> RED CROSS MADE A SUR-VEY OF THE BALKAN STATES

SEA, Via London. Jan 20 .- The American Red Cross Mission which is making a survey of conditions in the Balkan States with a view to aiding the refugees who were driven out by Bulgarian occupation experienced a tempestuous voyage from Piraeus, the port of Athens, to Saloriki, and finally found refuge in this mountain-sheltered harbor in the upper reaches of the Aegan Sea.

The old coastwise Greek steamer, Peloponnesus, on which they were traveling encountered a gale in which the vessel labored so severely that it was feared at one time she would never reach port. Having stopped at the port of Volo, 200 Greek refugees were put on board the teamer despite the protests of the captain. Throughout the voyage from Volo to Saloriki the weather was cold and rainy and a northeast wind lashed the sea into waves that tossed the old steamer about like a cork and made her groan from stern to stern.




