### County School Trustees.

The county school trustees met yesterday morning in the office of the county superintendent and adjourned this afternoon after a two days session. The following county trustees were present: R. F. Davis, A. F. Day, G. F. Fuller and Tom Maroney.

Among the different items for the schools disposed of was the county apportionment which was 20 cents per capita.

The rural schools of the county were classified as regards the rural high school. Woden, Martinsville, Center, Nat and Douglass were made rural high schools of the 3rd class. The balance of the county schools were classed as intermediate schools of 7 grades.

The high school transfer apportionment was placed at \$10.50, the same as it was last year.

### Farmer Bankrupt for \$360,289.

Waco, Aug. 30.—Augustus C. Allen, farmer and stock raiser at Fowler, Bosque county, filed a voluntary petition in bankruptcy in the federal court here today. His liabilities total \$360,289, while his assets aggregate \$303,318. Exemptions to the amount of \$5,294 are claimed. The petitioner is the owner of large property interests in Harris, Galveston, Erath, Bosque, Brazoria, Kirby, Liberty and Nacogdoches county.

The chicken fanciers in and around Nacogdoches are just now on the anxious seat figuring on whether or not their chickens will take the premiums at the chicken show to be pulled off at the fair by the Nacogdoches County Poultry Association. One thing is fortunate for the chicken fanciers, and that is that not all of them have the same strain of tows. There are several different kinds that will be exhibited.

Now since the cotton season is opening up and the cotton wagons are beginning to roll in from Angelina county over the new bridge, it would be a very wise act for the merchants business men and the county authorities to get together and do a lot of work on the road from town to the river. There is a fairly good road to the Fern Lake property, six miles out, but there are one or two sand beds and rough places in the road from Fern Lake to the river. This road could be made a splendid road with a very little outlay, and once the farmers get the habit of coming to this city to trade, the good roads will keep up the habit. Its worth looking into right away.

When the Sentinel begins to report load after load of cotton coming in every day over the new Angelina river bridge, built by this county and business men of this city, the Angelina commissioners court will take notice and begin work on the road between the bridge and Lutkin to turn the trade toward their county seat town. It doesn't look just right to force a proposition on a lot of fellows, but we just had to have a good road between these two towns, and there was no other way to do it. The law providing that there shall be a good public road between county seats should be observed the same as any other law, and besides we like those Lutkin people, they are all good fellows, and we want conditions so that we can drive over and visit them occasionally and have them return our call, too.

**Out After Angoras.**  
Fifteen thousand goats have been captured by the Mexican constitutionalists, according to a report made by Consul Blocker at Eagle Pass to the United States department of state. These goats belonged to Maiz Bros., Spanish citizens of Monterey, and General Carranza says their capture was a military necessity.

While it would have been better if Carranza had captured federal goats, including those of Huerta and Diaz, yet the fact that he has gone into the goat-getting business on a large scale shows that he has at last decided to get busy in the right way.

Capturing 15,000 goats, if they were only the right Angoras, would put a stop to the situation in Mexico. Some body is likely to feed Huerta's goat a can of nitroglycerin and then jostle the animal, and the goat of Felix Diaz is said to be now in the corral of the mikado.

There are lots of wild goats in Mexico, and some of them have never been penned, but if Carranza will keep on capturing goats he may soon have the situation well in hand.

If he can get Huerta's goat before Lind and Wilson get it, Carranza can also justify that as a military necessity.—Houston Chronicle.

**Rusk Citizens Do Not Want Prison There.**  
San Antonio, Texas, Aug. 26.—Deplorable conditions of the convict system of Texas since the abolition of the "bat" are described by W. M. Imboden, former district attorney of Cherokee County, who is in the city to place his youngest son in a military school here. Mr. Imboden stated that the citizens of Rusk are strongly in favor of the state abandoning the penitentiary there and cutting the land up in small tracts and selling it to actual settlers, so strong is the sentiment against conditions as they now exist, which, he says, were brought on by the abolition of the bat as a means of punishment. The convicts are really a danger and a menace, he says. Fifty per cent of convict labor has been lost thereby.

Mr. Imboden expressed himself as opposed to the treatment of convicts "with sentiment pervading the penitentiary situation." He scouted the idea that convicts can be successfully managed under a system as at present used, "that treats them like a lot of school boys."

**An Appalling Condition**  
A statement was recently made to the effect that only three boys out of every one hundred are in school at the age of sixteen. The announcement was made, it is declared, after a careful investigation. It is true, and there are no grounds for serious doubt, a condition exist along this line which is astonishing. That only three remain in school out of that number at sixteen years of age, simply shows a deplorable condition, one which needs serious consideration. It is a problem which will try the most adept in educational fundamentals. The reports say the Austin Statesman that "the average man who hasn't taken high school training or its equivalent reaches his minimum capacity at the age of 22. His average salary is \$10 a week. Men who take high school work and stop there reach their minimum capacity at the age of 30, with an average of \$18 to \$20 a week. Then men who take university training reach their maximum at the age 45 to 50 years, with an average earning capacity of \$35 to \$40 a week. It is shown school enrollment of boys drop from 50 per cent at the age of 12 to 3 per cent at the age of 16."

