## THE END OF THE WORLD CONFLICT

(By Associated Press)<br>WASHINGTON, Nov. 11-The World War ended at si oclock this morning, Washington time. With the red revolution in Germany, and with William Hohenzollern, the former emperor a fugitive from his native land, announcement that the armistice terms imposed by the allies and the American government, had

been signed by the Hun envoys at midnight last night. five o'clock Paris time, and that hostilities would cease six hours later, was made by the state department at $2: 45$ this morning.

Secretary Lansing said: "The armistice has been ties will cease at 11:00 o'clock this morning, Paris time. The infiermation that the armistice had been signed was transmitted to the White House immediatley after it was received by the government, and Preident Wilson was expected to issue a statement to the American people today

The signing of the armistice does not mean that the great American military machine will cease to operate at once. America must play an important part in disarming and guarding the enemy until the work has been completed. Even the movement o troops to France will be continued, but on a greatly reduced scale. The troops which have been in France longest will probably be re turned home soon, to be repla

## The Situation In Germany Today

WASHINGTON. Nov. 11-The strictly military terms of the armistice signed by Germany are embraced in eleven specifications which include the evacuation of all invaded territöry, the withdrawal of German troops from the left bank of the Rhein and the
surrender of all supplies. The war terms also provide for the abandonment by Germany of the treaties of Bucharest and Brest Litoysk. The naval terms provide for the surrender of 106 sub marines, 50 destroyers, six battle cruisers, 10 battleships, 8 light cruisers and other miscellaneous ships. All allied vessels in German hands are to be surrendered, and Germany must notify neurals that they are free to trade at once on the seas with the Allie

Among the financial terms included are restitutions for dam e done by German armies, the restitution of cash taken from he National Bank of Belgium and the return of gold taken from

The military terms include the surrender of five thousand uns, half of their field and light artillery, thirty thousand machine guns, three thousand flame throwers and two-thousand airplanes he surrender of five thousand locomotives, fifty thousand wagons he allies, and stores of coal and iron are also included In connection with the evacuation of the left bank Rhein, it is provided that the allied heads crossing the river a Coblen, Cologne and Mayence, with the bridgeheads and thirty kil ican prisoners without reciprocity is included. German troops are to retire at once from any territory held Russian, Rumanian and Turkish forces before the war. The allied forces are to have access to evacuated territory either hrough Dantzig or by the river Vistula.

The unconditional capitulation of all German forces in Eas Arica within a month is provided. The freedom of access to the
Raltic sea, with the power to occupy German forts in Kattegat provided.

The Germans must also reveal the location of mines, poisone wells, and like agencies of destruction. The allied blockade mains unchanged during the armistice.
