### Industrial Congress Convention

The fifteen annual convention of the Texas Industrial Congress, to be held at Dallas on December 13, when prizes for the best results in competitive crop production, aggregating \$10,000 in gold will be awarded, will be made up of officers and members of the Congress, delegates; contestants and visitors. The delegates will be appointed by County judges, mayors of towns and cities, commercial bodies, and State associations whose work is connected with agricultural betterment or otherwise allied with the purposes of the Congress.

The general attendance of all contestants and their friends is desired for the reason that these conventions inspire such a feeling of mutual encouragement and determination among them as is of the utmost advantage in carrying forward the work of the Congress for better farming during the whole of the ensuing year. The convention has been limited to one day; and the program and prize awards arranged accordingly. The railroads of the State have made a special low round-trip rate to Dallas for the occasion.

### Big Profit in Truck Growing.

Blossom, Texas, November 10.—N. B. Crawford, a farmer living a few miles north of here and one of the most enterprising farmers in this neighborhood has gathered 600 bushels of sweet potatoes for which he expects to receive \$1 or more per bushel. Mr. Crawford is an extensive truck grower and during the watermelon season he realized more than \$800 from the sale of melons emanating from a twelve acre patch. All the product was sold on the home market. A good crop of cotton and corn was also raised by him this year.

### Foreign Markets for American Fruit.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 10.—That Brazilian purchasers of California prunes have reason to consider them delicacies, since they pay at the rate of 65 to 75 cents a pound for them is one of the odd facts brought out in a bulletin just issued by the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, Department of Commerce.

The demand for American fruit in foreign countries is determined at times by factors that may seem trivial, yet it is only by catering to conditions as they exist that the grower or exporter can hope to extend his market. For instance, in Vienna, the average housewife does not keep on hand a large stock of tinned provisions, but buys a can or two at the time as needed. It is to the wealthy visitors to the spas of the Carlsbad district that imported fruit is sold. Too much "sameness" in the varieties characterizes the foreign apples brought to Brussels.

The commissioners court had quite a lively time Monday and Tuesday when a committee from Consolidated School District No. 1, embracing Linn Flat, Owensville and Union Spring, appeared before the court in an effort to change the district in some way. When this district was organized or created, bonds were issued for school purposes, and now some sections want to be relieved. Another matter which occupied considerable time before the court was a dispute with reference to a section of the public road on the upper Melrose road, where the road makes a bend and gets off the suavey land lines. One faction contended that the road was on the correct line, while the other differed and claimed that the old road was the correct line.

### THE MERIGOLD CREAMERY.

Dangerously Near Starting Point., With  
the Latest Improved Machinery.  
Absolutely Sanitary.

At the invitation of Capt. H. H. Cooper, promoter and proprietor of the Merigold Creamery, the Sentinel man went on a tour of inspection through the new plant, and Capt. Cooper was kind enough to explain the workings of the several machines, running them for a while, and also showed us how the product would be handled from the wagon of the farmer to the consumer.

The creamery, so we were informed, was "dangerously" near the starting point, and was only waiting for a few hangers for the shafting and pulleys which will operate the machinery, and to repair a leaking gasket in the boiler. The boiler was fired up this morning, but when the leak was discovered the fire was allowed to die down.

Before Capt. Cooper began work on this new enterprise, he showed us the plans and explained as best he could the arrangement of everything, and we made note of it in the paper; but now, since the plant is completed, it is easier to understand. The building is of pressed brick cemented walls and floors throughout and with a cement raised floor on the west side. The ceiling is galvanized steel. The doors and windows are all closely screened. There is absolutely no chance for a rat or mouse to get into the house and if care is taken in passing through the doors no flies can get in, and the premises surrounding the plant are so clean that flies will have no breeding place. Just in the rear of the main building is the boiler and engine room, and still to the rear of this is the sterilizing room, both built of corrugated iron and closely screened. From the boiler room into the sterilizing room are steam pipes by which the milk cans are scalded, drained and left to sun through the screen walls.

