The street paving contractors have transferred their operations to the south side of the square, and are now pouring concrete over there for the foundation for the paving. The grading had not been completed near the Perkins corner, and the repairs made at the storm sewer have been flooded and it is desired that this work settle a little before continuing further at this point.

The press agents for some of the several enterprises over the country seeking publicity, seem to be like the Pharisee of old, think they will be here for their "much speaking," and are contributing long articles to the press of the country, all of which articles are thrown in the waste basket because if there is any news interest in them they are of such length they cannot be handled. An occasional news paragraph might find space in the country paper, but a four or five column article always finds space in the waste basket.

The Alto Herald speaks of a big potato raised in that section which weighed six pounds. That is a pretty good sized potato, but the Herald editor perhaps never saw the mention in this paper a few weeks ago where one had been brought to this office which tipped the beam at nine and three-quarter pounds. It is altogether owing to where they are grown, you know, as to what they will weigh. Plenty of room in Angelina, folks, come ahead.—Lutkin News.

Texas Minerals

In the recent pamphlet issued by the United States Geological Survey, Uncle Sam gives the Texas legislators some good advice. At the expense of being considered impertinent by platform makers, we reproduce the following excerpt from the booklet:

"To express the statistical condition of the oil industry in Texas, and connect the development of the last two years with a reasonable view of the future possibilities of the state, it would be fair to say that if the legislators of that great commonwealth could by any means be induced to provide for an adequate geological survey of the State, Texas would soon rank next to California as an oil producer."

What the Federal geological authorities have to say on petroleum will apply with equal force to all minerals. Texas is the mineral vault of the earth, and Uncle Sam is trying hard to pry open the door.

In commenting on the platform announcement of Lieutenant Governor Will H. Mays which appeared in the papers last Sunday, the Rusk Press-Journal delivers itself in a column tirade against Mr. Mays, laying at his feet every act of the present administration as regards the conduct of the state penitentiary and the iron industry at Rusk. It seems to us that the editor of the Press-Journal should know that the lieutenant governor is not and cannot be responsible for the acts of the administration; he is simply the president of the senate, and has no voice whatever in directing the acts of the governor. We do not question the right of the Press-Journal to be sore on account of conditions at the Rusk penitentiary, but we do think that the blame should be placed where it rightly belongs. We doubt seriously if the majority of the voters of Cherokee county will think as does the Press-Journal, Mr. Mays is not running on the record of Gov. Colquitt, and should not be required to bear the blame of mistakes made by his administration.

Now that most of us are safely by Thanksgiving, all eyes will become focused on the king of commemorative events—Christmas. The little fellows have been talking about it for months and now the older ones are becoming inoculated with the festive spirit and feeling.—Jacksonville Banner.

Big Price For Karakule Sheep.

Hartley, Texas, November 27.—Forty-five head of full blood Karakule sheep were sold this week by the Middlewater Cattle Company of this county to a breeder of fine sheep in Charlottstown, P. E. I., Canada, for a consideration of \$18,000. This is the largest price ever paid for Karakule sheep in Hartley County and probably the state. They will be used for breeding purposes.

200 Possums Walk in : etc at Grapeland.

Grapeland, Texas, Nov. 28.—The Grapeland Possum Walk was a big success despite threatening weather at the beginning of the day. More than 5000 people poured in on the morning trains from points along the International and Great Northern and from the surrounding country. At 12 o'clock a luncheon was served at the Smallwood hotel for distinguished visitors and at 1:30 o'clock the possum walk took place. Although some of the possums wanted to sulk, more than 200 marched through the principal streets to the strains of popular airs.

A long lane was fenced in by poultry wire the length of the street and urged by the possum hunters of the Possum Club the possums struck a lively gait, which, once started, was hard to stop.

Immediately after the possum walk a parade was formed of school children, decorated floats, automobiles and buggies, and four companies of uniformed Woodmen of the World. The parade was headed by the Palestine Labor Band and was a mile in length. The parade ended at the new school building, where several good addresses were made.

Moving pictures were taken of the possum walk and a large number of photographs were made for the newspapers.

Thrown 40 Feet From Motorcycle.

Marshall, Texas, Nov. 28.—Yesterday morning about 10 o'clock Mr. James Mattingly, driving a big Clyde touring car, and Mr. English, riding a motorcycle, came together in a head-on collision at the corner near the Ginocchio Hotel. Mr. English was hurled about forty feet from the motorcycle and his machine doubled up under the radiator of the big car. Both the car and the motorcycle were damaged. Mr. English is a stranger in Marshall.

