The Executive committees of the East Texas Fair Association of Nacogdoches County met May 24, 1914, and changed the dates of the fair that were advertised for September 30, October 1, 2, and 3, to October 14, 15, 16 and 17, conform with the schedules adopted by the American Trotters Association and the Texas Short Ship Circuit.

The following special days were also scheduled:

First Day—Home Coming and Nacogdoches Day.

Second Day—Lutkin Day.

Third Day—Nacogdoches County School Day.

Fourth Day—Farm and Demonstration Day.

Says Huerta Will Force Intervention From Europe

Corpus Christi, Texas, May 26.—A Carranza, son of General Jesus Carranza, when seen at the seaside Hotel last night stated that he believed Huerta will resort to foul means to force European intervention in case the mediators at Niagara Falls fail to deal favorably to him (Huerta).

Carranza said the rebels are fully confident Huerta, if relieved of his high office would commence a campaign with such few of his followers that are left to kill Germans, Englishmen and other foreigners ruthlessly, in order to force European intervention. Carranza said, however that no matter how far Huerta may go he will be extradited and dealt with according to his just deserts.

The campaign is rapidly nearing the end, he said, and in the course of the next six weeks the political map of Mexico will be completely changed.

Supporters of Huerta Fleeing.

Vera Cruz, May 26.—With the constitutionalist army of more than 100,000 men preparing for a hurried attack on Mexico City, members of Dictator Huerta's cabinet, members of the Mexican senate and chamber of deputies, together with many other of the dictator's supporters, are preparing to flee from the capital. The belief that Huerta himself has completed arrangements to fly when the situation gets critical is becoming stronger here.

The report that there likely will be a general exodus of officials of the de facto government from Mexico City within the next few days is strengthened by the tales told by all refugees arriving here. Practically all Americans now are out of the territory controlled by Huerta, but many other foreign residents are arriving here.

Blanquet Prevents 100 Executions by Huerta

Vera Cruz, Mexico, May 25.—With Gen. Blanquet, Minister of War, openly defying Gen. Huerta and the dictator meekly submitting while business houses in the capital are barricaded, foreigners in the city sent word here that they believed Huerta might not last through the week.

The break between Huerta and his War Minister came with the discovery of an alleged plot against the provisional President on Saturday. Almost beside himself with rage when he discovered that his subordinates were in league against him, Huerta hurried to the Belem penitentiary, where 100 political prisoners were confined, and ordered their execution. He told the jailer to lead the 100 suspected of connection with the plot outside, and to stand them against the wall and shoot them.

The Minister went post-haste to the penitentiary in an automobile. He called Huerta outside and then ordered the prisoners returned to their cells.

Heavy Fire Loss in Elkhart.

Palestine, Tex., May 25.—Seventeen frame stores were destroyed with a heavy loss at Elkhart, a small place twelve miles south of here, in a fire of unknown origin which started about 4 o'clock Sunday morning.

Grants Pardon to G. H. Barnes.

Austin, Texas, May 25.—A pardon was issued today by the governor to George H. Barnes, the steward of the Elks' Club at Marshall, who was fined \$6000 for soliciting orders in dry territory and for operating a cold storage, and who was also sentenced to 180 days' confinement in the county jail.

The court of criminal appeals had affirmed the case and last Friday the mandate was issued. Immediately thereafter friends of Barnes appealed to the governor for a pardon and this was granted today.

The governor remitted \$5700 of the fine and also the jail sentence, and the balance of the fine, \$250, the governor indicated should be paid by Barnes for the violation of the law.

Henry Sampson Dead

New York, May 25.—Henry Sampson, noted for his collection of old Chinese porcelains, died at his home here yesterday. The porcelains, gathered after years of work, recently were sold to Edgar Groer for more than \$1000,000.

Vera Cruz, May 25.—Mexican Federals will begin the immediate reconstruction of the track along the line of the Mexican Railways, which was torn up by troops under the leadership of Gen. Maas. An official of the Mexican National Railways called upon Gen. Funston recently and asked for an armistice agreement upon the part of the United States soldiers, which was readily granted.

This action follows the decision to arrange for the exchange of mail with the City of Mexico and interior points, beginning tomorrow.

Putnam Predicts Ferguson Victory
Frank Putnam, traveler, special writer and newspaper man of Texas, is visiting Dallas. Mr. Putnam is widely known as a newspaper writer of ability. Formerly editorial writer for the Houston Chronicle, Mr. Putnam was appointed special commissioner by former Mayor Rice of Houston and sent to Europe to study the municipal governments of the leading cities of England and Germany. Upon his return to Texas Mr. Putnam published the result of his investigations and the book was widely distributed throughout the United States.

