To Tampico.

Washington, April 14.— Secretary of the Navy Daniels this afternoon directed Admiral Badger, Commander in Chief of the Atlantic Fleet, to proceed at once with all the ships under his command to Tampico.

Badger is now at Hampton Roads.

At the same time the Transport Hancock was directed to sail from New Orleans for Tampico with eight hundred marines.

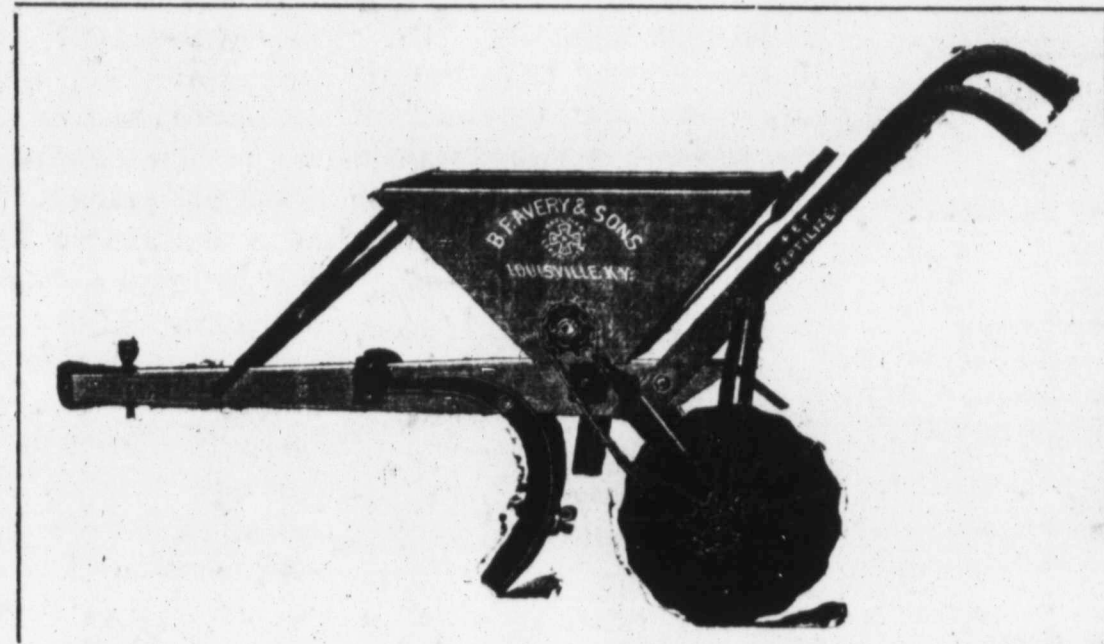
The battleship South Carolina, which is sailing north from Santo Domingo, has been intercepted and ordered to Tampico.

The Cruiser Nashville, at Santo Domingo is ordered to Tampico, as is the Tacoma, now at Boston.

The entire Atlantic Torpedo Fleet, now at Pensacola, was ordered to stand by for orders preparatory to being sent to Tampico.

The United States has ten warships and 1,200 marines at Tampico and Vera Cruz for an emergency, ready to carry out any orders to Rear Admiral Mayo or Rear Admiral Fletcher.

Washington, April 14.— No explanation of the order to the American Atlantic fleet to go to Tampico was forthcoming. Secretary Daniels, in issuing the statement telling of the movement said:

"I am making public a most important announcement. It is self-explanatory, and I must not be interrogated about it. The statement will speak for itself."

Only one interpretation was placed upon the action by Administration officials fully cognizant of what was going on behind the scenes. This was that Huerta must salute the American flag as a reparation for the indignity in the arrest of American marines last week.

Administration officials openly declare that temporizing, so far as Huerta is concerned, is at an end. Huerta is to be given a demonstration of force. Whether in the face of the overwhelming armament which will confront him within the next few days he will assume a conciliatory attitude, no one here is prepared to say.