Receives Mattress Made at Sugar Land.

Washington, Nov. 27.—Among the prized gifts received by Miss Jessie Wilson was a Sealy mattress, presented by W. T. Eldredge of Sugar Land, Texas. It has just been received by express and is a very elaborate and fluffy addition to the household effects of Mr. and Mrs. Frances Sayre.

The mattress received in Washington was shipped from the factory in Sugar Land last week. It was made by special order and is said to have cost the manufacturers fully \$100. It is filled with the highest grade long staple cotton that could be bought, and the ticking is of absolutely pure linen, in its natural color.

"I believe that no finer mattress has ever been made. It is the height of perfection," said Mr. Eldredge when asked about his gift Thursday morning after word had been received from Washington announcing the receipt of the gift.

The Spirit Of The Rio Grande.

Down in the Rio Grande Valley the bankers are helping the farmer through business co-operation. Arrangements have been made whereby cattle can be bought on time and paid for when they are sold. The bankers also finance silos, and scientific feeding of livestock is directed through experts.

The tremendous attention which these bankers are paying agriculture is one of the best signs of the times, and the spirit of the Rio Grande is rapidly spreading throughout the State.

Substantial Improvements Over T & P. Line.

Dallas, Texas, November 27.—The Texas & Pacific Railway has begun the work of laying 75 pound steel rails on the transcontinental division of the road, according to John W. Everman, general superintendent. The first stretch of the new work is from Sherman eastward, about 80 miles. This part of the division will be completed before work is begun further east. The track is also being surfaced as the steel is placed. Of the 1,000,000 new ties bought by this road for improvements on the system, 160,000 have been allotted to the transcontinental division. The new ties are being used under the steel now being laid.

At the Nacogdoches fair last week, the exhibit which attracted the most attention was seventy-five bales of long staple cotton, by H. M. Carter of Maytown. "Long staple" is raised north of us, south of us, east of us, and west of us; why not among us? This is Panola, and "panola" means cotton.—East Texas Register.

SECOND DAY OF CONFERENCE.

From Thursday's Daily:

The second day's session of the Methodist conference was taken up largely with routine matters. Bishop Mouzon called the conference to order at 8:30 o'clock and conducted a brief devotional service. At 11 o'clock Dr. C. M. Bishop, president of Southwestern university, delivered the Thanksgiving sermon to a large congregation.

The following young men were elected to deacons orders and passed to the class of the third year: Walton Day, J. L. Ross, Thos S. Ogle, A. L. Connor, J. M. Van Dineck, Ben O. Hill, a missionary in Cuba, was continued in the class of the second year and J. E. Buttrell was passed to the class of the fourth year.

Rev. Jas. K. Lane, a local preacher from the Congregational Methodist church, was received into the conference. John Drury Womack, a traveling preacher, was received from the Christian church. They will be assigned charges by the bishop.

Local preachers elected deacons were: J. C. Thompson, John Cockrell, Ed Prather, J. L. Webb, J. A. Disharoon, S. A. G. E. Steel, R. H. Wilson.

R. C. George of Houston surrendered his credentials as a minister, but continued as a member of the church. He has entered business and will sustain the relation of a layman to the church in the future.

B. R. Bolton's name was referred to the committee on conference relations. Rev. Ira M. Bryce's name was referred to the same committee. Mr. Bryce lost his health during the year and is unable to work. The preacher, made a large free will offering of cash to relieve his immediate needs.

Bishop Mouzon introduced to the conference Dr. C. C. Cody of Georgetown, Dr. R. S. Hyer of Dallas, Rev. Jerome Haralson, Dr. H. A. Boaz of Fort Worth.

A resolution presented by Prof. Frank Seay of Georgetown asking the bishop to appoint two commissioners to be members of the Texas Methodist Social service commission, the other commissioners having been appointed by the other Texas conferences, was adopted. The bishop will announce his appointments later.

Rev. J. B. Scoot of the West Texas conference was heard in an eloquent address in behalf of the fallen women. The home is located in San Antonio and is not conflicting with the work of the home in Dallas conducted by Mrs. Johnson. A committee of Dr. W. F. Packard, J. C. Box and H. C. Willis was appointed to take the matter up in behalf of the conference.

