## RED CROSS NEWS.

A district meeting for the Red Cross Christmas Roll Call was held in Nacogdoches last Sunday afternoon. The meeting was called by E. L. Kurth of Lufkin, chairman of this district, which comprises of six counties in East Texas.

The call for the meeting was made Saturday and owing to the shortness of the notice representatives from only two counties besides Nacogdoches county were present. Angelina county was represented by E. L. Kurth, Rev. W. T. Renfrow, P. D. Renfrow and W. S. Scott. Shelby county was represented by O. F. Metz, Judge Postell and Roy Payne. Nacogdoches county by F. R. Penman, Judge Middlebrook, Rev. Atwell and W. S. Davis.

The meeting was held to discuss the plans for organization in the various counties for the coming campaign. Judge Middlebrook delivered a short address of welcome which was replied to by Rev. Renfrow. District chairman stated the object of the meeting and made several suggestions as to how the campaign should be carried out. He assured all the workers that he would be ready at all times to cooperate with them in furnishing supplies and speaking when needed. Mr. Kurth said that this section of Texas had a wonderful record in its support of war measures and that he trusted that it would not only be maintained but surpassed in the coming drive. The counties in his district are counted upon for not less than 80,000 members. Angelina county, he stated, stood third in percentage of membership secured in the state in the Christmas drive last year. Mr. Kurth is anxious that each of the counties show some rivalry in the percentage of membership reported.

Rev. Atwell spoke, giving an outline of the Red Cross work during the war and showing how it had saved the world to democracy by coming to the relief of the French when the morale of that nation was at a low ebb and the question of a separate peace was being seriously considered. He cited another instance in which the Red Cross saved the day by providing fully equipped hospitals to replace 88 which were captured by the Germans in 1917 in the great drive on the Italian armies. The support of the Red Cross by the American people had enabled it to accumulate vast stores in Paris sufficient to replace the great loss which was sustained by the Italians and enabled them to erect hospitals in a few days to fully cover the losses.

Judge Postell told of the work which is being done in every school district through the Council of Defense. This organization in each school district has separate committees to take care of each phase of the work. There is one for War Savings Stamps, Liberty Bonds, Red Cross, war work, etc. The plan has worked splendidly enabling the county to discharge every war quota which has been assigned to it. ## HOLDS PROHIBITION LAW IS CONSTITUTIONAL

AUSTIN, Dec. 11.—Temporary injunctions restraining Emil Joseph and Percy Nelson, of Fort Bend county from selling intoxicating liquors were perpetuated today by Judge Calhoun, of the thirty-third district court, from which the original injunctions were issued. The defendants gave notice of appeal.

In writing his opinion Judge Calhoun held that the statutory prohibition law is constitutional as the legislature has power to pass any law that is not directly or by strict implication absolutely prohibited by the constitution.

## FRENCH COMMISSION ACTION AGAINST ARRIVES BERLIN EMPEROR BEGINS

### WILL REGULATE RETURN OF THE FRENCH PRISONERS.

PARIS, Dec. 11.—A French commission has arrived in Berlin to regulate the return of French prisoners in Germany. The commission will also investigate the recent affair at Lancensala, in Prussian Saxony, in which nine French prisoners were killed and fifteen wounded seriously in a prison camp.

### BODIES OF SOLDIERS BE LEFT IN FRANCE

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—The decision of the war department that the bodies of American soldiers who lost their lives in France should remain in that country until after the end of the war, was reached in agreement with the government of France. This is disclosed in the annual report of Major General Harris, Adjutant General, made public today.

### LORD CECIL SAYS HUNS SHOULD BE RESPONSIBLE

(By Associated Press)  
LONDON, Dec. 6.—German officials guilty of acts which result in injury or danger to the British prisoners of war should be held personally responsible, says Lord Cecil, former assistant secretary of state for foreign affairs. "We cannot make it too clear that the ill treatment of prisoners is not like occurrences in battle, committed in hot blood or ignorance. It is deliberate, cold-blooded cruelty, and ought to be punished if there is a relic of justice left in the world."

### KAISER'S SON JOINS BERLIN GOVERNMENT

LONDON, Dec. 6.—Prince Adalbert, the third son of the former German emperor, has joined the present government, according to a Berlin dispatch to the Express. He is now at Potsdam.

### "LITTLE MOTHER" DEMAND PROSECUTION OF FORMER EMPEROR.

PARIS, Dec. 11.—Legal action against the former German emperor has been commenced by an organization of "Little Mothers." The demand for prosecution states that the commanders of the German army in 1916 directed that young girls should be carried away from their families and that they were submitted to odious treatment and forced into close contact with notorious women, and that such commanders were under the command of the German emperor.

