At his home one mile west of the city last night, between 9 and 10 o'clock, "Uncle" Geo. Menefee passed away after an illness of about two weeks from a bowel trouble, and will be buried this afternoon at Fairview at 3:50.

"Uncle" Geo. was attacked about two weeks ago by sickness and his physicians were successful in arresting the disease, but the age and physical condition of the patient was against him and he did not rally, and lingered until early last night when death came to his relief.

The deceased resided for a number of years in the eastern part of the county. He moved to this city about a year ago, and has made his home west of town on the lower Douglass road. He was a prominent citizen in his section and a staunch worker in the Methodist church of which he was a member, and was highly esteemed by all who knew him.

He is survived by an aged wife and eight children, all of whom were with him when he died: Tatum and George W. Menefee of Center; Ralt Menefee of Chireno; Mrs. Carrie Webb and Mrs. Pearl Sanford of Center, and Miss Melissa Menefee of Center; Mrs. Vesta January of Dallas, and his youngest daughter who lives at Marshall, Texas.

The loss on the building is estimated at something near \$500, and the loss on Mr. Murphey's household effects will be considerable though the exact amount cannot be determined until things are straightened out and dried out; but it is though the loss will not exceed \$400; both losses are covered by insurance.

Little Miss Loverne Muphey heard the fire some little while before she could locate it and then the fire began dropping through the ceiling. She turned in the alarm, assisted her mother to the residence of a neighbor and returned to the burning building and began taking down the family pictures and emptying the dresser drawers of valuables before anyone else came, and by her presence of mind assisted materially in saving the household furnishings.

Hurt in Runaway Accident.

Saturday night when trying to get into his buggy from the rear in order to stop the horse which was going at some speed down the road, R. I. Burgess was thrown violently to the ground and had his left shoulder dislocated.

Mr. Burgess had been at the residence of W. P. Burrows, on the Logansport road and had accompanied the young lady to the picture show, and on returning to the Burrows home he tied the horse to a tree at the gate and went into the house. He was attracted by the sound as of a buggy wheel cutting against the bed of the buggy and went out to see about his team. He saw the horse going at a trot down the road towards town and ran after it. In order to get to the lines which were tied to the dash board he attempted to get into the buggy from the rear; just as he reached for the lines the horse gave a lunge, throwing him to the ground between the wheels, and dashed off at a fearful rate. The horse kept on down the road to the long bridge, but finding it broken up he turned to the east, ran the buggy against a telephone post and turning it up on the side, and tangled himself in the barbed wire fence.

An investigation indicates that the horse had been cut loose from where it was hitched, a part of the rope being still hanging to the tree, and the buggy cushion had been

placed in the bottom of the buggy and the lap robe tucked under the seat, when they had been left on the buggy seat. These evidences suggest that some one had arranged the cushion so that it would not loose out of the buggy, and had cut the horse loose, expecting to make Mr. Burgess walk back to town. It does not look probable that a runaway was expected or that it was intended that anyone should be hurt.

As Mr. Burgess fell from the buggy he lost what money he had in his pockets, a \$20 gold certificate, \$1.50 in silver and some small change.

Death at Melrose.

Ottis Moody, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Moody, of Melrose, died Monday at the home of his parents in Melrose, after an illness of about a week from what is believed was swamp fever, which he contracted in Louisiana.

Ottis was only about 20 years of age, and was a young man of exemplary habits and industrious. He was well liked by a host of friends and his untimely death will be regretted by all.

The time and place he was overworked is not given, but the fact that he is suffering from overwork does not reflect credit on Texans who have him employed. The Associated Press dispatch closes with the usual statement that the Senator is making rapid recovery and plans to go to Washington in a few weeks to resume his duties. Similar statements to the one just handed out, have been given out for publication several times a year for the past eight or ten years.—Tyler Couriers Times.

It is regretted that he could not meet with the farmers of Nacogdoches county on this trip.

Mr. Edmonds stated that he wanted to visit this county during our fair, and see what we had and what we are doing but as he had so many engagements ahead he was very much afraid that he could not get back.

Meat Importations.

From a country which a few years ago was exporting fresh beef by millions of pounds and cattle on the hoof by the shipload the United States has now reached the point where it is importing fresh beef from Australia and Argentina. Between two and three million pounds of fresh beef has entered the ports of the United States during the past three months, indicating that the imports during the current fiscal year will amount to more than eight million pounds.

