



STATUTORY LAW EF-FECTIVE JUNE 26TH.

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, May 16 .- The statutory prohibition law which will become effective June 26, will supersede the zone law in the event the last named is knocked out or upheld by the appeals court. The statewide act will govern either way the court decides the question. In many respects the statutory act is not as drastic as the zone law as the former permits the shipment of liquor into prohibited territory or zone area for scientific purposes. Under the statewide act a person also may carry intoxicants into prohibition territory provided they are for his own personal use.

It also is likely that under the provisions of the statewide act, a way will be found to permit the shipment of liquors into the state for manufacturing purposes, which cannot now be done under the zone law. Manufacturing plants in Texas have been hard hit by this piece of legislation, and the attorney general's department has been deluged with inquiries from various por-

MUST GET LICENSE TO SELL EXPLOSIVES

The Fourth Called Session of the 35th legislature enacted a law, which makes it incumbent upon every state, county and municipal peace officer in Texas to enforce the Federal Explosives act, which went into effect last November, and to co-operate with and report to Chas. B. Watters, United States Explosives Inspector, San Antonio, Texas, on all explosions, and violations of the Federal Explosives Act; and the willful failure or refusal of any such officer to discharge and perform the duties imposed by this Act shall constitute a misdemeanor involving official misconduct, and on conviction he shall be punished by a fine of not more than one thousand dollars and removal from office. This law was introduced and passed at the suggestion of the Texas State Council of Defense.
