EXPLODES, KILLING 31
Du Pont Plant Shattered and
Bodies Are Thrown for a
Quarter of Mile.
Wilmington, Del., Nov. 30.-
Thirty workmen were killed and
seven injured today in an explo-
sion of about four tons of black
powder at the upper Hagley yard
of the Du Pont Powder Co. It was
the worst accident that has oc-
curred in any of the company's
plants in a quarter of a century.
Lewis Booker, one of the in-
jured, died tonight, making 31
dead.
The cause of the blast is not
known. According to a state-
ment issued by the company the
origin "probably always will re-
main a mystery." Nevertheless,
a most searching investigation
has been instituted.,
There was the usual rumor
afloat that some outside agency
may have caused the explosion,
but officials of the plant said to-
night there was no evidence to
support such a theory.
Nearly all the victims of the
blast were young men between
16 and 21 yeara of age. The
greater number of them lived in
