ACCOUNT FOR PAVING TURNED DOWN.

Judge Ingraham Refuses to Have Matter Discussed or Voted on by Commissioners Court.

The commissioners court met in called session Wednesday morning, December 17th, all members being present, and Judge Ingraham presiding. The matters coming before the court at this special session were with regards accounts not reached or presented at a former term, the examining of them, etc.

As is customary, these accounts are docketed, and are taken up as they are reached. Several matters of this class were passed on, when the account of the Municipal Paving Co. for the sum of \$669.12 was reached. This is the assessment against the county for the paving of the street in front and to one side of the court house. Judge Ingraham ruled it out of order, refused to have it discussed in the court, and adjourned the court.

The following entry was placed on the docket:

"1409 Municipal Paving Co., account for paving \$669.12. This matter being an attempt to appropriate the county revenues to a city improvement, that is paving the street, is not county business, is illegal, and the County Judge as presiding officer of said court, declares it out of order and illegal and refuses to submit it to the vote of the county commissioners."

The returns of the pool hall election in the Garrison school district were canvassed and the result declared.

On account of the wording of the official bond of the

county treasurer, that official was required to file a new bond.

City Council Meeting.

The city council met this morning in regular adjourned session from the second Tuesday in December.

Quite a number of matters of interest came up for consideration, and aside from those of a routine nature the following business was transacted:

The city agreed to have the city hall remodeled and turned into an office building, cutting up the large auditorium into offices, and making provisions for office room for all city officers, and departments. This work will be attended to at once, and it is stated that when fixed up this will be a real nicely arranged building.

The city will fill in South Fredonia street to a proper grade with the paving on the square. As the grade is now a loaded team could hardly climb the hill.

On the sidewalk in front of the W. G. Reed bottling works, it was decided to have steps rather than the incline which was at first decided upon. This sidewalk had to be cut down considerably on account of the street grade, and it was necessary to have either an incline or step so the steps were agreed upon.

Carroll Holt was employed as city light and water sup-

county treasurer, that official was required to file a new bond.

MARKING THE KINGS HIGHWAY

Daughters Of American Revolution Have The Matter in Hand, and the Work Will Soon be Started.

At the November meeting of the Daughters of the American Revolution held at El Paso, the sum of \$1200 was pledged to begin the erecting of the granite boulders marking the Old Kings Highway, across the state from the Sabine River to the Rio Grande river, on the county boundary lines and cross roads through the counties, as monuments to those forbears who crossed the wilderness and to preserve the state history.

Texas granite boulders 5 feet high, 3 1/2 x 2 1/2 feet wide, one side smoothed and inscribed "Kings Highway—San Antonio Road, Erected by the Daughters of the American Revolution" donors name and date. These boulders will be set every five miles along the old road clear across the state. They will cost \$28.00 a piece.

The Daughters of the American Revolution are sending out an appeal to all patriots to lend a hand in locating this old trail, and already quite a number have subscribed for one of these boulders.

It is the plan of the Texas State National Old Trails committee to erect at once the first boulder at San Antonio, as the first was donated by the state regent, Mrs. Harry Hyman; the second at Nacogdoches, donated by Mrs. E. A. Blount of this city; at the same time a carload of ten boulders will be delivered at Nacogdoches to save freight rates; afterwards other stations along the road from the Sabine to the Trinity river will be decided upon as a distributing point.

The object of marking this historic trail is the same as that of marking any other battlefield of history. Here began that chapter of history which has gone on and developed into the history of the United States. For nearly four hundred years white men of Europe had visited this new found Southwestern world. Far to the south of the Texas country cities and colonies had been formed by Spaniards and grown, and the treasures of Mexico in the hands of Spain had so increased the power of that country, nothing seemed able to withstand the tide of its conquests. But here on the old Camino Real or San Antonio road was planted the seed which began to spring into being and life and power, which in time wrested the supremacy from Spain and the territory from Mexico, and covered the lands with American colonies. It was the first stone laid in the great structure of Texas colonization and expansion. The winners of the far Southwest fought a strenuous battle, and the trail became a real battlefield from one end to the other, with its unnumbered dead telling the ghastly story, and its memory should be preserved religiously, as a higher power than man's directs the course of a nation's

The Garden of Eden.

