REGISTRANTS NOTICE.

To all Registrants Under the Selective Draft Act.

On December 15th local boards will begin to mail out the questionnaires to each registrant, except such as are already inducted into the military service.

The prime purpose of the questionnaire is determination of the class in which each registrant will fall.

The questionnaire is a sixteen page pamphlet about 9 by 12 inches and contains the necessary inquiries to determine the class of every registrant. The whole pamphlet should be carefully read by the registrant before he attempts to answer any of the questions. He should familiarize himself with it before he starts to answer the questions, as to know his answer when given is correct and that the sum total of his answers, unmistakably places him in the class to which he belongs.

If any registrant is at doubt as to his being able to properly fill and answer any of the questions, he should appear before the local board provided by the government for instructing registrants along these lines. Primarily, that board consists of Honorable S. W. Blount, Geo. F. Ingraham, and J. C. Harris and the chairman of that board has authorized this local board that each attorney of the Nacogdoches bar has been designated a member of such local board. These attorneys will gladly assist all who come to them for advice. It is not presumed that registrants, nor their dependents, will present such matters to the local exemption board.

Each registrant is responsible to see that he answers the questionnaire in a correct and complete manner. He should be sure to sign the name of the registrant on the questionnaire.

The questionnaire must not be mutilated, wadded or wrinkled up, but must be kept and returned to the board in good, clean, legible form.

All answers must be written with ink and in plain, legible hands.

All notary certificates must be fully made out and the seal affixed.

A cartoon in this morning's Shreveport Times adds a capital P to the spelling of Russia, which makes it very timely read "Prussia."

A headline announces that "Washington will maintain an Attitude of Reserve" in the (P) Russian matter for the present.

Hon. C. B. Collins, who was chairman of this district in the pledge card campaign, has been appointed assistant to Col. B. F. Bonner, state chairman, in the forthcoming Red Cross drive, and has accepted the appointment.

The new Russian rulers, Lenin and Bolsheviks, who are on a deal with the Germans for a separate peace, doubtless have forgotten all about a country called Japan, and which unaided, whipped Russia, not so very many years ago.—Tyler Daily Tribune.

And this would be a good place to use our ally, letting her give the big old "baby" another drubbing.

From the Nacogdoches daily paper we note that the deposits of the three banks in that city are \$1,736,430.52, and the total resources are \$2,066,729.60. In Jacksonville the deposits are \$1,997,172.48, and the total resources \$2,496,611.75. But when what else could you expect for Jacksonville is just naturally a better town than Nacogdoches, and ought to have more money. However, we are not at all disposed to look down on our poor neighbors, for they are mighty good people.—Jacksonville Progress.

Accepting your figures as correct, you seem to have for one time in life "put one by us," and in the spirit of good losers, we will let you "crow" for the one time, humbly taking our places with the meek and lowly. We don't know how much of our money found its way up to Jacksonville at this particular time, but if you have the figures on us, we will submit for the once, promising you that it will never happen again.

At the Dallas meeting held November 17, the route of the "Choctaw Trail" through Texas was definitely settled and representatives were sent to Austin to go before the highway commission for the purpose of getting this highway designated by the commission. A telegram from F. L. McGee to R. F. Davis Tuesday brings the good news that the "Choctaw Trail" has been officially designated as a State Highway by the commission.

As designated by the directors and the Highway Commission the "Trail" runs from Paris through Mt. Pleasant, Daingerfield, Hughes Springs, Jefferson, Marshall, Carthage, Timpson, Garrison, Nacogdoches, Lufkin, Livingston, Liberty, to Houston and to Galveston.—Nacogdoches Sentinel.

But only those counties which provide funds to pay half the cost of construction can hope to secure either the East Texas Highway or the Choctaw Trail. Counties which refuse to bear their part of the expense can have no cause of complaint if these routes are changed to run through counties that are willing to pay.—Carthage Register.

ADDITIONAL TAX BURDENS

The very first matter of importance to engage the attention of congress at its first regular session next Monday will be that of war finance.

It is a pressing and vital question.

Mr. Garner of the ways and means committee promises that the work of removing ambiguous sections of the war revenue bill, making it easier of interpretation and application and remedying inequalities will be promptly undertaken.

That is important and the work will require prudence and caution, for the new revenue measure is woefully imperfect in its application, as well as full of inequalities and absurdities.

