There are quite a number of prizes to be contested for and the entries from the several counties may contest for all the prizes.

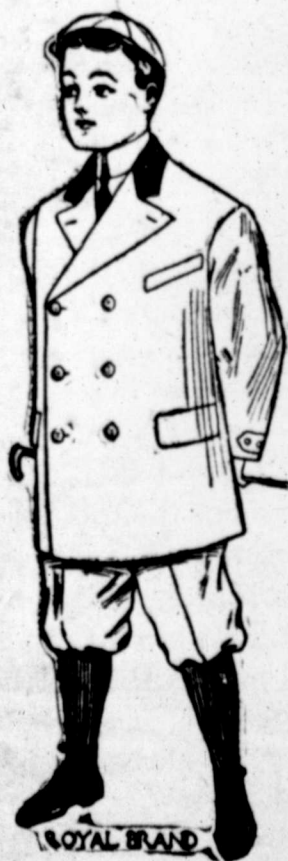

Colored Teachers Institute.

The increasing share of the Gulf and Northern border ports in the receipt and distribution of our foreign commerce is illustrated by a comparison of the figures of imports and exports by customs districts in 1913 compared with those of 1900, just completed by the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, Department of Commerce. It shows a distinct decline in the share which the Atlantic ports handle, both of imports and exports, and that their loss is chiefly diverted to the Gulf and Northern border ports. The Pacific and Mexican border ports show little change in their percentage of the total.

The cotton report for the month of August given out by the state department of agriculture, shows 500,202 bales ginned, as compared with 467,560 the same month last year. In the report some of the big cotton counties of the state are not listed.

For a Good Roads Exhibit.

The Sentinel is in receipt of a letter from the Department of Civil Engineering of the A. & M. College, good roads division, advising that the department had maintained a good roads exhibit and would show the exhibit at all the state and county fairs this fall, which exhibit will be seen by a large number of visitors to the several fairs and will make a splendid advertisement for the counties which will have an exhibit in the collection. The department's exhibit will consist of photographs of the several roads in the counties, of bridges and culverts, showing material of which the roads built and the cost per mile.

The department requests that this county send to the exhibit a lot of not less than six photographs of sections of their good roads and same will be grouped in the exhibit, a system of lettering adopted by the department will give the information with reference to the road, its cost, the amount of traffic which goes over it and the age, etc., shown at the bottom of each picture. The pictures should be 7-1/2x9 1-2 or 6x9 inches and mounted on dark board. This matter should be put up to the Young Men's Commercial Club and if possible the several photographs furnished.

The request is signed by Robt. J. Potts, professor of Highway Engineering, A. & M. College, College Station.

Cuero Planning Her Turkey Trot.

Austin, Texas, Sept. 11.—Elaborate preparations are being made for the Cuero annual "turkey trot," which is scheduled for the latter part of November, according to Representative A. S. Crisp of that place, who was here on business with the state board of education. He says that it is planned to have not less than 30,000 turkeys in the big parade, which is to be led by the governor and other state officials.

Mr. Crisp says that since Cuero has been making a specialty of the turkey raising business, it has developed into one of the leading industries in that section of the state; there are two slaughter houses devoted entirely to the preparation of these birds for the market. Most of these turkeys are shipped to the Northern and Eastern markets.

Arm Torn From Body.

Timpson, Texas, Sept. 12.—Yesterday afternoon as Travis Williams, fifteen years old, was on a step ladder trying to adjust a belt at the bottling works, his left arm became entangled in the belt in some way, and before the engine could be stopped the arm was twisted around the shaft several times, tearing the member from the body. The boy fell to the brick floor about eight feet below, where he was picked up and carried to the residence of his uncle and medical attention given him. Reports from the bedside state that the wounded boy is doing as nicely as could be hoped and the entire city wish and hope that he will recover.

We want it distinctly understood that we did not promise fair weather for today, or any other day for that matter, but that the promise of fair weather was sent out from the Washington Weather Bureau. However, this spell is not the kind of weather we would have ordered had it been up to us to designate.

Shelby county is to have a hookworm investigation under the direction of the State Health Officer, and the investigation began last week. The commissioners court of Shelby county made provision for this hookworm investigation and treatment of those effected last spring by appropriating the money for the county's part of the expense.

Last Sunday's Houston Chronicle carried a twenty-page advertisement for the Peden Iron & Steel Co., the largest commercial advertisement ever carried by any Southern paper. The growth of the Peden Iron & Steel company from a capitalization of \$7,500 to \$1,000,000 in two decades is attributable to the freight rates enjoyed by Houston by reason of Buffalo Bayou or Houston Ship Channel.

