

The verdict against Tyson and Peters was unqualified and carried with it the death penalty. Stewart! and Heard were found guilty without capital punishment. They were sentenced to life imprisonment in the state peniten-

The four negroes were specifically tried for the killing of Mrs. Maud Reeves, wife of John Nelson Reeves. Immediately after their conviction they were called before the bar and sentenced, following which they were placed in sutpmobiles and started on their way toward the state penitoutiony.

Washington, Jan. 29.-Presi-More than 1,500 re ogees are dent Wilson today vetoed the imfollowing in the wave of the migration bill passed recently by American expeditionary forces congress because of its literacy

It was the second time the president had vetoed an immigration bill because of the literacy test and for the same reason similar measures were given vetoes by Presidents Taft and of General Pershing's Cleveland. The president's veto message to the house in which the bill originated, follows:

"I very much regret to return this bill without my signature. In most of the provisions of the bill I should be very glad to concur, but I cannot rid myself of the conviction that the literacy test constitutes a radical change





AMERICAN TROOPS ARE COMING OUT

Uncle Sam's Fighting Men are Evacuating Mexico Under U. S. Orders.

Washington, Jan. 28.-Orders for the withdrawal of the troops from Mexico were officially announced today by the war department with the statement that the northward movement of General Pershing's men began early this morning with the evacuation of Colonia Dublan.

The final act in the entrance into Mexico of 12,000 American soldiers, as a result of the Villa massacre of 17 Americans at Columbus, N. M., on March 9, 1916, was written with the official announcement by the war depart-

Secretary Baker issued the following announcement:

"General Pershing has been ordered to bring his troops out of Mexico. The movement is to be an immediate one and is probably already under way."

Later advices to the department said the troops had begun the evacuation of Colonia Dublan, 110 miles from the border, where they had been concentrating for the past few weeks. The last American soldiers are expected to recross the border in about a week. 

Two years ago we took contracts to make 4,200 14-inch shells at a price of \$1,515,000. Up to now not a single shell has been aceepted by the Government, although we have expended, in wages, materials, etc., on these received a SINGLE DOLLAR on these contracts.

In the light of our experience, and having no other basis, we bid for 16-inch shells approximately the same rate per pound as that which the Navy Department actually swarded a 14-inch shell contract one year ago.
