### Negro Kills White Man.

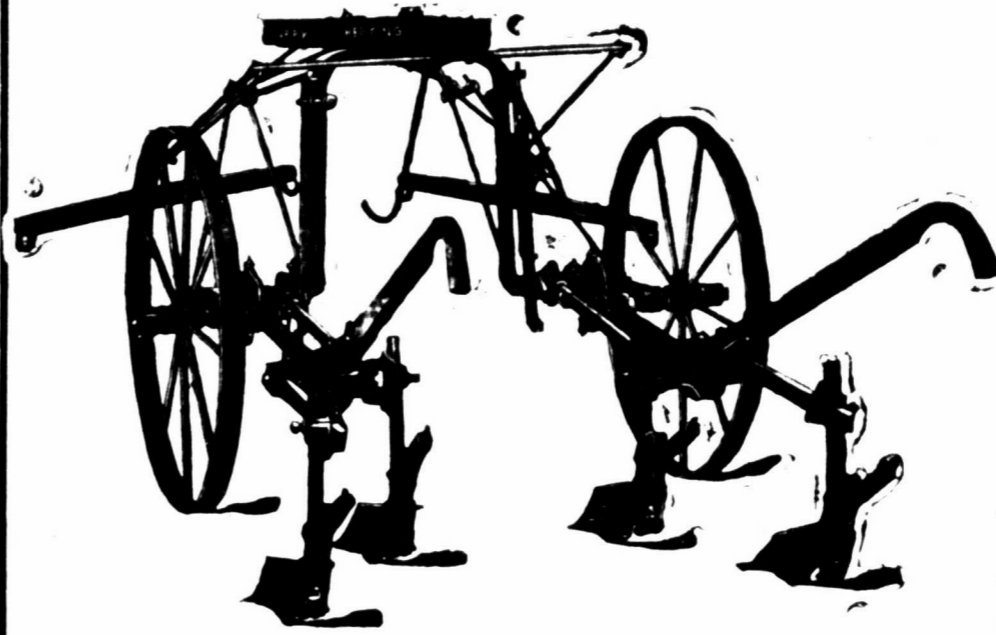
Lutkin, Texas, Feb. 3.—Luther Glass, who was struck on the head with a limb by a negro named George Smith, at the logging camp of Peavy Brothers, near here, about 8 o'clock last night, died at his home here today at noon.

According to those who witnessed the assault upon Mr. Glass, it was without provocation, and if the negro is caught it is likely that he will be summarily dealt with.

It is stated that he had been employed at the logging camp by Mr. Glass for five or six months, and on Monday his employer found it necessary to reprimand him for some negligence, for which the negro took exception and was later discharged.

He remained about the camp the remainder of the day, and about 8 o'clock that night approached the mess tent, where Mr. Glass and others were eating supper.

Mr. Glass arose from the table and approached the negro, and without a word of warning was struck a terrific blow with a limb which the negro held in his hand, the blow fracturing the skull and

Friday the 30th was an unlucky day for Texas. Burglars took \$2000 worth of jewelry in the W. T. Carter home in Houston and \$8000 from the First State Bank of Montgomery; fire destroyed the Imperial sugar mill at Sugar Land, loss \$300,000; just across the Sabine river at Logansport bandits robbed the State Bank of \$6000, and Mays announced positively that he will not quit the race for governor.

"What are the ten greatest inventions of our time?" The Scientific American offered a prize for the best answer. The winner named these: The electric furnace, the steam turbine, the automobile, moving pictures, wireless telegraphy, the aeroplane, the cyanide process, the linotype machine, the induction motor and electric welding. X-rays, radium, color photography, the Riesel engine, the telephone and the phonograph, it will be noticed, are omitted.

Number of bales of cotton ginned from the growth of 1913 prior January 16, 1914 was 18,589,171; the growth of 1912 ginned to corresponding date was 18,000,980 and of 1911 was 14,515,799.

The Houston Chronicle picks Colonel Tom Ball as the man to lead the pros to victory in the gubernatorial race. The Chronicle is not favorable to state wide prohibition, but it seems in Col. Ball is a big man, competent and copable as a big governor of a big state.—Palestine Herald.

Steve Blount of Nacogdoches has been mentioned as a gubernatorial possibility. Well, it seems the State could do worse and few men would be better qualified to fill the chair. Steve Blount has the ability, the honor and the dignity, to say nothing of the fact we wouldn't object to seeing a governor from this neck of the woods.—Sabine County Citizen.

