EAST TEXAS BEST FOR HOMESEAKER

Industrial Agent of Southern Pacific
Strong in Praise of New
Farm Country.

Prof. H. P. Attwater, industrial agent for the Sunset-Central lines, returned Saturday from Palestine, where he attended the meeting of the East Texas Development Association and by special request of the program committee, delivered an illustrated address on the "Undeveloped Resources of East Texas," which was considered one of the most important talks of the meeting.

In speaking of the great development now going on in East Texas, largely through the combined efforts of the East Texas association and the newspapers in co-operation with the railroads, Mr. Attwater said:

"East Texas has many advantages for the homeseeker. Growing crops in fields, orchards and gardens show the productiveness of the land and the fertility of the soil. They lose a peach crop once in a while on account of unusual weather conditions or occasional frosts, but who ever heard of a failure of sweet potatoes, hog and hominy, buttermilk, berries or syrup in East Texas?"

"As you travel through East Texas the wild-eyed, bonny, long-horned steer no longer rushes madly into the woods at the approach of the locomotive, but in his place the sleek, gentle Jersey cow is seen standing, undisturbed by the sights and sounds of modern civilization and progress. Thoroughbred Poland China, Tamworth and Berkshire hogs are frequently observed and are pushing the gaunt, long-nosed 'razor-backs' further and further into the woods. In the barnyards the thoroughbred Rhode Island Red rooster is now seen proudly strutting and proclaiming himself 'monarch of all he surveys,' where formerly the halfbred Dominicker with a flock of sickly, pale-combed pullets scratched for a living. The white boy in his corn field is getting to be as common a sight as the negro and the mule in the cotton patch. New stores and other buildings in the towns, and new farm houses and barns in the country are to be seen everywhere; in fact progress and prosperity is in evidence on all sides.

"A hearty welcome awaits the new settler and his family in East Texas, and at this particular time of year the groves and woodlands present an inviting appearance. The cordial welcome is accompanied by the song of the mockingbird, the fragrance of the pine forests, the perfume of the magnolias, and the hum of the honey bee. There

There other exchanges are in pretty good shape already and can wait, while this exchange must be looked after at once.

As soon as the spell was over, however, and the sun came out the crops rallied and there was very little damage done. A splendid crop of corn was made that year but the worms eat most of the cotton.

The press dispatches today report freezing temperatures in the far north, with snow on the lake at Chicago.

The eighteen Texas representatives in congress have, according to the democratic caucus in passing on the assignments made by the ways and means committee, received many choice positions on the committees. Some of the committees on which they will serve are the most important in the House.

The Intercoastal Canal Edition of the Galveston Tribune which was published Monday morning of this week was a dandy issue and contained a large amount of information along the line of the canal movement, and was embellished with numerous industrial scenes and specially written articles. It contained fifty-six pages.

Pike to Garrison.

S. M. King advises us that on a recent trip to Garrison, he met up with quite a number of citizens who reside on the road between Nacogdoches and that city, and also a number of the Garrison citizens, and he finds that there is a well defined and strong movement on foot looking to the building of a pike road between the two cities.

Just how the funds are to be secured or when work will begin on the construction is not given out; but there is no mistaking the fact that the people of the two towns have this idea in mind and will work on it until something is doing.

When the proposition was put up to Lutkin to bridge the Angelina river, this county to pay half the expense of bridging the bottom (which proposition seems to have been abandoned by the Angelina people) we heard of several complaints from the citizens along the route between the county seat and Garrison, who believed that the county was acting too liberally toward our neighbor county and that a pike highway between Garrison and Nacogdoches would be of much more benefit to the county. This movement seems to be the outgrowth of this idea, and with as substantial people as we have in the county behind the proposition we may expect to see something doing real soon.

Already there is a fairly good dirt road to Garrison, with the exception of a sand bed or two, and this road has proven of great value, but with a pike the value of the highway could hardly be computed in dollars and cents. By all means let's build to Garrison a splendid highway.

J. H. Padon, who has been the editor and owner of the Tenaha Messenger for years past, has sold the paper to R. L. Russell, a former newspaper man of Angelina and Houston counties, and turned over the business this week to the new owner. Mr. Russell has spent years in the newspaper business and knows the several ins and outs of the profession, and it is quite likely that he will give the people of Tenaha a good paper and make it prosperous for himself. School Meeting at Sacul.

The patrons and friends of the Sacul school district held a very important meeting there last night at which time a discussion as to ways and means of improving the school facilities was indulged.

The meeting finally decided to circulate a petition for a bond election at which time it is proposed to vote bonds to the amount of \$1250 for the purpose of building an addition of one room to the school building, remodeling and making modern the roof, modernizing other features of the school, and equipping it with modern furniture and fixtures.