In the main building, to the west is the loading platform which is even with the raised floor. Here the whole milk is received, and passed into the separator, which is driven at the rate of 1600 revolutions to the minute by an electric motor. The cream is then submitted to a test in a Babcock tester to determine the percentage of butter fat, by which the value of the cream is determined. The cream is placed into a large receptacle, called a pasteurizer and ripener; here it is left to ripen, and is subjected to extremes of heat and cold as is wished, and is ripened or retarded just as needed. By this method if there is any germ life in the cream it is

removed. From the ripener the cream goes to the churn, where it is churned and the butter worked while in the churn, by a reverse action of a roller against the main paddles. The butter is next passed into a moulder where it is again worked and pressed into one-pound packages. Oiled paper is placed over the butter, it is wrapped and placed into a carton and an outside wrapper put on. During the whole process the butter is never touched by the hands of anyone.

In the south east corner of the main building is a large refrigerator built into the building of 12 inch hollow tile lined inside with 2 inches of cork, and covered by 12 inches of saw dust. Here the butter is stored until delivered to the customer.

There are several by-products of the creamery, such as cottage cheese, etc., and Mr. Cooper has arranged to manufacture all these, where the farmers do not want the separated milk themselves.

There are only three pasteurizer machines in the state and the Merigold creamery has one of the three. This one fact, taken separately from all other features of this creamery, indicates that it is one of the best to be found anywhere and that its products will have no superior.

### Robbed Twice in Two Years.

Bronson, Texas, Nov. 10.—The postoffice here was robbed this morning about 3 o'clock by safeblowers. The explosion awakened J. W. Brown, editor of the Bronson Light, who shot at the robbers. It is not known whether his bullet took effect. One of the men fired several shots in reply, all of which went wild. The cracksmen got \$120 in money and between \$1200 and \$1300 worth of stamps. The safe that contained the money and stamps was completely ruined.

This is the second time the Bronson postoffice has been robbed within two years.

## The Issue in Japan.

A well-known missionary statesman says that the issue in Japan seems to be no longer between Christianity and Buddhism, but between Christianity and nothing, as indicated by a religious census recently taken in the Imperial University in Tokyo. It classifies the more than 4,600 students by religions as follows: Shinto, 8; Buddhist, 50; Atheist, 1,500; Agnostic, 3,000. These figures reveal a condition of vast significance. They show that the educated classes of Japan have practically broken with Shintoism and Buddhism and are looking for some better basis for their ethics and faith.

Man's ego is like a sponge; let him be immersed a couple of times in the spontaneous flow of public approval and approbation and he gets so big he can't get within speaking distance of his former friends. This peculiar phenomenon has been noticed most frequently in the case of state officials who a little more than two years ago were shaking hands with everybody.—Hamilton Record.

## Another Case of Hair Splitting.

Washington, Nov. 7.—Justice Holmes has the reputation of citing more peculiar cases from the old law books than any other justice of the supreme court of the United States. ## Appeals Parsons Case.

The National Life Insurance Association yesterday afternoon filed in the district court here a \$15,000 supersedeas bond, in the Lena Parsons case and will appeal to the higher courts.

Statement of facts and transcript of the case has been ordered and will be gotten up at once. These documents will be quite voluminous it is stated—the transcript covering about 200 pages and the statement about 400 pages estimated. In the trial of this case the time of the court was consumed for over a week, and a great deal of evidence submitted. The jury decided in favor of the plaintiff, holding that Frank Parsons was killed in the explosion which wrecked the Lufkin depot.

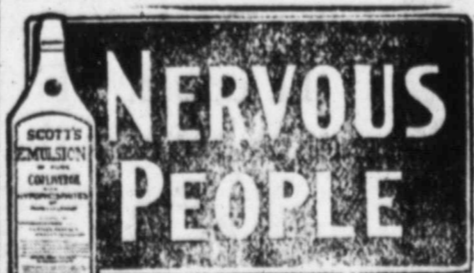

## Monterey is Attacked

Brownsville, Texas, Nov. 6.—General Pancho Villa, with a strong force of Constitutionalists has attacked Monterey.

This was telegraphed to Matamoros headquarters tonight by a scouting party from Ramones, forty miles from Monterey. They said they had approached within a few miles of the city and had heard the cannonading.

General Pablo Gonzales, who led the first attack against Monterey, has moved from Monte Morelos by a forced march to assist Villa. The Federal general, Pena, who has pursued Gonzales in his withdrawal to Monte Morelos, and then returned to Ramones has left that place for Monterey.

## Gen. Diaz Stabbed

Havana, Nov. 6.—General Felix Diaz was stabbed by a Mexican at 10:30 o'clock tonight. He was wounded twice, probably not fatally.

