Oklahoma Oil Syndicate to Invest \$15,000,000 in Large Refinery on Banks of Neches

Beaumont, Texas, Nov. 17.—A deal which has been watched with interest by all local business men for the past two weeks was closed Monday with the Caswell estate, and by it J. Edgar Pew, Oklahoma oil operator, acquired for Oklahoma interests a tract of 154 acres of land south of the city limits and fronting the Neches river. The tract will be used for an oil refinery site, and the new owners will construct an oil pipe line from the Oklahoma fields to Beaumont. The total investment will be about \$15,000,000. The refinery alone will cost about \$3,000,000, and will employ at least 1,500 men adding about 5,000 persons to the population of this city.

The site cost Mr. Pew \$150,000.

Mr. Pew would not disclose the names of his clients, but it is understood that he represents the large English oil concern which last week bought out a \$2,000,000 producing company near Tulsa, Okla. He denied the report that he was personally financially interested in the transaction.

Bury 40,000 Bodies in Grave Miles Long 3 Yards Wide

Amsterdam, Holland, Nov. 17.—Gruesome and horrid have been the woeful war tales told to the world by newspaper correspondents.

Stories of atrocities committed against defenseless Belgians have been oft repeated. Inspired by them thousands of Americans have sent aid to the stricken country.

But a story which more graphically reveals the terrible losses in Europe than figures was revealed today. It was in a letter from Trieste, in Galicia. It related the burial of 40,000 Austrians in a grave four miles long. The grave was three yards wide.

In it were piled the bodies of 40,000 Germans and Austrians. Drums beat a last tap. This was the last funeral rites for the 40,000 persons who plunged against molten steel defending the Galicia frontier.

The bodies were wrapped in military cloaks and laid side by side in three layers.

Colquitt's Future Home.

Austin, Texas, Nov. 16.—That he is not planning to make his home in Austin after his term as governor expires, but that he will probably locate in Dallas or Houston, was Governor O. B. Colquitt's reply tonight to a question concerning his future plans.

The governor declared that his plans are not matured as yet, and he is not sure whether he will locate in North Texas or South Texas, but he is pretty certain his come will be in one of the cities named. The governor did not indicate what line of activity he expects to engage in.

R. T. Millner Speaks.

Col. R. T. Millner, of Herderson, addressed the farmers and business men yesterday afternoon at the city hall regarding the cotton situation and the marketing of the present and future crops. Col. Millner's talk was a most practical, common sense one and it is to be regretted that every farmer and business man in Nacogdoches county did not hear him. He suggested plans for organization and co operation of the business men and farmers and urged that this county go into immediate organization.

After Col. Millner closed his address these present decided that now was the time to commence and unanimously elected W. U. Perkins, county chairman, Giles M. Haltom, Sec., and S. M. King organizer. The following executive committee was added to the list of officers elected: John Schmidt, Jim Christian, Geo. T. McNess, R. A. Hall, H. M. Carter.

The great aim of this organization over the entire south is for the reduction of the cotton acreage for 1915, which is a vital proposition to the people of the southern country.

Mexican Archaeology.

"The proximity of Texas to Mexico," says Dr. L. M. Keasby of the University of Texas, "suggests the thought that the University of Texas should take precedence over other institutions in undertaking a systematic investigation of Mexican archeology. Northern and European Universities have long since entered this extremely rich field of research and if one should wish to study the Aztec of Mayan civilization one would have to go now to Berlin, Washington, Cambridge or other distant points. Texas is the connecting link between the Indian culture of Mexico and the Indian culture of the Mississippi Valley. Texas should, therefore, be investigated with this relation in mind. Such a study involves of course, an antecedent study of Mexican conditions."