These facts indicate the alarming condition clearly and should arouse interest on the part of parent and teacher, to that pitch which will lesson, at least the percent of boys who drop out of the school work at the period they should stick closer to it.—Greenville Banner.

## FOSTER'S WEATHER BULLETIN

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Washington, D. C., Aug. 30.—Last bulletin gave forecasts of disturbance to cross continent Aug. 26 to Sept. 2, warm wave Aug. 28 to Sept. 1, cool wave Aug. 31 Sept. 4. This disturbance will average warmer than usual and rainfall will be less than usual but a few showers will occur with heavy rains in a few places.

The most important weather feature of Sept. will be its rainfall which is expected to be less than usual.

Of the three principal storm waves of September we give particular warning for September 12 to 18. That will be the most dangerous part of the month and no risk should be taken. The equinoctial storms this year will occur not far from September 15 to 28 but the first period will be unusually severe.

The dry weather of September will extend into the cotton states and cause considerable loss to top growths of cotton. As to the 1914 winter grain crops we can make no estimate before first of November, 1913, but we will be able to make a valuable estimate of the 1915 wheat crop early in the year 1914.

Next disturbance will reach Pacific coast about September 3, cross Pacific slope by close of 4, great central valleys 5 to 7, eastern sections 8. Warm wave will cross Pacific slope about September 8, great central valleys 5, eastern sections 7. Cool wave will cross Pacific about September 6, great central valleys 8, eastern sections 10.

Very warm during this period and the storm forces, though not great, will have greater than usual intensity. Not much rain generally but a few local thunder showers and some probability of a few hail storms.

Third storm wave of September will reach the Pacific coast about 9, cross Pacific slope by close of 10, great central valleys 11 to 13, eastern sections 14. Warm wave will cross Pacific slope about September 9, great central valleys 11, eastern sections 13. Cool wave will cross Pacific slope about September 12,

great central valleys 14, eastern sections 16.

While this disturbance will average warmer than usual it will not be as warm as the preceding storm wave. Showers will increase. Force of the storms will be less till about September 18, when they will begin to increase preparatory for the great storm period of September 12 to 18. On September 12 you should begin to think about hunting places of safety.

Orthodox scientists who are persistent critics of planetary meteorology should go back in weather history and investigate conditions during the years when Jupiter occupied positions similar to this year and they will surely find great weather events. Jupiter's cycle is 11.84 years and in its first cycle you will find the great drouth and destruction in the corn crop of the year 1901. Hunt up other weather events near those twelve year cycles of the great planet Jupiter and you will learn something of value.

Columbus Fleet on Journey to San Diego.

San Diego, Cal., Sept. 1.—San Diego is to see the reproductions of the caravels of Columbus, the Santa Maria, the Pinta and the Nina, and the harbor of San Diego is to be the first one on the Pacific Coast of the United States to hail them, after they have passed through the Panama Canal.

These reproductions of the caravels of Columbus, constructed for the World's Columbian Exposition in Chicago in 1893, have been in Jackson Park, in Chicago ever since that time, but on the fifteenth of the present month they leave the Jackson Park lagoon, and really start on their long journey to the Pacific Coast. They were first taken to the drydock at South Chicago, where they are made entirely seaworthy.

From Chicago the little fleet will proceed to Boston, and there they will tie up for the winter. In the spring they will be manned by crews of students from Harvard and begin their long cruise. It is planned to skirt the Atlantic, stopping at San Salvador, the first land discovered by Columbus, and then on to Panama and through the canal.

School Land To Be Inspected.

Midland, Texas, August, 31.—The members of the School Land Appraisal Commission left this city Wednesday, beginning their long trip over the school lands of West Texas. The party made up of R. W. Priest, Chairman, Hon. J. T. Robinson, Land Commissioner, L. E. Cowling, Secretary of the Commission, and G. C. Norris, stenographer. They will visit a total of thirty-eight counties and will travel by automobile. The work of the Commission will cover a careful view of the school lands, many of which have been sold at a price that works hardships on homesteaders. The values of some of the property will be readjusted as a result of this trip.

## Fourth Class Postmaster Examination, Saturday, October 11, 1913.

The United States Civil Service Commission announces that on the date named above an examination will be held at Appleby Texas, as a result of which it is expected to make certification to fill a contemplated vacancy in the position of fourth class postmaster of class at Appleby, Texas, and other vacancies as they may occur at that office, unless it shall be decided in the interests of the service to fill the vacancy by reinstatement. The compensation of the postmaster of this office was \$602.00 for the last fiscal year.

Age limit, 21 years and over on the date of the examination, with the exception that in a State where women are declared by statute to be of full age for all purposes at 18 years, women 18 years of age on the examination will be admitted.

Applicants must reside within the territory supplied by the postoffice for which the examination is announced.

The examination is open to all citizens of the United States who can comply with the requirements.

Application forms and full information concerning the requirements of the examination can be secured from the postmaster at Appleby and the local secretary at Nacogdoches, or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

Applications should be properly executed and filed with the commission at Washington at least seven days before the date of the examination, otherwise it may be impracticable to examine the applicants.

