The Americans Make More Gains

(By Associated Press)

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN FRANCE, June 5.—The Americans northwest of Chateau Thierry, in a brilliant bayonet attack have driven the Germans from Veully Wood. German machine gun fire failed to stop the Americans, whose casualties were light. The Americans engaged the Germans at close quarters and routed them. The French and Americans wiped out a small German force on the Marne, east of Chateau Thierry and took prisoners.

FRENCH PREMIER SAYS STAKING GAME ON AMERICANS

PARIS, June 5.—Premier Clemenceau said to the Chamber of Deputies today: "We are staking game on the help of the Americans." He argued that it was not time to discuss military operations. The Deputies upheld him in a stormy session.

BRITISH PRAISE THE SAMMIES.

LONDON, June 5.—The part played by American machine gunners in Chateau Thierry is classed by Reuter's as worthy of the achievements of the American infantry at Cantigny.

GERMAN ATTACKS ON MAIN FRONT FAIL.

PARIS, June 5.—German local attacks on the main battle front today failed. The allies broke the force of the German offensive south of Ailette. A German raid on the British lines southwest of Morlancourt, east of Amiens, was repulsed.

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, June 5.—Prohibition legislation by congress is unlikely now, Senator Morris Shepherd of Texas has announced, saying that President Wilson and Herbert Hoover both oppose it.

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, June 5.—An order has been issued by Gen. Crowder for the mobilization of forty thousand negroes for general military service to enter June 25. The call is for 20 states. Texas will send three thousand to Camp Travis.

MORE SUBMARINE VICTIMS ARE SAFE

SURVIVORS SAY SUB PAINTED SEA GREEN AND ALMOST INVISIBLE

NEW YORK, June 5.—A schooner carrying 156 passengers and 91 of the crew of the Carolina, which was sunk by a German submarine, has arrived here. The survivors say that the submarine was painted sea green and was almost invisible. The underwater boat was 250 feet long, and sank quickly.

The U. S. schooner Samuel C. Mergel is the newest victim, having been sunk Sunday off New York. Eleven of the crew were brought in. All but 10 of the 218 passengers of the Carolina have been accounted for.

16 OF CAROLINA WERE DROWNED

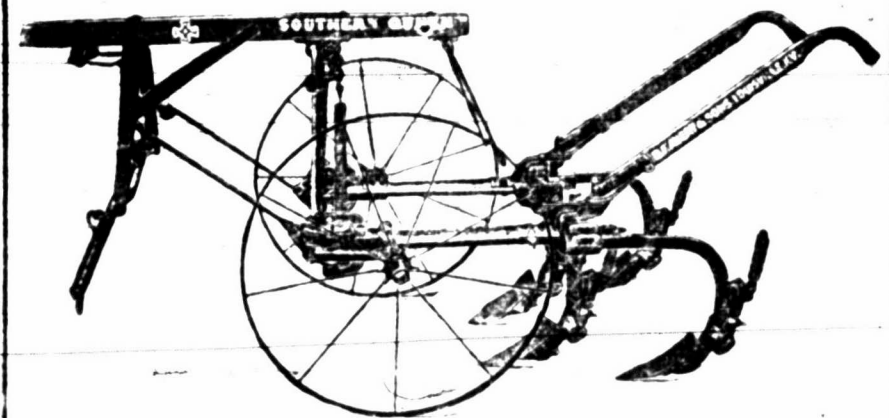

Some 20 Ships Sub Victims at Door New York

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, JUNE 3.—INFORMATION RECEIVED IN MARITIME CIRCLES HERE INDICATE THAT AS MANY AS FIFTEEN VESSELS HAVE BEEN SUNK BY GERMAN SUBMARINES IN AN ATTACK UPON AMERICAN SHIPPING ALMOST AT THE VERY ENTRANCE OF NEW YORK HARBOR. THIS IS TAKEN TO MEAN THAT GERMANY HAS AT LAST INAUGURATED A SUBMARINE CAMPAIGN TO BREAK UP THE TRANSPORTATION OF TROOPS TO FRANCE. RUMORS OF THE PRESENCE OF GERMAN SUBMARINES HAVE BEEN CURRENT HERE FOR TWO WEEKS. THE SHIPS WERE ATTACKED SOME TIME DURING THE NIGHT. PORT AUTHORITIES HAVE BARRELED THE DEPARTURE OF OUTGOING SHIPS. IT IS PRESUMED HERE THAT THE SUBMARINES ARE BEING DEALT WITH BY AMERICAN DESTROYERS. ONE SHIP SUNK WAS THE EDWARD H. COLE A SAILING VESSEL. ITS CREW HAS BEEN LANDED HERE.

