Investigation disclosed that 49 of the 65 convention votes of the county were represented in the convention.

In the long ago men of mature age were selected to fill all important positions of government but today it is different in the employment of men to fill commercial positions. The post master general of the United States has ruled that no man past the age of sixty years will be employed in any of his departments. The railroads have ruled that no man past the age of 45 years making his first application need apply. The Kids have captured the country and old men must stand aside they do not consider that time will keep rolling and by and by the age limit will be reached, and if a competency has not been accumulated they will be asking for employment the same as old men of today. There are hundreds and thousands of men past the ages of 60 and 70 years who are as competent to fill important positions as well and better than men from 25 to 40 years of age. Take the supreme Judges of the United States courts only two are under the age of sixty years. This rule will apply to all of the higher courts of all of the states in the Union. In some localities throughout the country the age limit men are organizing employment bureaus and are obtaining employment under this regime.

She left us the impression that she was under the impression that her children did not care anything about her and that they preferred her room to her presence. She was not complaining, but she had misgivings. Huerta And Party To Sail For Spain. Kingston, Jamaica, July 29.—General Huerta, who arrived here July 24, has chartered the steamer Patia, now at Port Limon, Costa Rica, and will sail Sunday with his party of refugees direct to a Spanish port, probably Santander.

Washington, D. C., July 29.—It is expected within a few days the Carbajal delegation will have worked out the details of an agreement. Diplomats here expect one of the first questions will be on recognizing the protocols signed at Niagara Falls between the United States and the Huerta government. Approval of the constitutionals probably would mean recognition by the United States, Argentina, Brazil and Chile.

An agreement by which Huerta's forces are to cooperate with the Constitutionals restoring peace through Mexico has been arranged by delegates at Vera Cruz and now required only the signatures of Carranza and Zapata before being made public.

A definite idea of General Villa's intentions are expected soon.

Cold Day In July; Overcoats and Furs Seen In New York

New York, July 29.—Light overcoats, sweaters and even furs were much in evidence on the streets and trains in New York last night and the temperature of between sixty-one degrees and 70 made those persons who wore winter clothing the envy of the summer clad folks.

According to weather bureau forecaster yesterday was the coolest July 28 since 1884. A heavy rain and east winds were responsible for the drop in temperature which today was expected to remain in the neighborhood of seventy degrees. The forecaster added that no very warm weather was in sight this week.

Captains of incoming steamships said that the ocean was cooler during the past few days than they had known it at the end of July for the last twenty-five years.

Will Avoid Dangers of Cape Cod Now. Buzzard's Bay, July 29.—The Boston Cape Cod and New York Canal, connecting Buzzards Bay with Massachusetts Bay and enabling coast-wise vessels to avoid the dangerous passage around wreck strewn Cape Cod, was formally opened today by August Belmont, of New York, president of the constructing and operating company. The canal shortens by seventy miles the shipping distance between the ports to the north and south of it.

Although the canal has actually been open from one end to the other since early this month, no vessels other than those belonging to the owners of the canal have been allowed to pass thru it. The canal will be open to traffic tomorrow and will be completed in all its details about the first of October.

Schools Will Have \$8.00

Austin, July 29.—Apportionment of the available school fund for the fiscal year beginning September 1 is expected to be made within a week or ten days by the state automatic tax board, and it is estimated that each scholastic in Texas will receive not less than \$8 for this year. This is said to be the largest amount ever portioned in the state and is caused by the recent action of the board in increasing the school tax from 17 to 20 cents on the \$100 property valuation. An increase of 50,000 scholastic is expected this fiscal year, the number now being actually 1,058,000.

Bitten by Rattlesnake While Grasping for Rabbit

San Marcos, Tex., July 29.—Herman Allen, son of Sylvester Allen of Devil's Backbone, near Hugo, went rabbit hunting the other day, ran a cottontail into the fence, reached after the rabbit and a rattler bit him on the hand. Local remedies were used and a runner dispatched for the doctor. The young man is out of danger.

Charbon Appears in McLennan County.

