communication between Antwerp and Brussels and from Bergen-op-Zoon to Antwerp has been restored, says a Reuter dispatch from Amsterdam. Nine thousand refugees returned from Roosendaal to Antwerp yesterday.

London, Oct. 20.—In a dispatch from Rotterdam, the correspondent of the Evening News declares "that the German marines are leaving Antwerp to rejoin the German fleet and the German ships at Kiel are being extensively provisioned."

Tokio, Oct. 20.—The navy department has announced the occupation for military purposes, of strategically important islands in the Marianne (or Ladrone), Marshal, East Caroline and West Caroline archipelagos.

Sasebo, Japan, Oct. 20.—According to information reaching here today, only three of the 284 members of the crew of the Japanese cruiser Takachibo, sunk in Kiao Chow bay, survive the disaster.

Harwich, Oct. 20.—Via London.—It is reported here that the Holland-American line steamer Potsdam struck a mine in the North sea last night and was crippled.

Berlin, Oct.—By wireless to Sayville.—It was officially stated here today that the British submarine E-3 was sunk on Sunday, Oct. 18, by German warships in the North sea.

Wilson Asks House To Pass Warehouse Bill.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 19.—President Wilson is anxious for the House to immediately pass the Lever bill for the establishment of cotton warehouses. He said today he believes the success of plans for loans to cotton planters depends on this bill. It has already passed the Senate.

This is the only legislative proposal for the relief of the cotton planters which the president has approved. Regarding suggestions for the restriction of the cotton crop next year, the president told callers that in his opinion this was entirely a state question.

The Sentinel extends congratulations to the happy pair. They returned to their home at Etoile today.

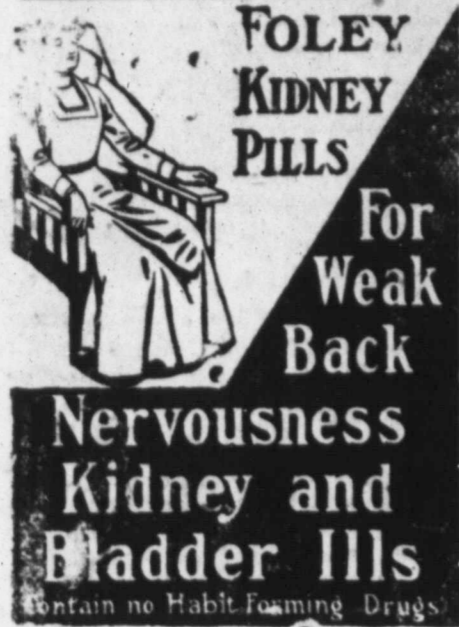

**GOVERNOR COLQUITT TO ENFORCE LAW.**

Addresses Note to Looney in Regard to the Allison Liquor Law.  
Austin, Tex., Oct. 15.—Gov. Colquitt announced today his determination to see that Allison liquor law is enforced in this state. He accordingly today addressed a communication to Attorney General Looney requesting that action be taken to restrain the railway companies and express companies from making deliveries of intoxicating liquors into prohibition territory. The action of the governor is prompted by the decision of the court of criminal appeals in the Elmer Peede case, in which it was held that under section 5 of the Allison liquor law could be delivered by express companies to individuals when such liquor was not to be used in violation of any of the laws of this state.

"I am writing to request you" said the governor to Attorney General Looney, "to prepare an application to some district judge in the state for writ of injunction against each railway corporation and each express company doing business in this state, asking that said railway corporations and express companies be restrained from delivering intoxicating liquors shipped from other states for delivery within the state of Texas. I am of the opinion that application for such writ of injunction could be made to a federal or state district judge. I should be glad to have your opinion on this matter and your co-operation, and the quickest action possible."

## MAY SHIP LIQUOR TO DRY TERRITORY

Provided it is not Done in Violation of the State Laws.

Austin, Oct. 14.—A severe blow was dealt the Allison liquor law of the last legislature today by the court of criminal appeals, when that tribunal held that intoxicating liquor may be delivered into dry territory when it is shown that such liquor is not to be used for the violation of any laws in Texas. This important holding was in the case of ex-parte Elmer Peede from Kaufman county, whose case was today reversed and the relator discharged. Peede was agent of the Wells Fargo & Co. express at Kaufman and was convicted of delivering four quarts of whiskey shipped from an interstate point, to a Mr. Laird, which it was charged was in violation of the Allison liquor law. Before the liquor was delivered to Laird, Peede required a sworn affidavit that the liquor was for his own use, and not for the purpose of violating the law, and under these circumstances the court of criminal appeals held that it was not a violation of the law. The opinion, written by Associate Justice Harper and concurred in by Justice Davidson, holds that under section five of the Allison liquor law, it is only a violation of the act to make interstate shipments when such liquor is to be used or possessed in violation of the laws of this state, and in the Peede case it was shown that the liquor was not to be used for that purpose. The effect of this decision is far reaching as it will permit the delivery of liquor into dry territory when it is proved that the liquor is not for the purpose of violating the law. The court upholds the constitutionality of the law.

## San Angelo—Large quantities of fall clip wool are being received here by commission men and is being placed in wrehouses to hold until the price advances.

The fall clip will be curtailed to a certain extent, according to a number of sheepman in this section, but the advance in price which is expected will offset the diminution in production.

## Prospectors Here From Nacogdoches County.

Messrs. Jessie and C. W. Muckleroy and H. M. and H. F. Lee of Nacogdoches County were here last week looking over the lands near Livingston with a view of locating here. In conversation with the Enterprise editor they were asked if they were cotton growers, to which they replied they had been this year, but would not be guilty of growing cotton next year. If all the farmers are like these gentlemen, and will diversity next year with their crops, East Texas will come into its own.—Polk County Enterprise.

## GOVERNOR URGES FARMERS TO RAISE MORE CORN.

Designates Oct. 18 As Seed Selection Day.

Governor Colquitt issued his proclamation yesterday urging the farmers of Texas to devote themselves during the week beginning Oct. 18 to the selection of seed corn with the view of producing as large a crop of corn as possible next year. He was prompted in making the proclamation, on account of the present critical condition of the market and the growing sentiment for intensified methods of farming. The proclamation follows: "Whereas, On account of the present disturbance of the cotton market, there is throughout the country a strong and rapidly growing sentiment in favor of more intensified methods of farming and a greater diversification of the products of the farm; and

Ducks, geese and brant—October 15 to February 1.  
Deer—November 1 to January 1; limit three bucks for one season. It is unlawful to kill does or fawns.  
Turkeys—December 1 to April, with a limit of three turkeys for the season.  
Rail, coots, gallinules—September 1 to November 30.  
Antelopes, rocky mountain sheep, pheasant and prairie chickens are protected until 1917.  
Hawks, crows, buzzards, owls, English sparrows, rice birds and black birds may be killed in any season.