ACCORDING TO THE SURVIVORS THE EDWARD H. COLE WAS SUNK SEVENTY FIVE MILES OFF THE NEW JERSEY COAST YESTERDAY AFTERNOON. THE COMMANDER SAID TWO SUBMARINES ATTACKED THE VESSEL.

THE CAPTAIN OF THE COLE SAID TWO SUBMARINES APPEARED AND ORDERED COMMANDER HEAVE TO GIVE THE CREW TEN MINUTES TO LEAVE. THE CREW TOOK TO THE SHIPS AND THE GERMANS PLANTED BOMBS, BLOWING UP THE SHIP. BEFORE THE EXPLOSION ANOTHER AMERICAN STEAMSHIP APPEARED AND THE SUBMARINES GAVE CHASE.

DETAILS OF ADDITIONAL SINKINGS OF TWO MORE AMERICAN SHIPSHAVE NOT BEEN RECEIVED BUT REPORTED TO HAVE FALLEN VICTIMS SOMEWHERE OFF THE NEW ENGLAND COAST.

THE CAROLINA WITH TWO HUNDRED PASSENGERS WAS BOUND FOR AN ATLANTIC PORT AND IS TWELVE HOURS OVERDUE. A WIRELESS MESSAGE SAYING THE AMERICAN SCHOONER ELLA M. WILEY WAS "SUNK BY GUN FIRE" OFF BLOCK ISLAND WAS PICKED UP BY AN AMERICAN STEAMSHIP WHICH JUST ARRIVED FROM PORTO RICO.

NEW YORK—LATER—TWO MORE AMERICAN VESSELS HATTIE DUNN AND SAMUEL W. HATHAWAY HAVE BEEN SUNK BY SUBMARINES.

Atlantic Ports Closed

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, JUNE 3.—THE NAVY DEPARTMENT ANNOUNCES THAT IT HAS RECEIVED AN OFFICIAL REPORT THAT THREE AMERICAN SCHOONERS HAVE BEEN SUNK OFF THE COAST BY SUBMARINES.

SECRETARY DANIELS ORDERED THE PORTS OF NEW YORK, BOSTON AND PHILADELPHIA CLOSED TO OUTGOING SHIPS UNTIL FURTHER ORDERS.

NAVAL OFFICERS DECLARED THAT THE AMERICAN FORCES IN HOME WATERS WAS AMPLE TO MEET THE ATTACK.

GERMANS ACCENTUATE MOVEMENT SOUTH

(By Associated Press)
WITH THE FRENCH ARMY IN FRANCE, June 3.—The Germans have accentuated their movement to the south of the Forest of Villers Cotterets and in the valley of Ourcq and are attempting at the same time to push forward to north between Aisne and Oisne rivers. This is indicated by heavy concentrations of troops here.

Last night the French held the Germans everywhere, with the enemy losses heavy. The French took prisoners the waroffice announced today. The French counter attacked along the whole front between Ourcq and the Marne, making progress at several points. A violent German attack on both sides of the road between Chateau Thierry and Paris was repulsed.

THE TREND OF FOOD NEWS

BAD NEWS  **GOOD NEWS**

Because S. Friedlander of Tyler, Texas, a merchant, refused to handle promptly a carload of meal purchased by him, the United States Food Administration has issued an "UNFAIR ORDER" directed to all wholesalers and other licensees, forbidding them to sell licensed commodities to Friedlander for a period beginning May 15, 1918, and extending to June 15, 1918.

For selling flour in excessive quantities, the Worth Milling Company at Ft. Worth, Texas, has lost its Food Administration license. The decision of the Division of Enforcement is that the mill will be allowed to apply for a new license after June 15, if in the meantime it follows the Food Administration's program, and that its officers are familiar with the rules and regulations of the Food Administration and of the Grain Corporation.

Because of his selling, holding and dealing wrongfully in and with food necessities, L. A. Bletch, a merchant at Otto, Texas, has had all supplies to him from wholesalers and jobbers suspended for a period beginning with May 15th and extending to the 13th day of July, 1918.

The grocery store conducted by Max Gott at 1102 Colorado Street has been ordered closed by the representatives of the Food Administration for alleged violation of the prohibition against the sale of flour on wheatless day. Two other charges were also made against the grocer. One is the failure to observe the rule for closing at 7 o'clock and the other is the disregard of prices promulgated by the price interpreting committee. The action will be taken and the papers are to be forwarded to E. A. Peden, Federal Food Administrator of Texas.

