NACOGDOCHES COUNTY INTERSCHOOL ASTIC LEAGUE Fourth Annual Meet.

The big event for the city for the county in fact, was the County School Meet of March 26-27 which occurred in Nacogdoches on the Central School grounds last Friday and Saturday. This was the fourth annual meet and larger interest was manifested than ever before.

The county is growing and the schools are growing and an evidence of this truth may be realized in these annual meets. In the numerous contests both literary and athletic the schools won creditably in ratio to the number of entries made. Doches and Cushing were closest contestants with Garrison, Chireno, Nat, Oak Ridge and Needmore and other contestants. Doches won 50 points, Cushing 62, Chireno 34, Garrison 5, Oak Ridge 1. The Loving Cup offered, to be held three successive years, for ownership was won by Cushing. Claud Thompson presented it to the school for Doches High School in his amicable spirit, which was responded to in a similar vein, for the Cushing High

Fruit Prospects

Varying reports from points make it difficult to determine to what extent the fruit crop was damaged by belated frosts and freezes. In sections where the orchards were farthest advanced the damage may have been heavy, but these represent only a part, if a considerable one, of the fruit belt of Texas, and there is ground for belief that, with favoring weather granted, the orchard output will be abundant.

Local nurserymen think that at least half of the fruit crop is safe. It may become evident within a few weeks that this optimistic opinion was an over-estimate of damage. A partial thinning out may, in fact, improve the quality of fruit and enhance its market value. Predictions of warmer weather should enable the Texan who likes his cobbler to extract a modicum of hope from a situation which has been far from encouraging.

Even if the worst has happened to the Elberta and Ross families, as a last resort, which is a first resort with many, we can fall back on fig preserves and crab-apple jelly. And then, the nut crop promises to exceed all records.—Dallas Journal.

Late War News.

The Germans have brought up many additional troops in the north of Poland where along the Narew and Orzyc rivers they have been pouring a deadly fire into the Russian ranks and have time after time undertaken strong offensive operations.

Notwithstanding this, however, the Russians claim to be making "slow but sure progress, capturing trenches and heights."

The Austrians are again devoting their efforts to clearing Rukowina of the Russians and the Germans have forced the Russian detachments which recently occupied Memel, East Prussia to retire.

British air raiders, according to an official statement from London, have succeeded in damaging two submarines under construction by the Germans at Hoboken near Antwerp and to have done damage also to the plant which was formerly the property of a British company.

There is some doubt as to what is going on in the Dardanelles, one report stating that the bombardment had been resumed but others that the operations were still being interferred with by unfavorable weather. The damage done to the Dardanelles forts at the time of the bombardment, when one French and two British battleships were sunk, is reported by correspondents who witnessed the bombardment as being of minor importance.

Vice President Marshall Opens Exposition at Frisco.

San Francisco, March 24.—Characterizing the Panama exposition as the "crystallization of the dreams and thoughts of genius and talent" Vice President Marshall today in the name of the president of the United States, dedicated the exposition in glorification of the Isthmian canal. He said in part:

"I crave your sympathy and your charity while for a few brief moments I stand here commissioned to take, but not to fill, the place of the president of the United States. In justice to the day Woodrow Wilson should be here. The office and the man would each fittingly grace this occasion.

"But duty said to him that justice to all the people bade him stay in Washington. You hope for continued peace. Do not forget that he is your greatest peacemaker. Before the sunset bell shall proclaim the close of this marvel of the twentieth century, the president of the United States hopes to meet you face to face.

As To The Wars

There is nothing to write except the repetition of the fact of the continued battles in Europe. They increase in frequency, in magnitude and in savagery. They are unceasing, day after day, hour after hour, in rapid succession, and several battles rage at the same time in different localities, on the land and on the waters also.

The effort of the navies of the allies to pass the great forts and reach Constantinople is still pressing hard but with not much success.

Victories and defeats on land are frequent but as compared with the whole military move, they are small. They come and go, again and again.