The Nacogdoches Sentinel notes: "A long series of tests in fruit growing will be begun at once by the Agricultural and Mechanical College. Superintendents to carry on this work have been appointed at Troupe, Nacogdoches, Temple, Angleton, and Pecos. The plan is to make soil, water and atmospheric tests for the growing of fruits and give the information to Texas farmers." We need more fruit growing in Texas, and more canneries. If we could save some of the money that goes out of the state for fruit and canned fruit it would help Texas much.—Houston Chronicle.

The Carthage Register inquires who the man is that can relieve Congressman Dies from his job, fully believing that it ought to be done as soon as possible. We are informed that Mr. Strong of Nacogdoches will not be a candidate and the one we have in mind is the old war horse, Captain James W. Truitt of Shelby county. That is the one man who, if he would, can reunite the people of the second district with the Democratic party and make them a part of the splendid administration that is so rapidly re-establishing a government of, by and for the people.—San Augustine Tribune.

**Monster Rattlesnake**

Columbus, Tex., Jan. 25.—A negro living on the old F. A. Brune place on Cummins' Creek, a few miles north of town, killed a monster rattlesnake supposed to have been driven to higher ground by the flood, that has thirty-two rattles. As no snakes of this kind have been heard of for years in this vicinity, it is supposed that this one must be the last of the species.

**Closing "Wild" Gas Well.**

A gas well in Louisiana that had run wild for six years and had been wasting from 10,000,000 to 20,000,000 cu. ft. of gas a day during that period was successfully closed recently by a method that is probably unique in the history of the gas industry. A relief well was first bored close to the old well, and to the same depth. Water and mud were forced down the relief well under heavy air pressure until the gas stratum was choked and the flow of gas shut off. The old well, which had made a crater 225 ft. in diameter and 50 ft. deep, was then permanently closed with concrete.—From the February Number of Popular Mechanics Magazine.

Shreveport, La., Jan. 31.—The two men who robbed the bank of Logansport, getting away with between \$5000 and \$6000, after locking the cashier and his assistant in the bank vault, have been captured. It was Cole who implicated Chambers and Hannegan saying they had agreed to accept \$500 each to help the two bandits get through the woods west of Logansport and escape.

**Almost Serious Accident.**

Leander Liles came near being the principal actor in a very serious accident Wednesday afternoon. While attempting to remove his irrigating pump from four large railroad ties which were fastened together and anchored in the bank of his lake and extending out over the water, the anchorage gave way throwing him in the lake and the ties, with the additional weight of the pump, rolled over on him and fastened him to the bottom of the lake. Had it not been for his presence of mind and the bringing forth of his latent strength he would have been drowned before assistance could have arrived.

**War Material To Sell.**

Washington, Jan. 28.—As an answer to the rather sensational plea which Admiral Vreeland of the navy general board made to the house naval committee for a four-battleship program this year, the small navy men of the house, led by Representative Hensley of Missouri, are about to open an attack on the Navy League, which organization the small navy men charge with conducting a system of persistent lobbying in the interest of extravagant naval construction. The small navy men have nothing to say as to the motives of Admiral Vreeland and other naval officers who urge congress to make big naval appropriations. But they say that the outside agitation along the same line is kept alive by the organization known as the Navy League, and intimate that organization is supplied with its funds by shipbuilders and armor plate manufacturers.

Postmaster General Burleson recommends the purchase of telephone lines, valued at about \$200,000,000. The salient features submitted by Mr. Burleson follow:

Constitution intended that the government should control all agencies of communication and provide for it.

United States is only nation that does not control the telephone and telegraph service.

Telephone and telegraph facilities are now for the classes; under government ownership they would be for the masses.

It would be unwise to acquire telegraph lines by purchase; telegraph service can be readily superimposed on telephone lines.

Telegraph service is on the wane compared with telephone lines.

Within ten years telephone business increased 287 per cent while number of telegraph messages increased but 18 per cent.

Telephone lines are owned by 3000 proprietors; but two own the telegraph.

Private monopoly has no incentive to extend its facilities to unprofitable territory; but the government must serve all the people.

The government would require the system to be merely self-supporting while private monopoly demands a profit.

The longer acquisition is deferred the greater will be the cost.

It is economic waste to permit private enterprise to build up vast properties that must eventually be taken over by the government.