The attack on Diaz occurred while he was walking on Malecon, a fashionable promenade. He was wounded behind the ear and in the neck, besides receiving several blows on the head. He was removed to a hospital. His assailant was arrested.

The heavy shipments to that section are attributed to the good pasturage afforded through the fall months. During the same period, more than 40 cars of sheep passed through here enroute to the Fort Worth market.

## Increase Of Christianity

In the days of Constantine, after the political victory, according to the best calculations, there was not more than one Christian to every one hundred and fifty of the inhabited world. At the present day, says Bishop W. Boyd Carpenter, the proportion may be not unfairly said to be one person in three of the population of the globe that would call themselves Christians.

It is fair calculation to say, according to the same authority, that at the beginning of the nineteenth century, the Christians could be reckoned as 200,000,000 whereas today they can be reckoned as 500,000,000.

## Stock Show Featured With New Entries

Fort Worth, Texas, November 5.—With many of the finest stables of the country already entered and many more anticipated, there is every indication that this year's exhibition will be the greatest and most brilliant affair in the history of the National Feeders and Breeders show, which commences here November 22nd and lasts until the 29th. Val Crane, the famous horseman who has not shown here for several seasons, will be on hand this fall with an entirely new string of fine animals and vehicles. Crane's horses were the sensation of the recent Kansas City Horse Show, where he carried off many blue ribbons. J. R. Peake and son of Winchester, Illinois, whose entry also won the blue ribbon at the Kansas City Show in the \$1,000 roadster class, will be at the Fort Worth Horse Show with a stable of fine steeds. Miss Loula Long's stable will again be a feature of the horse show and she has many new animals. Among them will be "Kentucky Choice", the great five-gaited saddle horse for which she recently paid \$7,500 and "My Major Dare", another five-gaited saddle animal for which she paid \$10,000 a few months ago. These two great saddle horses will be entered in the "Horse Classic" which is a new feature of the Stock Show.

## Elephant Butte Dam To Water Valley

El Paso, Texas, November 7.—The Elephant Butte Dam, which is being constructed 60 miles north of this city at a cost of \$10,000,000 and which will be used to furnish water to the Rio Grande Valley farmers 40 miles south of here, is about half completed. The working force on this project numbers 600 and it is expected that the dam will be fully completed in the year 1915, although sufficient water will be furnished for the land under cultivation in 1914.

The product was made in Paris, from Lamar County fruits. This is the largest single shipment from the plant since its establishment. There are 963 establishments in the United States employed in the manufacture of vinegar and only four of them are in Texas. The products of the Texas factories are of excellent quality and compare favorably with those of other states. Texas manufactured vinegar is sold in this State principally, although numerous shipments have been made to other states recently.

According to the depot agent there were 120 tickets sold to Lufkin last Saturday for the foot ball game. Friends of the N. H. S. wanted to see the boys trim the Lutkin team—and they did.

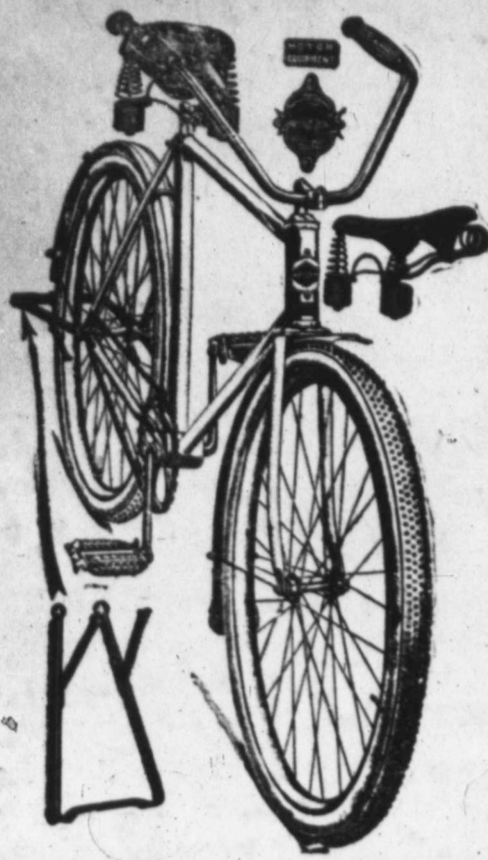
