The Price Section of the Federal Food Administration for Texas has grown to such proportions in Texas that an inventory of the Committees shows 151 with a personnel of 675 men and women, while the Price Reporting Section has a personnel of 325

All Price Interpreting Committee are appointed direct by Administrator Peden. Each committee has a chairman and the committees meet in the larger cities twice a week and in the smaller cities and towns once a week.

The FAIR PRICE LISTS issued are published in the local newspaper and are intended as guides for the retailer and the consumer, The prices as interpreted must be adhered to by the merchants, and the consumers' are urged to report all cases of violations to the County Food Administrators.

The Price Reporters make checks upon the retail merchants. Their reports are sent to the Price Section. Federal Food Administration for Texas, where the prices are compared with the local Fair Price Lists. Wherever there are indications of excessive charges, the matter is referred to the County Food Administrator for adjustment. Where the profiteering is flagrant it is referred to the Field Inspection Division and upon investigation turned over to the Enforcement Division for action

It is the wish of Administrator Peden to have every county in Texas covered with a Price Interpreting Committee as a protection for the law abiding merchant and for the consumer. At the rate the Section grows, all counties with any considerable population will be covered by November 1:

### "YELLOW SUGAR" USERS ANOTHER FORM OF SLACKERS.


"Yellow Sugar" is the brand which patrons of public eating places carry in their pockets and add to their drinks, desserts and cereals after the restaurant pro-prietor has fulfilled his science obligation to the nation by serving only what is al-lowed on the basis of two pounds per person per month. The "Yellow Sugarite" and the "Yellow Sugarette" is the male and female declension of these thin-skinned men and women who have only a casual interest in the winning of the war. Handling these men and women is a rather unpleasant task of the Food Administration; and their selfishness is the source of embarrassnt and worry to the patriotic proprietors who are complying with the rules and

ment and worry to the patriotic proprietors who are complying with the rules and regulations. Administrator Peden announces that the law of public opinion should be invoked in all such cases and has requested that all loyal citizens noting patrons bringing sugar into public eating places send the names to the Houston headquarters so that the names may be made public. Name of person making report will be protected. Herbert Hoover, speaking to the State Food Administrators on the issue of sugar, said: "Sugar is the one commodity that voluntary conservation does not seriously reach. I suppose the great sugar eaters are those of the community who have the least moral resistance,"

#### SUGAR BEING OBTAINED UNDER FALSE COLORS.

Summons to householders purchasing more than their allotment of sugar based on the ration of two pounds per person per month have, in a number of instances, been returned to the Food Administration marked "no such party at this address." The Enforcement Division is inclined to believe that purchases of sugar are being made under false names and retail merchants, where in case of doubt as to the name and address of a purchaser, are requested to verify the pame and address in the City Directory; and where altempt to secure sugar under false pretense de-velops to report the name of the offender to the Food authorities.