Attendance at the University of Texas has reached the point where in now compares with the University of Kansas and Missouri. The number of students in attendance at Texas is only four less than 2500, the main department at Austin has 2227 students registered, while the medical department at Galveston has 273. The total registration is still far below that of the universities of Illinois, Wisconsin and Michigan, and the physical equipment at Texas is very inferior to Missouri and Kansas, over half of the students at the University of Texas being compelled to attend classes in nine frame shacks on the campus due to the rapid increase in enrollment and the lack of building funds. The University of Texas is now the largest in the south.

County Judge Ingraham, of Nacogdoches, has had published the oath to be taken by members of the commissioners court with reference to the assessed valuation of property, and he tells the people he is going to see that the renditions comply with the law. Judge Ingraham, doubtless, has the best of intentions, but we will wager the amount of our poll tax that there will be property in that county, as in many others, that is not rendered for more than a third what it would require to pur-

chase it. And there will also be monies, notes and diamonds that are not rendered at all.—Center Champion.

As such unfortunate conditions exist it is fortunate for our county that official action is taken to remedy them as much as possible.

What was populism twenty years ago is progressive democracy today, as shown in the following clipping from an editorial of one of our exchanges.

"The Senate has voted to appropriate \$40,000,000 to build and equip a railroad in Alaska, only three Democratic senators having the temerity to oppose it. Let's see, it was in 1892 that the Ocala platform, demanding government ownership of railroads, was promulgated and at once became the chief demand of the Populists. Bitterly did the Democrats denounce the advocates of such a scheme as vagarists, socialists, anarchists and all else despicable: but this is a progressive age."

The Lutkin News man has been measuring lances with the editor of the Nacogdoches Sentinel, and among other things he says: "It is 10 to 1 shot that the Lord has never heard of the town of Nacogdoches." He may have heard of the place, but if anyone ever gets smart and asks Him how to spell it He well probably say: "Depart from Me ye wicked into everlasting punishment prepared for the devil and his angels."—Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

### Hard Blow to Huerta.

Washington, Feb. 3.—President Wilson has decided to lift the embargo on exportation of arms to Mexico.

A proclamation under the authority of 1912, which will restore the status of the arms question where both forces of Provisional President Huerta and constitutionalists may export arms from the United States, soon will be issued from the White House.

### Diaz Emisary is Executed.

Juarez, Mexico, Feb. 2.—Francisco I. Guzman, who figured in the revolt against President Madero in the City of Mexico a year ago, was executed in the front yard of a house occupied by General Francisco Villa here today. Guzman had just come from Havana, where it was charged, he had been given as a secret mission by Felix Diaz to induce General Villa to renounce General Carranza and throw the strength of the revolution to Diaz.

As soon as he heard of the proposal, General Villa gave Guzman a conference, and after making sure the nature of the visit, ordered the messenger shot. Within a few minutes after his arrival Guzman was led out of Villa's room, stood up before an adobe wall, and with his hands tied and eyes blindfolded, was executed.

Fort Worth, Texas, Feb. 3.—It was again demonstrated Friday that this market is the best hog market in the United States. Usually on the last days of the week prices are lower than at other times but with a good run of hogs, George Erwin, of Oklahoma, with a load of 132 head, topped the market at \$8.65. This was five to twenty cents per hundred higher than any other market in the United States on that day.

### Farmers Clubs.

#### Editor Sentinel:

As I have not seen anything in your paper from Appleby for some time I will try and write a few lines. I am proud to know that the farmers of this locality have organized a truck growers association. Now I want to see them organize a corn, a pig and a canning club. By organizing these clubs we can exchange ideas and learn to make farm life more profitable. We can't make good crops unless we have good farmers, and good farmers are not made in a day. Agriculture is no longer a haphazard rule of thumb affair but a science. So you see it is not more farmers that we want but better farmers and we can't have better farmers unless those who intend to take up agriculture go into it with all the seriousness with which a man prepares himself to take up the law, the university, surgery or medicine. It is true that Providence sends the harvest and at times withholds it—but if you don't prepare the land properly, a harvest of weeds will be all you'll get.

We should educate ourselves to the possibilities of the farm, and there is no better way to do it than through the farmers' clubs.

Man is a social being. He is gregarious—he works best in contact with others of his kind. A club is the expression of the desire for association with kindred minds. A club helps the farmer in spiritual uplift, broadens his mental horizon and lengthens his purse—the three dimensions of the balanced life. We all need mental stimulus from time to time if we are going to grow in a well-balanced fashion. If we continue to work only our muscles, our brain cells becomes dulled and our thinker rusty. We need mental exercise on the farms as well as leg and arm exercise.