Old Briley Town. I notice in a recent issue of the Sentinel that somebody has under taken to write a few lines in regard to "Old Briley Town."

do not think he did the subject justice and besides if I read correctly between the lines, there was a covert attempt to poke fun at this old place of a heroic past in the pine woods. It is a pity that there is a general tendency this day and time to forget the past and everything that pertains to the past and get into the new fangled foolishness of the present. The result is that not one per cent of the graduates who are turned out of the high schools and universities this day and time know anything whatever about the early history of their own country. More is the pity. The idea this day and time is to get on base ball and fashion, smoke cigarettes and look smart. That is as far as it goes. As I say the result is ignorance, woeful and pitiful in many instances.

Briley Town belongs to a past that can never more be duplicated on this earth. It is a past that is hallowed by men and women who were cast in a heroic mold. The people who used to live in the neighborhood of old Briley Town were the best people that God in his wonderful wisdom ever made. In youthful years it was my pleasure to know many of them intimately. The Humphreys family, the Rainbolts, the Broyles, the Philips, the Shaddens, the Fears, Jim Wiggins, the Boyette, Young Lloyd, Old Simon Crawford, Old Bill Crawford, Old Man Slay, the McGuires, Parson Melton of blessed memory, Dave Melton, Jim Melton, the Weatherlys, the Odems, Lee Joplin, Bill Oxshier and many others now living as well as those who died years ago attest the truth of what I say in regard to the old time Briley Town of the pine woods.

True it was a little old cross roads store that stood where two main country roads crossed each other. It was there on rainy days and on Saturdays that numbers of men of the neighborhood gathered to discuss the events of the week. But who is it that can write as it [should be written the history and influence of the old time cross roads store and the effect and influence it had upon the development of the country at large? Who I ask can write the wonderful story of these dear old cross roads stores, to which your mother and mine carried the socks which they knit with their own hands, tallow, beeswax, cloth, eggs and chickens and exchanged the same for things needed in the little household in the woods. I still remember many of these old time stores in the woods at the cross roads, and if I were able I would erect a marble shaft a hundred feet at every place and write thereon the name of every man, woman and child that used to come to these old time places. It now seems that because mayhap whiskey was sold at such places occa-

sionally, the very name should be rubbed from the scroll of memory and cast into the dust heap of oblivion. When I was a child—only a few years old, indeed about as far back as memory leads me. I remember the first quart of whiskey I ever saw was drawn from a barrel, in a little old log house that stood some fifty yards from Bill Swift's old store, not far from where Cross Roads now is in the eastern part of the county. It was sold for 50 cents. But the evil day came—the day of the crank and agitator and all the old days are now numbered with the past that even many of the people who lived at that time are striving to forget. Thirty years ago old Briley Town lay on the main route of travel between all the eastern part of Nacogdoches county and the town of Henderson where the farmers of the county mentioned sold their cotton every winter. Near old Briley Town was a wondrous spring of pure, clear and cold water. It was not far from the road and in the depths of the great lonely and lovable pine woods—the place where God Almighty communes with man and gets nearer to him than any other on earth. Near the spring the farmers used to camp and it was a dream to lay at night when everything was still, when the horses had ceased their eating, and silence reigned, to lay still and listen to the singing of the pines overhead. Old Briley Town is remembered by the old time wagoners like John Dickinson, now dead, Henry Stack, and many others. Bill Gaddy, the best preacher in Texas, also remembers old Briley Town mighty well.

in the good old neighborhood—a neighborhood where a neighbor could borrow meal, or a chunk of fire without having to pay it back or be charged for it.

Before Nacogdoches ever dreamed of having a railroad—when the only way of getting to the town was in a wagon or old time "hack," the farmers of the county, most of them at least, nauded all their cotton to Henderson. These were the days when John Hardeman clerked for old John E. Jones and when Bill and Elliott Mims were working for M. L. Fleishel & Co., in Henderson. John Cox and George Partin and Buck Parks were also there and everybody in Nacogdoches knew them and traded with them when they visited Henderson.