Rev. I. Z. T. Morris of Fort Worth spoke briefly in the interest of the Children's Home of which he is the head. Rev. R. A. Burroughs, superintendent of the Methodist orphanage at Waco followed him with a report of the work of that institution.

A telegram, from Dr. J. H. Gambrell expressing greetings to the Methodist body

and calling upon them to continue to co-operate with the other bodies of the state for stamping out the liquor traffic was read and met with applause.

Dr. George Sexton, secretary of the National Representative church commission, reported that the representative church in Washington City would soon be under construction, the ground having been secured and \$318,000 having been raised for the building cost. His tribute to the family in the White House, as people with the ideals of the Old South as regards morality and home life, brought forth continued applause.

THIRD DAY OF CONFERENCE

Friday's Daily:

Bishop Mouzon called the third day's session of the Methodist conference to order promptly at 8:30 o'clock this morning and after a brief devotional service the business of the conference was taken up. Mrs. J. D. Hammond, wife of Dr. J. D. Hammond, the well known preacher and educator of the church, was introduced to the conference and made a strong appeal for Payne college of Augusta, Georgia, an institution for negroes which is conducted by Dr. and Mrs. Hammond under the auspices of the Southern Methodist church. Bishop Mouzon took up a collection for the support of this school and \$800 was promptly subscribed.

A number of visitors were introduced by the bishop, including Rev. Boone of the Central Texas conference; Rev. C. T. Taylor of the Oklahoma conference and Mrs. McKnight, president of the Women's Missionary society.

A class of young preachers was received into full connection. In the course of the ceremony Bishop Mouzon delivered a very able address, picturing to them the ideal life for the preacher to live.

Rev. C. E. Mock was received into the conference as a member from the Methodist Episcopal church. W. C. Hughes was elected to elder's orders.

Dr. C. M. Bishop of Southwestern university made an address on Christian education just before noon adjournment.

The speculation that has been rife as to whether this conference would be entitled to five or six clerical delegates to the general conference was settled when Bishop Mouzon announced that there would be six. The first ballot was taken and the following preachers were declared elected: Dr. Jas. Kilgore, F. M. Boyles, J. W. Mills. Final vote had not been announced when we went to press.

Four of the six lay delegates elected, are T. S. Garrison, H. L. Griffith, J. C. Box, W. L. Dean.

Third Day of Conference.

During the session of the conference this morning the lists of delegates to the general conference were completed. They are Clerical, Dr. Jss. Kilgore, Revs. F. M. Boyles, J. W. Mills, Dr. S. R. Hay, Rev. E. W. Solomon and Rev.

J. B. Turrentine. Lay delegates, T. S. Garrison, T. N. Graham, H. L. Griffith, W. T. Dean, J. C. Box and Beeman Strong.

Bishop Mouzon announced early Saturday morning that the session Saturday was to be a business session and speakers would be limited to a very few minutes. Accordingly a great deal of routine business was gotten through with. The names of the superannuates were called and they were continued in that relation to the conference.

A class of young preachers were elected to elders and the deacons of one year were passed the class of the second year.

R. P. Smiler, pastor of University Methodist church, Austin, solicited the support of the conference in a campaign to lift the indebtedness from this church which is conducted for students.

Dr. R. C. Rankin of the Texas Advocate spoke in behalf of that paper. Visiting Methodist preachers will occupy the pulpits of the various churches in Nacogdoches Sunday.

Rev. Gus Garrison was recommended to the superannuated relation J. A. Smith surrendered his credentials and withdrew from the membership of the church.

Dr. G. B. Winton, editor of the Missionary Voice, was introduced and spoke briefly of the publications of the church.

Rev. Walter Harbin entertained the following friends at a luncheon at the Bonita hotel at noon: Rev. F. M. Boyles, A. A. Wagnon, H. B. Delaye, Harry Hayes, D. B. Boddie, Dr. W. F. Andrews, Dr. L. B. Elrod, Prof. Pfaffenberger and Tom C. Swope.

Dr. C. M. Bishop, president of Southwestern university, is a visitor at the conference in the interest of that school. He is not only a great scholar but a preacher, having filled many of the leading churches of Southern Methodism before going into school work. He reports Southwestern has more students this year than ever before and the work is progressing nicely in all departments. A campaign will begin soon to raise \$300,000 for this school and it is probable that Dr. W. J. Johnson of this conference will be appointed to take charge of the campaign.