Mr. Garner makes it very plain, however, that the people need expect no lightening of tax burdens. On the contrary, they must prepare to respond still more generously to the war needs of the country. He even hints at additional taxes of \$4,000,000,000 to meet war expenditure for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1918, which, if we understand him, would double the levies upon the citizen made by the war revenue bill passed just before the adjournment of the special session.

Mr. Garner bases the possibility of this extraordinary levy upon the apparent inexpediency of another bond issue next spring.

The special session of congress left the financial program for 1918, as follows: Revenues from taxes, \$3,800,000,000; from bond sales, \$18,500,000,000 in round numbers.

The first bond authorization was for \$7,000,000,000 and the second for \$11,500,000,000.

So far, less than \$7,000,000,000 of bonds have been sold. The \$11,500,000,000 has not been offered to the public yet, but next week \$2,000,000,000 of war savings certificates are to be offered through the banks and post-offices.

If, as Mr. Garner says, it may not be expedient to float another bond sale next spring, when the bonds have already been authorized by congress, the inference is that the great financiers of the country believe that it is undesirable to issue so much as \$18,500,000,000 bonds in a single year; and that of the \$9,000,000,000 remaining after savings certificates are deducted it will be better to withhold at least half from the market and provide an equivalent sum through additional taxation.

The motive of this seems plain enough. Financial security demands the financing of the war as far as possible out of current taxation, and obtaining the balance through bond sales, a plan that tends to limit an after-war debt that under any circumstances will be heavy enough to burden the next three generations to the limit.

The very fact that all business and industrial operations are pitched upon a dangerously inflated basis seems to be peason enough why in the broader view it would be better to meet the engagements of the government with the low-power dollars the government is compelled to purchase with and hold down as much as possible the inflated debt that will ultimately have to be liquidated with high-power dollars.

It is unfortunate that the people generally do no sense the fallacy of the profits and earnings which attend inflated price levels, especially when considering the enormous debt that the war is piling upon the country. It is unfortunate that the great financiers who do not possess the measure of public confi-

dence in a time like this that their fealty to principles of sound finance and monetary stability entitle them to.

Apparently, it is idle to expect the public to learn of any former experience. The temptations of monetary profit are irresistible. It is only when reaction comes that people learn that natural law is immutable and that artificial conditions are temporary and must ultimately give way to the natural order.

In reporting the negotiations for an armistice between Russia and Germany, it is announced that the Russian representatives who went into the German territory had to travel blindfolded. And at this distance it would seem that their actions are similarly clouded, a fact of which they do not yet seem to be aware.

The Nacogdoches Sentinel screams in a headline: "A good walk to the cemetery now." Please tell us, brother, how we shall construe this startling declaration—do the Nacogdoches dead walk to their own graves or is it a fact that their lives are so miserable they find most pleasure in walking to the spot where they must lie shortly and behold the ground with anxious eyes?—Logansport Newsboy.

If you will come over here on a little visit we will use the new walk again, marching in solemn procession to the potter's field where impudent editors who get too fresh with the Mother town are consigned for safe keeping.

Congress re-assembles today after a brief recess, and a dispatch from Washington announces that most of the congressmen and senators have arrived in the capitol city ready for their duties when President Wilson submits his program. Like the preceding session, the big business of this session will be the appropriations which will be necessary to sustain and carry on the war. It is reported that on the opening day will be the receipt of appropriation estimates aggregating many billions of dollars for the fiscal year. President Wilson will address the body, and it would seem that no plans are being made in advance of his recommendations.

PRINTED MUSIC.

There were a great many difficulties in the development of the present form of written music. The custom of writing melodies rather than trusting to the uncertain help of memory for their preservation was first observed by the Greeks. Indeed, at one time, the preserving of music in a tangible, visible form was deemed so necessary as to be the subject of a special papal bull.

The writing out of music was accomplished by the use of many different sets of signs and symbols, in the various countries. Nothing really definite and lasting, though, was done in this connection until the fifteenth century, when the first real printing of melodies and harmonies was accomplished in Germany. This was made possible by the invention of the metal types.

The prints thus produced were remarkably clear and neat at first, but later became gradually more and more imperfect, which degeneration finally led to the invention of copper plate printing, in 1586 by Simon Verovio, an Italian.

