NACOGDOCHES TRADITIONS There are several old graveyards in and about this old town, besides the one now in use-
Some of them are not even known to old residents for the reason that these old burying
places have so long been aban places have so long been aban-
doned, and also been disregarded and obliterated.
One such extinct cemetery was in the biggest of our five pre-historic mounds. These
mounds are now gone-they mounds are now gone-they
were leveled by civilization, sowere
called.
The Big Mound, as it was locally designated by residents
here, stood on what is now Mound street; adjoining the south-east corner of our college campus , about three hundred
yards north-east of the main plaza of our town. These mounds were built by human beings of an unknown race and
date, and for unknown purpose.
The extavation, or holde from which the dirt or soil was taken for their construction, is yet
clearly evident, about one hundred yards eastward from the
big mound.
These mounds are wonders to the present races. They were
supposed by some people to have supposed by some people to have
been used for burying the dead. there to adopt the big mound as