Rev. J. T. Smith was a familiar occupant of the front seat in the conference at the opening session. He is finishing four years of fine work on the Jacksonville district. He has been ill for ten days but is rapidly recuperating. He is one of the oldest and best known preachers of the Texas conference. He has been traveling over East Texas for nearly thirty years and he knows the field as probably no other man in the conference. He is regarded with great affection by the conference as a whole.

Dr. W. F. Andrews of Tyler reports that Marvin Memorial church has two pastors, one on this side of the world and one on the other. In other words this church is now supporting its own missionary in Brazil. All told Dr. Andrews has raised \$16,500 in Tyler this year.

CONFERENCE PASSES TO HISTORY.

Last Hours Marked by Rush. Conference Votes Against Changing Name of the Church. Bishop Reads Appointments. Bay City Selected as Next Place of Meeting.

From Monday's Daily:

The last hours of the Methodist conference was marked by quite a rush to dispose of business matters not yet reached, and the reading of reports of committees.

In accordance with the request of the general conference the Bishop put the question as to whether the name of the church should be changed from The Methodist Episcopal Church South to the Methodist Episcopal Church of America to a vote of the conference, and the conference voted against changing the name the vote standing 7 for changing the name to 133 against the change.

At the close of the reading of the minutes the conference joined in singing a hymn after which the bishop led in prayer, followed by a lesson from the scriptures. Then came the last, and it might be said, the most interesting feature of the conference, the reading by the bishop of the appointments for the next year.

As there are several districts in the conference, and our space will not admit of our publishing the names of the entire list, we will only give the appointments for this district.

The name of the district was changed from San Augustine District to Timpson District.

Timpson District: J. W. Mills, presiding elder; Appleby Mission, J. C. Kirkpatrick; Burk and Diboll, T. S. Wilson; Carthage, H. J. Hays; Center station, C. B. Garrett; Center circuit, J. L. Ross; Corrigan, R. F. Pace; Garrison, J. L. Dawson; Gary, W. W. Thomas; Geneva, N. A. Griffith; Hemphill and Bronson, J. B. Luker; Kennard, W. F. Campbell; Livingston, J. F. Kidd; Huntington and Manning, L. S. Smith; Lufkin, W. H. Vance; Melrose, R. J. Jones; Mt. Enterprise, L. H. Machison; Nacogdoches, S. S. McKenney.

Two points were placed in nomination for the next conference — Crockett and Bay City—the latter place winning in the voting.

Dr. R. S. Hyer, president of Southern Methodist university, Dallas, is on the ground in the interest of the new school. He brings a good report of the work of establishing this new university for North Texas. It will be opened in 1915, according to present plans. Dr. Hyer was formerly president of Southwestern.

Dr. C. C. Cody, dean of the faculty of Southwestern university where he has taught for 35 years, is mingling with the conference delegates. He is one of the best beloved men in Texas, as no student at Southwestern ever failed to form an attachment for him. Many of the leading men of this conference, as well as the younger ones, were his pupils and his smiling face is ever welcome among a Methodist gathering in this state.

Every indication points to the fire being the work of incendiaries. The actual setting out and caring for the trees would furnish an able course in horticulture which the dullest scholar would master and enjoy and which he would not be slow to apply to his home orchards. Spraying, pruning and general tillage of the trees would be learned under the happiest conditions. The money derived from the harvest could be applied to fixing up the school yard or buying books, pictures or apparatus for the school house, or possibly a tennis court, flower beds or for paying the expenses of an annual picnic for the school. —Mrs. E. P. Turner.

Establishes Connection With A. & N. R.

The Nacogdoches & South-eastern railroad will on Thursday, December 4th, establish a connection with the Angelina & Naches River railroad at Lacerda Junction, six miles out from Chireno.

No. 1 the south bound, or morning train over the N. & S. E. will leave this city at 8 o'clock in the morning, arriving at Lacerda Junction at 9:45, just thirty minutes before the A. & N. R. train out of Lufkin is due going to Chireno. Train No. 2, or north bound, will leave Lacerda Junction at 1:30 p.m. just fifteen minutes after the A. & N. R. passes, and will arrive at Nacogdoches at 3:15 p.m.

This will give the citizens of Chireno an opportunity to come to the county seat over the N. & S. E. without having to go around via Lufkin, as heretofore, and also in returning home they will make good connection at the junction.
