GERMANY READY FOR PEACE NEGOTIATIONS

Makes Polite Answer to President Wilson and Gives Assurance of Earnestness.

Berlin, Dec. 26, by wireless to Sayville.—Germany and her allies-Austria-Hungary, Bulgaria and Turkey-today replied to the note of President Wilson, in which he asked that the belligerent nations state the aims for which they were fighting. The proposal is made by the central powers that a conference of the delegates of all the belligerents be held immediately in a neutral city. The task of preventing future wars, the statement says, can be begun only after the end of the present struggle. Germany expresses her readiness to "collaborate entirely with the United States" in helping to prevent future wars.

The answer, which also contains the reply of Austria-Hungary, Bulgaria and Turkey, says:

Minden, La., Dec. 25.-One of the most foul crimes in the history of Webster parish was committed on the night of Christmas Eve, in the Grove community, nine miles north of Minden, when John Nelson Reeves and his wife were murdered outright, and an attempt was made on the lives of three of their helpless children, one of whom died later after being rushed to Shreveport



"If population continues to increase, as it unquestionably will, and production does not keep pace with the increase, the obvious and inevitable results will be an increase in the cost of food, with consequent further result of the inability of a large part of the population to get the essary to meet the demands of their tasks upon them
