Charged With Bigamy.

Yesterday afternoon Deputy Sheriffs Frank Maples and Josh Henson went to Poe switch and arrested John Massey and brought him to town and lodged him in the county jail with a charge of bigamy entered against him.

It seems that Massey had been living in Shelby county, where he had a wife and two children. Some time ago he left his family and went away, and later he returned and took the children away with him. His wife made application to the district court at Center for the proper papers whereby she could secure the custody of the two children, and coming to Garrison she learned where her husband was and secured the assistance of the constable, and they went on Poe Switch to get the children. Arriving at Poe it was discovered that Massey had been married again about a week ago to a Miss Kirkland of Poe. A telephone call was put in for the sheriffs department here requesting that a complaint be filed and a warrant issued, and as Massey had threatened to make a fight to bring help with which to arrest him.

Deputy Maples made the complaint and secured a warrant and in company with Josh Henson went to Poe after their man. Massey made no effort to resist arrest, but came on without any trouble and was lodged in the jail.

It might be that an inter-urban company in East Texas would bridge the river and bottom between Nacogdoches and Lufkin, but it is a cinch that Angelina commissioners court would not take stock in such an enterprise. The must be afraid that they will lose some of their trade to Nacogdoches if their citizens could cross the river.

The San Augustine Tribune notices that just now as the cotton crop nears maturity the price nears the cost of production. If the cotton growers were not compelled to sell their crops as soon as gathered the price might possibly go up a little, but it never reaches the high water mark until after it is out of the hands of the producer.

A deed recorded in Angelina county 121 years ago sounds much like fiction, but the one to Pedro de la Passes for a large tract of land on the Angelina river near what is known as Spradley's Ferry was dated in 1792. Records in the abstract office of W. J. Townsend, in this city, bear out the fact. That was a long time ago, to be sure, but some of the deeds we are writing today will be referred to with just as much curiosity in generations to come. — Lufkin News vs.

The request that the governor demand the resignation of a district judge is a new procedure in Texas, yet such is the case with Judge Davidson of the Beaumont district court, who is charged with having ridden to California on a railroad pass and accepted expenses, and while there testified in the Southern Pacific suit to impeach the testimony of the government's witness.

Some weeks ago the Lufkin News stated that the Angelina county commissioner's court would bear half the expense of the bridging of the Angelina river at the Spradley ferry, the News evidently concluded that as this was permissible in the law the court would do so; but last week it was forced to make a correction, the county judge of that county advising that such was not the case, but that Nacogdoches county was going it alone on the job.

The exact mission of Governor Lind, special representative of the president to Mexico, is not known outside of official circles at Washington, yet the Mexican press and Mexican officials are making a great howl over the fact that he is sent there without credentials and a recognition of the Huerta regime, and an official note has been dispatched to the United States embassy stating that his presence in that country will not be desirable. It is hardly likely, however, that any violence will be done to Mr. Lind, the Mexican government could not afford to do worse than to treat him coldly.

We Will See What Angelina Will Do.

We are advised by parties who have been on the ground and have watched the progress of the construction of the bridge over Angelina river at the Spradley crossing, that by the end of this week the bridge will be finished across the river. It now remains to see what the Angelina county authorities will do in regard to the fixing of the bottom and the bridging of the several slues between the river and the bluff on the further side.

Nacogdoches county made a proposition to the Angelina commissioners court offering to bear half the expense of bridging the river and fixing the bottom so as to make a good and substantial crossing between the two county seats over the Angelina river. The business men of Lufkin were very much in favor of the proposition, they seeing that Nacogdoches county had agreed to do a great deal more than their rightful part in the matter; but the commissioners court turned down the proposition. So Nacogdoches county with the subscriptions of the Nacogdoches business men have gone ahead and built the bridge independent of Angelina county.

We are advised that Angelina county has more money to the credit of her road and bridge fund than any county possibly in Texas, and she has the worst roads.

It has been suggested that the commissioners want to do some work on the roads but are afraid that if they work roads in one part of the county they will encounter a protest from other parts, so in order to keep down these protests they will not spend the road money any where except where it is absolutely necessary.

Good Roads Reduce Expense.

"Over the roads to the market," is the ever sounding cry of the nation. It reverberates along the highways of commerce and finds its way into the minds of men. To reduce the cost of transportation and make farming more remunerative is the thing that is attracting the attention of those who strive for the uplift of mankind. In Texas the evolution is going steadily onward. So far this year over \$4,000,000 in good roads bonds has been issued, an amount sufficient to improve 1000 miles of public highways.

The farmers of Texas will market this year over ten million tons of products, entailing a highway expense of approximately \$21,000,000. If all our roads were in first-class condition this enormous expense would be reduced one half, as the cost of hauling freight over the mud hole and through the sand is 43 cents per ton while the cost over improved highway is 23 cents per mile.