The armies are so large that these sectional engagements fail to jostle the great whole. And this it may continue till these nations realize the futility of fighting, not till one side is vanquished, for that is an impossibility.

It can be ended only by conference.

The Mexican situation is very different in magnitude and in shape. But, as the warring forces there are greatly scattered a defeat at one point does not affect the entire dispute. The forces merely go ahead at other points. The two chief leaders, Carranza and Villa, are not in front of each other. If one of them should be run out of the country another leader would probably come into the field. They seem to be fighting just any old way, for fun or for spite, and peace is not what they want.

The Country Newspaper.

Ex-Governor David R. Francis of Missouri once said: "Each year the local newspaper gives from \$500 to \$1000 in free lines to the community in which it is located. No other agency can or will do this. The editor, in proportion to his means does more for his town than any ten men, and in fairness he ought to be supported—not because you like him or admire his writings, but because the local paper is the best investment a community can make. It may not be brilliantly edited or crowded with thought, but financially it is of more benefit to the community than the preacher or teacher. Understand me, I do not mean mentally, and yet on moral questions you will find, most of the papers on the right side. Today the editors of the local papers do the most for the least money of any people on earth."

East Texas Normal School

Equal Suffrage Not Yet in Texas.

The suffragettes of Texas are right now paying the price for having insisted on too much.

A vast majority of the men of Texas are what might be called "average Americans," and the "average American" is willing that American women should have anything they really want. If the men of Texas were convinced that a majority of the women of Texas wanted the vote, they wouldn't make the women ask them for it. But they are not so convinced. The number of women who debate and work for equal suffrage is extremely small, as compared with the number of women in the state.

It was suggested at Austin, and an amendment was introduced to that effect, that instead of asking the men of the state to vote on the question, a vote be taken of the women. If a large number of them showed they want the ballot, the Legislature would know what to do about it—and could be depended upon to do it.

This amendment could have been passed, had the suffragettes been wise, but they were not. So they lost not only what they wanted, but what they undoubtedly could have secured.

Another year may give the suffrage leaders greater wisdom. But, hold! Perhaps they had wisdom all the time. Perhaps that is just why they wouldn't agree to allow the matter to be submitted to the women of Texas. Perhaps they are afraid they know what the majority of women would be likely to say about it—and do not want to meet that decision.—San Antonio Light.

Matamoras Reinforced

Brownsville, Tex., March 24.—The Carranza garrison at Matamoras, opposite here, was reinforced today by approximately 1,200 men under Gen. Oscar Lopez de Lara from Fernando.

The exact size of the garrison at Matamoras is not known.

Other reinforcements are said to be en-route.

Canada Sends Many Soldiers to Europe.

That the Canadian government will have 95,000 troops with the armies of the allies within the next two months is the prediction of G. W. Saunders, a business man of Toronto, Canada, who is stopping at the Menger Hotel. Mr. Saunders is on his way to the border on a brief business trip, intending to return to San Antonio in about three weeks.

"Canada now has about 45,000 troops in the field," said Mr. Saunders. "This is called the first contingent. Although nothing has been said recently about the time of departure for the second contingent, I know it expects to leave for Europe in two weeks. The third contingent, which already is mobilizing, will be ready to take the field in about two months. The recruits are in fine sturdy looking lot of men. They are mostly farmer boys, who ride like American cowboys, shoot accurately and can stand any sort of physical hardship."—San Antonio Light.

Curing the Habits.

Some of the larger cities are having a hot time with the drug fiends since the new law went into force. The new law is also demonstrating the fact that it has not been the pharmacists who have been flagrant violators of minor state laws by selling dope to friends, but that it has for the most part been peddled around pretty much as the boot-legger peddles whisky. The cities are meeting the emergency, however, by securing the services of reputable physicians and curing the dope fiends of the habit. Many eminent physicians are rendering their services free of charge to their cities. This is a noble act on their part, but the reputable physician may always be counted to do his full part in the community in which he lives.—Sherman Democrat.