Three Houston, two San Antonio and one Victoria restaurants have been penalized by the Federal Food Administration for Texas because of failure to comply with the rules and regulations, each instance being a case of a use of too much sugar and wheat flour in service. The Houston restaurants are:

 In each case of a sustained proof of violation, notice that offense has been made against the Food Administration is posted both on the outside and the inside of the public eating place, until its removal is authorized by the local administrator.

PLAN TO TEST POWER OF FOOD LAW NOW OFF
 An injunction suit brought in the 45th District Court at San Antonio by the Alamo Brokerage Company, presumably to test the constitutionality of the food control law and the authority of the Texas Food Administration, has been dismissed by the judge who granted a temporary injunction against Administrator Peden and others.

EATING HOUSES CONTRIBUTE TO THE RED CROSS.
 Not as a penalization, but as a return to the government in money of the equivalent of wheat flour and sugar used more than the government

The wheatless period for Texas has been extended from June 1 to the next harvest, due to the fact that the shortage of wheat has become so acute that the National Government must use every conservation measure in order to secure sufficient wheat to meet the European demands. In replying to U. S. Food Administrator Hoover's query if Texas would remain wheatless until the harvest, Administrator Peden for Texas replied:

"Complying with your message I am requesting all district and county administrators to explain situation and feel safe in assuring you TEXAS will cheerfully continue on wheatless basis until next crop. Our people genuinely enjoy making this sacrifice for our allies and our boys OVER THERE."
 "PEDEN."

Superintendent Mark Riley of the Bureau of Fisheries for Texas, located at San Marcos, says emphatically that PORPOISE MEAT is highly palatable and has begun a campaign, backed by the Food Administration, to encourage the use of porpoise meat as a beef substitute. The purpose of the campaign is not to popularize porpoise meat, which centuries ago was considered a rare viand, but to give the people, the every day folks, a chance to live. With beef at 35 cents a pound and over, beef eating is beyond the hope of the average, and with many has become a lost art. Porpoise meat has the appearance of venison, the flavor of veal and is the flesh of a fish abundant on the Texas coast.

James N. Darrow, representative of the Federal Food Administration for Texas to the onion growers of the Rio Grande, in a recent report to Administrator Peden, states that because of the Government's assistance in marketing and distributing the onion crop for 1918, the grower who had no expectation of more than 65 cents a crate for his onions has received from \$1.00 to \$1.10; and as a consequence the administration has every assurance that the 18,000 acres planted in onions will be immediately planted in other feed and food crops.

There will be no waste in sugar during 1918, nor extravagant use in non-essentials. The United States Food Administration has placed the manufacturer using sugar on a ration basis in order to make certain sufficient sugar to take care of the housewife in her summer program of preserving fruits. The housewife may buy all the sugar she requires for this purpose by submitting statement to her grocer. Nor does the ration plan to the manufacturer affect the home. Sugar may be bought by the consumer in towns and cities in 5-pound packages, and in rural districts in 10-pound packages. The ration, or basis of a ration, still remains 3 pounds per person per month, and all serving should be on this basis.

WAS FINED \$250.
 On Tuesday, May 21, J. L. Stinson, a grocer of Laurel Heights, San Antonio, because of the failure to sell wheat substitutes with wheat flour has been fined \$250 to be paid the Red Cross and is required to close his place of business for two days. The store will be so posted by the Food Administration.

 NEW YORK, June 5.—After abandoning the Carolina, the survivors in life boats began whistling the bars of the Star Spangled Banner. The tune was taken up by all the boats and the women joined in, singing the words. Very few women were hysterical, and the more courageous rebuked the others to keep order. The survivors were unable to understand why ten new commissioned officers from the San Juan training camp were left unmolested.

 DALLAS, June 5.—Compulsory military training with government supervision and equipment will be instituted at the Southern Methodist University next year, according to an announcement made by Dr. J. H. Kean, dean of the university. Work will also be offered to students in radio and electrical courses.

The university is to have compulsory military training with instruction offered by an army officer or officers, as the number of students require. Equipment has been promised providing it does not interfere with the manufacture of these articles for war purposes.

 WASHINGTON, June 5.—What became of the missing Collier Cyclops?
 Is she a prize in some German port the victim of treachery? Does she lie disabled in some unfrequented cove of the tropical seas driven there and helpless by accident?

Or has she made her last voyage and with more than 300 souls turned up in the Port of Missing Men to join seventeen other ships of the American Navy which have disappeared just as mysteriously since 1871?

Sailing from Barbados in the West Indies March 4 with a complement of 295 men, the great 19,000-ton naval collier has not since been sighted or reported. By order of the Navy Department all available navy craft in southern waters have been making a dragnet search for the vessel, but daily the conviction among officials grows stronger that the great modern mystery of the sea will remain unsolved.
