COMPCLSORY SCHOOL LAW.
W. F. Doughty, State Super
intendent of Public Instruction,
has issued a bulletin on the com-
pulsory school law which goes
ber 1st of this year. The bulle
tin outlines the law as follows:
Every child in the state who
is eight years and not more than
fourteen years old shall be re-
quired to attend the public
schools for a period of not less
than sixty days for the scholas-
tic year beginning September 1, 1916, and for a period of not less than 18 days for the scholas1917, and for the September 1, 1918-19, and each year thereafter a minimum attendance o 100 days will be required.
The period of compulsory school attendance at each schoo whall begin at the opening of the
school term unless otherwise