From time to time it is a good thing to get out of the daily rut or route of living. Otherwise we get stale and stolid. Farmers' clubs offer a good opportunity to acquire this needed stimulus. There we meet old friends and neighbors, make new acquaintances, increase friendships, whet our minds against others who fortunately differ with us and get new ideas of working or living which would never have come to us if we had stayed at home and drugged the whole time. The biggest problem before each man, woman and child in a civilized country is learning how to get along with other people. The best way to learn this art is not to retire to a monastery and abjure the world but to form a brotherhood based on good fellowship and mutual self-interest by practicing the noble art of forgiveness and good nature. We learn that only by intelligent and faithful co-operation can we get along in this world and not make a mess of living for ourselves and for our neighbors.

Therefore again let us urge the farmers' club as one of the most important in-

stitutions for rural progress. It costs nothing; it is not patented; it is open to all; it affords social pleasure and intellectual discipline; it is a school in itself for young and old.

Whenever an important matter comes up in the country neighborhood a well managed farmers' club can handle it with neatness and dispatch. Wisdom is the keynote to the songs of success.

Ignorance and greed have robbed old mother earth of her fertility and brought poverty to thousands of homes.

The farm is the ground sill that all business must rest upon. There is nothing that locks the wheels of commerce as quickly as a crop failure. It affects every man, woman and child, it makes no difference what their occupation may be, and to overcome these difficulties we must have the co-operation of our fellow man. For the like of co-operation we have trampled under foot many golden opportunities.

We have dammed up the fountain of success with ignorance. With the cotton fever, we have slapped prosperity full in the face and sent the proceeds of our labor to the four corners of the earth and landed it with the speculators.