### SERIOUS DISORDERS OCCUR IN BERLIN

LONDON, Dec. 6.—Serious disorders have occurred in Berlin, and considerable firing has occurred in the principal streets, according to reports reaching the Dutch-German frontier, says an Amsterdam dispatch. The trouble is said to have been caused by the German bolsheviks.

### DISCUSS PROLONGATION ARMISTICE AT TREVES DECEMBER TWELFTH

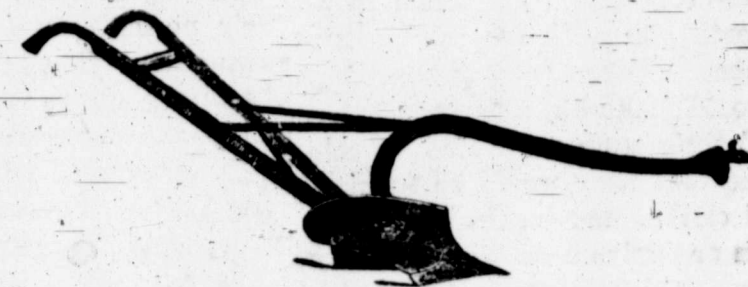

### BRITISH TROOPS ARE RUSHED TO COLOGNE

AIX-LA CHAPELLE, Dec. 9.—British troops have been hurried to Cologne to maintain order. The nature of the trouble there or how serious was not stated in the brief unofficial announcement.

It is reported that the Red forces and their opponents have been rioting, and that the situation demands armed British forces. In the meantime the British infantry pushed up as far as Duren, which it entered to night.

LONDON, Dec. 11.—William Hohenzollern will not make any statement as to his efforts to prevent the outbreak of the war in 1914, according to the American correspondent of the Express. The kaiser stated that if there was any possibility of his becoming a defendant that he preferred to postpone anything he had to say until that time.

### MANGIN WILL ENTER MAYENCE THIS WEEK

PARIS, Dec. 9.—General Mangin will enter Mayence, a French bridgehead on the Rhine this week at the head of the 13th and 43rd infantry divisions, each of which has been cited for bravery. In order to meet the wishes of the various units which desire to enter Alsace Lorraine and the Rhine provinces, the government has decided to change from time to time the troops in the occupied territory.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF ATTORNEY GENERAL

### EXPLAINS HOW THE ENEMY AGENTS WERE PREVENTED FROM OPERATING

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—The story of how enemy agents have been caught, disloyalty suppressed, draft slackers apprehended, dangerous Germans interned, explosions and other sabotage prevented, and enemy secrets ferreted out for use against their armies abroad, was given to the public today in Attorney General T. W. Gregory's annual report. Through a great corps of department of justice civil officers, secret agents and volunteer citizens, this big job of policing has been accomplished, said the attorney general, with a minimum disturbance to the normal life of communities, and with constant effort to avoid encroaching on freedom of speech, action and political criticism.

"One of the distinct achievements of the American people," Attorney General Gregory said, "has been the maintenance of order, the comparative failure of enemy activities and, speaking broadly, the general self-control and self-restraint exhibited throughout the country in critical situations."

The attorney general disclosed that only 6,000 enemy aliens have been arrested on presidential warrants and examined with a view to internment, and that "a considerable number" of these have been placed in internment camps administered by the army. The balance were paroled. Most enemies interned were German men, and there were comparatively few German women or Austro-Hungarians.

Looking forward to peace conditions, the attorney general makes a number of recommendations for freedom of judicial processes.

"When it becomes possible through the lapse of time, to disclose fully the activities of these various secret service, their work will stand out as one of the substantial achievements of the war," Attorney General Gregory said.

Great stress was laid on the sufficiency of normal civil processes "and the needlessness of attempting to invoke the use of military tribunals in this country."

The message indicated that its presence at the Netherlands capital has to do with the negotiations concerning former emperor William in progress at the Hague, the nature of which is not stated.