Southern Churchman. About 3000 men are at work in the region between Babylon and Bagdad, which Sir William Wilcocks thinks was the site of the Garden of Eden. At present it is an arid desert, but the Turkish government seems determined to do for it what Anglo-Egypt has done for the lower Nile. Sir John Jackson is to perform feats on the Euphrates by building barrages, so as to suffuse the arid regions with the fertilizing waters of the river.

At first a district of 600,000 acres will be irrigated, at a cost of \$7,500,000, after which the value of the land now practically nil will be at least \$50,000,000. When entirely irrigated Sir William Wilcocks estimates that this resuscitated Garden of Eden will have acquired a value of \$190,000,000.

Texas Cotton Crop Nearly 3 Million Bales.

Waxahachie, Texas, Dec. 17. — The Crop Reporting Board of the United States Department of Agriculture has just completed its estimate of the Texas crop and calculates the 1913 crop to be 1,883,256,000 pounds or 3,980,000 equivalent 500 pound bales. The census reports of 1912 show 4,880,210 bales produced last year. The Ellis County crop this season will probably exceed that of any other county in Texas or the United States, but will not be greater than last years production, which amounted to 187,449 bales.

Corn Show Will Eclipse Anything Previously Attempted.

Dallas, Texas, Dec. 16.—Prof. C. P. Bull, Secretary-manager of the National Corn Exposition, which will be conducted in this city during February 1914, is in receipt of a letter from the Duluth, Minnesota Commercial Club stating that it will have an exhibit of agricultural products at the Exposition. Prof. Bull and his staff of assistants are optimistic and are confident that the 1914 exhibition will eclipse anything of its kind ever attempted before. Communications have been received from commercial organizations in practically every State in the Union, announcing that they will send exhibits to this mammoth agricultural show and a number of foreign countries have also notified Prof. Bull that they will have displays at this exhibition.

Ginners Report to December 1st.

According to the government report, Bureau of Statistics of the Agricultural Department, there had been ginned in Nacogdoches county, from the crop of 1913, up to December 1st, 19,555 bales of cotton, as against 20,920 the same date last year.

This shows a falling off in the ginners' report over last year, but it is believed that by the close of the season there will have been ginned in this country more cotton than last year. The apparent falling off in the number of bales ginned this year to this date, was caused by the heavy and continued rains which prevented the farmers from gathering their cotton as early they would have done other-wise.

To Protect Foreigners.

Mexico City, Dec. 12.—Rear-Admiral Fletcher, commander of the American naval forces in Mexican waters, today ordered the rebels and Federals, fighting at Tampico, to cease firing, threatening to open up on them with the guns of the gunboat Wheeling if his order was not obeyed. Both sides complied with the order.

This information is contained in a dispatch received tonight by Sir Lionel Carden from the British admiral, Christopher Craddock, of the British cruiser Warwick, which is lying off Tampico.

The Federals hold the center of the town of Tampico and the water front. Rear-Admiral Fletcher has ordered foreigners to take refuge on board ships or to congregate on the water front, where they will be under the protection of his guns.

California's High Mountains.

The State of California has 70 named mountain peaks and 60 or more unnamed mountains, a total of at least 130; whose altitudes are greater than 18,000 feet above sea level. Twelve of these are 14,000 feet or more high. The highest is Mount Whitney, which is also the highest peak in the United States, with an elevation of 14,501 feet. Mount Williamson is the next highest, 14,384 feet. The elevation of Mount Shasta, probably the third highest peak in the State, has not been determined exactly, but it is generally credited with being about 14,380 feet high. Other mountains attaining more than 14,000 feet are: South Peak of White Mountain, North Palisade Mountain, Mount Russell, Split Mountain, Middle Palisade Mountain, Mount Langley, Mount Muir, Mount Tyndall, and Mount Barnard.

Two And One-Half Million For Texas Waterways.

Texas City, Texas, December 18.—Citizens of this place are well pleased with the action of the War Department in asking for liberal appropriations for the improvement of Texas waterways. The budget which has been sent to the House by Secretary of Treasury, McAdoo, contains two and one half million dollars for Texas projects. They are as follows: Channel from Texas City to Galveston \$900,000; Port Aransas Harbor \$800,000; Sabine Pass \$500,000, and \$200,000 for the Houston ship channel.

Fort Worth, Texas, December, 9.—Acting upon the suggestion of President Lewis of the Texas Farmers' Union, Tax Collector Elliott is touring the rural sections of Tarrant County and urging farmers to pay their poll tax.
