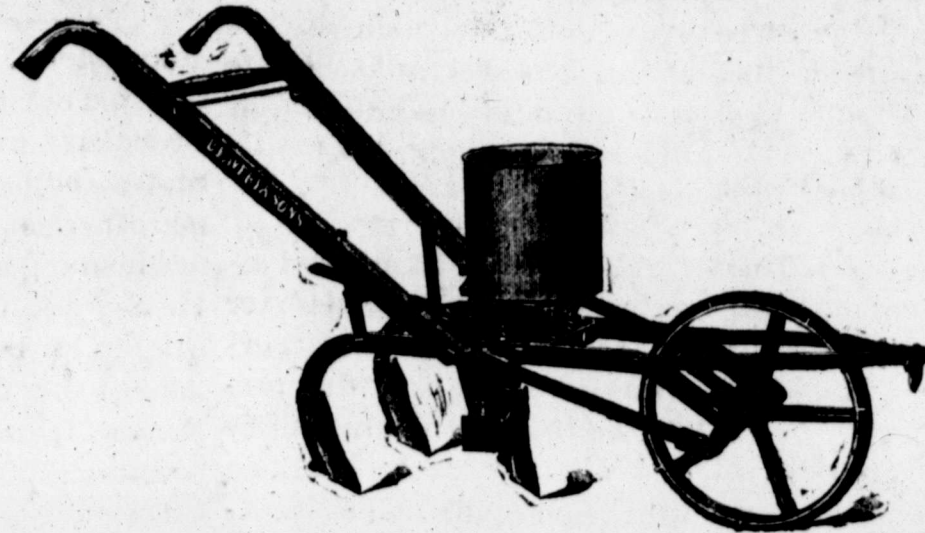

Tallie Manning Assassinated.

Sheriff Rich and Justice of the Peace, J. F. Perrette returned last night from Libby where they went yesterday morning to investigate the death of Tallie Manning. From reports given by them, it appears that he was the victim in one of the most cold-blooded assassinations that has occurred in our county in many years.

Fourteen months ago he was sent to the Epileptic colony at Abilene and returned home last Sunday and in apparent good health. Tuesday morning his father, Bob Manning, sent him to Watterman after some plows. After he had been gone some time some parties heard two reports from a gun and some one hollering and upon arriving at a point about 50 yds below

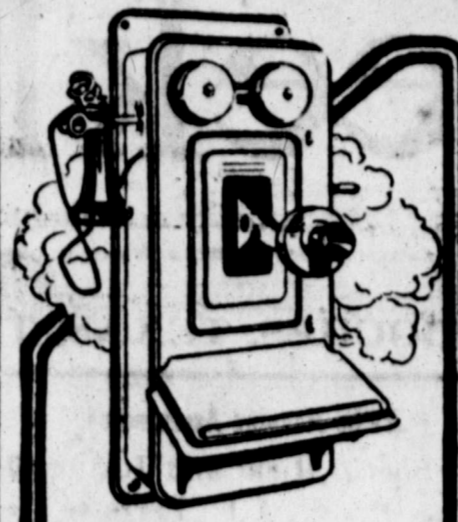

Sympathy is Due Colquitt. Not in anger and not in wrath, but with sympathy and understanding, we should view the utterances of our governor. We should sorrow with him and say, "Ours is partly the blame, for did we not elect you and put upon you the peril of saying these words that you have said?"

"Though you have done foolish things and have made rapid utterances, ours is the basic fault, for did not we lift you to the high pinnacle upon which you stand with our insuring ourselves of your proper qualifications thereof?"

"Though you have made Texas a butt and a joke among the states of the nation, we should not complain too bitterly, but should sorrow silently. Though you have done your best, or worst to embarrass our loved president, Woodrow Wilson; though you have tried to harass the man, Morris Sheppard, named by a majority of the voters of Texas in open ballot to represent them in the senate, we should chide ourselves as having erred.

"With all feeling and sympathy, we should consider ourselves at fault. We are your political keeper. You can not expose yourself in these ways unless we permit you, unless it is our will. Did not we make you our governor?"

"Our governor, we should now rise in tears and say to you that we will never more place you in a position that is so likely to bring condemnation and embarrassment upon ourselves and you. We should pledge and promise you that we will retire you back to private life and place you beyond the dangers of these things—these excesses of speech, these wild, unreasonings of mind—from which you seem so illy equipped to protect yourself.