Roscoe Hauser's House Burned

Monday evening about 7:30 or 8 o'clock fire was discovered in the kitchen of Roscoe Hauser's home on Houston Street. The alarm was immediately sounded and the fire department made a run to district 32, when the fire was in district 42. This of course delayed assistance, and owing to the doors being open through the house the suction carried the flames rapidly through the house and in a short time the building was enveloped in flames. Heroic work was done even then, the flames were confined to the one building and most of the house hold goods and some of the clothing were saved. The family had only been away from home a few minutes when the neighbors discovered the fire. The supposition is that it caught from a defective flue or by accident from fire dropping from the stove during supper, near the kindling box.

The loss is estimated between \$2000 and \$2500 part of which is taken care of by insurance. This is the second time Mr. and Mrs. Hauser have lost their home by fire. The first time occurred about three years ago in October.

**Nacogdoches Methodist Church**

As we approach the close of our quadrennium in this splendid city and growing station it is with pleasure that we review the results thus far achieved. It has been a period of strenuous service and yet of unprecedented success. The city has taken on new life, having advanced commercially, socially, intellectually and religiously. Nor has the Methodist Church had an inconsiderable part to play in the progress of the city. Our new and splendid building has been dedicated, about \$10,000 having been raised upon the indebtedness on same and about \$35,000 having been raised for all purposes. The value of our property here will easily reach \$25,000. During this period the salaries of the pastor and presiding elder have increased twenty-five per cent and all other contributions in even greater proportion. We have received into the membership 519 persons to date, (or exactly the number received in the ten years immediately preceding) 236 of them having been taken in on profession of faith and 283 by letter. Also, these additions have chiefly been at the regular services rather than at special meetings. Of the above number 155 have been added during the present year, ninety of them on profession of faith. The congregations have at no time been as large and enthusiastic as now and almost every service brings new additions to the membership. It will be with reluctance that we leave this noble people and this fruitful field, but in so doing we turn over to our successor one of the best and most delightful appointments in the Texas Conference.—S. S. McKenney.—Texas Christian Advocate.

**Origin of Dum Dums.**

Dumdum bullets have their name from a little town in India, near Calcutta, where the ammunition factory for the British government in India is situated. For the benefit of Afghans, possible Indian mutineers, negroes and other barbarians, the British had a bullet manufactured here which is half covered with steel, but with a soft leaden nose; when discharged from a modern rifle of high power this soft nose expands, or "mushrooms," turning the bullet in the air into a horrible bulging object which tears through the flesh of a man, surely bleeding him to death.

The purpose of this bullet is to kill the man every time. The purpose of the ordinary humane bullet of modern warfare, which is wholly incased in steel or nickel, is merely to put the man out of the fight. It makes a small, clean wound. It does not strike a vital part the bullet may go entirely through the man without wounding him seriously. But it shuts him out of the fight for the time being.

Our British friends in India considered that a humane bullet like that would be of little use to fight savages with and therefore, at Dumdum, they manufactured the soft-nosed, expanding horror. But the international conference at The Hague, in 1899, decided against the use of this bullet in war, and adopted a rule forbidding it.—New York Mail.

**Convicts Pardoned**

Austin, Texas, Nov. 13.—Governor Colquitt's Thanksgiving pardons will number seventy-five. Nearly all of the proclamations have been prepared and will be sent to the prison authorities in ample time to permit the fortunate men to reach their homes to spend Thanksgiving day with their families. The governor will issue two hundred pardons on Christmas.

**CHURCH DISPUTE TO GO TO COURT**

Civil Tribunal Must Settle Presbyterian Controversy.

Rev. M. C. Johnson and Judge V. E. Middlebrook of Nacogdoches, Rev. J. A. Hornbeak of Dallas, Rev. F. H. Ford of Jacksonville and Rev. G. W. C. Selt of Cushing, members of the Jefferson presbytery of the Presbyterian Church, United States America, were in Beaumont yesterday on their return to their homes after having held a business meeting of the synod in New Orleans, regarding the recent transfer of Rev. J. C. Barr, D. D., pastor of the Lafayette church of New Orleans, from the New Orleans presbytery of the U. S., or Southern Presbyterian church to the Jefferson Presbytery of the U. S. A., the Northern church, and the subsequent action on the part of the Lafayette church in seceding from the Southern presbytery and going to the northern.