"Frank" has been traveling in North Texas and as the result of his tour of that part of Texas, announces his belief of the election of James E. Ferguson as governor of the state over Thomas H. Ball. Also, that liability for the loss in the case of one who dies exists. If adopted generally, this ruling would send many cities that have been furnishing water at cost into bankruptcy. But, at the same time, to furnish such impure water to consumers is a crime against the public health, and a crime is no less a crime if committed by a municipality than if committed by a private concern.—Houston Post.

Senator Criticizes Colonel
Washington, May 21.—Colonel Roosevelt's charge that the administration is submitting to "blackmail" in the treaty with Columbia by a \$25,000,000 payment indemnifying that country for the loss of the Panama Canal property, brought a sharp reply tonight from Senator Stone of Missouri, chairman of the senate committee on foreign relations. Senator Stone declared that the circumstances attending the Panama revolution and expropriation of the canal zone convict Colonel Roosevelt of "robbery." He stated that the word "blackmail" is ill chosen and will not stand inquiry into the facts.

\$20,000,000 is Given To Benefit Farmers

Washington, May 23.—The general agricultural appropriation bill, which was passed in the senate late today, carries a number of provisions in aid of Southern and Southwestern industries. The total appropriations will reach about \$20,000,000.

The cattle industry is provided for in an item of \$400,000 for work in eradicating the Southern cattle tick. Provision was made for extermination of noxious animals that prey on sheep and cattle by an appropriation of \$125,000. Of this amount \$50,000 was added by an amendment by Senator Shepard, which also included wolves among the animals eliminated. Western sheep raisers will profit by a \$5,000 item for investigation of the adaptability of the Corridale breed of Australia to Western ranges of the United States, and for the importation of varieties of the sheep.

For the protection of migratory birds, the bill carries \$50,000. Senator Reed and others led a fight to eliminate this item on the ground that it was unconstitutional. It was stated from the floor that the federal court of the eastern district of Arkansas had recently held the law invalid.

An appropriation of \$180,000 is made for investigation of gin compresses for use by the cotton grower, and on methods of handling and baling cotton; also for distribution to the primary cotton markets of samples of cotton yarns and standards of cotton for use by the farmer when he reaches the selling market with his staple. The department of agriculture will select the person at the primary markets to receive and display the samples. Senator Sheppard of Texas, who aided Senator Smith of South Carolina in securing adoption of the amendment, will cooperate with the department of agriculture as far as Texas is affected.

Six hundred thousand dollars is provided for farm demonstration work throughout the country, and with it goes work for extermination of the cotton boll weevil.

It is estimated that more than \$30,000 was raised. Women sold these tags. The Texas building material for which has been donated will be a large replica of the Alamo.

Senator W. O. Bradley of Kentucky is Dead.

Washington, May 23.—Senator William O'Connell Bradley of Kentucky died tonight in Washington at 9:45 o'clock. He was completing his first term in the United States senate, which would have expired March 3, 1915.

Senator Bradley was born near Lancaster, Ky., March 18, 1847. He is survived by his daughter, Mrs. John N. South of Frankfort, Ky., she being at his bedside when he died. Senator Bradley had been ill but a few days, suffering from acute kidney trouble. We was a republican.

Was Spread in Albania.

Durratio, Albania, May 23.—Following the receipt of news that the insurgent forces were close upon the capital, Prince William, the princess and their suite late this afternoon fled from the city, taking refuge abroad the Italian warship Misurata.

The revolt broke out at Tirana, to the east of Durratio, and in the fight which immediately ensued the rebels decisively defeated the government troops.

Bandits Get \$5,000

Millerton, Ok., May.—Two masked robbers rode up to the Bank of Millerton today and commanded the cashier, one customer and the agent of the St. Louis & San Francisco Railroad to hold up their hands.

One of the robbers then walked behind the counter and forced the cashier to open the vault and turn over all the money, about \$5,000.

The bandits escaped to the hills.

Visit Lutkin School.

Superintendent R. F. Davis and R. C. Monk, H. F. Tucker, V. E. Middlebrook and W. E. Thomason members of the school board went to Lutkin Wednesday afternoon to visit the school at that place for the special purpose of inspecting the manual training and domestic science departments which has been added there the past year.

They were met at the station by Superintendent Dericson who escorted them to the school building and showed them through one of the most up to date and thoroughly equipped school buildings in this part of the state. One of the most interesting features of the school was the manual training department where a number of boys were finishing up their first years work in this department. They were under the supervision of Mrs. Kaine and were as busy as bees over their work benches, making cabinets, bookcases, desks, tables etc. and were turning out work that would do credit to any school or any community. Each student does three years work in this department and the superintendent stated that this work had a great tendency to keep a certain class of boys in school besides the practical advantage it gives each one.