"For your own good—and our—dear governor, we must agree, one and all, not in wrath and not in anger, but with feeling and sympathy and tenderness of heart, that we must put you where you can no longer do wrong to us and you.

"And as we are your political keeper, so must we keep you politically out of places where level headed, sober thought and unbiased unhystrical brain are absolute and utter necessities to the welfare of thee and me. We beg your pardon for having exposed you to the things for which you have fallen, and we will see that never again do you hold high office where unbridled tongue may be a danger.—John G. Willacy.

U. S. Warship Texas Now Ready

Newport News, Va., March 12.—A ready for "fight or frolic" the giant super-dread- naught Texas, most powerful battleship afloat in the world, today left the yards of her builders here, the Newport News Shipbuilding Company, for the Norfolk navy yard, distant only a few miles, there to be turned over to Rear Admiral Usher, commandant of the Norfolk station. The vessel's officers and crew had been assembled so that she was ready to be placed offici- ally in commission immedi- ately after being turned over by the builders to the autho- rized government represent- atives.

The monster of the sea carries as its principal fight- ing equipment a battery of ten 14-inch guns, being the first warship in the world to be fitted out with guns of such large calibre, and in ad- dition has in its main battery twenty-one 5-inch guns. Since the 14-inch guns were placed on the Texas a Japanese ship has been equipped with similar sized guns, although 13-5-inch guns are the largest which have yet been placed on any British dreadnaught. The big guns on the Texas are arranged in five turrets, all on a central line from stem to stern and are so placed that they can be fired over each other.

