### Wool and Cotton.

The time is not recalled when cotton and wool sold for the same price, as is the situation now. Cotton is worth as much, pound for pound, as is wool. It is not expected to remain that way long, although the first departure from the parallel in prices is apt to come in cotton going ahead of wool. It is almost time for merchants to advertise "all cotton" clothing and blankets.—Temple Telegram.

One thing that will prevent the merchant running such ads is the fact that people are so discriminating that they will not wear woolen garments made from the wool as it leaves the sheep. They insist that it be scoured, and this process reduces the weight two-thirds, making the scoured wool more than twice as high as cotton. This is one trouble about reaping the full benefit of free wool. Many families are not in position to make it into garments that will suit the fastidious people of this age.—Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

The old wooden awning on Church street, in front of the Sentinel office and on north for three buildings, is being torn down and a new galvanized metal awning will take the place. ### Advises that all Get Busy.

The Mound street sewer has been completed and as soon as the city street workers can get on the job and smooth the street over and drag it down, this street will again be one of the pretty streets of the city.

One of the residents of Mound advises that every citizen on the street who will connect with this sewer, should get busy at once, so that all the digging up of the street can be finished and when the street is worked it will not be necessary to dig it up again to make other connections. If one citizen makes his connection now, it will necessitate digging up the street from his side to the center of the street to the sewer, and when the next connection is made the same operation will be necessary, and so on until all connections are made. If every fellow makes his connection individually, not taking into consideration the matter of tearing up the street, it may be all winter before the last connection is made, and the consequence will be that the street will be torn up in places all winter.

### Shelby County Votes Out the Pool Hall.

Center, Texas, Oct. 25.—At a county election held in Shelby county today to determine whether or not pool halls shall be run, the returns from several of the larger voting precincts show a large majority against the pool hall. Center boxes show 221 for prohibiting pool halls and 24 against prohibiting. The vote was very light, probably because the question had not been thoroughly discussed throughout the county because there was little active campaigning and the farmers were too busy gathering crops to go to the polls.

Some confusion was shown among the voters at first over the wording of the tickets they not realizing that "against prohibiting pool halls" meant to continue them.

### Good Roads Prevent Disease.

Few persons, on first thought, would see any possible connection between good roads and good health. Yet the State Board of Health of Kansas says that good roads can and will prevent disease. How? By the removal of weeds and trash. Weeds and trash prevent the prompt evaporation of moisture and promote retention of ground water. This makes ideal breeding spots for mosquitoes, flies and other insects, which are known as disease carriers, not to mention chinch bugs, hoppers and other insects which are crop damage. Furthermore, an undergrowth of weeds invites the dumping of garbage and manure by offering concealment, of which fact careless and thoughtless people are prone to take advantage, thus increasing the facility of insect breeding and providing these insect carriers with proper material for disease transmission. Good roads also prevent disease transmission. Good roads also prevent disease by providing good drainage. Many farms have no means of drainage except by ditches along roadways. Open ditches, clear of brush and debris, with hardened surface and proper fall, afford these farms the opportunity of ridding themselves of many a stagnant pool. The removal of weeds, proper road grading, surface hardening and oiling, insures prompt drainage of all pool, ditch and surface water, removing the possibility of insect breeders, for none can multiply without moisture. Dry roads offer pedestrians, and notably children who are compelled to walk to and from school, dry shoes and feet. While colds are due to specific germs, yet it is a well known fact that cold, wet feet and chilled limbs lower the resistance of individuals and make them more favorable subjects for infections of the respiratory passages, including pneumonia and tuberculosis. Good roads prevent disease by setting an example to adjoining farm premises. Good roads promote travel and set an example to the farmer whose premises are bordered by them. The comparison of a well-graded, clean highway with an unkempt and trashy barnyard adjoining is sufficient to stimulate every landowner to a clean-up. Pride compels him to offer to passers-by a neat appearing and attractive house and barnyard. Results are only too obvious. Good roads are active disease prevention agencies, aside from their financial and commercial value.—American Medical Journal.

### Room for Good Roads.

One after another of the Governors of western states have had their pictures taken working on the road. While it is doubtful if the first blister has been raised on the gubernatorial paw, yet the enthusiasm that has been added to the movement in this manner has been very beneficial.

Washington has been greatly interested in such meetings as were recently held in Detroit, as well as gatherings that have taken place in Missouri, Kansas, Nebraska, Colorado, and other states. It is a certainty that good roads legislation will be popular in the regular session of Congress when it convenes this fall.

Depending on her marriage commerce and the development of trade in semicivilized countries for the prosperity of the nation, it is only natural that England should put the protection of her foreign interests, above the question of moral principle in shaping a foreign policy. For this reason Great Britain has recognized Huerta; and should another coup occur in Mexico City, in which some political aspirant caused the taking off of Huerta and seized the reins of government, England would extend recognition to the party in power, regardless of how that power was obtained, just as readily. British interests above everything has been the cold blooded policy of the British foreign office from time immemorial.—Galveston Tribune.