The domestic science department was complete in every detail and wonderful advance had been made by the girls in the practical things in domestic life. Scientific cooking, sewing, etc. are taught and much interest is added to school work by the addition of this important department.

The physical and chemical departments were visited and found to be as well equipped as any high school in the state. These departments were under the supervision of Prof. Armstrong who is a very able instructor and is doing very efficient work.

The people of Lutkin are to be commended for securing able services of Superintendent Dericson who has brought their school out of chaos and placed it on a footing that is equaled by few and surpassed by none. He has on able corps of teachers who are absolutely co-operating with him and are potent factors in the success of the school.

Their school building is not only the pride of Lutkin but of East Texas.

It cost \$32,000 and in addition has \$10,000 worth of modern equipment.

The parties returned last night very much pleased with the trip.

Crop Conditions in Jones County Best in 10 Years.

Stamford, Tex., 20.—Farmers in this section are jubilant over crop conditions and are anticipating record breaking yields in all grain crops. Thirty bushels of wheat and fifty bushels of oats per acre are predicted by some. Altogether crop conditions at this time are the best witnessed in this county in ten years and from present indications one of the largest crops ever gathered in Jones County will be harvested this season.

Gonzales, Tex., May 20.—Miss Ora Wood of this city has announced her candidacy for the office of county superintendent of public schools. This makes two candidates for this place, the other being Chester Cochran of Harwood the present incumbent. A. V. Peterson, not being a candidate for re-election, he having accepted a position as superintendent of the schools of this city.

Texas Congressman After Marine Hospital.

Washington, May 20.—A bill appropriating \$200,000 for site and buildings in connection with the construction at Galveston of a marine hospital has been introduced in the House of Representatives by Congressman Gregg of Texas.

Employes of Penvy Railway Don't Drink.

Philadelphia, Pa., May 22.—After an efficiency test applied to 700,000 employes, it is announced that the Pennsylvania Railroad's forces are 99.9 per cent.

Not a single violation of the anti liquor rule was discovered.

President Mezes of the University of Texas in a circular letter to the former students and friends of the University calls attention to the fact that the University will "be compelled to close its doors and send its students to their homes unless \$340,000 is somehow added to the \$861,000," and requests them to make a special point of communicating this condition to candidates for the legislature and other official representatives of the people.

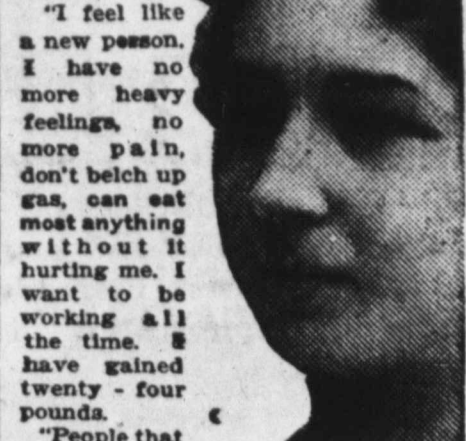

ADDRESS BY R. C. MONK, PRESIDENT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

Reviews Progress of Schools for the Past 14 Years Makes Recommendation for the Future.

The most interesting program in the history of the Nacogdoches High School commencement exercises, was rendered Tuesday night at the auditorium.

Among the interesting features of the occasion was the address of R. C. Monk, president of the board of trustees. He said in part:

"Some one has said that 'we are all creatures of circumstances'. I'm not admitting it neither am I denying it. Whether it is true or not as a general proposition. I know right well that I'm a victim of circumstances to-night for when through the generosity of the board I was chosen as chairman, they told me that I must give some information to the patrons as we felt proud of some things that had been accomplished. One of the board suggested that I make a 'bragadocio' speech."

I'm going to recount some of the things that we as a school community have accomplished since the awakening about the year 1900.

Before that time our schools had gotten in a bad way. There was not sufficient funds in the first place, and in the second place, there was not the co-operation of patrons to insure good schools. We had troublesome times in these days getting out of the wilderness, but we got out and have been making progress ever since. Many of you recall how after voting a bond issue of \$32,500 in July, 1902 and because of the laws governing towns and cities we could not get the bonds approved and we were forced to abolish our city corporation, after which we established the present independent district and in Jan. 1903 bonds were voted and approved to the amount of \$36,500, all of which was used to construct the building we are in tonight besides two other school buildings in the district. We thought we had ample room for many years to come. From that time we have grown wonderfully in many ways.

I can remember and so can Superintendent Davis when he was a teacher in the school with only about a dozen teachers. Last year we had 26 teachers on our pay roll and had about 1600 children within the scholastic age in the district.