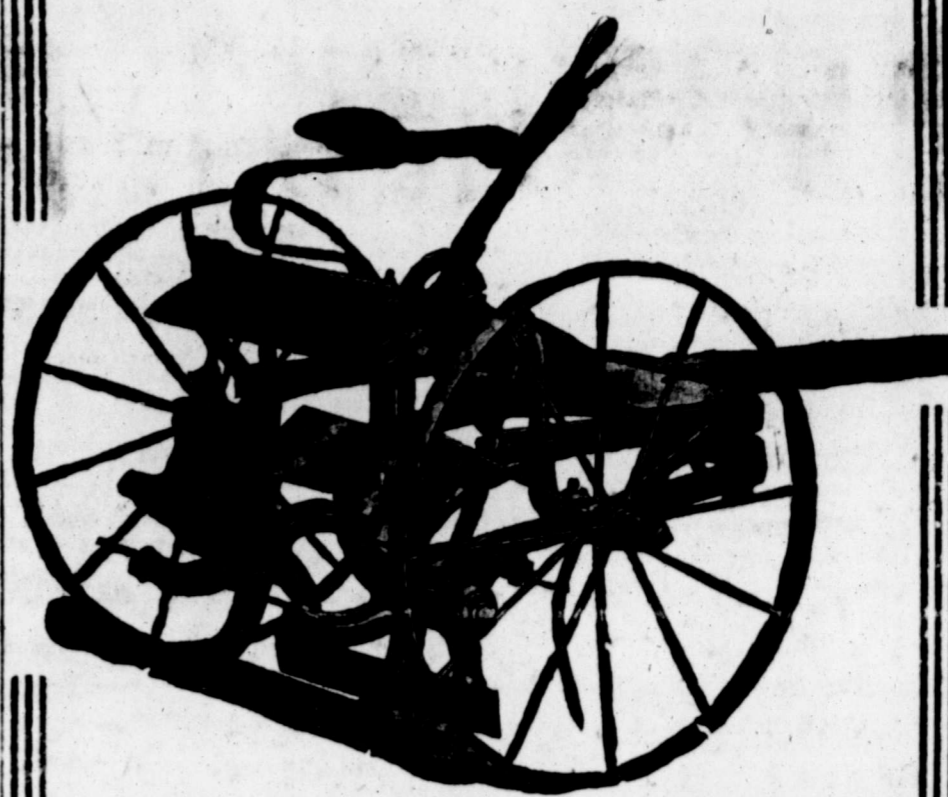

### A Bale of Texas Cotton

Groesbeck, Texas, January 27—Mr. Willams S. Cates, one of Limestone County's leading cotton planters and a prominent member of the Farmers Union, who has for several years been studying marketing methods employed by Texas farmers, has unearthed some mammoth inequalities in our system of selling cotton, our leading farm commodity. Last July when Mr. Cates marketed his first bale of 1913 cotton, it brought 11 cents and he enclosed a note inside the bagging requesting that the spinner write him tully regarding the final disposition of the staple. Yesterday Mr. Cates received a letter from August Tetrue, owner of the largest cotton mill in Schweizerth Saxony, stating that the cotton was purchased by that concern at 19 1/2 cents per pound, that it would be manufactured into yarn, weaved into hose and sold back to Texas and other American trade at a price to the ultimate consumer many times in excess of the original price of 11 cents. The letter also requests information regarding the number of cotton mills in Texas and asks for data pertaining to a location for a mill in this state.

### The Cost of War

Some interesting and startling facts and figures, regarding the cost of war, taken from an article in the Saturday Evening Post, by Senator Theodore E. Burton.

Since the beginning of authentic history fifteen billion men have lost their lives in war, more than nine times the present population of the earth.

During the twenty years of the Napoleonic wars six millions of men were killed in battle.

Our Civil war contributed eight hundred thousand men to this tragic cause.

Religious wars so fruitful a source of bloodshed during the Middle centuries, have ceased.

In a single year the nations of the civilized world spent approximately \$2,500,000,000 on account of wars, past present and prospective.

In 1911 England expended \$341,820,000 and France \$270,918,000.

Sixty-seven cents out of every dollar expended by our National government goes to feed the present day mammon for wars and armament.

The cost of a single battleship of the dreadnaught type, if fifteen million dollars, this does not include the cost of armament and guns which run into added millions.

It costs one million dollars a year to maintain one of these monsters and their life is about twenty years.

A single thirteen inch gun costs \$55,569.00 and ever shot from such a gun costs \$1,500.

The appropriations for the army, like those of the navy, have increased in remarkable progression. In 1897-1898 1899 we appropriated in round numbers twenty-three million dollars a year for our army. For the present fiscal year our army appropriation is \$94,266,145, four times as much as it was fourteen years ago.

The pension list for 1872 amounted to \$30,703,999. In 1913 it was \$108,300,000.

Of Napoleon's wonderful army of six hundred thousand men the finest that ever stood in line, which set out under his leadership for Moscow, only a pitiful remnant of 20,000 returned the following December.

### Fell to the Basement.

A preacher was preaching the funeral sermon at the home of the deceased. He told of the golden street of the New Jerusalem and how everything will be a constant delight. He said:

"Pain will never be there, sorrow will not be there, tears will not be shed in heaven. Washington, D. C., Jan 29.—The Treasury Department today recommended that \$250,000 be appropriated for construction of a post office building at Dallas.

### Warehouse Bill Explained.

Fort Worth, Texas, Jan. 21—The Farmers' Union of Texas closed its meeting here today. About 1,000 delegates were present from over the state and much interest was manifested in the called session. The two days meeting was devoted principally to the Ousley-Williams warehouse bill, and the visitors were attentive listeners while Clarence Ousley thoroughly defined this subject. He said in part, the bill provided for a state warehouse commission for the purpose of organizing a warehouse system in Texas under the supervision of the State. The bill prescribes for the sampling of cotton at gins and also that the gin sample shall be graded by a state officer of a bonded warehouse. The purpose of these provisions are to prevent the cutting of bales after being wrapped. The warehouse corporations are to be composed of at least 60 per cent of farmers and stock raisers and are to be financed by the subscription of one-half the capital required. The bill included numerous other provisions of vital importance to the farmer.

### Federals Lose 400 Men in Ambuscade

Browsville, Tex., Jan. 29.—Four hundred federals were killed during the battle of Conception del Oro, Zacatecas, early this week, or executed following the battle, according to official details of the fight received in Matamoros today.

The greater portion of the dead in actual fighting occurred when an over whelming force of rebels ambuscaded federal reinforcements en route from Saltillo.

Then battle lasted twenty-four hours, the rebels fighting from behind houses and intrenchments that were built as they moved forward.

The rebel loss was given at seven dead and seventy wounded. The peculiar dynamite bombs made by the rebels from cast iron pipes were used by them and caused much loss of life.

There was no property destruction.