Good roads reduce expense and distance as well.—Homer D. Wade.

Marble Pudding

Sift together, three times, the flour, baking powder, salt and cinnamon. To the yolks add the sugar, butter and water, and stir into the dry ingredients. Add the whites of the eggs. Divide the mixture into two parts and add the chocolate to one part. Dispose the two parts in a buttered mold to give a marbled appearance. Steam forty-five minutes.

Boil 2 cups of sugar and a cup of water six minutes; add 2 tablespoonfuls of butter and a teaspoonful of vanilla extract.

Much Interest in Texas Building at Worlds' Fair.

Fort Worth, Texas, August 6.—Considerable interest is being manifested all over Texas in the movement by the Texas Commercial Executives Association for a state building at the Worlds' Fair, San Francisco, 1915. At the recent Institute of that association a resolution was passed and forwarded to the Governor asking his assistance in securing an appropriation to cover the cost of constructing the building and gathering an exhibit. In connection with the resolution passed by the state association it was decided to place the matter before the clubs represented at the meeting and as a result of the movement over forty petitions have been sent to Austin asking for favorable action on the appropriation. Practically every commercial organization is in favor of a building at the Exposition.

Griffin's Complaint in Governor's Office.

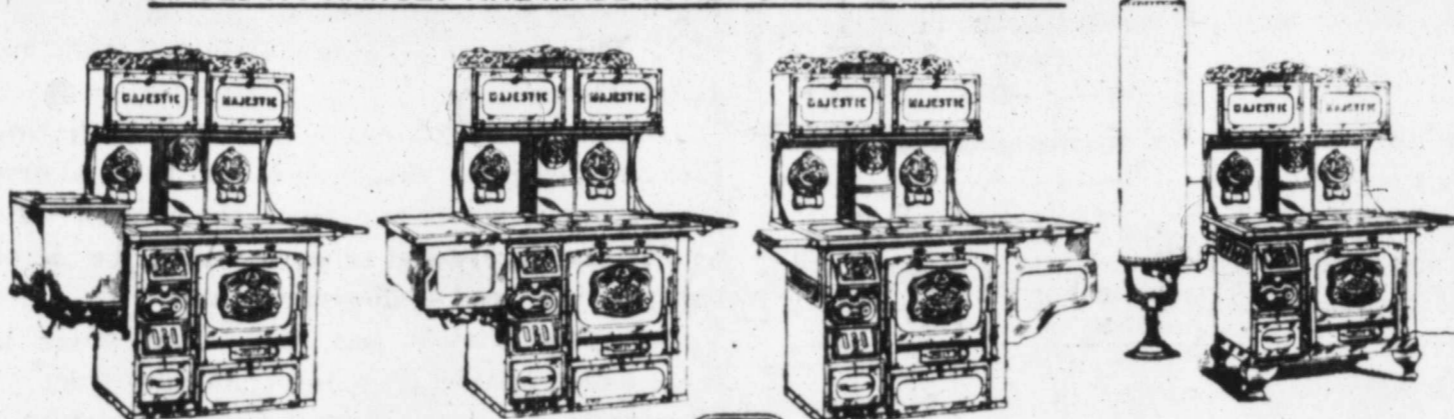

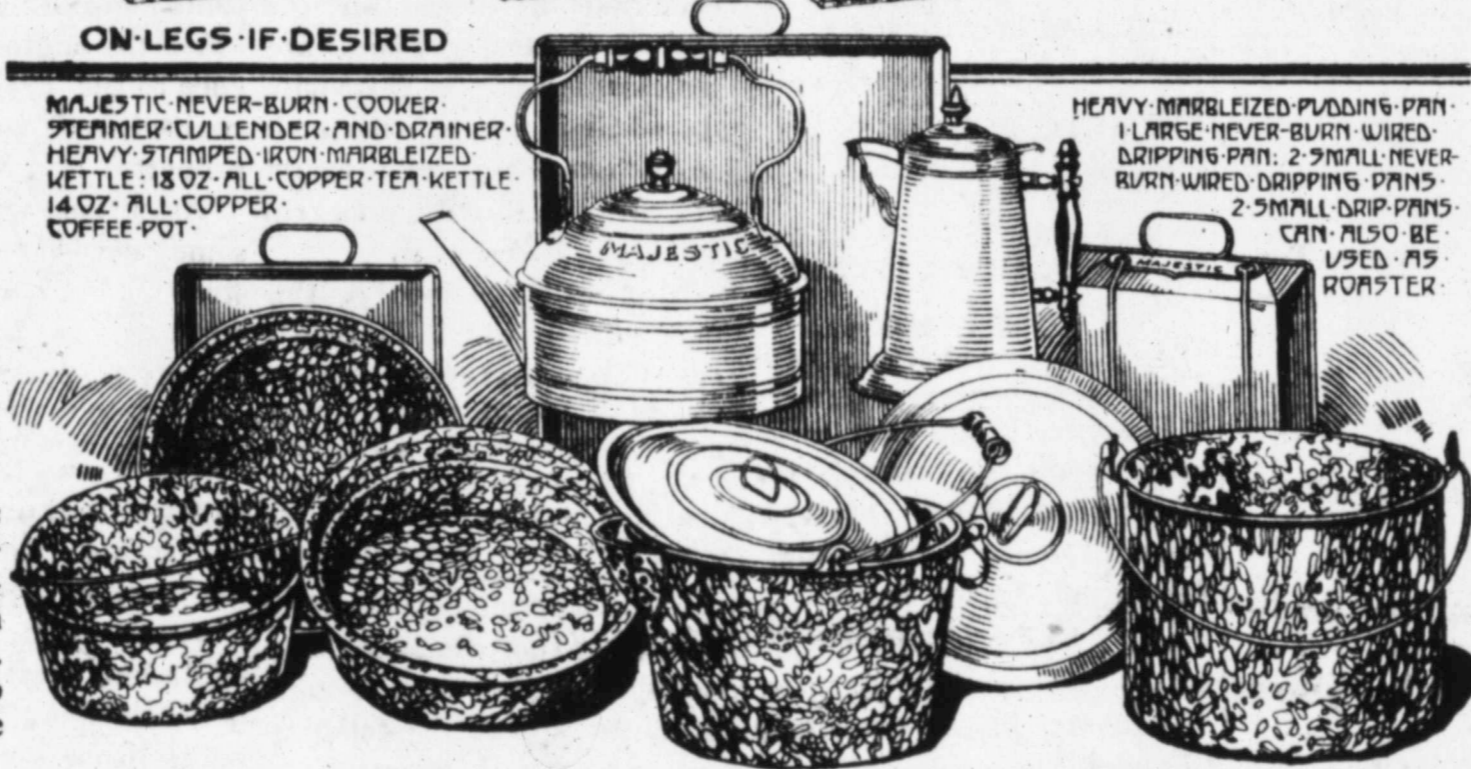

The First Bale.

From Saturday's Daily: The first bale of this year's crop of cotton was brought to the city late yesterday afternoon, August 8th, and was grown by O. D. Ammond of the Red Oak community, about six miles north of town. It was sold at auction this morning by John S. Doughtie to Thomas & Richardson for 20 cents a pound. The seed were bought by the Nacogdoches Cotton Oil Co. for \$6.15. A premium of \$55.25 was made up by the business men of the city. The bale weighed 387 pounds. It netted the grower \$138.80.

In the last twenty-nine years Mr. Doughtie has sold twenty-five of the first bales, the other four first bales were sold while Mr. Doughtie was out of the state.

A notable fact is that this is the second earliest first bale brought to this market in the twenty-nine years Mr. Doughtie has been selling them. The earliest was brought in July 28th, this one August 8th, and the other first bales have been brought in August 10th, 11th and on to the 15th.