In order to keep the record straight regarding my announcement for alderman I wish to make the following statement.

Several days ago C. A. Hodges come to me and asked me to submit my name as the election comes off in a few days and it seems that no one is going to apply for the job. Up to this time I had not thought of being a candidate but being long on patriotism and still longer on self sacrifice and servitude I consented. In this solicitation I was not led to believe that he thought I was over stocked in alderman's ability, as I suppose he had spoken to possibly a dozen before he reached me—but since this, some one has suggested a gunny sack full of names, who he would be pleased to see make the race. This would ordinarily knock a timid man off the Christmas Tree, but as the matter has gone this far will say that I am in the race to a finish.

I admit that I am not very well prepared for a heated campaign as my experience is very limited on this line. A few years ago I was a candidate for school trustee in this city, which is the extent of my office seeking. Dr. Barham, Judge Blount, R. C. Monk and myself ran in a breast without opponents. Under such circumstances we felt reasonably secure in a successful termination, and while this office is similar to that of trustee in a point of emoluments the campaign promises to be decidedly more strenuous.

Now in conclusion will say that I have a fair idea of the physical needs of the city and if elected will devote sufficient attention to give the city the best of my ability. I presume every one knows that a rigidly economic administration will be necessary as the city seems to be financially embarrassed at this time. Emergencies may arise when it will be necessary for the City to incur some indebtedness but ordinarily I believe the city should be put on a "pay as you go" basis and I hope and believe that if the affairs of the city is properly managed that it will soon be relieved of its present embarrassment. If however I am defeated I assume you my equilibrium will not in the least be disturbed and that I will as usual proceed to saw wood.

Austin, Texas, March 26.—Texas leads in its liberality to the Confederate soldier and also stands at the top of the group of sixteen Southern States in the number of veterans in state homes and on the pension roles, according to figures prepared by Pension Commissioner Jones. It is shown that the total amount paid in pensions in Texas to the 17,000 pensioners amounted to \$849,250, the average received by each veteran being \$90 annually.

There are 365 inmates in the Confederate Home and the appropriation made for the support and maintenance of this home in 1914 was \$96,000. Tennessee appropriated last year for pensions, \$800,000 and paid the old soldiers an average of \$100 each, while there are only 92 inmates in its Confederate Home and the appropriation made for its support for 1914 was \$16,100. While Georgia paid in pensions \$1,170,000 in 1914, the average to each veteran was only \$50 annually against \$90 by Texas, and the appropriation for the Georgia home is only \$80,000, and there are only 182 inmates. All of the Southern states fall below the figures herein given in appropriations for homes and pensions paid last year.

Lieut. Gov. Hobby.

Beaumont is the home of Lieut. Gov. W. P. Hobby. When he got back from the legislature he made a speech at home in which he said:

"Referring to the work of the regular session of the Thirty-fourth legislature, I do not intend to give an account of my stewardship here, which later on I will render to the people of Texas, but for my friends and neighbors in southeast Texas I am glad of the opportunity to say that the session has, in my judgement, been helpful to the material welfare of the state.

"The most pleasing and most noteworthy feature of the session was the absence of any discussion of the prohibition question. It was not directly considered and it did not even enter indirectly into the proceedings of the session. As a result consideration was given to other questions upon their merit and a better and a happier spirit prevailed among the members than has been the case for a number of years.

"The platform demands were well taken care of.

"The law to prohibit excessive charges for rent upon the tenant farmer who farms on a share basis, by limiting the rent to the value of one-fourth of the cotton produced was passed.

College Station, Texas, March 29.—That half and half cotton, the staple which has been discussed so much these days does not compare at all favorably with the native Texas varieties is the statement of H. H. Jobson, assistant agronomist to the experiment station at the A. & M. College and who is in charge of cotton investigations. Mr. Jobson says that the staple is not so good as the Texas varieties and that in tests at seven of the Texas stations within the past few years the Half and Half has ranked from twenty-seventh to fifty-seventh in productiveness.

