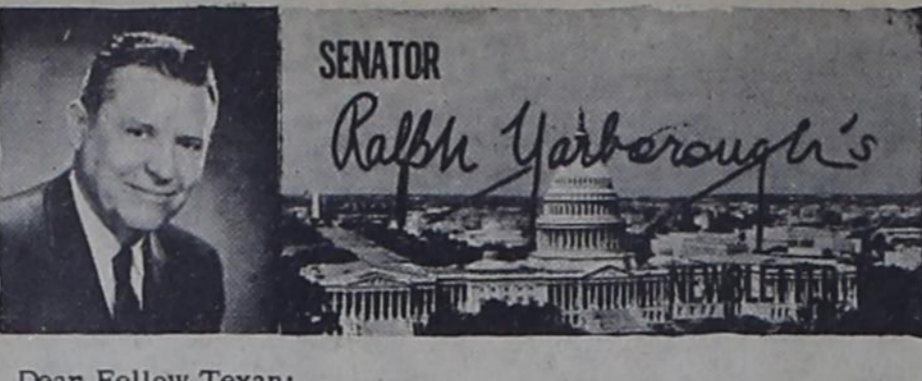
Bovina Women's Study Club has completed the remodeling of their building and it is now finished and ready for use.

Dear Fellow Texan:
Today, the automobile ranks as one of the four leading causes of death in the United States - the increase of automobile accidents is alarming, yet we have failed to take any positive steps to halt this loss of American lives.

In 1965, about 49,000 persons were killed on American highways with automobiles, and millions more were injured, while only 253 died in airplane crashes and less than 2,000 were killed in action in Viet Nam. The U. S. Air Force loses more men in automobile accidents than it does in aircraft crashes.

In the next five years, at the present rate, as many Americans will die on the American highways as died during all of World War II from enemy action in combat.

Yet, while we spend millions of dollars each year on research to eliminate cancer and heart disease, two other major killers, we have stood by the wayside and allowed the automobile death rate to steadily climb.

For these reasons, I have supported legislation and do support laws which will protect the public against such drastic waste of human lives and human resources.

As long as we have the automobile, we know that there will be accidents, but the United States Public Health Service Accident Prevention Bureau has estimated that 43% of all the people who die in automobile accidents would have lived if certain precautions were taken. More than 20,000 people would be alive today if precautions had been taken last year.

First, I have supported a Tire Safety Bill which unanimously passed the Senate and is now pending in the House of Representatives. This bill would set minimum safety standards for automobile tires and require honest labeling and grading practices by tire manufacturers.

I have also co-sponsored bills that would set up safety standards that all new cars manufactured would have to meet. This bill would also require prompt notice of any defects to all new car owners as soon as the manufacturer discovered them.

Two years ago the Congress passed a bill which required that there be certain safety measures on all Government cars. It is now time for the public as a whole, for you as the consumer, to receive the same protection with your private car that the Government requires on the cars it buys.

Almost half of our total highway death rate is unnecessary and could be eliminated by simple improvements in the automobile itself. I believe it is time for the people of this Nation to be protected and for unsafe features of automobiles to be eliminated. The costs of improvements are minor compared to the needless loss of human life and I will continue to support legislation to bring this protection to the American people.

County officials being returned to office for four-year terms without opposition in the primary were Loyde A. Brewer, county judge; and Mabel Reynolds, county treasurer.

