PRESIDENT WILSON PRESENTS PEACE TERMS

Freedom of the Seas for All Nations, Reduced Armaments -No Annexations.

Washington, Jan. 8 .- Presilent. Wilson to ay in addressing congress delivered a restatement of war aims in agreement with the recent declaration by the British premier, David Lloyd George.

Fourteen Requirements For Peace:

Open covenants of peace without private international uncorstandings.

Absolute freedom of the seas in peace or war, except as they may be closed by international action.

Removal of all economic barriers and establishment of equality of trade conditions among nations consenting to peace and associating themselves for its maintenance.

Guarantees for the reduction as it is very necessary for this lowest point consistent with domestic safety.

> Impartial adjustment of all principle that the peoples concerned have equal weight with the interest of the government.