SATAN ABDICATES THE THRONE OF HELL

Biting Letter From His Satanic Majesty to His Favorite Pupil and Successor, the Kaiser, Brings Fame to an Iowan as a Writer

Louis Syberkrop, of Creston, Iowa, has acquired fame as author of a satire on Kaiser Wilhelm. Requests have come from Secretary Tumulty, Secretary Daniels and Mr. Roosevelt for copies of Mr. Syberkrop's article. It follows:

THE INFERNAL REGIONS.

I have planted in your soul a cruel hatred for your mother, because she was English and left my good friend Bismark to fan the flame I had kindled. Recent history proves how well our work was done. It broke your roya; mother's heart, but I gained my purpose.

The inherited disease of the Hohenzollerns killed your father, just as it will kill you, and you became the ruler of German and a tool of mine sooner than I expected. To assist you and further hasten my work I sent three evil spirits, Nietzsche, Treitschke and later Bernhardt, whose teachings inflamed the youths of Germany, who in good time would be willing and loyal subjects and eager to spill their blood and pull your chestnuts, yours and mine; the spell has been perfect—as you cast your ambitious eyes toward the Mediterranean, Egypt, India and the great Dardanelles, and you began your great railway to Bagdad, but the ambitious archduke and his more ambitious wife stood in your way. It was then that I sowed the seed in your heart that blossomed into the assassination of the duke and his wife, and all hell smiled when it saw how cleverly you saddled the crime onto Serbia. I saw you set sails for the fjords of Norway, and I knew you would prove an alibi. How cleverly done, so much like your noble grandfather, who also secured an assassin to remove old King Frederick from Denmark, and

later robbed that country of two provinces that gave Germany an opportunity to become a naval power. Murder is dirty work, but it takes a Hohenzollern to make a way and get by.

Your opportunity was at hand; you set the world on fire and bells of hell were ringing; your rape on Belgium caused much joy, for it was the beginning, the foundation of a perfect hell on earth; the destruction of noble cathedrals and other infinite works of art was hailed with joy in the infernal regions. You made war on friends and foe alike and the murder of civilians showed my teachings had borne fruit. Your treachery toward neutral nations hastened a universal upheaval, the thing I most desired. I was in Belgium when you drove the peaceful population before you like cattle into slavery; you separated man and wife and forced them to hard labor in the trenches. I have seen the most fiendish rape committed on young women and those who were forced into maternity were cursing the father of their offspring, and I began to doubt if my own inferno was really up to date.

You have taken millions of dollars from innocent victims and called it indemnity; you have lived fat on the land you usurped and sent the real owners away in starvation. You have killed and robbed the people of friendly Nations and destroyed their property. You are a liar, a hypocrite and a bluffer of the highest magnitude. You are a part of mine, and yet you pose as a personal friend of God. Ah, Wilhelm, you are a wonder. You wantonly destroy all things in your path and leave nothing for coming generations.

I was amazed when I saw you form partnership with the impossible Turk, the chronic killer of Christians, and you a devout worshiper in the Lutheran church. I confess, Wilhelm, you are a puzzle at times. A Mohammedon army commanded by German officers assisting one another in massacring Christians is a new line of warfare. When a Prussian officer can witness a nude woman being disemboweled by a swarthy Turk, committing a double murder with one cut of his saber, and calmly stand by and see a house full of innocent Armenians locked up, the house saturated with oil and fired, then my teachings did not stop with you, but have been extended to the whole of the German Nation. I confess my Satanic soul grew sick and there and then I knew

the pupil had become the master. I am a back number, and my dear Wilhelm, I abdicate in your favor. The great key of hell will be turned over to you. The gavel that has struck the doom of damned souls since time began is yours. COUNTY CLERK TO ISSUE PERMITS

Persons who have in their possession explosives of any kind, with the exception of shotguns and small arms cartridges, must secure a license from County Clerk Lake Orton, under an act of congress of the last session. The law includes all manufacturers, sellers and even purchasers of explosives to be used for blasting and such purposes. The list of licenses that will be issued is to the following persons who handle explosives:

1. Manufacturer's license, authorizing sale, manufacture and possession of explosives and ingredients.
 2. Vendor's license, authorizing purchase, possession or sale.
 3. Purchaser's license, authorizing purchase, sale, possession and issuance to any citizen of the United States or friendly country.
 5. Exporter's license, authorizing exporting, but not contrary to any proclamation of the president.
 6. Importer's license, authorizing importing.
 7. Analyst's inventor's educator's and investigator's license, authorizing purchase, manufacture, possession, testing and disposing.
- Mr. Orton has received his supplies for this service, and will be glad to furnish blanks to anyone coming under this provision. Another matter that he would call attention is that permits are issued only by the county clerk, no other officer has authority.