### City Council.

The city council met yesterday afternoon at the city hall, Mayor Matthews presiding, and all councilmen present except G. A. Blount, who was not in the city.

The minutes for the previous meeting were read and approved.

Officers of the Southwestern Telephone Company were present and came before the council requesting that they be not required to move their poles off the streets to be paved at once, but that time be given them in which to do the work, promising that when they removed the poles they would fill in where the poles had been with paving the same as at any other point on the street. They explained that they were arranging to move their exchange to quarters on East Main street, and were putting cables under ground on this street, and expected to run their wires so as to give service from the back streets. The council agreed to give them until March 1st in which to do the work.

The reports of the mayor, tax collector, treasurer, city marshal, and the light and water superintendent were read to the council and filed with the city secretary.

R. L. Hardeman, Elbert Summers and Simon Mintz, acting as a committee from residents on North Church street and streets adjoining, appeared before the council and requested that a sewer be put in to serve that section of the city. The committee represented to the council that for years they had been asking for this sewer and believed they were entitled to it, and they offered to pay a portion of the expense of the said sewer if the city would appropriate funds for the work. The city agreed to appropriate \$175 on the work and the committee guaranteed the remainder. Engineer Collins was instructed to prepare specifications and estimates for a six inch sewer from the head of Church street to connect with the sewer near Main. As soon as the estimates are in hand the necessary material will be ordered.

A communication was read from the paving company complaining about no remittance being received on their claim for the work done on the storm sewers preliminary to the paving of the streets. The paving company has rendered a bill for the cost of the storm sewers but the city refuses to pay the bill until the paving company begins work on the paving or shows a willingness to do the work, holding that the storm sewers are a part of the paving contract and unless the paving is done the storm sewers are of no value to the city.

The matter of the water supply of the city came up for discussion. Mr. Hubbard of the water department made a statement to the council regarding the status of the water in the pond, showing the amount taken out each day and the amount accumulating during the night, and it appeared that the supply of water was not sufficient to meet the demands should the dry weather continue. ### July Vital Statistics.

Austin, Texas, Aug. 29.— Births quadrupled deaths in the state during the month of July. The report issued today by R. P. Babcock, state registrar of vital statistics, shows 4814 births and 1247 deaths. There were 45 sets of twins born.

The greatest number of deaths was occasioned by infantile diseases, 233 deaths from enteritis and diarrhoea under two years of age having been reported. Tuberculosis claimed 212 deaths, while the deaths from the other diseases were scattering. Typhoid fever caused 79 deaths.

Three deaths of negroes who had passed the century mark were reported, one of which was a negro woman whose age was given at 106 years.

She packed her butter in jars to within a couple of inches of the top, covered it with two inches of salt, put over that two thicknesses of cheese cloth and put on stone lid. She says it would stay good that way indefinitely. Of course you'd want to keep it in a cool, clean place.—[A. M. A. in Southern Farming.

### MEXICO ACCEPTS GOOD OFFICES

Message of Gamboa to Mr. Lind Forwarded to President Wilson.

Vera Cruz, Aug. 27.—(Copyrighted, 1913, by the New York Herald Company.)—Mexico has agreed to accept the good offices of President Wilson in settlement of the grave internal disorders, revolutions, brigandage and bankruptcy which have been ravaging and depopulating the land during the past three years and which cost many thousand lives, and destroying many hundreds of millions of dollars worth of property.

Mexico's acceptance of the good offices came to John Lind, President Wilson's personal representative, late this afternoon as he was preparing to steam within the next few days for the United States.

Yesterday Lind's mission, a most delicate one, was accorded a failure. Today it is one of the most successful in the history of diplomatic negotiations of the United States, and it is expected that he will return to the capital which he left yesterday, going as the acknowledged friend of Mexico instead of "persona non grata," as Mexico regarded him a fortnight ago.

The message which Minister of Foreign Affairs Gamboa transmitted to Mr. Lind this afternoon is one which the Mexican government on its own accord accepts Washington's good offices to help it out of a most tangled and difficult situation.

Gamboa makes it plain to Mr. Lind that it is not necessary for Washington to insist on the elimination of President Huerta, since the constitution provides for that end and it is not possible for him as president ad interim to become a candidate for a constitutional office to succeed himself. This phase of the situation at once removed a most objectionable feature and one which Mr. Lind most persistently urged.

With the earliest possible election of a constitutional president, recognition by the United States will come. In the meantime, it is known that President Wilson's official or unofficial representative will be welcomed in the City of Mexico and the work of untraveling the tangled threads will be taken up.

Mr. Lind in a message to President Wilson tonight communicated to Washington the full text and import of Mexico's note.

Mr. Lind is now here waiting for instructions from Washington.

The first work of Mr. Lind on his return to the Mexican capital will be to get the leaders of all factions and parties together to name their candidates for president and vice president.

"Equal suffrage and fair count" will be the slogan and aim of Mr. Lind, and if he is successful it will be the first time in the history of Latin-America that a real election has been fact and not fiction.
