EX CROWN PRINCE RETURNS GERMANY

PARIS, June 26 .- Frederick William Hohenzollern, former German Crown Prince, has escaped from Holland and made his way into Germany. News of his escape caused considerable stir in peace conference circles. While it is not felt that the reactionaries and monarchists will rally enthusiastically around the former Crown Prince, the action is regarded with considerable signifance in view of the other German recalcitrancy.

The former crown prince was interned by the Dutch government on the island of Wieringen, and if he preserves the status as soldier, the Netherlands government may be held accountable for his escape, according to authorities on international law.

ALLIES TO EXACT REPARATION SHIPS

PARIS, June 26.—Germany was mformed today that the Allies possess the right to punish the persons responsible for the destruction of the German ships, and to collect reparation for the loss. The sinking of the fleet was denounced as a violation of the armistice and a deliberate breach in advance of the conditions of peace. When the investigations are completed, the note states, the Allies will ex; act the necessary reparation.