It Sam Hall sees this he will call to mind the fact that there were two roads, that led from the eastern part of Nacogdoches county to Henderson. One was called the Briley Town road and the other the Red Shoot road. The Briley Town was the original road that led from Henderson to Houson and ran through old Cross Roads and Melrose in Nacogdoches county and thence through Old Marion over in Angelina county and thence to Homer and on and on through the everlasting solitudes of the pine forest in those days. What a wealth of romance and history clustered around these old time places.

The Red Shoot road started at Shady Grove and intersected the Henderson and Nacogdoches main road one mile east of Beech Creek, the prettiest stream of water that was ever turned from the hand of creation. The Red Shoot road ought to have been called the Suicides Highway. It was crooked, stumpy, rocky, muddy and rooty. It was no trouble at all to place three of the four wagon wheels on as many stumps at the same time and then enjoy the sensation produced when the wheels all jumped off and struck a rock. In bad weather the roads were boggy. All along this road lived good people. They are probably all dead now. But as I remember them now they were as good as ever lived—old man Boyett, the Newmans, the Bells, and many others. The road ran through the Bogg settlement and right by the doors of the Bogg school. Bud Hogan lived near the school house—the same Bud who afterwards had so much trouble in Nacogdoches county and who, if I mistake not, was killed near Orange, Louisiana, several years ago. This will do for this time.

Reports On Lee Franks Case Withheld. Atlanta, Ga., April 3.—William J. Burns said today that results of his investigation into the murder of Mary Phagan probably would not be reported until late this week. He previously had indicated that his report might be laid before counsel for Leo M. Frank, under death sentence for the murder, today or tomorrow.

The detective, who has been at work on the case for nearly a month at the instance of friends of Frank, said that only a few minor points remained to be cleared up.

"I want to be absolutely sure" he added, "that my report will convince all concerned that I have, beyond the shadow of a doubt, found the murderer of Mary Phagan."

Mr. Burns would not indicate whether his findings would show Frank to be innocent. That this would be the case was confidently predicted by the condemned man's counsel, although they professed ignorance of the detective's discoveries.

Villa Ousted Spaniards.

Juarez, Mex., April 8.—A long refuge train, made up of five passenger coaches, baggage car and eight box cars and caboose, carrying 612 Spanish refugees and 165 Federal prisoners, pulled into the Mexican Central Railway yards at Juarez at 2:30 o'clock this morning.

The doors of the cars were locked and no passengers were permitted to leave the train until after daylight. The condition of the passengers, many of whom had been on the train for forty-six hours, were pitiable. No opportunity for leaving the train for relaxation or recreation had been given since the train left Torreon shortly before midnight Monday. Four passengers died on the way, adding to the distress of the exiles. A great many were sick as the result of hard hips experienced on the trip.

Mabank Almost Burned Out.

Mabank, Tex., April 8.—Fire originating in the harness and shoe store of Knight Bros. this morning shortly after midnight burned through the block on the north side of Main street, destroying twelve buildings and entailing a loss of at least \$100,000, according to the best estimates that can be made at this time.

Double Murder Still Baffling.

Winfield La., April 10.—No clew had been developed at noon Friday, following a coroner's inquest Thursday night, as to the identity of the murderer of Sam Chandler, 75 years old, and Mrs. Chandler, 70, whose bodies were found Thursday afternoon at the farm home, a mile and a half from Calvin, Winn parish.

The discovery of the crime was made by Baxter Wilson, a son-in-law of the victims, who first found Mrs. Chandler's body in the hallway of the home. Wilson spread the alarm and a searching party which formed later discovered the body of Mr. Chandler at the barn, about 75 yards from the house.

Mrs. Chandler had been hit on the head with an iron rod; her husband's head had been crushed and his neck broken.

A trunk in the house had been broken open, it was discovered, a fact which is taken to indicate that robbery was the motive. About \$600 was believed to have been concealed about the premises, but no trace could be found of the money when an investigation was made. Evidently it had been taken, only \$135 which was overlooked, being found.

When Wilson entered the house late in the afternoon having gone there from his own home a short distance away, he found the breakfast dishes undisturbed the meal remaining uneaten upon the table. This gave the only idea of the time of the crime's commission.