Natural Desire Is Not to Get the
Worst of Any Business
Transaction.

CHEAPEST NOT ALWAYS BEST

Person Who Buys From Catalogue
House Sees Only the Price and
Forgets That Value Is Thing
That Counts.

When you spend your money you
naturally want to get all you can in
return. No one can criticize you for
having that desire. Only those who
are commonly referred to as having
"more money than sense" throw their
money away. All others are careful to
see that they do not get the worst of
any bargain. But one has to be able
to look farther than the end of his
nose if he is to be sure that he is get-
ting the most that he can get for his
money.

That is the defense of the man who
buys from the mail order house instead
of patronizing the merchants in his
own town. He says he can get more
for his money when he buys from the
mail order man than when he spends
his money at home. But in arriving
at that conclusion he certainly has not
been able to look further than the end
of his nose.

In most cases the man who buys
goods from a mail order house does
so because he thinks he is getting the
goods for less money than he would
have to pay for them at the store in
his own town. He thinks he is look-
ing out for No. 1 and he says it is
not his fault if the merchant in his
town cannot make any money and is
forced to go out of business. He over-
looks the fact that he is likely to be
as hard hit as anyone else when that
merchant closes his doors bit, leav-
ing that probability out of considera-
tion, the chances are about 10 to 1 that
the buyer has really lost money on his
deal with the mail order man.

Price Not Only Consideration.
If buying an article of any kind,
whether it be a house and lot or a pa-
per of pins, the price is not the only
thing to be considered by any means.
You are not in the habit of going into
a store when you want to buy a suit of
clothes and saying to the storekeeper:
"Give me the cheapest suit of clothes
you have in the house." You want the
best suit of clothes you can get for the
price you pay for it, but you don't
usually want the cheapest thing you
can find.

A man may delude himself into be-
lieving that when he buys a suit of
clothes from a mail order house for
\$10 he is saving money, but what is
there to justify him in such a belief?
The mere fact that he is getting a suit
for \$10 does not mean that he is sav-
ing money. The chances are that if
he should go to the man who runs the
clothing store in his own town and
ask for it he could get a suit of clothes
for \$10 and the chances are also that
it would be just as good if not a bet-
ter bargain than the suit which he
could get from the mail order house
for the same sum. It is not the price
he pays that shows whether he is get-
ting a bargain or not. It is the qual-
ity of goods that he gets for his money
that counts.

Can Undersell Mail Order House.
The home merchant can sell as
cheaply as the mail order man if he
sells as cheap goods as the mail order
man sells. His expenses are not as
heavy as those of the mail order man.
He pays less rent in proportion to
the business he does, his taxes are less
in proportion to the capital invested.
His advertising bills are less than
those of the mail order man in propor-
tion to the volume of his sales. He
can undersell the mail order man any
day in the year if he wishes to sell
only goods of the same quality and
style of those sold by the mail order
man, but he doesn't do this because he
knows that the majority of the people
in his town do not want that quality
and style of goods. Therefore he keeps
in stock goods of all qualities and all
prices. He has the \$10 suit for the
man who thinks that he can get more
for his money by buying a suit at that
price than he can by buying a better
one for \$20, but he tells the customer
just what he is buying.

The next time you think about buy-
ing something from a mail order house,
if you ever do think of such a thing,
go first to your home merchant and
ask to see the article which you are
thinking of buying.

Ready to Compare Prices.
Your home merchant is a business
man. He gets the best values he can
for his money when he buys goods, and
he does not expect his customers to
do anything else. All that he asks, in
return for the favors he does his cus-
tomers and the things he does for the
good of his community is that he be
given an opportunity to meet the in-
vidious competition of the mail order
house. He is perfectly willing to have
his price and his value compared to

FROM CAMP TRAVIS.