Nothing better illustrates the condition into which the cattle industry of this country has fallen and no stronger argument is needed to show that cattle raising could be made profitable, especially in Louisiana where the winters are mild and where pasturage and feed are to be had at comparatively little cost.—Shreveport Times.

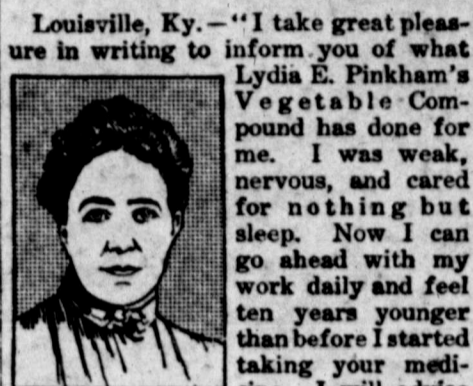

An Everyday Cake

Here is a simple and inexpensive cake that can be varied in many ways with different frostings and icings. It looks a little nicer baked in a tube pan, but will be equally as good baked in a square loaf.

K C Gold Cake

By Mrs. Janet McKenzie Hill, Editor of the Boston Cooking School Magazine.
1 cup butter; 1 cup sugar; 2 eggs, beaten light; 1 cup flour, less 2 level tablespoonsfuls; 1 level teaspoonful K C Baking Powder; 1 cup milk; grated rind of 1 orange.

Over 100,000 people are reported to have viewed the remains of Mayor Gaynor. The entire city pays a tribute to their dead mayor, such as was never accorded a king.

The school bond election held last Saturday in Pleasant Hill common school district No. 3, for \$1000 in bonds for the purpose of building and equipping a two room modern building, carried by a vote of 18 to 5. The trustees expect to begin work on this building as soon as they can get the bonds approved.

Several weeks ago the commissioners court consolidated Union Springs, Linn Flat and Owensville common school districts into a consolidated district, for the purpose of being able to maintain a high school. On last Saturday the citizens voted a \$2500 bond issue for the purpose of building three school houses, two primary and a central high school. The election on the bonds carried 42 to 26.

Unloading Steel for Bridge.

The steel for the new bridge over the LaNana creek on the Loganspor. road has arrived and was being hauled out to the trade site today. The work of putting in the bridge will begin just as soon as the material is put on the ground and workmen can get to it.

The old wooden bridge was condemned by the commissioners court some time ago and was torn out and the road has been closed at this point for several weeks. When completed the steel span will be over the run of the creek, with a wooden bridge at each end of the span.