Sheriff Payne is pushing an investigation with the hope of developing a satisfactory clew, but so far has been met with failure.

Coroner J. J. Peters and District Attorney J. T. Long, who held the inquest were no more successful.

\$3,299,000 of Street Car Cash.

Under the terms of a franchise granted the surface lines about eight years ago, the city receives 55 per cent of the net earning. The traction fund, which has accumulated since the franchise became effective and which is now in the city treasury amount to about \$14,000,000.

Education By Moonlight

A young school teacher in the mountain regions of Kentucky has reduced the illiterates in one county from 1,100 to 23 within three years. Touched by the sad conditions of the uneducated people, many of whom were not only willing but anxious to learn, she originated the idea of having school at night for parents who could neither read nor write. On account of the treacherous roads of the mountain district, these schools were only held on nights when the moon was shining, hence their name "The Moonlight Schools of Kentucky."

Many men and women who, three years ago, were unable to write their own names, are now teaching in the schools, and the farmers who barely existed are becoming well to do because of scientific methods they have adopted since they learned to read literature sent them by the government.

While the per cent of illiterates in Texas is indeed small compared with that of the older states, yet the example of the Kentucky teacher might be well followed in isolated sections of the state where education is difficult to obtain.—Exchange.

Saloon Voted Out by Women.

Chicago, Ill., April 8.—Women's first use of the ballot as a weapon in Illinois worked radical changes. Nearly complete returns early today show that suffrage votes in yesterday's election drove 1,100 saloons out of Illinois and added great strength to the nonpartisan in Chicago politics.

"Vote for women" added sixteen counties to the dry column, now numbering forty-six in Illinois, and several large cities will close their saloons. With but few exceptions, the male vote alone in these cities and township favored the "wet," the women voting heavily against the saloons.

In a few cities, however, women helped swell the majority in favor of retaining the saloons. This was true in Springfield, the capital of the State, where a majority of the women voters cast "wet" ballots.

To Oppose Negro Judge.

Washington, April 8.—Southern Senators today indicated an intention to wage a vigorous fight against the appointment of R. H. Terrell, a negro, as municipal judge of the District of Columbia. The nomination came up in regular order on the calendar today but no action was taken.

Our Immigrants
Mary Antin, a brilliant contributor to the April American Magazine, suggests that we don't appreciate our immigrants. She says that they come to our shores with the courage and faith of pioneers, that they are builders and workers, and that as a class they love and believe in our country passionately. Following are a few sentences from her article:

"What we get in the steerage is not the refuse but the sinew and bone of all nations. "I am never so clear as to the basis of my faith in America as when I have been talking with the ungroomed mothers of the East Side in New York.

"Voluntary emigration always calls for the highest combination of the physical and moral virtues. With every shipload of immigrants we get a fresh infusion of pioneer blood.

"Our brains, our wealth, our ambitions flow in channels dug by the hands of immigrants. Alien hands erect our offices, rivet our bridges, and pile up the proud masonry of our monuments."

Senator Lodge's Views
Senator Lodge, Stalwart Republican member of the foreign relations committee, upholds President Wilson in his stand on the Panama Canal tolls question. Senator Lodge is of the opinion that the Hay-Pauncefote treaty permits of an exemption, under the strictest interpretation, but believes, in view of the tangled condition of foreign affairs, that the president's viewpoint is based on what is wisest, safest and best.

Ferguson Forces Bolt
Fort Worth, Texas, April 14 — Following a bolt by Ferguson forces, the original conference planned by Sheb Williams, Paul Wapels and others, was called off just after noon by James Callan, who had been slated for temporary chairman, and who with Clarence Ousley, was considered a probable nominee for Governor by this meeting.

"An address was issued and is now being prepared," said Mr. Callan, "but the conference is called off and nobody will be nominated."

The Ferguson, or opposition convention, is scheduled to start at the city hall at 2 o'clock, but it is possible at noon that it may be called off. Since the original scheduled Williams meeting is abandoned the opposition forces no longer have compelling incentive for their convention.