Division Publicity Officer,
Nineteenth Division, N. A. Camp
Travis, Texas.—Major General
Henry T. Allen, commanding the
90th Division, at Camp Travis,
believes that the American sol-
dier, if he knows the reason why,
will respond to any call that can
be made of him. While exacting
that kind of discipline that must
be had if the lives of the soldiers
themselves are to be safeguarded,
General Allen typifies in his
every action Paragraph 3, of
Army Regulations. This para-
graph reads:

"Superiors are forbidden to
injure those under their author-
ity by tyrannical or capricious
conduct or by abusive language.
While maintaining discipline and
the thorough performance of
military duty, all officers, in
dealing with enlisted men, will
bear in mind the absolute neces-
sity of so treating them as to
preserve their self respect. Of-
ficers will keep in as close touch
as possible with the men under
their command and will strive to
build up such relations of confi-
dence and sympathy as will in-
sure the free approach of their
men for counsel and assistance.
This relationship may be gained
and maintained without relaxa-
tion of the bonds of discipline
and with great benefit to the
service as a whole."

The question of selecting can-
didates to attend the next train-
ing school for officers has been
receiving the most thorough con-
sideration of the authorities at
both Washington and at Camp
Travis. Political influence, per-
sonal appeals and all those
things that sway the civil popu-
lation are thrown to the four
winds in the plan that has evolved.
The question of what a
man was, who his father was
and the prominence of his wife's
relatives are all ignored. No
stone is being left unturned to
pick from the soldiers of the se-
lected draft only those who have
shown by their work since they

have been in Camp Travis those
elements of capacity and leader-
ship that officers must have, and
who, prior to coming into the
National Army, occupied spheres
of activity that would tend to
make stronger these essentials.
In other words, this war is not
to be fought by soldiers led by
officers who have gone through the
mill, as it were, and have
emerged therefrom with demon-
strated fitness of their capacities
to be officers in the American
Army.

Just a suggestion to the
Folks Back Home. Write to
the soldiers now in the army,
write often and write all sorts
of gossip. True, the soldiers
may not write home as often as
they should, but then there is a
sameness and such a grim reali-
ty in their lives here, that
coupled with the tremendous
amount of work they are doing
with cheerful spirits, they some-
times procrastinate about writ-
ing until the days grow into
weeks and the weeks roll into
months before they are aware
of it. But this does not mean
that they do not delight in re-
ceiving letters from their rela-
tives and their sweethearts! In
fact those who know the soldiers
best, believe that the sweet-
hearts at home can well afford
to do just a little flirting in their
letters, if need be, to keep arouse-
d the interests of the soldiers.

If such a thing should hurt the
conscience of these sweethearts,
it can be stated with some room
for the assertion, that flirting is
a game that two can play at and
both win—or lose.

If the fond fathers who think
their James, (camouflage for ar-
my "Jim"), or Henry (ditto for ar-
my "Hank"), is without a bit
of the boy in him, they should
come to Camp Travis between

3:30 and 4:30 o'clock any week
day afternoon, except Wednes-
days and Saturdays. This hour
is devoted to games and such
games as the boys play would
put to rout a case of mully-
grubs of the worst kind. Every-
thing from ring around the rosy
to rat and tan, which is played
with a piece of rope and a piece
of anatomy and a running course,
is indulged in. While called
play, these games all assist in
making supple the muscles,
quick the eye and keen the brain
and heart for the work that is
just ahead of the soldiers at
Camp Travis. Anything that
will cause a soldier to be just a
fifth of a second quicker than the
soldier he is warring with is in-
valuable. The first second may
not be so important in a man's
life, but its that last fifth of a
second that counts big with a
soldier in actual warfare.

GLENFAWN PIONEER PASSES TO REWARD

Mr. J. M. Fussell, a pioneer
citizen of the Glenfawn commu-
nity, was laid to rest in the fam-
ily burying ground of the Gould
cemetery yesterday in the pres-
ence of a great concourse of sor-
rowing relatives and friends.
Mr. Fussell lacked just forty-
eight days of reaching his three
score and ten years. He is sur-
vived by his widow and eight
children, all prominently con-
nected with the best citizenship
of the country. Among the other
relatives were the Goldsberry
brothers, who were nephews, and
Mrs. J. B. Stripling, a niece by
marriage, of this city. He had
spent his whole life in the Glen-
fawn community, and was a
good christian man and kind
neighbor who was highly es-
teemed by all who knew him, and