Some of our citizens are indulging various speculations as to what the paving contractors, the bonding company or the city intend to do about the paving of our streets. The city council has ordered the work to proceed and when the contractors failed to proceed the bonding company was notified and advised that the city would expect them to take up the work and go ahead with it. But no word has been received from either the contractors or the bonding company. The nearest evidence that anything is being done in the matter is a shipment of steel bars at the express office addressed to the Municipal Paving Company. These bars are intended for use in the construction of the curbs and gutters.

Sorghum Poison in Cattle.

By Geo. R. White, M. D., D. V. S., State Live Stock Inspector.

The plant botanically known as Sorghum Vulgare—or as referred to through this section of country as "sorghum"—when eaten by cattle during certain stages of its development is a deadly poison on account of the prussic acid which it contains. Prussic acid is recognized the world over as one of the most dangerous and deadly "poisons."

Sorghum retarded or stunted in growth contains a larger per cent of prussic acid than does that which grows rapidly and develops into a healthy vigorous plant. The leaves are more heavily loaded with prussic acid than the stalk. As much as 1 per cent prussic acid has been extracted from green sorghum leaves. This would mean that one pound of these leaves would contain a fatal dose for an ordinary cow or steer. In mature sorghum the stalks and seeds do not contain prussic acid.

There is an erroneous impression abroad to the effect that it is only the second crop of sorghum which is poisonous to cattle. This is incorrect as the first crop contains as large per cent of the poison as does the second crop. However this erroneous idea rises from the fact that the first crop is rarely ever pastured, whereas it is not at all unusual, especially in the early fall, for cattle to be turned into fields where the shoots and the young plant of second growth or crop are developing. It is under these conditions that the cattle owner should fear death from sorghum poison. Every year in Tennessee during the late summer and early fall hundreds of cattle are lost from poison of this character.

Experiments to date demonstrate that dry, clear weather, by arresting the normal development of the plant, is the chief cause of the formation of abnormal quantities of poison.

SYMPTOMS.

The usual symptoms presented may be summarized about as follows. However, it should be borne in mind that these symptoms may vary, depending upon the amount of sorghum consumed, and the per cent of prussic acid which it contains, the susceptibility and size of the individual animal, etc. Drowsiness, fluid discharge from the eyes, involuntarily twitching of the muscles, numbness of limbs, incoordination of movement, staggering gait, inability to stand, dizziness, involuntary passing of urine and feces, stopped rumination, dull expression from eyes, free flow of saliva from mouth, partial or complete paralysis of tongue and throat, limbs and ears cold, weak heart action, pupils dilated; all the symptoms increase in intensity until there is complete coma after which death quickly ensues.

What a spectacle this lofty sentiment to behold! How awfully inspiring to our youth! How consoling to our manhood? It is disgusting beyond all power of human tongue to tell or pen to indite."—Tyler Courier Times

Trip to the Inside of Fiery Vesuvius.

Naples, Sept. 15.—A depth of 1200 feet was reached by Prof. Malladra and his two companions in their recent descent of the crater of Vesuvius. This constitutes a record for such an enterprise, it is said. The party spent an hour in making scientific experiments on the brink of the great funnel at the bottom of the crater; which they are able to sound to a depth of 200 feet.

The tunnel, which is 500 feet in diameter, was created by a sudden subsidence of the old crater floor last month. The explorers found the inside of the tunnel to be an enormous fiery cavern. They lost their thermometers, the steel rope on which they were suspended becoming fused by the acids and terrific heat. However they had obtained a recognized temperature of 626 degrees Fahrenheit before the mishap occurred.

Cultivation of Milo Maize and Kaffir Corn recommended.—Every farmer in the State of Texas, it matters not in what section he lives, is advised to raise each year a moderate amount of milo maize and kaffir corn. These are of the sorghum family, and are drought resistant. They will wait for the rain, and grow and mature when it comes, while Indian corn, under like circumstances, will die; in point of value as food for all kinds of stock, in both grain and roughness they will average to be fully as valuable per acre as Indian corn. If you had intended to plant twenty acres in Indian corn, put five acres of the ground in kaffir corn, or milo maize, and the other fifteen acres in Indian corn, and note results.

Presbytery.

Rev. M. C. Johnson has just returned from Atlanta where he attended the meeting of Jefferson Presbytery, and reports that in spite of the incessant rains this meeting was the most interesting and profitable for many years. For the information of the many Presbyterians in Nacogdoches county in particular it may be stated that from the official records this church in Texas and throughout the nation reached the high-water mark of its progress, both in growth of membership from conversions and in contributions of money for the Kingdom of Christ—in other words this past year has been the best in this 150 years of Presbyterian work on the American continent.