Webb Law is Upheld
Topeka, April 13.—The supreme court holds that the Webb law giving states control over liquor shipments is operative in Kansas and is to be upheld by the courts of the state in all cases. The case in question is over the seizure of a shipment of beer shipped to Kansas by the Columbia Brewing Company of St. Louis and held by authorities here. Without this law dry states would be helpless but in this measure they have perfect protection if they care to use it.

Villa Wins Bloody Battle.
Juarez, Mex., April 14 — A nine days' battle, possibly more desperate than that at Gomez Palacio and Torreon has resulted in a victory for the rebels under General Villa, according to an official report made public here this afternoon.

The combined rebel forces came upon the routed Federals, said in the last days of the battle to have numbered 15,000, at San Pedro de las Colonias, State of Coahuila forty miles east of Torreon. Killed and wounded on both sides, it is said, will number in the neighborhood of 8,000.

The rebels claimed to have taken 700 prisoners. The Federal army is said to have included the Torreon garrison led out of that city in retreat by General Velasco, those of General Maas, General Hidalgo and General Demoure and two others.

Houston, Tex., April 12.—Richard G. Maury, criminal district attorney, was burned to death about noon today when his automobile turned over between Lamarque and Oleander. Maury was crushed beneath the machine, which was consumed by fire. It is said Maury's automobile crashed into a cow and the machine was overturned. Gasoline ignited and the car was destroyed. Maury was crushed and partially cremated.

Cotton Worth Two Million Dollars.
Houston, Texas, April 13.—Antonio Elosua, commercial agent of the constitutionalist government in Northeastern Mexico, is negotiating with Houston cotton brokers for the sale of \$2,000,000 worth of cotton captured in the city of Torreon. Ten thousand bales of the cotton are already on the road between Torreon and El Paso.

400 Huerta Men Killed in Battle.
Chihuahua, Mex., April 14 — Four hundred Federals of the garrison at Colotlan, Jalisco State, were killed Sunday when Constitutionalists, commanded by Gen. Banuelos and Cols. Caloca and Cervantes, captured the town.

News of the sanguinary battle which preceded the capture was received in an official message today by Gen. Venustiano Carranza, leader of the revolution, from Banuelos. It said the Constitutional triumph was complete.

Among the slain were Gen. Del Toro, the commander of the garrison, and many of his subordinate officers. Six hundred Federal regular soldiers, 400 Indians and 200 citizen volunteers composed the garrison. The strength of the attacking force is not known.

Democrats For Tolls Repeals

Washington, April 12.—First returns from a poll Senator Gore is making of delegates to the democratic national convention at Baltimore on the canal issue were given out tonight by the democratic canal committeemen. They showed 838 for repealing the clause of the toll exemption act and 69 against repeal, while eleven were noncommittal. Debate on the repeal has centered largely on the declaration of the Baltimore platform for free tolls and two weeks ago Senator Gore addressed personal letters to each of the thousands-odd delegates to the convention asking for an expression of opinion on the issue.

"Up to date the returns are alike astounding to the champions and opponents of the repeal," said the announcements of the tonight. "Only two states have given a majority against the repeal. A number of them, so far as the votes have been received, have declared unanimously for the repeal—notably Texas and Pennsylvania. In Illinois to date the vote is 24 to 2 for repeal."

Veteran of The Civil War is Dead.
Weimar, Tex., April 7.—W. C. Crebbs, ex-mayor of Weimar, an old confederate war veteran, and for many years a prominent citizen of this section, died at the family residence in this city yesterday at 10 o'clock after a long illness, leaving a wife and a son, W. B. Crebbs of Seguin who were at his bedside constantly during his long illness. The body was laid to rest in Weimar Cemetery today under the auspices of the local Masonic lodge.