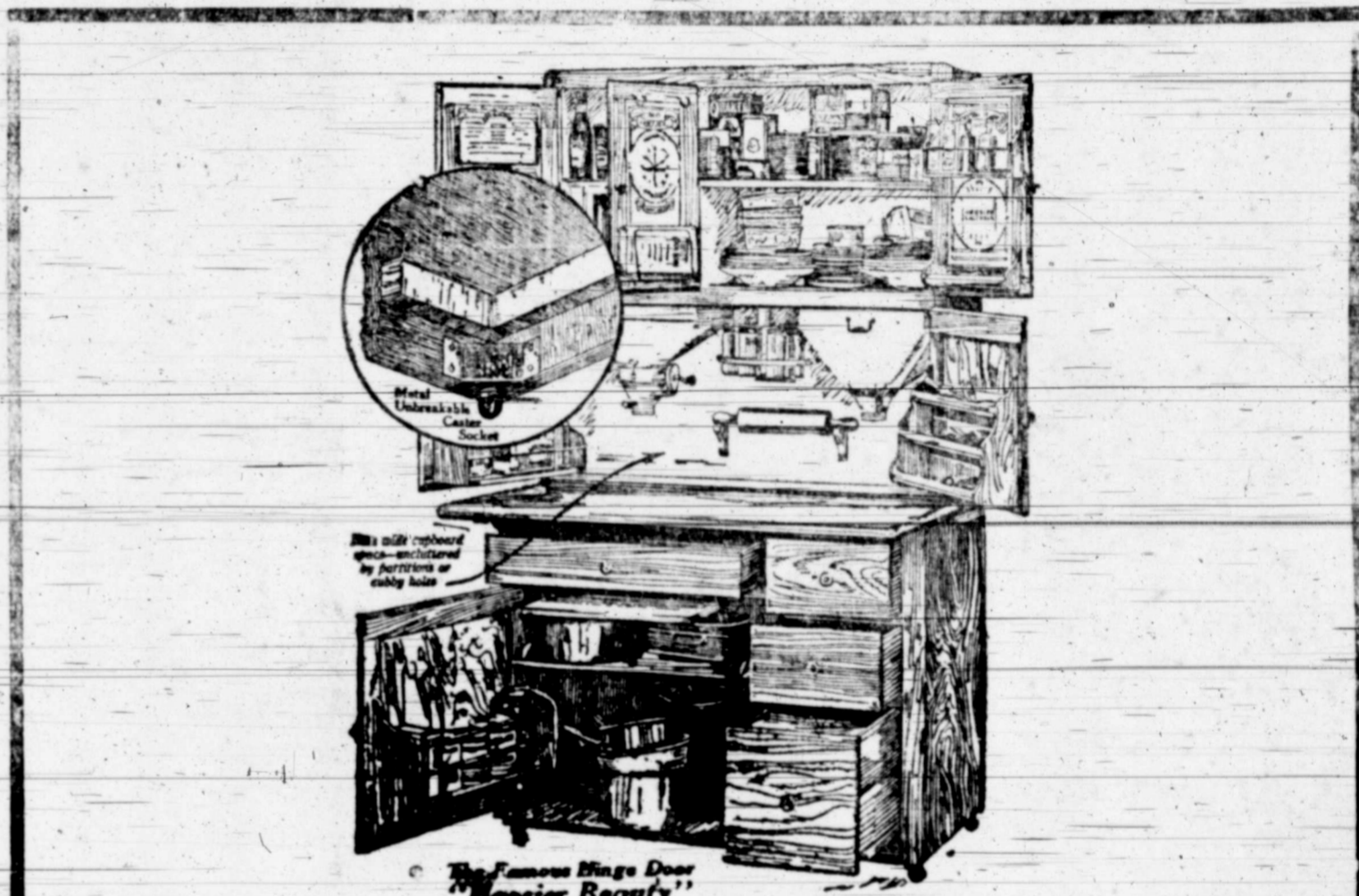

**THE LATEST NEWS
FROM THE WAR ZONE**

**Russia and Germany Enter Into
Negotiations For Armistice
as Planned.**

The papers of today announce that Russia and Germany entered into negotiations for an armistice Sunday as originally planned, and have set December 15th for another meeting at which time they hope to work out final details of the program by which fighting between those countries will be suspended looking to peace.

The news from the zone in which the big battle toward Cambrai has been raging was discouraging yesterday and the day before, but today the report comes that General Byng has recovered the territory he lost.

The attempt of Bavarian Crown Prince Rupprecht by an encircling movement to nullify the brilliant advance of British General Byng toward Cambrai has resulted apparently in complete failure. Although at certain points the Germans pierced the British lines and captured positions, men and guns, they have paid dearly for their entrance. The dead near La Vacquerie during the course of 12 hours have been greater in numbers than during any similar period of fighting since the war began.