The records show that 88,808 were added on conversion, 61,866 by certificate, making a total of 150,174, added to the church during the year. This does not include converts in mission fields, which are always reported separately. The members contributed \$26,250,000 for all purposes, exclusive of legacies or endowments. The legacies were \$683,800, and theological funds \$521,389. From the totals it is shown the Presbyterians lead the world in offerings to Christian work.

It is of local interest to know that J. G. McCarter, who has relatives here, was licensed to preach, and Rev. Edward K. Temple was received as a new pastor. The vote to receive the Reformed Church (German) into union with the Presbyterians was unanimous. Rev. G. W. C. Self is moderator for this year and Rev. M. C. Johnson the stated clerk.

Wanted Money Order on Credit.

We often hear of people making strange requests of postmasters, but one out of the ordinary came to Postmaster Price from Pineland last night. It was from a lady and urged that a postoffice money order to a foreign land calling for \$140.60 be forwarded to her to day and she would remit by return mail.

Mr. Price tries to oblige everybody, but was forced to decline to accommodate the lady on account of Uncle Sam's peculiar ways of doing business.—Exchange.

Paderewski's Tribute to Women.

In the October Woman's Home Companion Ignace Paderewski, the celebrated pianist, is interviewed on the subject: "What a Little Knowledge of Music Means." In the course of the interview Paderewski is quoted as saying:

"But for women there would be today no art in the world not alone in America, but anywhere. The assertion may seem a sweeping one, but I thoroughly believe it to be true. The women it is who, though inborn love of music, and responsive, deeply refined feeling, encourage it in braye, practical, energetic ways. The women it is, too, who lead in the cause of its fostering, and influence by their supreme enthusiasm the men to follow."

This embrace in Presiding Elder's Districts and about 275 pastoral charges representing a membership of about 75,000.

During Conference week it will be necessary to make provision for the entertainment of approximately 650 persons, which includes preachers, lay delegates and visitors. This is a monumental task, and will tax our city to its utmost capacity. Yet, we can do this thing creditably, and we must. We have invited this body not simply as a denomination, but as a city, and as such our reputation is at stake. Hence we are writing this article that our hospitable citizens may get an idea of what is before us and plan accordingly. Without regard to denominational affiliation, Nacogdoches "expects every man to do his duty", and she will not be disappointed.

The coming of such a body of men into our city will be commercially advantageous, as many of them (even a majority) are from our smaller towns and country places, and will purchase their winter supplies in various lines while among us. They will be a blessing to the social life of our community by the atmosphere of delightful association in the homes and at the public gatherings. But above every other consideration, the influence of such a great body of Christian workers upon the religious life of our churches is beyond computation.

Now, I am calling upon whosoever reads these lines to consider what part you can take in making this Conference a success. Talk about it in your homes, and decide how many delegates you can entertain for that period, and let me know at your earliest convenience by phone, or otherwise, as I am already beginning to keep record of such matters. By complying with this request you save me from a personal interview and assure the provision of homes for all delegates at a much earlier date than otherwise.

She is a noted club woman, writer, and one of the most brilliant women in the South. Mrs. William E. Martin, of Montgomery, Ala., is Secretary of the Auxiliary.

President Wilson will be the principal speaker at the Mobile convention of the Southern Commercial Congress, and Mrs. Wilson probably will accompany him and participate in the Woman's Auxiliary convention.

District Court.

The criminal docket was taken up in the district court Tuesday morning of this week and has occupied the time of the court since. The following cases have been disposed of up to Wednesday night.

State vs Percy Birdwell, charged with burglary. Tried by jury and given two years in the penitentiary. The jury in this case recommended a suspended sentence. It appeared at the trial that at the time of the offence for which defendant was charged, that he was under twenty-one years of age; that it was his first offence, and that he was led to the commission of the crime by an older party. Young Birdwell was released by the court on suspended sentence and went to his home. This is the first case of a suspended sentence in this county since the law went into effect.

State vs Bob Horn, two cases of forgery and two cases for passing forged instruments. Three cases were dismissed and he was convicted in one and given two years in the penitentiary.

State vs Oscar McLamore, charged with murder; dismissed on account of the death of the defendant.

State vs Lawrence Haltom, arson; dismissed on motion of the district attorney.

State vs Jno. Massey, charged with bigamy; plead guilty and was given two years in the penitentiary. This case was disposed of the first of last week.

State vs Elwood Keithley, charged with burglary. Case on trial.

The court being engaged in the trial of a case, ordered a jury to be empaneled and present in the court at 1 o'clock in the afternoon.

At the afternoon session, after empanelling the jury, Massey appeared in court and entered a plea of guilty to the charge and asked and mercy of the court. The penalty in such case is from two to five years in the penitentiary, and the jury assessed the penalty at two years in the penitentiary.
