## Late War News

Brief Summary of Events that Happened in the Mexican Situation Today.

Special to the Sentinel:

Washington, April 30.—The scope of mediation plans for settlement of Mexican crisis was suddenly broadened tonight so as to include entire range of Mexican affairs, not alone the critical issue between the United States and the Huerta regime, but also the conflict between elements of northern and southern Mexico which have rent the republic for many months.

This signal enlargement of the mediation program followed receipt, late today, of a formal acceptance by General Carranza, chief of the Constitutionalists, of the principle of mediation as proposed by Ambassadors from Brazil and ministers from Argentina and Chile.

Earlier in the day mediators made another decisive move in asking United States and Huerta to agree to armistice by which all aggressive military movements would be suspended pending the outcome of negotiations.

Mediators confidently expect both sides to accept and are working for an armistice between Huerta and Carranza and with its acceptance all of the warring elements through Mexico as well as American forces would maintain a military status quo. The American government, in its formal reply to armistice proposal, will stipulate expressly that any untoward act toward Americans will be regarded as an infraction of the armistice.

Washington April, 30.—It has just developed that Huerta tried to get Japan to represent his cause in Washington but was turned down. Spain was then appealed to and consented to act.

**J. C. Marshall Shot and Killed**

J. C. Marshall of Sacul was shot and killed by W. F. Webb Thursday evening about 7 o'clock.

The trouble came up over Marshall's objection to Webb's attention to his wife's sister. Webb arrived in Sacul yesterday afternoon on the 3 o'clock train when he and Marshall got into a fight in which Webb was considerably bruised up, after which he went to the hotel. He returned to town late and met Marshall after he had closed his store and was his way home when the shooting occurred. Six shots were fired, two striking Marshall in the breast and three in the back, one shot only going wild.

J. C. Marshall was a member of the firm of Moore and Marshall. He stood very high in the community in which he lived and had an extended acquaintance throughout the county.

He leaves a wife and three children.

W. F. Webb is in the in-

urance business. While he spends a great deal of his time in East Texas, his home is in Weatherford. He was arrested by Sheriff Rich and was brought to Nacogdoches early this morning.

## Federals Burn Nuevo Laredo.

Laredo, Texas, April 24.—Mexican federals today wrought destruction in Nuevo Laredo, across the river from this place, blew up the public buildings with dynamite, and then they turned their guns across the international boundary at Laredo.

At 3 o'clock the Mexican town was burning in several places. All available United States troops here have been called out to control the situation.

It was reported that three people had been killed by the Mexicans' fire, but in the excitement prevailing it was impossible to verify this report immediately. Americans attracted to the border said that probably ten or twelve Mexicans were seen to fall when American troops on border patrol returned the fire.

Among the buildings destroyed in Nuevo Laredo were the United States consulate, the municipal building, the flour mill, one of the largest in this section of the southwest, the postoffice, the theatre, and the customs house. At 3:15 the fire originating from the explosions or deliberately set, had spread to all quarters of the city, which appeared doomed.

Ferguson Speaks at Tyler. Tyler, Tex., April 25.—James E. Ferguson, candidate for Governor, addressed an attentive crowd of Smith county voters in the court house here this afternoon. His speech was largely devoted to an answer to the opening address of Hon. Thomas H. Ball at Greenville.

Mr. Ferguson criticised Mr. Ball severely for declaring against Nationwide, statutory and "circle" prohibition, after receiving the nomination, or indorsement, from the Fort Worth convention that declared for Nation-wide prohibition. Mr. Ferguson took the position that Mr. Ball has double-crossed the pros.

The Temple candidate renewed and defended his landlord and tenant plank, and declared that if his (Ferguson's) land plan was socialistic, that of Ball, as outlined at Greenville, was anarchistic. Mr. Ferguson discussed the land issue and prohibition question at more length than any other subjects, and declared that, in view of Mr. Ball's Greenville speech, the campaign is pitched principally upon those issues.

Mr. Ferguson was introduced by John S. McIlwaine of Tyler. A large reception committee has been appointed, headed by Dabney White and John Durst.

## Texas Regiment to Border.

Austin, Tex., April 24.—Gov. Colquitt at noon directed Adjutant Gen. Hutchings to mobilize a regiment of the Texas National Guard at Brownsville, and the troops will be moved as soon as possible.

It had not yet been determined at noon what regiment will be mobilized, but it probably will be the Third.

The Dallas Artillery will also be moved to Brownsville.

This order was made by the Governor following the receipt of an answer to his telegram to Secretary of War Garrison requesting a full regiment of regulars to be sent to Brownsville.

## Huerta is Turned Down.

Nogales, Ariz., April 24.—Formal overtures from the Huerta forces to the Constitutionalists to make common cause against the United States have been rejected by the constitutionalists. The communications were interchanged today between General Joaquin Tellez, one of Huerta's intimate friends and prominent generals, and General Obregon, Constitutionalist commander in the state of Sonora.

**The Taking of Vera Cruz.**

Vera Cruz, April 22.—The American marines have captured the City Hall of Vera Cruz, have stationed a guard in the barracks of the Federal troops and are now holding the principal parks of the city.

The bombardment of the city by the American ships started at 8 a. m. today.

Within a half hour the center of the city, had been taken.

The marines and blue-jackets advanced through the streets, using machine guns and rifles in dislodging sharpshooters and sweeping the thoroughfares of small squads of peons who resisted the advance.

The Mexicans are retiring rapidly before the steady advance of the marines.

Shells from the fleet have wrecked many adobe houses. The bombardment was exceedingly heavy for a considerable time.

**2000 Refugees To Galveston**

Washington, April 23.—Rear Admiral Badger reported to the navy department today from Vera Cruz that he was sending Esperanza with about 400 refugees to Galveston, where they will be landed. The Esperanza will then return for more. Admiral Badger will charter the steamer Mexico City and send her to Tampico to transport other refugees to Galveston, and Collier Cyclops also will be employed to carry refugees away from Tampico. In transmitting this report the admiral said it was his intention to send ships to Tuxpam to take off refugees. The number of American refugees to arrive at Galveston would aggregate 2000, he estimated.