Anthrax, or charbon, the dreaded disease which has been killing all sorts of animals in South Texas and by the wholesale, has made its appearance in McLennan county. Three mules and one yearling steer have died near Axtell since last Friday. An analysis of the blood of the mules, made yesterday in the laboratory of Drs. Colgin & Colgin, showed that the charbon germs were present.

It is well for stock owners in Nacogdoches county and in all other counties in different States to keep a close watch on their stock and combat this dreaded disease among cattle, horses and mules. It can be overcome, if attended to in time.

Fred Warren Resigns Editorship.

Girard, Kan., July 28.—Fred O. Warren yesterday resigned as editor of the Appeal to Reason, the socialist paper here, because of ill health. Louis Koehling, managing editor, succeeds him.

The Winner. James E. Ferguson of Temple has won the nomination for the governorship of Texas. It is a remarkable triumph. His opponent had the indorsement of what was believed to be the dominant wing of the party, and the support of nearly every accredited leader, including President Wilson and Mr. Bryan. He went to the people as plain "Farmer Jim," told them his story and, as the result shows, succeeded in enlisting their sympathy.

He is 42 years of age, a native of Bell county, and the son of a Methodist preacher. He was raised on a farm and had little schooling. At the age of 16 he went to California where he worked in vineyards, on wheat farms in placer mines and in a barbed wire factory. Later he worked in mines in Nevada and Colorado and was a bellboy in a Denver hotel. Two years he was gone from home. Returning to Texas, he farmed awhile, then took employment with a bridge gang building county and railroad bridges. He returned to the farm, later was admitted to practice of law, invested in farm lands, and finally became a banker. We doubt if there is a man in the state, possibly the United States, of his age with such a varied career. Farmer, miner, factory hand, bellboy, lawyer and banker—not theoretical, but by actual experience—and never a complete failure in any undertaking.

The man's chief recommendation is his common sense. He goes to the heart of a proposition without any circumlocution. His triumph is an illustration of what is possible in a democracy he having won the highest honor in his state over the combined political forces, including the president of the United States. Men will now seriously consider Ferguson's rental scheme. The chances are that two years from now he will have another proposal as to the land. As the saying goes, business will go up in the state's affairs when Jim Ferguson takes the reins of government.—Waco Times Herald.

Insane Persons of Texas.

Terrell, Tex., July 30.—Texas had 4,058 insane persons confined in her hospitals at the last census, compared with 1,045 twenty years previous, according to a report issued by the Federal Department of Commerce and Labor. These figures do not include the insane persons in the jails of Texas, but relate only to the insane enumerated in hospitals. According to the report, Texas has 104 insane persons to every 100,000 people and the average for the United States is 204 per 100,000 persons. In the entire nation there are 187,791 insane people confined in hospitals.

Texas Penal Institution.

Huntsville, Tex., July 31.—There are 109 prisoners per 100,000 population confined in Texas penal institutions, and the total number confined is 4,282, according to a report which has just been issued from the Census Bureau. About 60 per cent of the prisoners are negroes, 40 per cent are whites. In the entire United States there are 111,609 prisoners confined in penal institutions and the ratio is 121 per 100,000 population.

Flour Jumps.

Minneapolis, Minn., July 29.—Notwithstanding a 40c per barrel raise this morning, the price of flour will not become prohibitive, according to F. J. Clark, vice president of the Northwestern Miller and Flour Market Record, here today. Flour today is quoted at \$5.40 per barrel in the wood.

"There is likely to be considerable fluctuation in the price of flour," said Mr. Clark today. "This is due to the European war situation. The European crop is short and this was reckoned with some time ago."

W. R. Morris, manager of the St. Paul Bread Company, said that the price of bread will not be affected by the changed prices.

Fighting Forest Fires

Missoula, Mont., July 29.—Two hundred men were engaged fighting forest fires in a heavy stand of spruce on Big river in the Flat head national forest. Assistant Forester Prenton left here yesterday to take charge. The fire is the worst thus far developed from burning in various portions of western Montana.