The king who dwelled in splendor in gloomy ancient hall ne'er knew a beef steak tender, nor sampled codfish ball.

Red Cross Preparing.

Washington, March 29.—The Red Cross, having ordered nurses from Beaumont and Houston to Brownsville, and having placed Dr. J. L. Renfrew in charge of the relief work, it was announced tonight that the wounded and refugee Mexicans in Brownsville will be properly cared for and S. P. Morris, acting national director, is ready to proceed from Washington to the Texas city immediately should his services be required. The Red Cross also reports suffering and want among 4000 refugees in El Paso and has ordered Charles J. O'Connor, the Pacific coast director, to proceed immediately to El Paso to take charge of the relief work.

Colonel Uriah Lott Dead

Houston, Texas, March 29. Colonel Uriah Lott, aged 78 years, a resident for more than a score of years of Brownsville and the builder of three of the principal railroads of southwest Texas, died tonight in Kingsville after an illness of two weeks' duration.

Colonel Lott, twenty-eight years ago, practically penniless, tossed up a dollar and said: "If it comes heads I am going to build a railroad from San Antonio to Corpus Christi."

The flip of the coin was as he had called and he built the San Antonio & Aransas Pass railroad.

A Texan Inventor

University Station, March 29.—Hard upon the announcement by the U. S. Bureau of Mines of the discovery of a method for recovering high grade oils from petroleum which will increase the production of gasoline 200 per cent, comes the news that Letters Patent have been granted A. M. McAtee on an invention to greatly facilitate and improve methods now in use for taking high grade oils from petroleum to such an extent that a much larger quantity can be obtained from the crude product than heretofore. If the claims of the inventor are verified, the process will result in the cheapening of several of the refined oils. Mr. McAtee is well known at the University of Texas and the scientific men of that institution believe that there is much merit in the process. The inventor specialized in chemistry while at the University and graduated in 1908, coming to the University from Corsicana. He later took graduate work in chemistry in Columbia University, and subsequently was in the employ of the Texas Company as Experimenting Chemist at Bayonne, N. J. It is stated that the Gulf Refining Company will erect a plant in Texas designed by Mr. McAtee to make a thorough, practical trial of his process. It is such a highly technical subject that chemists of reputation are reluctant to express definite opinions upon the practical value of the process, until a thorough trial under actual working conditions has been made.

Can Wire Easter Greetings.

The success which attended the introduction by the Western Union Company of messages conveying Christmas and New Years greetings written on specially designed blanks suited to the occasion has prompted the Company to introduce a specially designed Easter blank on which messages of seasonal greeting will be delivered.

Easter greetings is now well established and that the use of the telegraph on such occasions is rapidly growing in public favor, combining as it does a written record with all the directness, freshness and warmth of a personal greeting.

Stroud Bank Robbers Seen at Kellyville.

Oklahoma City, March 28.—The five Stroud bank robbers are reported to have passed Kellyville before daylight Sunday morning, headed toward Sapulpa. Authorities at that city report tonight that the bandits have not been seen. There is no official report of any one having seen the men up until a late hour Sunday night.

An election is to be held to fill the vacancy in the legislature caused by the death of Hon B. A. Calhoun. This is the 10th district, and is composed of the counties of Angelina and San Augustine. I. D. Fairchild, a promising young lawyer of Lufkin, is a candidate.

Havana is Now Boxing Center of the World.

Havana, March 29. — The task of educating the Cuban people to an understanding of boxing, is under full headway. Boxers are gathering here from all parts of the United States and bouts are scheduled for every night of this week. Windows and bill boards are filled with oards and posters announcing the fights. Pugilists of all classes are in training here, and as they parade the streets clad in flannels or linens they are followed by crowds of boys and men.



Mr. J. J. Ayo of Bowie, La., formerly held the world's record, having won it in 1914 with the Byrne Simplified Shorthand in the Tyler Commercial College.

Mr. Kendrick is but nineteen years of age and should have a great future before him as a reporter.