Low Hyomei Sooths at Panama. In the October American Magazine Ray Stannard Baker writes a remarkable article entitled "The Glory of Panama," in which he gives a most interesting and detailed account of Uncle Sam's success in building the Canal. On the subject of the cost of living in Panama Mr. Baker writes:

"Living is cheaper to day on the Isthmus than anywhere in America. Meats, groceries, clothing, all cost less there than in your town or mine, and the quality and purity is assured. Refrigerated meat from Chicago, the choicest cuts, sell at Panama, two thousand miles away, for less than they do in Lansing, Michigan. Not only this, but the prices in these stores (at which only canal employees are allowed to trade) are from twenty-five to fifty per cent. cheaper than in neighboring native stores. I made, personally, many comparisons of prices. A linen suit of clothes for which I paid nine dollars in Panama City was priced at six dollars in the government store. These low prices are possible because the Government buys in immense quantities, because its credit is perfect, and because all middlemen are eliminated. Every employee, black, yellow, or white, has an equal chance to buy at the standard government prices."

Theoretically at least, men are not as cleanly as women, in caring either for themselves or their surroundings. Yet the twelve thousand men who have been encamped at Texas City for the past five months have not had a single case of either typhoid fever or small pox—both diseases of uncleanness. The reason? Not because all the U. S. soldiers at Texas City are by nature models of cleanliness; but because, in command of the troops were officers who compelled cleanliness whether the individual soldiers happened to want to be very careful or not. That's what it takes to keep a town healthful, too—officials who compel compliance with health rules whether the rules happen to be popular with the individual citizens or not.—Port Arthur News.

It is alleged in the petition that the Liquor company committed an act of bankruptcy by paying a large amount to Japhet & Co. thereby creating a preference."—Lufkin News.

Our Corn Imports. Press report announce the arrival of a shipment of a quarter of a million bushels of corn from Argentina to Texas. The 1918 Texas crop was 155,800,000 bushels and requirements are 200,000,000 bushels, leaving us with a forty-five million bushel shortage. Only one year in the history of Texas agriculture, that of 1908, has production equalled consumption.

No more powerful argument was ever presented in favor of diversification than a fleet of vessels laden with corn from foreign countries unloading at Texas ports and a counter-scene of vessels loading with cotton for a glutted market.

