VS. Temperance

In Germany, where prohibition is unknown and where all the people have been temperate drinkers of wholesome beers and light wines, there is less drunkenness than in Maine or in Kansas-the two most conspicuous prohibition states in the Union.

The same is true of France and Italy. The world over you will find that the really temperate races are those who are not prohibited from drinking temperate beverages such as beer and wine.

Prohibition in Germany, France or Italy would produce exactly the same results that it has produced in every state in the Union where prohibitory laws have been enacted. It would not stop men from drinking nor decrease drunkenness, but it would drive out the mild drinks and encourage men who de drink to resort secretly to the highly concentrated spirits.

If prohibition really saved men from the "curse of drink" it would have more to commend it to the intelligence of the people. But, as the great editor, Henry Watterson, observes in the Louisville Courier-Journal, "It does not promote either temperance or virtue. It arouses human passion to frenzy by restricting private rights. It does not reduce drunkards. It multiplies Pharisees and malefactors."-Paid Advertisment.







Minister's Views on Social Clubs. Rev. Knickerbocker on the Social Clubs. (Waco Morning News, January 1914.)

"In his sermon, Rev. H. D. Knickerbocker, pastor of the Austin Avenue Methodist Church of Waco, on Sunday night held the social club where liquor is sold, up to the light and dissected it in comparison with the saloon."

"The saloons have been surrounded with laws so that they occupy their own place-although it is a shameful place. But the social club is merely putting a cordon of church people around the saloon and inviting young people to come. With the social club it is MORE DAMNABLE THAN THE SALOON. Do you think any Christian man would have stock in a saloon? Then he should have no stock in a social club run as a saloon. One share of stock in such a club puts 100th part of a saloon in your posession, but you are WHOLLY GUILTY of running it. There is no such thing as a club conscience or a corporation conscience-if 100 men kill one man they are equally guilty-if 100 men own a club where liquor is old they are equally as guilty."

"You can't sit around in a saloon and play cards and hear music, but you can in a social club. From he standpoint of justice the saloon man has a mighty kick. It is right to let the social club run on Sunday then let the saloon run. I hope the members of my church who own stock in social clubs which are run as saloons will get rid of it."

Social Clubs Represent The Privileged Classes.

Judge McPherson in the case of the United States ersus Alexis club, 98 Federal reports, page 725 was alking of Tom Ball and his fellow club members when he gave utterance to the following:

"Equity before the law is a principle of American ociety, than which there is none more vital. Privlege and privileged classes are, and ought to be NTOLERABLE; and it comes irritatingly near to privilege when SOCIAL CLUBS, offering comforts nd luxury that are only in the reach of the more prosperous, escape a share of the public burdens, beause a refined reasoning declares that they are dong no more than distributing a common stock of quor among their members, while the ROBUST ENSE of the community KNOWS THE TRANSAC-TION TO BE A SALE."

Here is what it costs: State liquor license \$375, county liquor license \$187.50, city license \$187.50, Federal revenue tax \$25, tees for County Judge and County Clerk \$8.50, enrolling fee \$2, bond to county \$25. Total \$810.

Only one malt license was issued this morning. The cost of dealing in malt liquors is somewhat less as follows: State license \$62.50, county \$31.25 city \$81.25, Federal revenue \$25 tees \$10.50, bond \$10. Total \$170.50.