Sudan Grass.

College Station, Texas, March 29.—In a bulletin on Sudan grass just issued by the Experiment station system at the A. & M. College, results of experiments to determine the comparative feeding value yield per acre of this forage crop and other leading hay crops shows Sudan grass to be undoubtedly the best hay crop in the United States. The bulletin gives full information on this crop which was first planted under the direction of the Texas Experiment station system and which has leaped into popularity insuring fame of the Texas system.

In comparison with Johnson and Bermuda grass, the most common hays in this State. Sudan yields 7655 pounds in feeding value per acre as compared to 4000 pounds for each of the other crops. Timothy hay is the great hay of the Central and Northern States yet in Ohio where Timothy flourishes best the bulletin shows that Sudan yielded 8300 pounds while Timothy grown on the same experiment farm yielded only 3867 pounds.

The new bulletin, which was prepared jointly by B. Youngblood, director of the Stations, and by A. B. Conner, agronomist to the stations, and who grew the first Sudan grass in the United States at the Chillicothe station, is ready for distribution and may be had on application to Director Youngblood. It deals with history, types, soils preparation of the soil methods of cultivation, harvesting and every other phase of the growth of the grass.

Nacogdoches Oil Mill.

It is good to see the Nacogdoches Oil Mill rebuilding. The mill has been here so long that people had almost forgotten that it was an industry that was a real benefit to the community. When it burned last October and threw out of employment about fifty men and stopped a snug little weekly payroll for labor alone, those of us who had overlooked the fact that the mill had been contributing to the support of Nacogdoches began to miss this payroll, to say nothing of the convenience to the farmers as a place to market their seed and a place where feed stuff could be bought any day in the year and in any quantity from 10c worth to a carload.

The Nacogdoches Oil Mill is what is known as an independent mill. It is owned entirely by Nacogdoches capital, and does not belong to any of the so called large trust or syndicate mills, whose stock is mostly owned by New York and Chicago capital. These big mills some times make it pretty hard for the home mill, but by fair dealing and straightforward, honest methods with the farmer who has the seed to sell the home mill generally manages to get a good share of the seed.

It is not generally known but it is a fact that every ton of cotton seed crushed in Nacogdoches and converted into oil, meal, hulls, linters and fertilizer, aside from the price paid the farmer for the raw seed, puts \$6.50 in cash in circulation, the most of which drops right into the cash drawer of the Nacogdoches merchants. Multiply this by 6000 tons, a normal crush for the mill, and you will see what an industry like this is worth to your town.

In addition to these benefits the Oil Mill pays from \$800 to \$1000 per year taxes, a greater part of which goes to improve our streets, roads and bridges and to build school houses and pay for maintaining our schools: something the foreign mill has no part in.

Mr. W. U. Perkins, the President and Manager, has talked home industry so long and so hard that he has become so thoroughly to believe in it that when he began to rebuild the mill, he went to his home people first for labor and materials, and as far as is possible is using both home folk and home material in the new buildings. Move To Be Made By Women For Peace.

New York, March 24.—The program for the woman's international congress in the interest of peace, to be held at The Hague next month, just received here from Holland, shows the first move to be made in the congress will be to urge a truce in the European war. Women of nearly all nations, including those at war, are expected to attend the congress.

"Since each of the belligerent nations claims it is not an aggressor, but is fighting in self-defense, all are asked to publicly define the terms on which they are willing to make peace," says the program.

It is proposed that the women demand that all future international disputes be referred to arbitration, the powers uniting to bring pressure to bear on any country resorting to arms.

The franchise for women as an effective means of preventing future wars is to be a topic of discussion, and the congress is to be urged to adopt a declaration that there shall be no transference of territory without the consent of the men and the women to it.

The railway mail committee, representing "certain railroads" the statement declared, engineered the fight against the appropriation bill and financed a propaganda designed to "mislead" and wrongfully influence the public mind into an attitude of antagonism to the department.
