

- SUNK BY TORPEDO New York, April 2 .- The

American steamship Aztec owned by the Oriental Navigation Company, the first armed ship to sail from an American port, was sunk yesterday by a German submarine, according to advices received here tonight by the company from the United States consul at Brest, France. -The Aztec sailed from New York, March 18, for Havre. She was commanded by Captain Walter O'Brien. Sixteen members of the crew were native born Americans.

The cable message gave no information as to the fate of the crew. There were 39 men aboard the vessel.

The Aztec was armed with two five-inch guns, one forward and one aft. The crew of naval gunners on board was in command of a warrant officer. The Aztec, formerly owned by the Pacific Mail Steamship Company, was a ship of 3727 tons gross and 2345 tons net. She was built in Newcastle England, 1894. She was 350 feet

long with a beam of 43 feet. Paris, April 2.-The American steamer Aztec has been sunk by a submarine near an island off Brest. Some of the crew were rescued and are being brought into Brest. A numlittle hope is held that they can be saved as the steamer was torpedoed at night while a heavy sea was running.