In those years of our beginning we had no affiliation with any of the state institutions of high learning but now we are afflicted with all the schools of the south and have 19 1-2 units of affiliation with the University of Texas. These are only a few of the things we have accomplished and I believe every citizen is proud of the record.

I forgot to say that for a number of years we were forced to have from one to two months of private or pay school to supplement the free school, but for the past three or four years we have given to the people nine months of

free school each year. It is true that two years ago we came out at the end of the term with a debt of something more than a thousand dollars. I tell you that every member of the board sweated blood for a whole week trying to solve the problem for another year. The board decided to have the nine months free schools and asked the teachers to draw pay for eight and one half months for nine months service.

I pause now to pour out the gratitude of my heart to the noble, unselfish, sacrificing band of excellent teachers who willingly came to our relief. Ladies and gentlemen shall we not appreciate more those faithful ones and give to them our whole hearted, unstinted support, and sympathy as they daily toil for the building of our children's lives and characters.

I should say further that at the close of the year just referred to, we came out with no debt and this year will close with something like \$1700 on hand.

I have been saying something of what we have achieved during these years of progress. We are proud of what we have done, but we are never satisfied. I want to tell you something. Have you ever said anything against our sister city—the enterprising little town of Lutkin? If so take it back. We would do well to pattern after them in some respects, especially relative to school buildings and equipment. Together with three other members of the board and Superintendent Davis we visited the Lutkin school last week and we were cordially received by Superintendent Derickson and his teachers and conducted through their new building. We were carried away with the arrangement of the building in all of its details and the manual training department was an eye-opener. Any man, who can visit a place like that where twelve or fifteen are as busy as bees making and turning out furniture that would be nice enough to grace our nicest homes, and not be imbued with its importance, there must be something wrong with him. The board, I think is unanimously in favor of putting in the manual training and domestic science courses in our school. We must do it if at all possible.

We need and must have

more room. We can't have it unless we build. We can't build unless we have the funds and the best way to have funds is to float bonds.

Ten years ago we owed \$36,500 and could not retire any of it under five years, since that time we have paid all interest and and paid \$19,500 of the bonds, leaving \$17,000 and have 30 years in which to pay same.

Now why can't we vote an issue of \$50,000 or \$60,000 retire the \$17,000 we owe and use the balance for the erection and equipment of an up to date High School and other necessary buildings.

May be you have not thought of it that way, but we are not only responsible for the present conditions, but we are responsible for what the next generations maybe."

England Not to Exhibit at Frisco.

London, May 25.—Premier Asquith announced in the House of Commons that the Government adheres to its decision not to participate in the Panama-Pacific Exposition at San Francisco.

Woman Killed and Five Injured.

San Antonio, Texas, May 23.—Kathleen Zigmund was killed and seven persons were seriously injured when a touring car dashed headlong into a farmer's wagon on the south loop last night. The farmer's wagon was demolished and both horses killed, one of the animals being hurled thirty-five feet. Five of the injured were dug out of the wreckage of the car.

Home Rule Bill Wins.

London, May 25.—The Irish home rule bill this afternoon was passed by the House of Commons.

It was the third enactment of home rule by the Commons and by the veto act the measure will become a law, even though it be rejected by the House of Lords.

Upon the rejection of the bill by the Lords, which is taken for granted, it will automatically become a law with the King's signature, and within the next twelve months the new Irish Parliament will be sitting at Dublin.

The bill itself provides that it shall not become operative for eight months from the date of its passage nor in its entirety later than fifteen months; but there is a special provision which compels the organization of the Dublin Parliament within a year.

Portland, Me., May 25.—The party of negroes assembled by "Chief" Alfred Charles Sam will sail next week to establish a colony on the gold coast of Africa, according to announcement made here today. The steamer Curityba, secured by Sam last winter and brought here for overhauling, has been changed from Cuban to British entry and now bears the name Liberia.

"We will first go to Norfolk to take on our bunker coal," said Sam, "and we will then head for Galveston where many of the colonists are waiting for us. We will have accommodations for a few over sixty.

Captain MacKenzie of the "Holy Ghost and Us Society," is of the steamer.

Five Are Shot to Death.

New York, May 25.—Gang killers, whose battles on both the east and the west side of Manhattan resulted in the murder of five men, the wounding of three and the injury of many more, were sought by the police today after the outbreak of disorder had culminated in a bloody street fire in Hell's Kitchen.

Twenty-five suspects were gathered in by the police. They spent last night vainly seeking for those whose blood spattered the pavements after the Hell's Kitchen affray. Every man hit was spirited away, and today all had evaded the searching detectives.

According to the refugees aboard the Monterey who recently left the City of Mexico there are yet nearly one thousand Americans in the Mexican capital.