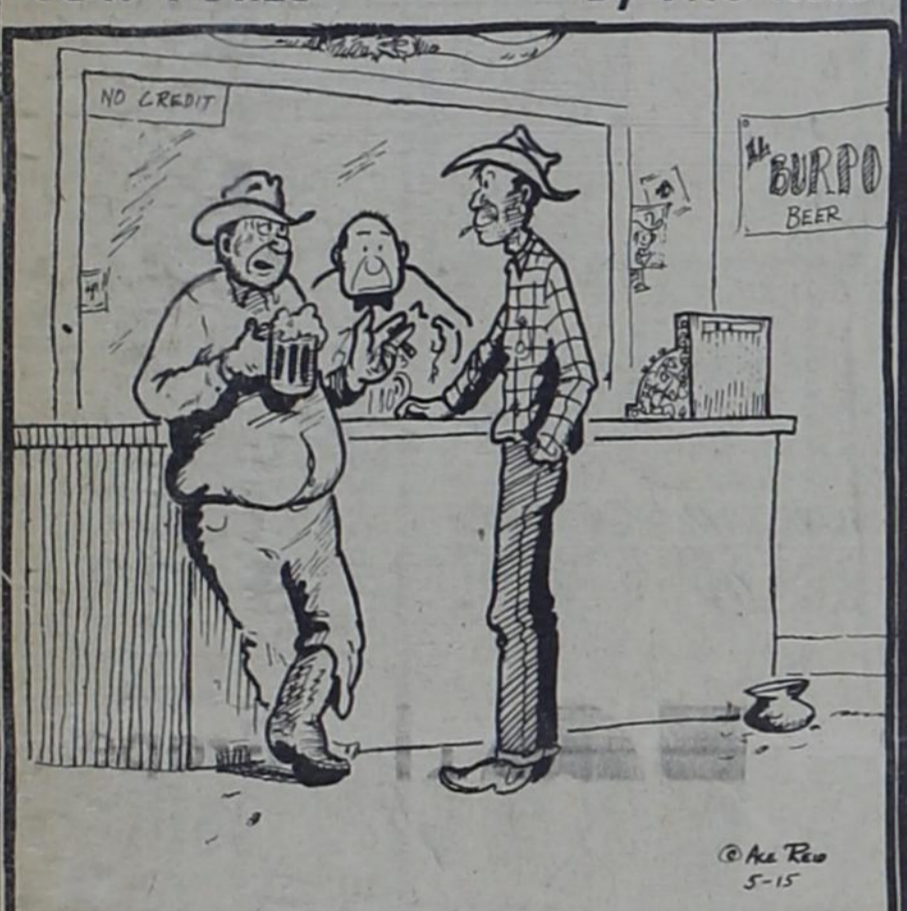

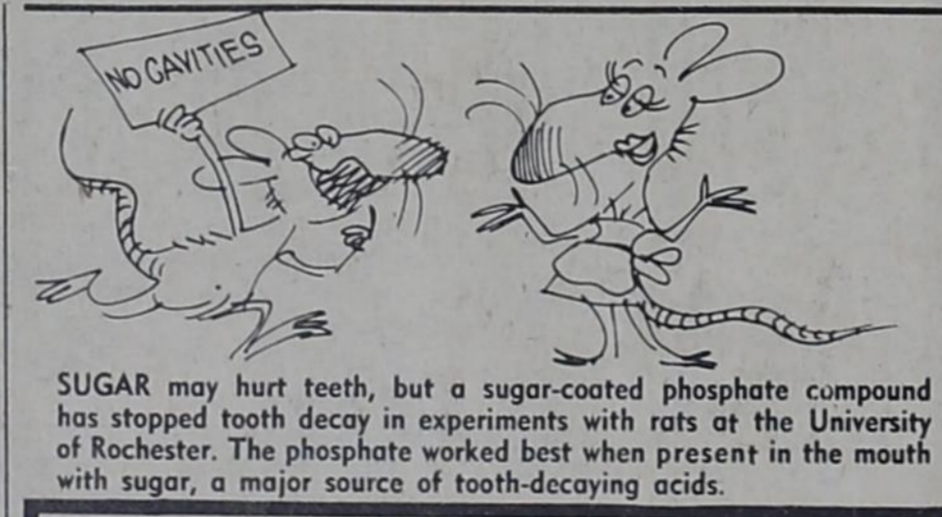

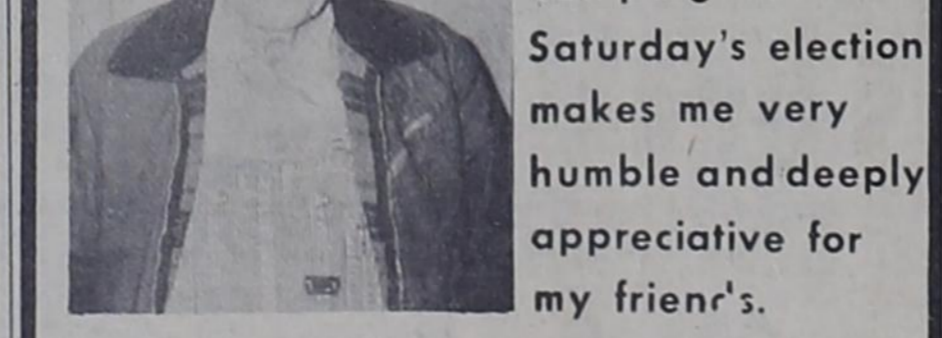

The Facts Of Life
A female cat can produce dozens of kittens in her lifetime. Unless you want all the kittens for yourself, it's wise to consider having her spayed. This is a relatively simple operation which many veterinarians feel is best performed when the cat is about five months old. On the other hand, if you would like your cat to have a litter, she can be safely spayed at a later age.

Spaying eliminates the problem of unwanted kittens. It will also tend to make your cat more affectionate and easier to live with. An unspayed female desires to mate when she comes in heat and becomes extremely nervous and restless. Spaying also eliminates this problem.

If your cat is male, you will probably find it desirable to have him altered. Neutering a male cat is a simple operation which the veterinarian will perform any time after your pet is eight months old. As with the female, the operation will generally cause him to be gentler and more pleasant around the house.