THE Angelina county commissioners court has killed the proposition of this county which sought to bridge the Angelina river and the bottom. The proposition that Nacogdoches county made to the Angelina county court was the most liberal that could have been made at all, and in fact had it not been for our liberal citizens who were behind the offer the county could never have made the offer. According to all rules or laws in such matters, when a steam in a county lines, each county pays only one-half the expense of bridging the stream. In the case in question this county proposed to pay its half of bridging the stream and one

half on the expense of bridging the bottom on the Angelina county side. Angelina county has missed an opportunity that may never again be put up to them, and we feel that they have made a great mistake.

THE Main street crossing at the passenger depot, at which point an effort was made some months ago to have the city council require a flagman, but which requirement was not made on account of the railroad agreeing to keep the crossing well open, is attracting considerable comment just now, and it is claimed that this crossing is very dangerous. The railroad company has recently put in several additional side tracks, and now there are about ten tracks across the Main street crossing. The complaint is made that the company em-

ployees are not careful as to where cars are left as regards the road crossing; sometimes a car is left just in the clear of the roadway on one side with considerable space on the other side, another track will have a car just missing the roadway from the other side, and so on across the ten tracks. It is claimed that this arrangement makes it absolutely impossible for teamsters or pedestrians to see an approaching train from either side. It is reported that one day last week a farmer with his wagon and team drove across the main line track and a freight train moved in behind him, but before he could clear the last line of tracks the switch engine backed a string of cars in front of him, shutting him in on both sides. Fortunately the team was gentle and did not scare, else there might have been a bad runaway and someone hurt.

THE best authorities have decided that the plague of infantile paralysis which is afflicting several sections of the state just now, particularly Texarkana and Eastern Texas in general, is directly attributable to the common stable flies, and a vigorous war is to be waged on this little pest. Time and time again have we urged the extermination of the flies in this city and have called on the authorities to take action, but nothing has been done and today the city of Nacogdoches is swarming with innumerable flies. Great wonder that an epidemic of infantile paralysis has not broken out here. A few fly traps are about the only evidence of a fight against the flies that can be seen here, and stables, barns, wagon yards, etc., remain unnoticed so far as compelling them to be cleaned up at regular intervals.

FOSTER'S WEATHER BULLETIN

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Washington D. C., June 12.—Last bulletin gave forecasts of disturbance to cross continent June 10 to 14, warm wave 9 to 13, cool wave 12 to 16.

Next disturbance will reach Pacific coast about June 15, cross Pacific slope by close of 16, great central valleys 17 to 19, eastern sections 20. Warm wave will cross Pacific slope about June 15, great central valleys 17, eastern sections 19. Cool wave will cross Pacific slope about 18, great central valleys 20, eastern sections 22.

As this disturbance approaches from the west the hot spell will continue but a great drop in temperatures is expected to follow, bringing cooler weather and showers and then generally quiet and cool weather for several days. Local drouths will be broken in some places as the cool wave comes in but many sections will continue to be dry and crops will suffer.

Another disturbance will reach Pacific coast about June 21, cross Pacific slope by close of 22, great central valleys 23 to 25, eastern sections 26. Warm wave will cross Pacific slope about June 21, great central valleys 23, eastern sections 25. Cool wave will cross Pacific slope about June 24, great central valleys 26, eastern sections 28.

Temperatures of this disturbance will average about or a little below normal. Showers will occur in many places but the rainfall will be generally less than usual. No dangerous storms are expected. Fair cropweather is expected in at least half the grain sections but not sufficient rain in south half of the cotton belt except a few heavy local rains.

But look out for July. Two dangerous storm periods will

occur in that month centering on 6 and 27. The forces are so complicated that specific forecasts are difficult and destructive storms may be expected any day thruout July. If, by giving these warnings, we could save one life we would be well repaid for taking the great responsibility of predicting dangerous storms.

We regard July as one of the most dangerous storm months of the year and we do not hesitate to give the most urgent warnings to all, particularly in the great central valleys of the middle west, that very dangerous storms will occur during next month. Five storms are expected to cross the continent and everyone should watch their movements carefully. Destructive storms—particularly tornadoes—usually occur southeast of the low or storm center and in the warm wave.

The dangerous storms are expected to cross the continent July 4 to 8, 10 to 14, 19 to 23, 24 to 28 and 29 to Aug. 2.

They will probably pass eastward between latitudes 35 and 45. One or more tropical storms—hurricanes—are expected during the month in the Caribbean Sea and Gulf of Mexico. Sometimes the first warning of a hurricane comes from the far northwest in shape of a severe cool wave. These northwestern cool waves in summer and cold waves in winter are usually connected with tropical storms.

We will continue to give out warnings and descriptions of the expected July dangerous storms.