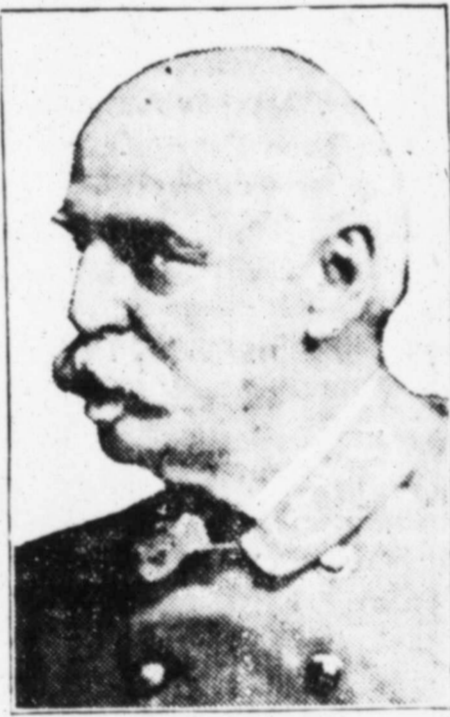
SOLDIERS' MONUMENT, JACKSONVILLE, FLORIDA



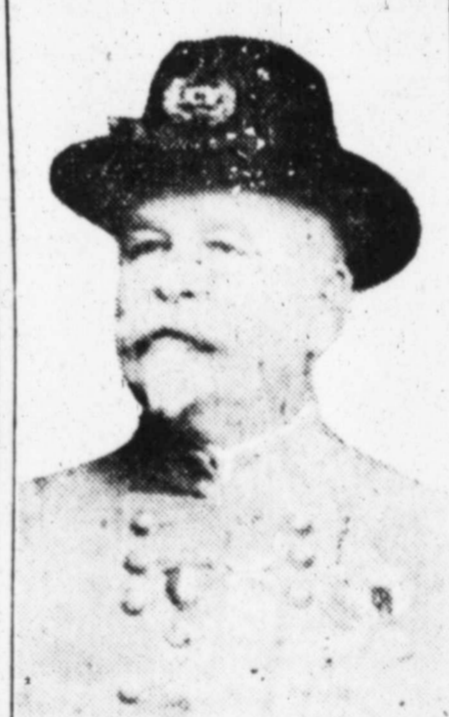

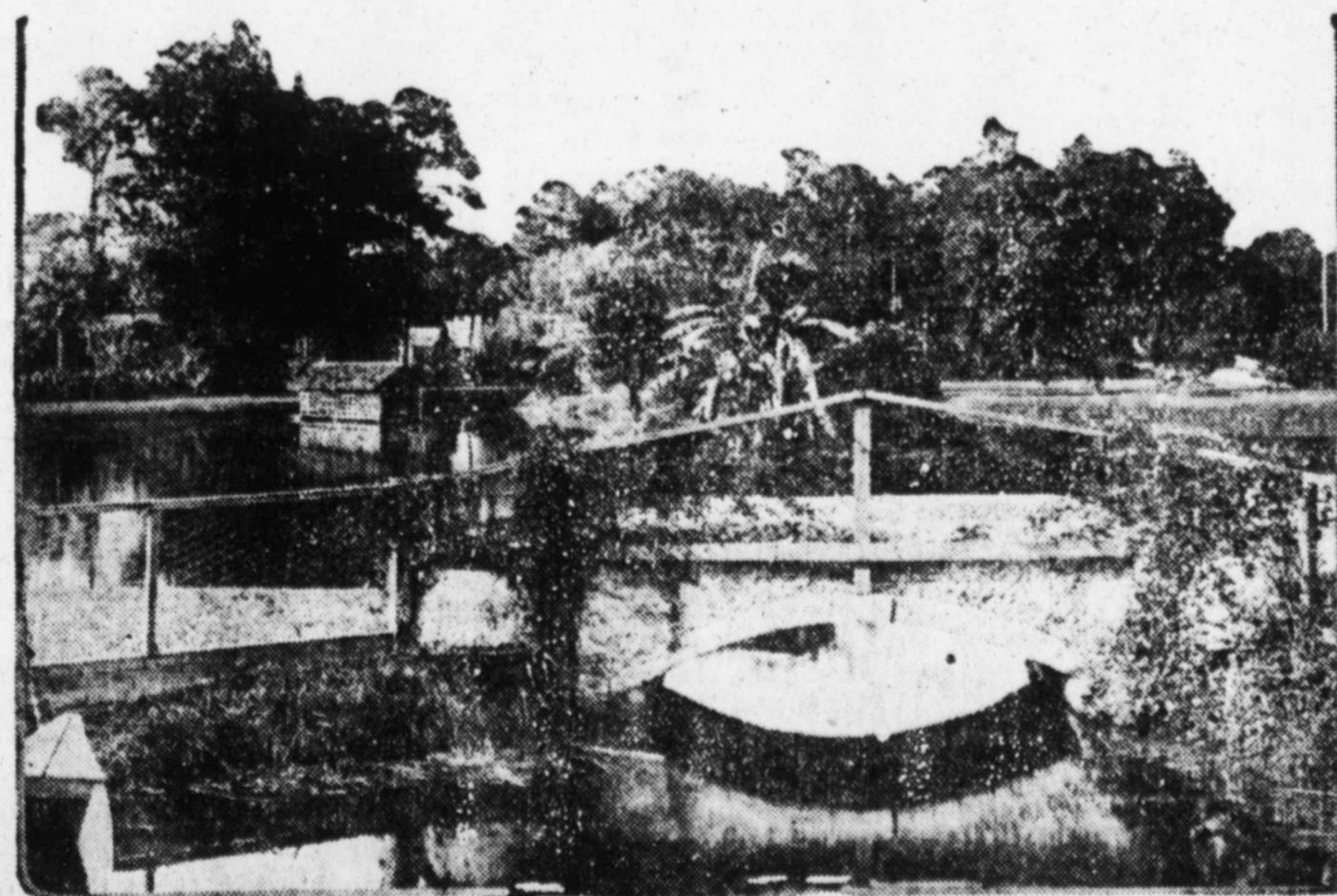
Gen. Wm. E. Mickle, New Orleans, Adjutant General and Chief of Staff Division, U. C. V., Jacksonville Reunion.

