From Monday's Daily:
The death of A. B. Ireson, which occurred at his home on North street, Dec. 28, 1914, at 8:31 a. m. is sad news to our town, and to the surrounding community, where he has been a well known resident since 1865. He will be buried here in Oak Grove Cemetery at 10:30 tomorrow morning from the First Presbyterian church.

He leaves a widow, two sons and two daughters. They are all here today. He was stricken with paralysis on last Wednesday about 7 p. m. and was unconscious almost from the first.

Mr. Ireson was born in Abingdon, Va. on Aug. 27, 1836. He came to Texas about 1860, and he enlisted in the Confederate army at Rusk in Mayor Jack Davis's company. He was married to Miss Mary Smith, Jan. 12, 1866, living first near Melrose and Fairview, and later about 1870 at the home where he died.



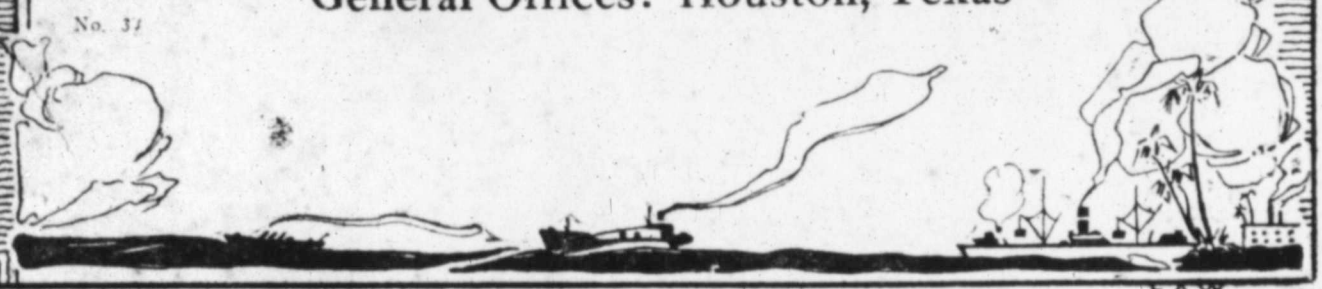

Weight Must Be Stamped on all Butter.

Exact weights of all packages of butter must be printed on the package beginning Friday morning. If the package contains less than one pound, the weight must be printed on the package in figures one-half inch high. If it contains a full pound the figures must be one-quarter inch high.

An ordinance prescribing the stamping of weights on packages of butter was passed by the council some months ago, to be effective January 1. It was not made immediately effective because creameries protested they would have to destroy packages already on hand.

In case the ordinance is violated by any dealers in butter prosecutions will follow, say city officials. You ton Chronicle.

Sudan Grass.

Every farmer in Nacogdoches County should plant at least one acre of Sudan Grass this coming season, because it is the earliest and largest yielder of hay that can be grown on the farm. Sudan grass is a Sorghum and should be planted after all danger of frost is past. Right after corn planting time or the latter part of March or first of April is the best time to plant and when planted at this time three or more cuttings can be had during the season. The first cutting can be made from 50 to 60 days after planting, and the remaining cuttings about every forty days, under normal weather conditions. This grass as tested out on the Experiment Station on North Street can be planted as late as June 24 and a yield of close to two tons per acre obtained, but when planted in April the grass will yield five and more tons to the acre for the season. To obtain the best results Sudan Grass must be planted on well drained land, a good seed bed prepared and planted in 24 inch rows. The seed can be planted with corn and cotton

should be applied before planting in the drill and well mixed with the soil. The amount to be applied depends entirely upon the nature of the soil. Of course the better the soil and the more fertilizer applied the larger will be the yield of grass. On the Station 400 pounds of this mixture was used to the acre on sandy land. For hay the best time to cut is when the grass is in full boot, the stems then are tender and juicy. After cutting, this grass will continue

to stool until frost and after the last cutting there will be good grazing for stock, the heavy stubble plowed under will also add a large amount of organic matter to the soil, but will add no nitrogen as it is not a legume, and therefore should not be planted on the same land the following year. This grass works well in a crop rotation for the reason that it is an annual and dies with the first frost. Any crop can be planted on the same land the following year, but in order to maintain the fertility of the soil it would be best to follow Sudan grass with cowpeas or some other legume. This crop also makes good silage and is eaten with relish by all stock either as hay or silage and on account of its high content of sugar is fattening.

The advice of the Experiment Station is the same as Mr. Hotchkiss told in last week's paper. Keep out of town, go to work, visit the Experiment Station. It is yours and if you follow this advice there will be no cry of hard times next fall.