"We are facing a repetition of the great fires of 1910," said District Forester Silcox, "unless we can stamp out these fires before they run together."

\$500,000,000 Gold To Banks Says McAdee.

Washington, July 31.—Secretary of the Treasury McAdee today issued a statement saying the government has \$500,000,000 for the banks of this country in case of an emergency, caused by the enormous withdrawal of gold from America by foreign powers.

The senate promptly agreed to the amendments, which then went to the White House for the president's signature.

Mexico News

Saltillo, Mexico, Aug. 3.—An advance on Mexico City of more than 70,000 well armed and equipped constitutionalist soldiers was begun today on orders from General Carranza.

The order for the general advance was given by General Carranza after a telegraphic conference with General Obregon in Queretaro. General Obregon reported that the division of the Northwest under his command and that of the Northeast under General Pablo Gonzales had formed a juncture at Irapuato, where 60,000 men were concentrated. On receipt of General Carranza's order Obregon and Gonzales began today their march to Pachuca the first important point toward the capital held by the federals.

General Antonio Flores now holds a position in the suburbs of Pachuca and General Jacinto Trevino with his brigade is marching from Queretaro to join in an assault on the town.

General Candido Aguilar is approaching Jalapa, capital of the state of Vera Cruz.

If the Carbajal delegates have authority to agree to terms of unconditional surrender it is positive that they will return to Mexico City without even having seen General Carranza. According to constitutionalists undoubtedly well informed as to the situation, they have been requested to outline their exact powers. If they are not authorized to meet demands for unconditional surrender on which General Carranza agreed to receive them, it is said they will not be received at all.

Early today no appointment for a conference between the delegates and General Carranza had been made.

Anderson Will Not Hold Second Primary.

Palestine, Texas, August 3.—There will be no second primary in the race for representative. As A. R. Walters received the highest number of votes, County Chairman P. W. Brown rules. Walters is the nominee. He is a prohibitionist.

Beginning Monday afternoon the Crockett and Eagle Lake ball teams will play a series of three games in the ball park here. Both are very good teams.

The trades and labor council are planning to observe Labor Day with an old-fashioned basket picnic in the Reagan park.

The big brother movement has been organized at the Y. M. C. A. The men present went into a permanent organization electing H. I. Myers president; H. V. Hamilton, secretary-treasurer.

A committee appeared before the county commissioners this afternoon bearing petitions asking for an election on whether or not pool halls shall remain here. Palestine now has two well-conducted establishments.

The State of Georgia works 5,000 convicts on her public roads and leads all States in the nation in the nation in this respect.

Late War News

Paris, August 4.—A German aeroplane last evening dropped three bombs on the fortified town of Luneville, the southeast of Nancy. Some property damage was caused, but there were no casualties.

Berlin, Aug. 4.—A body of Russian frontier guards from Krittingen was driven back yesterday by a part of the garrison of the German seaport of Memel, the most northerly town in German territory.

London, Aug. 4.—German troops today made a further invasion of Belgian territory near Verviers to the east of Liege, according to a dispatch to the French embassy here from the French legation at Brussels.

Brussels, Aug. 4.—A special train carrying all the securities of the national banks of Belgium left here for Antwerp during the night.

European War News

Premier Asquith, in the house of commons, confirmed the sending to Germany of a request that she should give the same assurance of the neutrality of Belgium as France had done and that her reply should be sent to England before midnight.

King George proclaimed today the mobilization of the British army and the reading of the proclamation was cheered by huge crowds in London.

Germany is to have declared war on Belgium and threatened to annex the Belgian Congo.

Germans today invaded Belgian territory.

The United States embassy in Paris is to look after German interests in France and after French interest in Austria.

Austrian troops are reported to have been defeated with heavy loss by the Serbs.

German army aviators dropped bombs last night on the French fortress of Luneville, causing little damage and no loss of life.

Japan officially declares she may join the war if England be involved in the Far East.