There has been a controversy between Dr. Barr and certain members of the Lafayette church and the New Orleans presbytery for some years regarding the right of control of the property interests in the Gretna church in New Orleans. The culmination of this controversy came about when Dr. Barr and others from New Orleans came to Beaumont October 26, and at a meeting of the Jefferson presbytery, held in the parlors of the Crosby hotel, Dr. Barr was accepted into Jefferson presbytery of the U. S. A., or Northern church. Dr. Barr had resigned his charge before making this transfer, but when he returned to New Orleans a sufficiently large portion of the membership of the Lafayette church wished to follow him, that the church officially became affiliated with the Jefferson presbytery, and Dr. Barr was called back as pastor. When Dr. Barr came here he was accompanied by Rev. W. H. Leith, assistant pastor of the Lafayette church.

Dr. Barr was deposed from the Christian ministry in the New Orleans presbytery at a meeting of the presbytery Monday afternoon in New Orleans, Rev. Dr. P. D. Mooney, pastor of the Napoleon avenue church, the moderator, reading the sentence deposing him and denying him the sacrament of the church administered by the New Orleans presbytery.

The members of the Jefferson presbytery who were here would have nothing to say other than that the transfer of Dr. Barr and the secession of the Lafayette church was accomplished without friction and in an orderly manner, that the standing of Dr. Barr as minister and a Presbyterian was in no wise affected by the action of the New Orleans presbytery, inasmuch as Dr. Barr had become affiliated with the Northern church before this action was taken.

byterian church, of which Rev. W. H. Leith, assistant pastor of the Lafayette church is pastor, and which church succeeded at the same time the Lafayette church did, the members of the Jefferson presbytery made no other comment than to say that the matter would be left for the civil courts to decide.

Rev. M. C. Johnson, who served as stated clerk of the meetings of the Jefferson presbytery, said that the members of the Jefferson presbytery went to New Orleans upon the invitation of certain churches and ministers to be received under the case of the denomination, and that this was done in an orderly and quiet manner.

The members of the Jefferson presbytery were unanimous in saying that the transaction of receiving Dr. Barr and the seceding churches was performed with scrupulous regard to constitutional rights, and with the most cordial feelings toward the Presbyterian church of the United States, known as the Southern Presbyterian church, from which the minister was transferred October 26.—Beaumont Enterprise.

A recent inspection of the fire protection of your city by our Chief Engineer discloses the fact that there are existing a number of defects, the correction of which will no doubt commend itself to the favorable consideration of the city authorities, as well as the business men of your community, and therefore we invite your attention to the attached list of recommendations, which, if carried out, will not only safeguard the interest of your citizens from fire, but will materially reduce the Key Rate from the present figure.

Improvements recommended for the fire protection of Nacogdoches, Nacogdoches County, Texas.

Inspected October 28, 1914.  
R. B. Godley, Jr., Inspector.

(1) Water works:

(a) An inspection of your city reveals the fact that there is only one pump, and in order that the town may be prepared for an emergency, such as the breakdown of the present pump and rendering useless the pumping facilities, we strongly recommend the installation of a duplicate fire pump of required capacity, and aside from the protection afforded, a credit of 3 cents will be allowed in the Key Rate.

(b) The pumping station is the foundation for the protection of the city against fire and the base of domestic consumption, and if the building is not constructed of fire resistive material and void of hazardous occupancies, the city is being endangered and the proper authorities are failing to carry out the intention of fire protective devices. Therefore, we strongly recommend that the present frame pumping station be replaced with one of brick, stone or concrete, with non-combustible roof and solely occupied as such. If power used for operating pumps is electric, it will be necessary that the plant from which the electricity is generated shall also be of brick. By complying with the above recommendation, the present charge of 10 cents in Key Rate will be eliminated.

(c) We note at present there is only one discharge main from the pumping station to service distribution mains, and in order to be prepared for a breakdown in this pipe which would be extremely disastrous, we suggest the lay-

ing of an additional discharge main from the pumping station to service distribution system, also securing a 2 cent reduction in Key Rate.

