NEGRO BRAKEMAN KILLED

Constable J. L. Burrows Put Under

Wednesday morning about 1 o'clock a negro brakeman by the name of Abe Ivery was killed just north of the water tank near the H. E & W. T. rathond. Ivery was deadheading his way on No. 11 which was a through freight ou, of Shreveport and was shot while the train was stopped to take water at the tank One shot took effect striking him in lower part of the back and coming out in front. He was picked up by the crew of the southbound passenger train and taken to the depot where he was sent to the sanitarium for treatment but died about three hours afterward.

First Steam Saw and Flouring Mill In is Squire Murph who is still Nacogdoch es.

north of where the town now stands, the first steam saw mill in Nacogdoches county was erected in March 1858 by J. W. Murph. ln 1860 he added to his plant a complete flouring mill with smutter, bolter, etc.

The machinery for this mill was purchased in New Orleans and shipped down the Mississippi river to its mouth, thence on the Gulf of Mexico to the mouth of the Neches river where it was transferred to smaller boats and shipped up the Neches and Angelina rivers to Plattonia where it was unloaded and hauled overland on wag ons to its destination.

Bran, chops and first and second grades of flour were turned out by this mill in large quantities.

Squire Murph says that there was a great deal of the principal crops raised and his head. averaged about 20 bushels per acre.







I cannot repeat the exact language of the plan but will tell you how I tollowed it and any one doing as I did will be wonderfully surprised at

"First, be sure and have the well curbed five or six feet; have well thoroughly cleaned; then take large gravel or crushed rock and wash same clean, after gravel or crushed rock has been washed place a layer of same about 5 inches deep in bottom

"I could not get gravel but used crushed rock using pieces about the size of marbles, and I have had no more trouble with muddy or impure water."