The Undefeated Meet Their Waterloo in a Fast and Furious by a Score of 4 to 3.

The Houston Elks baseball team, who had heretofore resisted all efforts of opposing Elks ball teams to put a game by them, came to Nacogdoches yesterday to try a tussle with our team—and they went home last night a sadder but wiser bunch. All their advance dope about thirsting for more gore, hating to do it, and wearing bells, etc., didn't seem to have the desired effect. They were a formidable looking bunch of fellows, and looked every one a ball player, and they were; but there are others, and the Nacogdoches Elks demonstrated this fact to the satisfaction of all.

From the time Umpire Wood announced the batteries of the two teams and called "play ball" the struggle was on. The home team took the field and retired the visitors in one, two, three order. In Nacogdoches half of the inning Muller singled to first and was thrown out trying to steal second, and a little later Monzingo was thrown out trying to steal third. This with a throw out at first retired the side, and Nacogdoches lost a splendid opportunity to start the game in the lead.

In the second chapter Houston bunched a lot of bunts and managed to get two runners over the home station, while the best that Nacogdoches could do was to get a man or two on the bases, only to die there.

Here the run getting ceased until in the fifth stanza Drewry singled and got to first, and Nichols took his place as runner; Muller lined out a clean three-bagger, scoring Nichols and landing on third. On a sacrifice bunt Muller was put out at home plate, but Monzingo who had advanced to third completed the circuit and tied the score.

In the next inning Houston worked a man around the circuit and the score stood one in favor of the visitors; but in the seventh inning Nacogdoches put two over, while the visitors failed to register either in the eighth or ninth inning.

The game throughout was fast and snappy and every player was right on the job all the time. Of course there were several errors made on both sides and some bonehead plays, but such things will happen; but taking the game all the way through it was the best game of baseball ever seen on the local diamond, and a number of visitors in the city who had seen several games this year by the league clubs declared it was the very best game they had seen this year.