(d) The present charge of 5 cents appearing in Key Rate for mains not wholly of standard cast-iron, can only be eliminated by replacing all mains in your city not standard cast-iron bell and spigot joint mains.

(e) It has been proven that mains of less than 6 inches in diameter should not be laid in the residence section. Therefore, we suggest that the future laying of 4 inch mains be discontinued. Also an objectionable feature exists in the prevalence of dead end mains in this system, as pressures at hydrants at these points are greatly reduced, hydrants become stopped up, the water stagnant, etc., and in addition, consumers in such locations receive a poor supply of water at low pressure, so we recommend that loop system be made of all dead ends and necessary controlling valves be installed.

(f) Installed pressure recording gauge in city hall or fire station and file and date all records.

(g) Maps or records should be prepared showing the location and size of all water mains, fire hydrants, etc., in your city.

(h) Install approved labeled oily waste can at pumping station.

(i) Install standard 2 way hydrant at pumping station with at least 100 feet of 2 1-2 inch approved labeled cotton rubber lined hose and 1 1-8 inch Underwriters Smooth Nozzle Play Pipe in standard hose house over hydrant.

(j) All hydrants installed in the future should be standard 2-way type with steamer connection.

(2) Fire Department:  
(a) By the installation of a standard automobile or horse drawn hook and ladder truck, the present charge of 2 cent Key Rate will be eliminated.  
(b) In order that full credit may be allowed for the fire alarm system in your city, it will be necessary that present system be made to conform to the standard rules and requirements of the National Board of Fire Underwriters and the general requirements of this Commission.

(3) Police system: A city the size of Nacogdoches requires the services of four full paid policemen, two for day and two for night duty, and in order that the present charge of 25c for police system deficient 50 per cent may be eliminated, it will be necessary that two additional full paid policemen be employed.

(4) Fire Marshal Ordinance: An inspection of your city reveals the fact that the Fire Marshal Ordinance is not being properly enforced, and you are receiving credit in Key Rate of 3c for the proper enforcement of same, for which we direct your immediate attention.

(5) Building Laws: To eliminate the present charge of 5c in Key Rate for building laws inadequate, it will be necessary that the Building

Code of this commission be adopted in full, copy of which we will gladly furnish upon request.

(6) Arson Ordinance: By the adoption of an ordinance offering a reward of at least \$100.00 for the arrest and conviction of any party or parties found guilty of arson within the corporate limits of your city and the posting of placards, a credit of 2 per cent will be allowed in Key Rate.

(7) Ordinances: Very many serious fires are due to the unlawful handling and storing of gasoline, dynamite and gunpowder and explosive and inflammable materials, and in order to safeguard both life and property and prevent such hazard, it is necessary that your city adopt strict regulations governing same.

Negro Protest.

Washington, Nov. 15.—Members of the delegation which went to the White House last week with a protest against race segregation in government departments laid their case before a mass meeting of negroes here today. The meeting was a formal protest to the American people against "the pronounced tendency in American law and public opinion to draw the color line."

"We make this appeal at this time," said the statement, "because it has been ascertained by us from the highest authority in the nation that it is the policy of the federal government to draw the color line, to make what the newspapers of the country denigrate and denounce as 'Jim Crow government.'"

Abolish Capital Punishment

Portland, Ore., Nov. 15.—Complete unofficial returns indicated today that the bill to abolish capital punishment in Oregon carried at the recent election, the totals being: Yes, 100,036; No, 99,978.

Dear Sir:

I am glad to report to you that the Commission on Accredited Schools of the Southern States, which met at the University of Virginia last week, placed Nacogdoches High School on the List of Accredited Schools of the Southern States.

The Commission voted unanimously to revise the entire list of Southern Accredited Schools one year from now. All schools in which three-fourths of the academic teachers do not hold degrees from reputable colleges, all schools in which any teacher is compelled to teach more than six periods per day, all schools having an average of more than thirty pupils to the teacher, and all schools not properly equipped for the various subjects offered will be dropped from the list.