Three state health officers are in the field, and their efforts are meeting with success generally. Dr. J. D. Davis has closed a campaign of four and a half weeks in Milam County: He examined 711 persons, gave 73 free treatments and found 62 cases of infection. This is considered a rather small percentage, when compared to counties further to the east. Dr. Davis will next visit Anderson County, making headquarters at Palestine.

Dr. J. H. Thorne is beginning the second week of his campaign in Bell County. No report has been received of conditions there. It is believed however, that very little hookworm will be found. The people of Bell County are deriving good from the lectures and instruction given sanitary and health matters.

Dr. O. H. Judkins has about finished his campaign in Burleson County. He examined 1,032 persons, gave an even hundred treatments and found 69 cases of infection. Dr. Judkins will go to Nacogdoches County, making headquarters at the city of Nacogdoches.

Develop Water Power of Texas.

Washington, D. C. July 31.—There are 195 water wheels, with a horse power of 9,966 in the manufacturing establishments of Texas, according to recent report of the National Conservation Commission.

The Guadalupe has more water wheels than any other Texas river, the total number being 690. The Susquehanna river leads all streams of the nation, having 3,494 water wheels. New York is the leading water power state, having 6,513 wheels with 85,862 horse power. The total for the United States is 2,827 wheels and 5,356,680 horse power.

Texas High Schools.

Georgetown, Tex., July 28.—A report issued today from the National Bureau of Education at Washington contains some interesting information about Texas high schools. There are 604 high schools in the State and 510 of them are public high schools and 94 are private institutions. The public high schools employ 949 male and 847 female teachers, who instruct 39,718 secondary pupils. The 94 private schools employ 257 male and 256 female teachers. The enrollment of these private schools is 3,861 boys and 62 girls.

The First Aerial War

London, July 29.—A clash between Germany and France would make the first great aerial war in all history. The French aeroplane fleet numbers more than 5,000 and Germany has a big aeroplane fleet, in addition to an incomparable dirigible equipment.

Texas Deaf, Blind and Feeble Minded Institution.

Austin, Texas, July 31.—Advance proofs of the report of the Federal Educational Bureau have been received here and in them is contained some interesting information pertaining to Texas. The following is taken from one of the bulletins:

"Texas has one state institution for the care of the blind and the enrollment at the close of the 1918 school year was 244. There is also one school for the deaf in the state and 428 pupils enrolled for instruction last year. There is no state institution for the care of the feeble minded, but an institution is operated by private capital for taking care of mental delinquents. The enrollment last year was 17 pupils.

There are 64 blind institutions in the United States and they care for 4,978 pupils annually. The number of schools for the deaf in the nation is 68 and 11,070 pupils are enrolled. Fifteen states have schools for the instruction of the feeble minded."

The interior of the capitol is a disgrace to the State of Texas, it is claimed. Only the exterior is attractive and the interior is wholly out of keeping with the outside. Also the building is a fire-trap in many respects.

Palestine, Texas July 28.—Enthusiasts are now arranging for the formation of a Municipal Band, which will be used for park concerts and upon public occasions. Palestine already has one band.

Mr. Castellot showed Secretary Bryan his latest advice from Mexico City, which stated that General Villa and Sustice Allendel Carbojal's two delegates to Carranza, have been instructed to carry out in detail the general basis of peace "already agreed upon."

That was interpreted by Mr. Castellot to mean that through Reginaldo Cepeda, advance delegate of the Carranza government, now with General Carranza, a definite understanding has been reached for a peaceful transfer of the government at Mexico City to the constitutionalists. With respect to amnesty and guarantees, it is understood, will promise immunity to all except those directly responsible for the overthrow of Madero. Practically all those said to be guilty have fled Mexico and that exception will not be opposed by the Carranza government.

Fort Worth Widow Made Object of Novel Prosecution.

Fort Worth, Tex., July 30.—Tortured by mysterious telephone calls, by false alarms, by strange deliveries of groceries and merchandise and by threats, Mrs. R. A. Blanton finally has been driven from her neighborhood. The police who were called in two days ago to solve the mysterious persecution, have been unable to protect Mrs. Blanton and she announced this morning she would move at once.