Relatively, the British line remains as it was before the German drive. Tactically it is just as strong, the enemy in great numbers has endeavored to pierce the front at Masnieres, delivering all ten attacks there, all of which were successfully repulsed. Some of the enemy succeeded, by redoubing forces, in reaching the adjoining valley of Les Rues Vertes, but were later driven out in a counter attack.

The sharp salient formed by the occupation of Masnieres by the British was an extremely hard one to hold and during the evacuation of the village, which was carried out unhampered by the Germans, who Sunday morning evidently had not learned of the strategic move as they were continuing to bombard the old position. Later Berlin announced that the village had been cleared of British. Near the southern base of the line the Germans also have attempted to better their positions around Gonnelleu, La Vacquerie and Bourlon, but their efforts, as at Masnieres, brought them nothing more than additional heavy casualties. The German war office claims that 60 guns and more than 100 machine guns were captured by them in the fighting on Friday and Saturday.

U. S. Engineers Join in Battle.

An interesting feature of the initial attack by the Germans Friday was that near Gouzeau court a large force of American army engineers were trapped in the encircling movement. They took refuge in shell craters until the British pressed forward, and then, joining the British ranks, fought side by side with the Britons and aided materially in repelling the enemy.

The Austro-Germans have not yet launched their expected attack in force on the northern front in the Italian theatre, but all along this line and also along the Piave river to the Adriatic sea violent artillery duels are in progress. Near Melatta an attempt by the enemy to break the Italian line, delivered with preliminary artillery preparation of great intensity, was put down and the attacking forces compelled to flee.

In Palestine the Turks west of Jerusalem continue to attack the British positions, but everywhere they have been repulsed

with heavy losses. At one place the Ottomans penetrated a British position, but later were ejected from it, leaving prisoners in the hands of the British.

U. S. Engineers Fall Gloriously.

Paris, Dec. 2.—The Havas correspondent at the British front, describing the formidable attacks before Cambrai on Friday, in which he asserts 11 or perhaps 12 enemy divisions tried to encircle the British, only failing because of the vigorous counter-attacks, says:

"The courageous conduct of a number of American soldiers attracted much attention. They were specialists engaged in constructing and working on field railroads. When the enemy appeared Friday morning they exchanged their shovels for rifles and cartridges and fought alongside the Tommies. Several fell gloriously with arms in their hands, facing the foe. None saw them at work but praised their coolness, discipline and courage of these improvised fighters."

Thousands of Germans Killed.

London, Dec. 2.—The Reuter correspondent at British headquarters in France sends the following:

"During Saturday the Germans delivered no less than 15 attacks against our positions in La Vacquerie. Those in a position to know say that we killed more Germans opposite La Vacquerie in 12 hours than in any other spot in the same time during the whole course of the war."

**LANGSTON KING IS

Mr. King immediately filed his bond, which was approved and the oath of office was administered to him, by which he became the county attorney of Nacogdoches county until his successor is elected and qualified.

Mr. King was reared in the county, and is a brother of Hons. George and Steve M. King, both well known lawyers who began their careers in the profession in this city. He was granted license to practice law in 1911, but having opportunity to get the position of court reporter, he accepted it and has not been engaged in much active practice, but has been continuously at work in the courts through which he has gained a wide range of experience which will be valuable to him in his new position. While his position was one of a clerical nature, yet it was a constant record of details, and he had opportunity to observe witnesses interrogated by the best counsel, the law points discussed, etc. all combining the equivalent of a good school.

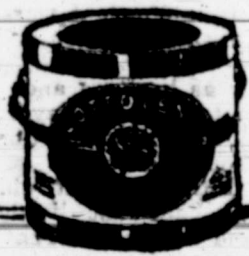

STAMP TAX LAW EFFECTIVE DEC. 1.

On December 1 war tax stamps will be placed on sale at the stamp windows of the postoffice. The war stamp tax becomes effective on that date, and stamps must be affixed to and cancelled on the following documents:

Bonds of Indebtedness—Bonds, debentures or certificates of indebtedness, each \$100 or fraction thereof, 5 cents.

Bonds—Indemnity or surety, each 50 cents.

Capital Stock—Each original issue, for each \$100 or fraction thereof, 5 cents.