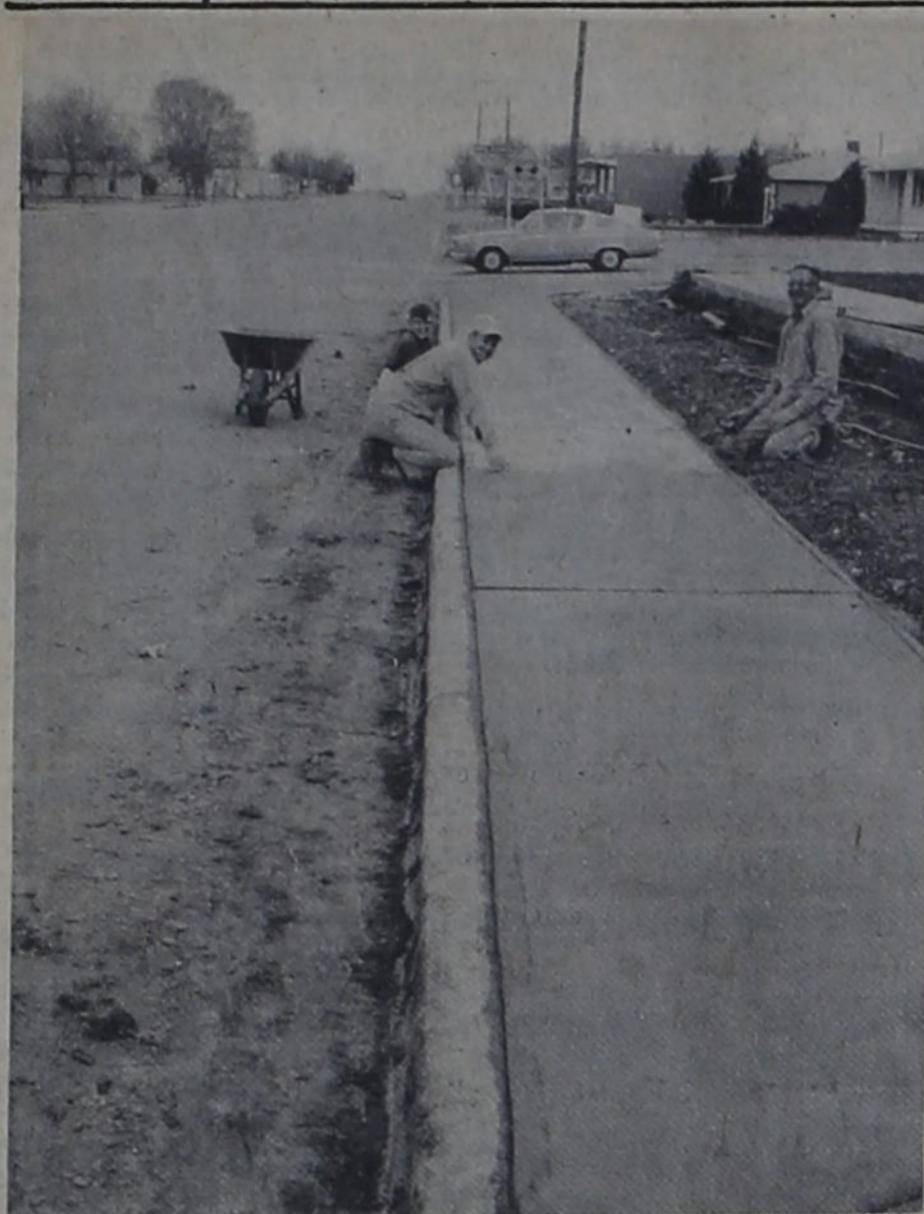

At Home In Parmer County

SPECIAL PROGRAM ON SEWING TECHNIQUES

What is your biggest problem in clothing construction? The answers that are usually heard are: Setting in sleeves, or neckline and collar finishes. Some will name zippers, fitting and etc.

Because of these problems, the County Committee on Clothing planned for the home demonstration agent to give some help to homemakers having the problem. Special techniques can do much in improving the appearance of a garment.

Four meetings will be held in the County on "Setting in sleeves, neckfinishes and collars." If you are interested, put the following dates on your calendar. In Bovina, on June 7th at 2:00 p.m., in the Homemaking Cottage; in Friona June 10 in the High School Homemaking Dept., at 2:00 p.m.; Farwell June 9 at 2:00 p.m., in the County Home Demonstration Agent's office and Lazbuddie (date and place to be set later.) Watch the newspaper for further announcements.

NEWS NOTE ON FABRICS

A new permanent press for wool blends has been announced which is machine washable. Wool is blended with polyester and acrylic fibers. You will want to watch for this new product in wearing apparel and fabrics too.

RESULT DEMONSTRATOR IN FOOD -- When visiting recently with a homemaker who carried out some recommended practices for improving meals, and cut down on the amount spent for food resulted in the following benefits. She reported: Savings in food cost amount to 1/3 of previous cost, family had better balanced meals and in addition time and energy was saved. She said "I prefer to use the 1/3 I saved on food for something else, not just leave it at the grocery store."

Living in this land of plenty, families waste a good deal of food every day, usually without noticing it. Food waste in the U. S. last year averaged 2/3 pound per person, according to USDA reports and some agricultural food specialist predict a possible food shortage in this country by 1970.

Homemakers might start now to make better use of food resources.

Take a look at a typical day

in your food preparation and consumption. At breakfast, if you hurry, you spill part of the instant coffee powder. The partially eaten toast, cereal and milk is scraped into the garbage. When you come home from grocery shopping, into the garbage to the wilted lettuce leaves, carrot tops and excess fat from the chuck roast.

As you put away the groceries, you find food in the refrigerator that needs to be thrown away. At dinnertime, peels from potatoes go into the garbage and liquids from the canned beans and peaches go down the drain. You use a lot of water over the potatoes and after they're cooked, throw away the excess. Also thrown away are the drippings that are cooked out of the roast.