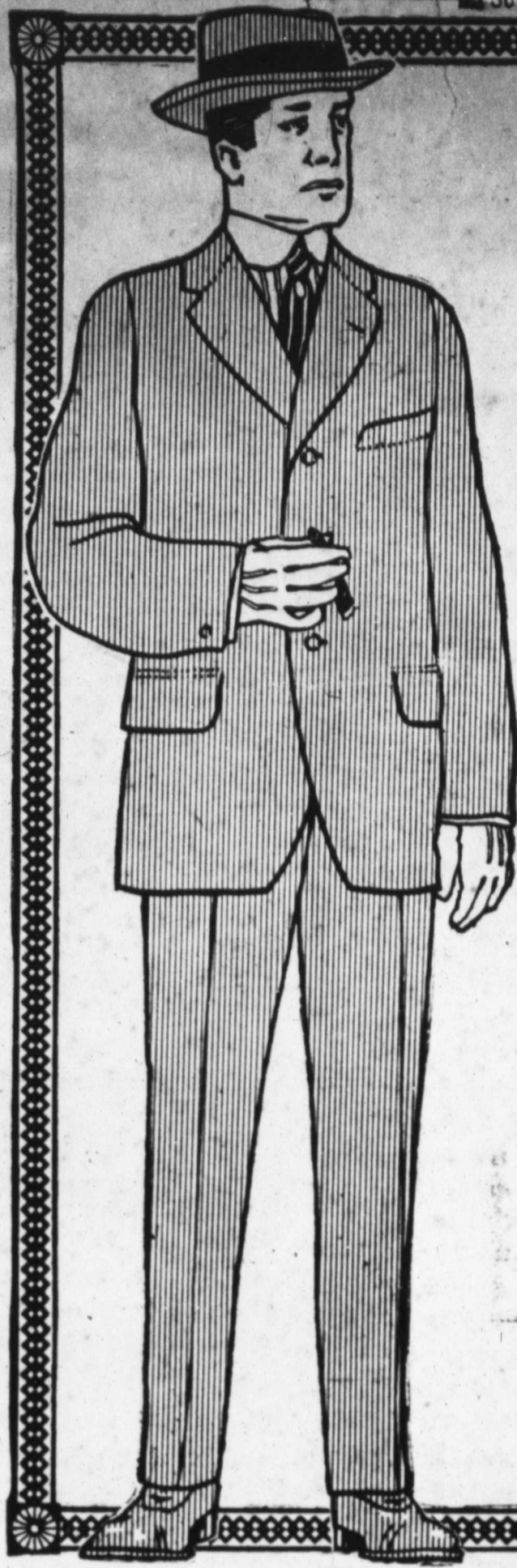

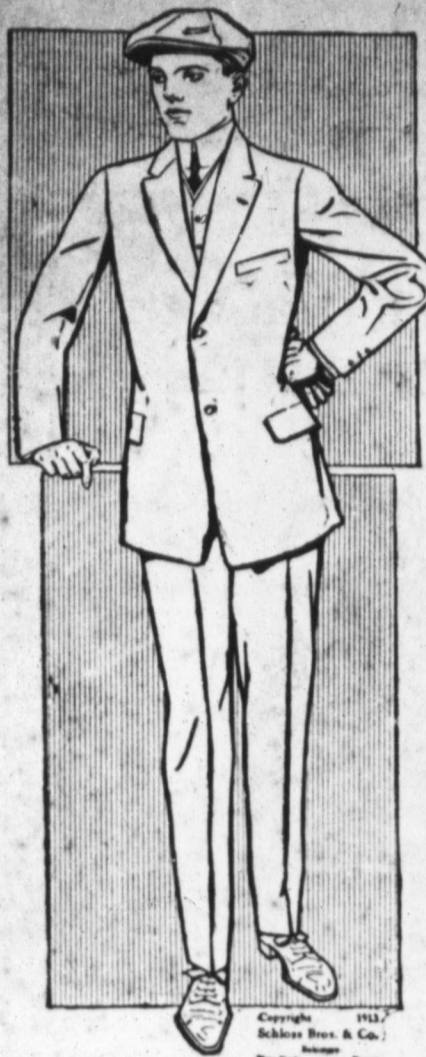

HULLER GIN A BOON TO FARMERS.  
 The Double Ribbed Gins Clean Cotton of Bolls and Stalks and Gives Good Sample.

The benefits of improved machinery, as regards the farmer particularly, was possibly never more forcibly demonstrated than in the matter of the double ribbed huller gins this year, since the rains prevented the farmers from gathering their cotton until the bolls were dead and partially rotten, making it an almost impossibility to pick it.

Yesterday afternoon the Sentinel man visited the new gin of Clevenger & Christian, just west of the railroad tracks near the W. T. Wilson Grain Co.'s warehouse, and spent several hours watching their gins do the work of cleaning the cotton of bolls and limbs before passing it to the saws to be cleaned of the seed, and turning out a fairly good sample of lint from the dirtiest kind of cotton.

Early in the season these gentlemen installed a four-stand Murray gin plant, fitted with the pneumatic cotton handling devise, and all other late improvements, including the double ribbed huller attachment. By the arrangement of their plant the cotton is unloaded from the wagons through the suction pipe, passed along through a large galvanized pipe and distributed to the several gin stands, never touching the inside of the gin house. From the gins the lint is blown to the press to be baled and the seed pass out through a trough under the gins by means of a continuous screw to the seed elevator, also operated by suction. Before the cotton is handed to the saws to be cleaned of the seed it is first cleaned of the bolls, hulls and stems which are conveyed by another trough by means of a continuous screw, back to the boiler room to be used as fuel.

We watched a wagon of cotton unloaded, and from the looks of the cotton in the wagon it would seem impossible to get anything like a sample from it. The cotton bolls, hulls and sticks, and didn't appear to be worth handling at all. This cotton went through the cleaning process and when it came out to the bale it was a fairly good sample, and the hulls were carried back to the engine room, with very little cotton left in them.

Aside from the fact that by this process the farmer is enabled to gather cotton that would otherwise be lost, Messrs. 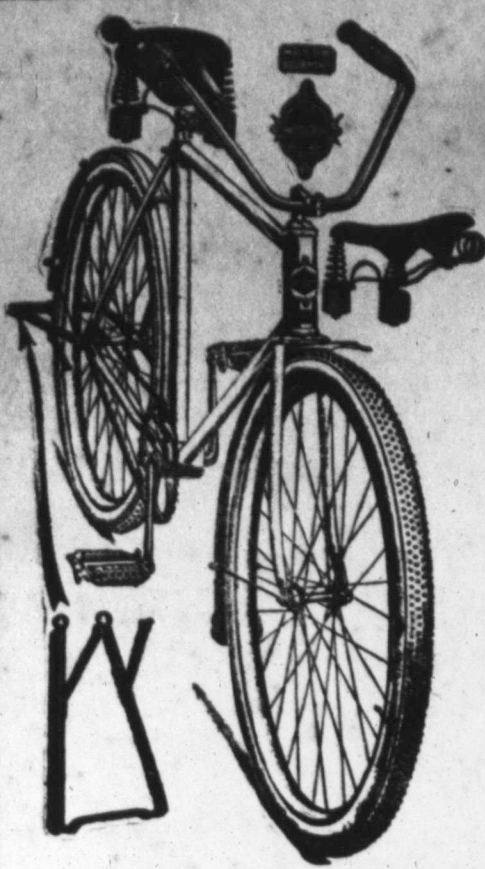