Capital Stock—Sales or transfers, each \$100 or fraction thereof, 2 cents.

Conveyances—Deeds, etc., exceeding \$100 to \$500, 50 cents; each additional \$500 or fraction, 50 cents.

Drafts or checks payable otherwise than on sight, promissory notes, and for each renewal, \$100 or fraction thereof, 2 cents.

Entry in custom house, not exceeding \$100, 25 cents; exceeding \$100 to \$500, 50 cents; exceeding \$500, \$1.

Entry for withdrawal from customs bonded warehouse, 50 cents.

Passage Tickets to Foreign Ports. Not exceeding \$30, \$1; more than \$30 to \$60, \$3; more than \$60, \$5.

Parcel post, 25 cents or more postage on each 25 cents or fraction thereof, 1 cent.

Power of attorney, 25 cents.

Produce—Sales of, on exchange, each \$100 or fraction thereof, 2 cents.

Proxy for voting at an election, 10 cents.

Playing Cards—Pack containing not over 54 cards, in addition to existing tax (effective October 3, 1917), 5 cents.

Three slits with a knife or other suitable implement will be cut through stamps of 10 cents or higher denomination, in addition to cancelling with ink.

Parcel post packages amounting to less than 25 cents each will not require a war stamp. A tax of 1 cent must be paid in cash for each 26 cents or fraction thereof on express packages.

Postoffices will not sell internal revenue stamps, which are required on tobacco, etc. These stamps are obtainable from the United States internal revenue collector at Austin. Ordinary postage stamps can not be used for payment of any internal revenue taxes and will not be accepted as payment for war taxes.

Thrift Stamps Different.

War tax stamps are entirely different from war savings certificate stamps and thrift stamps. Beginning December 3, the government will place war savings certificate stamps and thrift stamps on sale at the first, second and third-class postoffices for the purpose of obtaining money to help meet war expenses. Persons who buy war savings certificate stamps and thrift stamps will simply be lending their money to the government at 4 per cent interest to be compounded quarterly for five years, beginning January 1, 1918.

The government proposes to sell war savings certificate stamps and thrift stamps to the amount of \$2,000,000,000 par value during December, 1917, and the calendar year or 1918. To accomplish this it will be necessary to sell savings stamps sufficient to average \$16.50 for every man, woman and child in the United States.

Four per cent interest on \$24 for five years amounts to \$164.80 Compounded quarterly, it amounts to \$175, or \$11.20 more. If a person lends Uncle Sam

\$824, at the end of five years the lender will receive \$1000. If \$82.40 is loaned, \$100, or a profit of \$17.60 will be the sum paid; if \$4.12 then \$5, or a profit of 88 cents will be paid.

Sums ranging from 25 cents to \$82.40 can be loaned daily, but the government will not accept more than \$824 from any one person.

Interest will be paid on war savings certificate stamps of a maturity value of \$5. The 25-cent thrift stamps will bear no interest until they amount to \$4, and are exchanged with 12 cents to 23 cents in cash for \$5 certificate stamps.

During December and January \$5 maturity value war certificate stamps will be sold for \$4.12 each. During the balance of the coming year 1 cent each month will be added to the selling price to offset accumulating interest.

The buying of United States thrift stamps and war certificates will be a safe investment. In case of necessity, the owner of a certificate can surrender same back to the government upon a 10 days notice after January 1 and receive the cost thereof plus interest at the rate of 3 per cent. It is impossible under this plan for a certificate or stamp to depreciate in value.

War savings certificates may be registered at any first, second or third-class postoffice, and thus protect the lawful owner in case of theft or loss.

THOS. B. JORDAN
Our father who has just left us, was born in Fayette County, Tenn., April 1, 1841. When four years old he came, with his parents, and maternal grandparents to Texas, and settled in Shelby county, where he grew to young manhood. In the fall of 1861, when but 20 years of age, he joined the volunteer company of Captain John H. Brooks of the Confederate army, and served until the close of the war, doing his part to make his brigade "the flower and the pride of the west." On Oct. 11, 1866, he was married to Miss Florence Moore. To this union seven children were born, only two of whom are now living. He is survived by six grandchildren and three great grandchildren. Though he will be sadly missed in our home, his example of faith in God and in the more abundant life into which he was

about to enter will comfort us and make us more fully realize that all this boundless universe is life—there are no dead."