This thrown-away food represents not only a waste of dollars but a waste of your time and energy spent in shopping for and preparing the family's food supply. Even more important are the habits of waste you are developing -- and you're not only permitting but setting an example for your children to form habits of wasting food. Make it a habit to store food promptly. Use stored food while it's still fresh. With good planning, you can cut down on peeling and shopping. Use liquids and drippings from cooking and the liquids drained from canned foods in gravies, soups, sauces and gelatin dishes. Encourage family members to take smaller servings at mealtime.

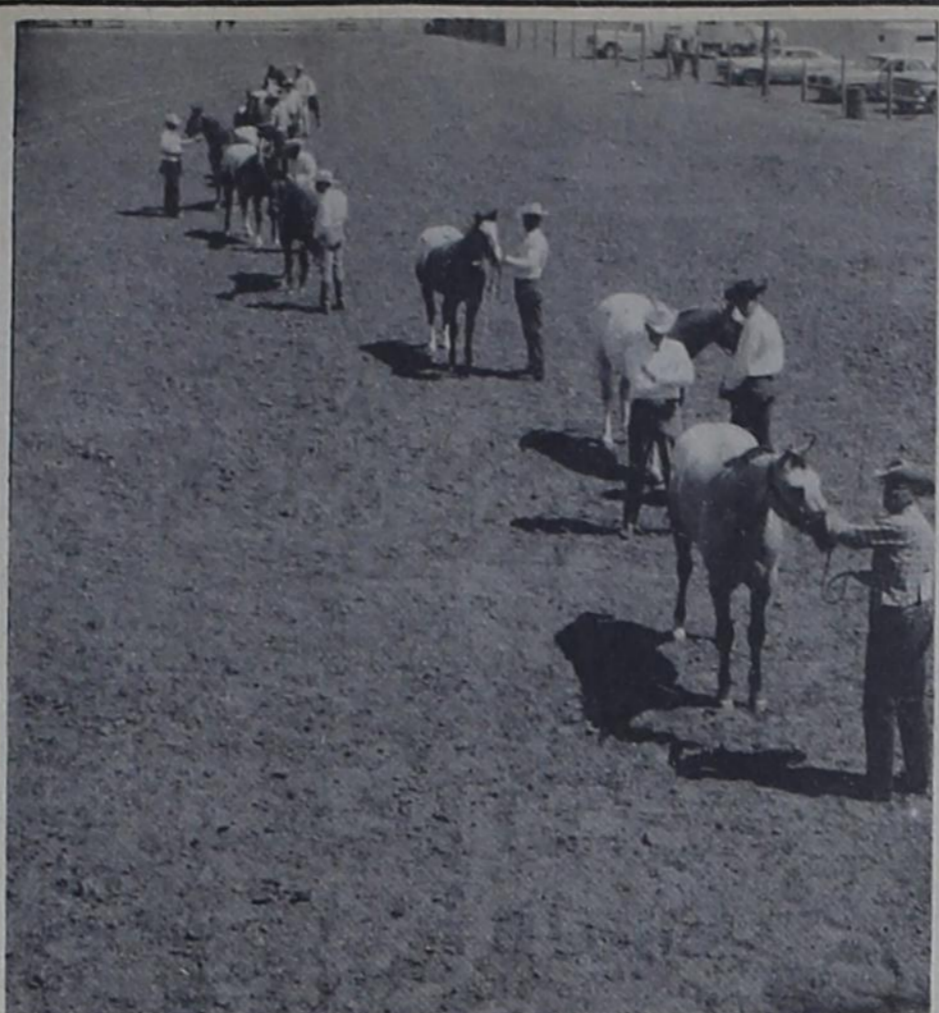

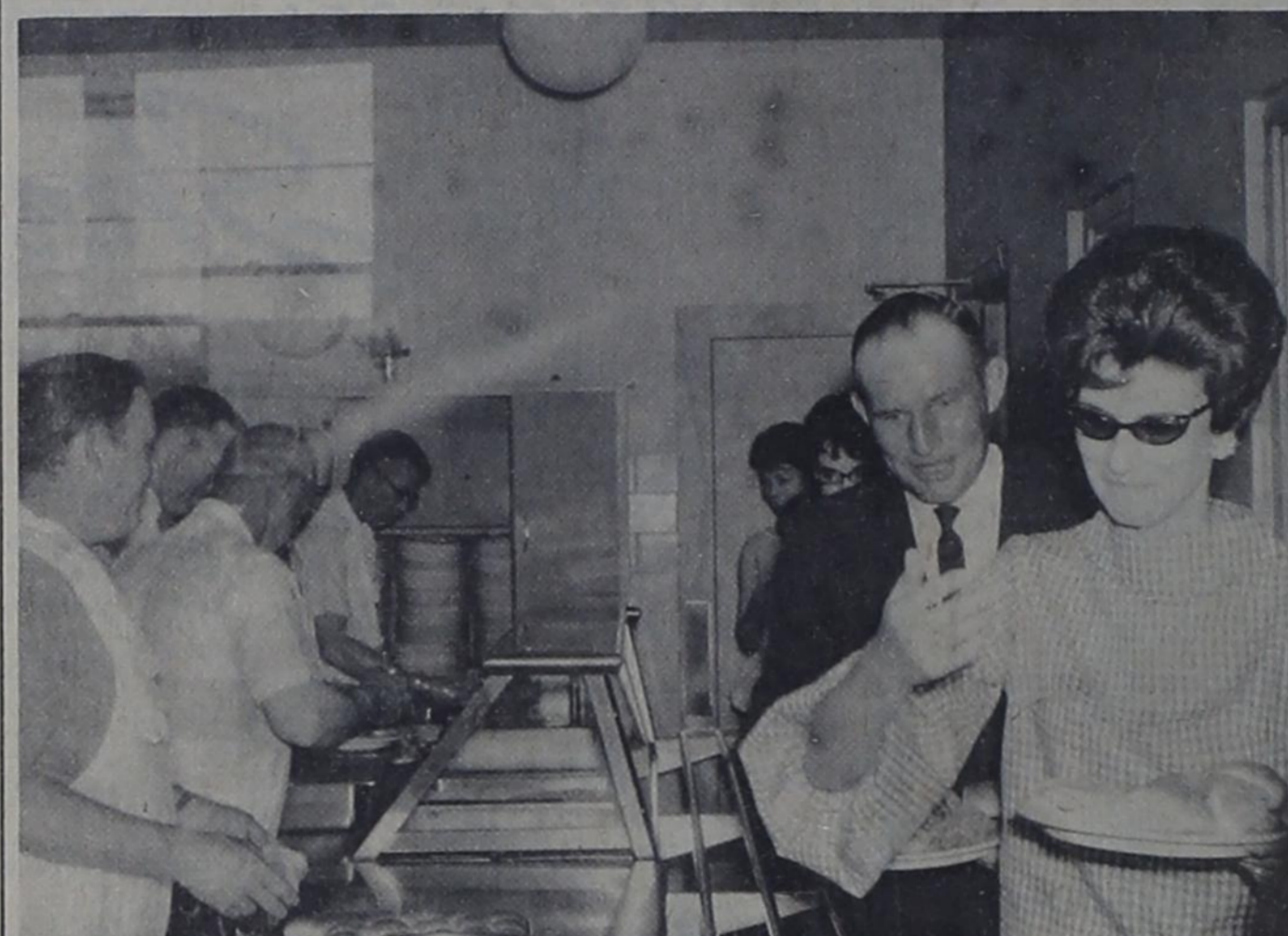