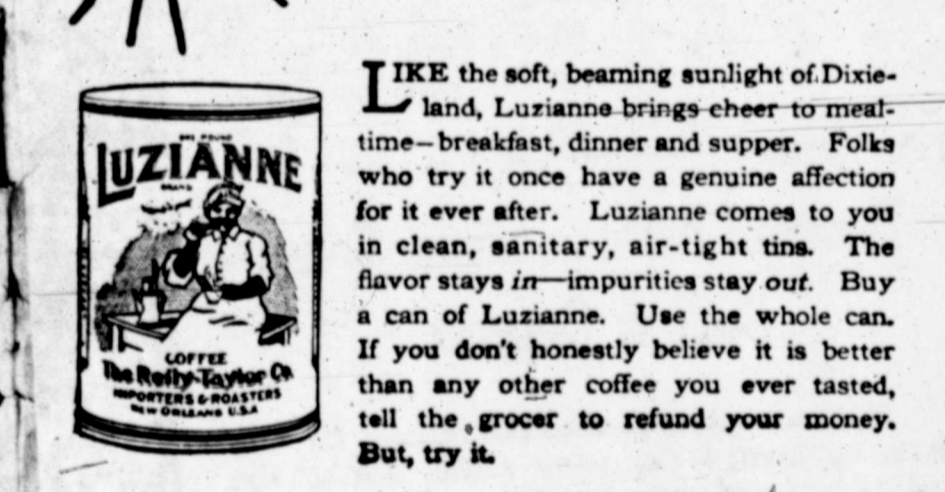

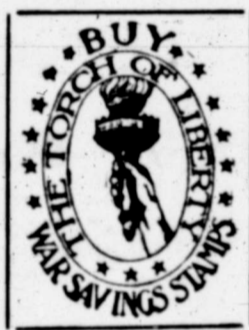

**R. C. COOKING "HITS" FRANCE JUST RIGHT**

**Expert Dietitians Devise Palatable Menus for Soldiers in Hospitals and Canteens.**

France is much interested in American cooking, which is truly a gratifying compliment to a nation which prints its fashionable menus mostly in French. The two hundred and more American Red Cross canteens dotting both the French and American lines of communication have been a success with the Poilu as well as the Tank, and that well known French organization for the wounded, known as the *Bien-Etre du Blessé*, has opened a number of model kitchens in French hospitals, usually in charge of amateur dietitians, who consult a professional dietitian provided by the American Red Cross, who goes about among these hospitals and offers suggestions and advice.

Three hundred trained dietitians are now in service in hospitals, canteens or kitchens on Red Cross hospital trains in France. The American Expeditionary Force took with it a trained dietitian for each base hospital. These women are civilian employees of the Army, recruited through the Bureau of Dietitian Service of the American Red Cross.

**Red Cross Model Farms.** For the double purpose of providing enough fresh milk and vegetables for sick soldiers in hospitals and well soldiers in canteens and providing healthful outdoor exercise for the patients well along in their convalescence the Red Cross has established a number of farms and dairies in connection with hospitals. Besides their great practical value they have given an enormous amount of entertainment to the men. The French government, more than interested, has loaned some thousands of cows, and altogether it is a scheme which appeals to everybody.

But it is not alone for the soldiers that the Red Cross does some of its thinking in terms of cooking and food-stuffs. The Bureau of Dietitian Service has helped to solve the food problem of civilian refugees.

The American Red Cross in France thinks in terms of huge figures, marvelous systems of transportation, tons of shipping space, and it also thinks in terms of the white of egg or orange juice for one single boy. That is why 22,000,000 people have affiliated themselves with the American Red Cross and why Christmas this year in the United States is marked by the Red Cross Christmas Roll Call.

**MANY LIVES SAVED IN MINNESOTA FIRE**

Heroic devotion to duty on the part of Red Cross workers in northeastern Minnesota saved hundreds of lives, soothed untold pain and fed, housed and comforted tens of thousands of homeless refugees in the awful forest fires which devastated a district of 100 square miles.

The Duluth Red Cross immediately formed a committee, opened the armory, the churches and the courthouse as a temporary refuge for the victims. The canteen service in Duluth and also in Superior, Wisconsin, served hot meals. The First Aid Department of the Nursing Service had physicians and nurses ready to meet all the incoming trains, and the Motor Corps scouted all the roads leading out of Duluth, bringing in hundreds of people who were exposed to extreme peril, and worked for 24 hours without pause for rest.

**UNIVERSAL MEMBERSHIP.**

The purpose of the Red Cross Christmas Roll Call, expressed in the fewest possible words, is to see that every man and woman in every city and community throughout the United States, and wherever Americans may be, has the opportunity to join the Red Cross or to renew his or her membership. Nothing short of universal membership is the goal. A 1919 Red Cross membership button is to be given to each person enrolling, as well as a Red Cross Service Flag, with a cross for each member of the family enrolled. Every home in America and every business office should have on display a Service Flag the week before Christmas, when the Roll Call will take place.