Long Staple Enthusiast.
H. M. Carter, the long staple cotton specialist of Mayo, was in the Sentinel office Saturday and had the following to say with reference to his 1913 crop of long staple cotton. "I had in about 45 acres of land from which I gathered 22 bales. I sold 7 bales at 15 cts, 5 bales at 14 1/2 cts and ten bales at 12 1/2 cts, receiving a total amount of \$1457.50 for same. The total expense for labor, feed, picking, ginning and fertilizer was \$1007.50, leaving me a profit of \$450.00.

I sold my long staple cotton that was picked after the rain for 12 1/2 cts, when short staple cotton was being sold at 7 and 8 cts.

I have about 10 bales of good seed that was picked before the rain and a few bushels of double pointed short staple cotton that is a good yielder.

I expect to plant about 40 acres of long staple cotton that will make about 1 1/2 or 1 3-4 inch staple."

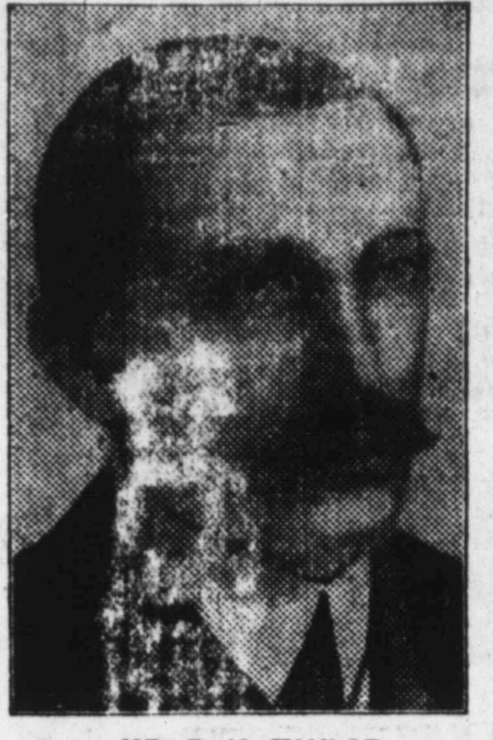
