Nor mal Matter Us To Legulature
Austin, Texas, April 28.It is understood here Governor James E. Ferguson will submit to the coming special session of the Thirty-fourth legislature an amendment to the law providing for the establishment of three new state normal schools, which would change the method of selecting the locating board. This has become necessary, it is said because of the recent action of the Supreme Court of Texas, in deciding to per form the duty imposed of selecting two members of the selecting board.
The present law provides that the governor, lieutenant governor the attorney general, and two private citizens the latter to be appointed by the supreme court, shall constitute the bard selecting a location tor the three normals. The plan now, itis understood, is to either eliminate, through legislative action, the two citizen members or provide that the three named state that the three named state officiais shall sele
citızen-members.
Unless the special session of the legislature takes action in the premises there will be no new state normals until

How to Destroy Insects on Tcmatees, Beans and lrish Pototacs. As the growing of tomatoes. beans and Irish potatoes for the market is on, the increase in Nacogdoches county it may be of benifit to the arowers to know of some simple method that will help them control that will help them contro these pests, which cause large
losses in the growing of these crops each year. Not only s the damage caused by insects, but also trom fungous diseases which in most cases it treated in time are easily controlled. This vear the colorado beetle commonly known as the potatoe bug bas appeared early and is doing considerable damage to both lrish potatoes and tomato plants. In the case of Irish potatoes an application of paris green applied to the plants
follows will kill the beetle. follows will kill the beetle. tablespoontul of paris gre
mixed with. 2 gallons slacked lime and sprinkled over the plants. This must long as the beetles show their presence. For tomatoes the same amount of Paris Green
mixed with 2 gallons of dry sitted wood ashes, or in the torm of a solution 1 pound of Paris green to 100 gallons of water. Either application injure the plants. This same reatment can be used tor the horn worm on tomatoes.
For snap beans an spplication of wood ashes sprinkled over the plants atter the dew has dried will keep plant lice off of snap beans. Care must be taken not to apply this remedy while the plants are wet, either from dew or rain. Leat spot and leat mold are two tungous diseases common to the tomatoe plant and in appearance is marked by
small irregular spots on the leaves, causing them to cur and die. Blossom and rot on

the pound of quick lime in one gallon of water. After both the bluestone and lime are dissolved and the lime is cooled off, then take a third vessel and pour in at the same time both the lime solution and the bluestone solution and mix well to-
gether, then add ten gallons ot cold water. The mixture is then ready to spray upon

Hon. A. T. Rusell Explaims.
Editor Sentinel:-
1 have been trequently re quested to explain the objects and operation of the warehouse law passed by the 33rd Legislature. As there has been considerable misunderstanding with reference to this law, and some very untair criticism of it. I shall approciate the use of your columns tor a tew very briet statements.

## Purpose of the law

One of the purposes of the legislature in passing this law was to protect the producers of cotton against the enor mous waste that occurs between the gin and the factory on account of poor wrapping, posure weather between the gin and the compress, and the reckless manner sampling that is practised.
Another purpose was provide an easy and inexpensive means whereby tarmers can procure advances on their cotton when the price is unthe rush of their product up on a glutted market.
Still another purpose was to enable the producers ot cot ton to cooperate in the sale of their cotton direct to the spinder without the intervention of army of high-salaried emploves.
These purposes combine bring about the one great purpose. which is to make cotton bring what it is worth all the time.
No one can object to any law that will bring these reults. But it is not clear to all of us how some of the prowill contribute to this result. will contribute to this result.
Something is seriousiy wrong when cotton varies in price within a period of six months rom below six cents to a price above nine cents per pound. This appears more eocider when we price took place atter it lett the farmer's hands. The increase in price exchanged the coffers of those who had bought it cheap and were able to hold. This condition is European war. The same thing has frequently occurred before, and will oceur again anless some means can be devised to enable the producer to market the cotton as it is aeeded by the consumer.
This new warehouse law provides for the organization warehouses wherever the tarmers and business men will get together and build them. They will be conducted under the supervision of the state government. The tarmer will bring his cotton to the warehouse, where it is weighed by a bonded warehouseman and placed under a shed. This warehouseman is also a qualified grader and classer of cotton and will mark on the sample the class of cotton contained in the bale. He delivers to the owner of the cotton a sample and also a

Some tarmers can alwavs get accomodations but most of such farmer could get the such farmers goods without any collateral that is, upon their personal credit. The small tarmer and the man without financia backing and with no credit at the bank, has been handi capped. His extensions hav been procured at such grea sacrifice, and his loans at such extortionate rates of interest, and tor such short time, practically to compel him to ell his cotton as soon as pick d at anv price. The spin ners and speculators, knowin these conditions, "bear" the price down and take, his cot on at a price sometimes les than the cost of production. Let this unfortunate man be armed with a basis of credit as powerful in his hands as in he hands of the banker, and good in New. York as i Nacogdoches, and you will see will pay him something lik its value for it.