Thirty-seven Texas High Schools were accredited by the Commission. The list will be published in the large daily papers within the next few weeks.

We earnestly hope that, in making provisions for your school next year, you will not let it drop, in any particular, below the standards announced by the Commission.

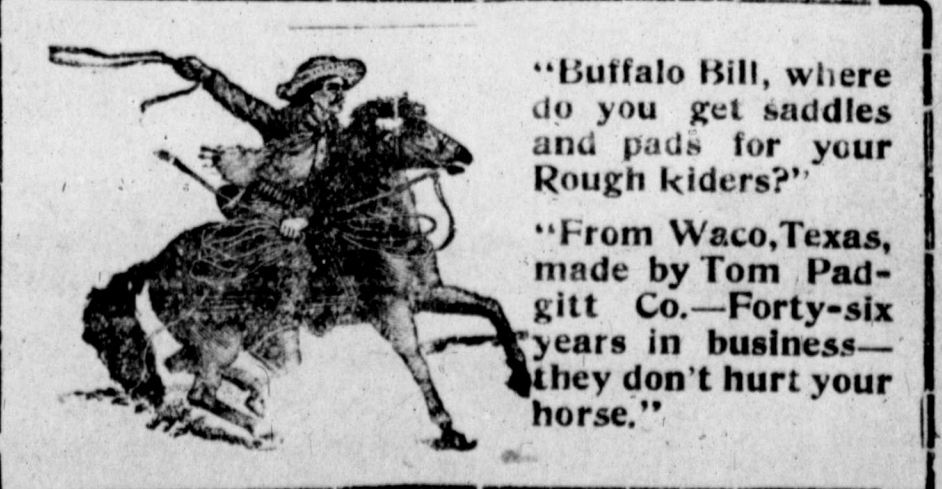

### Cotton Jumps To Eight Cents.

Cotton jumped to 8 cents on the Houston market Friday, advancing a quarter of a cent over the closing price of Thursday.

Thus have the predictions of leading bankers and cotton factors become a reality. They recently declared cotton would be selling at 8 cents, middling basis, on the Houston market before November 15.

The general opinion of cotton men is that the price will not go lower than that point during the remainder of the season. It is claimed the low tide has been passed and that the market will be strong, with the foreign spinners actively buying.

The opening of all cotton exchanges next Monday, November 16, will have a tendency to further steady the market, it is said, and some further advances may be expected.

Cotton has advanced about \$8 a bale during the past thirty days. This was due to the opening of shipping to cotton cargoes, the formation of a \$135,000,000 pool to carry surplus cotton and to the opening of the federal reserve banks, which also will take place Monday.—Houston Telegram.

### "Mercy Sunday" Designated.

Austin, Tex., Nov. 14—Today a committee, headed by State Superintendent of Education W. A. Doughty and consisting of Mrs. Ed Kone, Mrs. Frank Latten, Miss Katie Daffan and Will L. Vining, called on Governor Colquitt with the request that he issue a proclamation setting aside a certain Sunday to be observed as "Mercy Sunday," having for its immediate object the arousing of interest in the proposed establishment of a state training school for dependent and delinquent girls. This committee represented the Travis County Humane Society.

The proclamation will be prepared next week, and Sunday, Dec. 13, will be set aside as "Mercy Sunday," and it is hoped that every kind-hearted and humane citizen in Texas will be reached by the appeal of the clergy of the state, and also that it will result in the immediate realization of sufficient funds to make the home delinquent and dependent for girls a certainty.

### Swift School Tax Election

In the election held last Saturday to determine whether or not to take off the school tax now in force at Swift the tax was retained by a vote of 36 to 21. Quite a lot of interest was taken in this election by the people of this community, as the tax was held to be too high by some of the citizens and they wanted the present tax removed and a smaller one put on in the place of the present one. The entire voting strength was polled in the election.