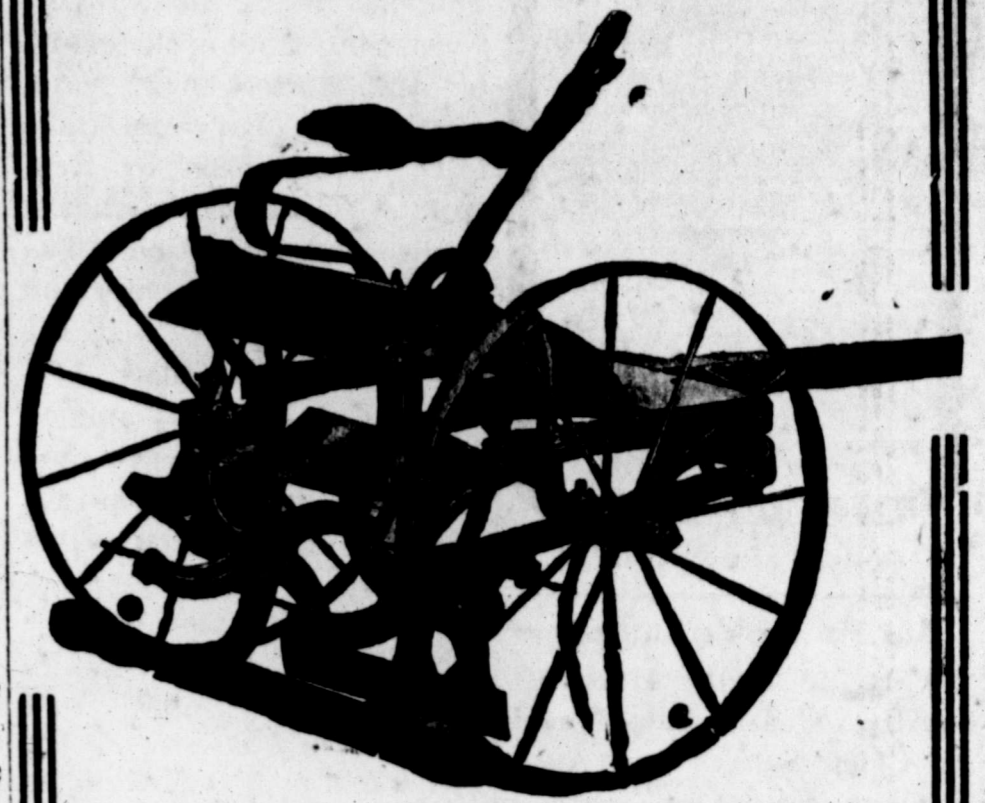
Geo. B. Terrell Will Place

Railroad Through 28 Texas Counties

Quanah, Tex. March 17.--Amendments have been filed at Austin changing the name of the Quanah, Seymour, Dublin & Rockport Railway Company to the Central Railway Company of Texas. The road also filed amendments increasing its capital stock from \$500,000 to \$550,000. If present plans mature, this line will be constructed from a point in the northwest corner of Hardeman County, through Wilbarger, Baylor, Throckmorton, Young, Stephens, Palo Pinto, Eastland, Erath, Comanche, Hamilton, Bosque, Coryell, Bell, Williamson, Travis, Bastrop, Hays, Caldwell, Guadalupe, Gonzales, Karnes, Dewitt, Goliad, Refugio, Nueces and Aransas Counties, connecting with the deep water terminals on Harbor Island in Nueces and Aransas Counties. The proposed road will be 550 miles long and will penetrate a section badly in need of transportation facilities and heretofore untouched by a steam line. English capital is behind this project and it is also their plan to construct large port and harbor works at Harbor Island.

Statement from Moss Adams.

To the Voters of Nacogdoches County:—

Now, don't you get frightened, for I'm not announcing for office tho I must admit there is a great deal of fun in running for office and I do really enjoy getting out and running for office more than any one I know, as most of the candidates dread riding out the county, but in all my campaigns I have been treated kindly and respectfully by the people of this county, and I can say to the candidates that have not met all the people of this county that there is no better class to electioneer with than the citizens of this county, and they will always give the office to the one best suited for it as they see it, and when this is done no one has any kick coming, but I'm getting off my subject, as I started this to write a few words to the voters regarding the hog law election that is to be had on the 11th day of April next. This election covers the entire county, in other words, it is a county wide hog law election, and I believe that every voter of this county wants the right thing done about this election, and at first I want to say that it is a sure thing that there is no law in the books but what works injury to some individual, be it a criminal or civil law, and let's look into this matter for a moment and reason it over together.

This county is now under hog law in most of the territory, and all the territory under hog law is territory where there is nothing for hogs to get if running at large, and this is a law that is left entirely with the men of a certain locality, if they wish to take advantage of it, and in certain communities, it is a good law, but in others, it's a bad law, as for instance you take in, and around the towns of Cushing and Garrison, the citizens want hog law for there is not an acorn in the whole territory, but take over on Beach creek near Linn Flat and down in the forks of the river and there are thousands of acres of wild land on which hundreds of hogs this year and every year get fat and are killed without the feeding of a single ear of corn, as for instance Mitch Holland and Chas. Lowery this year have killed and marketed like \$2,000.00 worth of meat from the bottoms of the Attoyac and Angelina Rivers, and over on Beach creek the same thing has happened. Now do the people in this thinly populated territory want the hog law? I say they do not, and it would not be right for us to vote on them something that they do not want. At any time an election is desired for any territory to see whether or not the running at large of hogs, goats and sheep shall be prohibited, the voters of that territory can petition the Commissioners' Court for an election for that territory and let the citizen of that territory decide the question, as for instance, we here in Nacogdoches have the hog law, and if we go in and vote in this election that is to be

held on the 11th day of April, and the hog law is defeated on that day, we will still have our hog law, and if it carries, hog law will be forced on a lot of citizen who do not want it, and does this seem right to you to force on them something that they do not want and by only taking in this territory that now has the hog law can the hog law be carried in this county, where if an election was held in the territory now not hog law, it would be snowed under by a big majority, and I do not think it is right for us who have the hog law to come in and vote on the others something they do not want when we have what we want and will have it if the election goes against hog law.

I think every man who is now living in a hog law district should stay out of the election and not vote, and I have heard it said that some people are telling over the county that if the election goes against hog law, it will defeat the hog law territory. Beware of such men, for this is not the law, we will have hog law where it is now if the election to be held on 11th day of April goes against hog law, and do not be brought in to vote when you really do not want to vote on this flimsy excuse, and by some one who is doing this maliciously. The election on the 11th day of April has nothing to do with your hog law and will not have any thing to do with it. I am sure that the citizens of the territory where hog law now prevails will not want to put something on the others who do not want it, and the only way to do will be to refrain from voting on the day of the election. It is a fact that the hog law in a certain territory puts a burden on the liners, but he has a remedy if he wishes to take advantage of it, and why not leave it to him, he can petition in, and let's not put on the people of the forks of the river something that they do not want, and REMEMBER that if the election is defeated it will not have any thing to do with the territory where hog law is, and DO NOT LET some one make you believe it, for he will be ignorant of the law or else crooked when he tell you this. Look into the election and leave it to the men not in hog law territory.