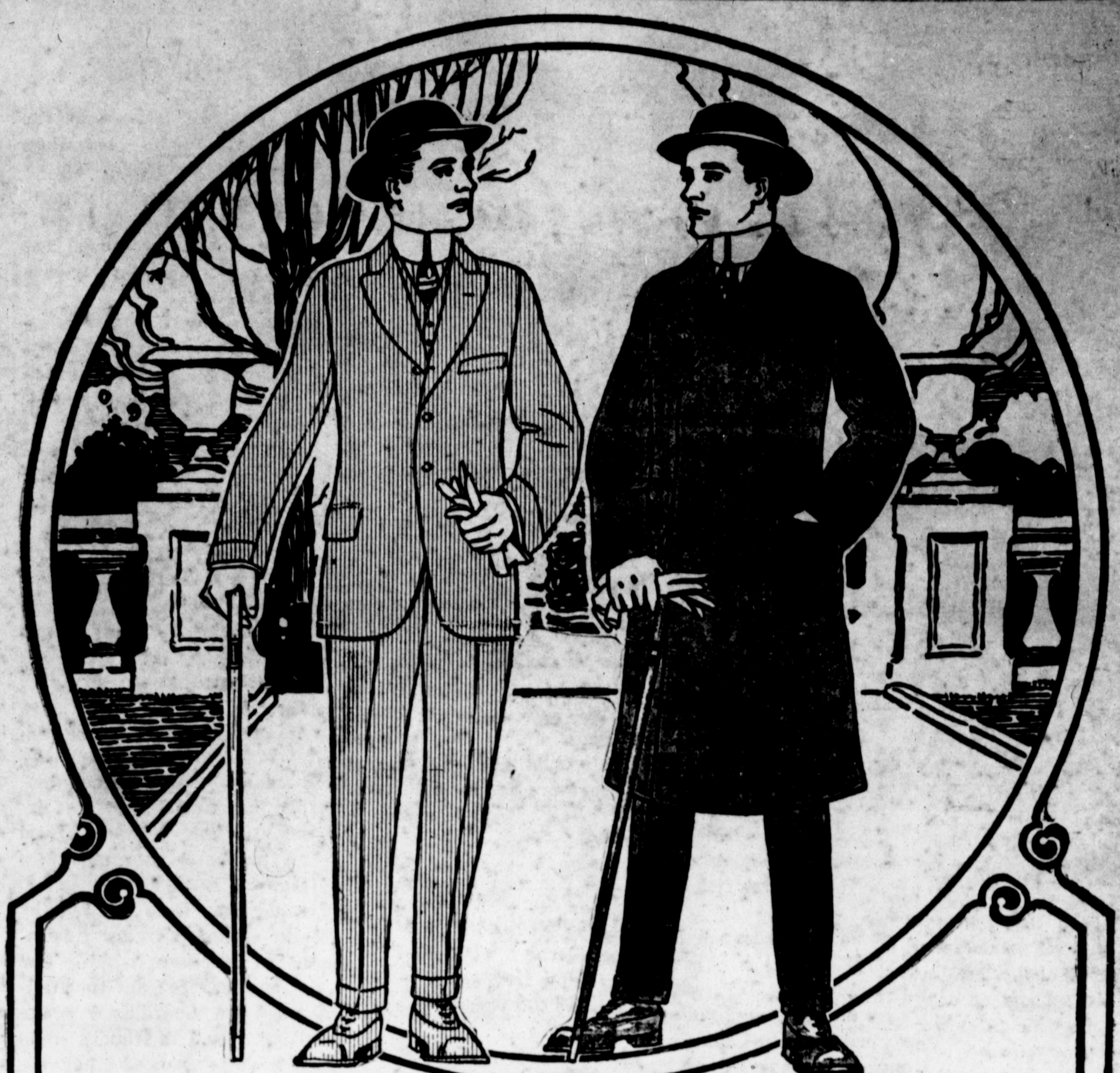

Looking for Peanuts in East Texas.
J. Sizelove of Oakland, Cal., owner of a peanut factory there, was in the city today and was here looking for peanuts, and he wants them badly and as many as he can get. He found here that our farmers have been planting considerable peanuts, but are raising them for feed and not for the market, so he could not have much luck in securing peanuts. He left on the 1:04 train for Garrison and will try and secure some peanuts there, as for several years past the Garrison country has been producing peanuts for the market and have facilities for threshing and cleaning them.

The peanut industry if developed in this section would make one of the best crops we could grow, and besides the price received for the peanuts the farmers could still get the feed value of the crop. In harvesting peanuts the vines could be cut away and baled for hay, which makes the finest of feed, and afterwards the nuts could be plowed out with the instrument made for that business, which would leave the main tap root in the ground to furnish fertilizer. A ton of peanuts will make about \$45.00 worth of oil and the meal retains the same feeding value almost as with the cotton seed. Another feature is that our poor lands which will hardly grow any other crop profitably will make the finest of peanuts and at the same time the land will be improved.

That a market could be had for all the peanuts we can grow is assured, as Mr. Sizelove informed us that every year there are thousands of tons of peanuts shipped into the United States from Spain, the Java Islands, China and Japan, and bring not less than 75 cents per bushel, and he states that with peanuts at 75 cents a bushel these places cannot compete with the United States. The Spanish peanut, which grows to perfection here, is the highest priced peanut on the market and the price averages 75 cents a bushel, with the best grades going higher.
Secretary Spear has had several letters of late from parties who are in the market for peanuts, all of whom want the farmers to grow peanuts prepare for threshing and cleaning them, and a good market is assured.

These lands are the most fruitful in Texas and their owners are now arranging with our progressive railroad people to put them on the market, and if the writer of the foregoing article will take a little trip over the line of the T. & N. O. between Beaumont and Dallas, he will tell a different story from that above quoted.
