WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—President Wilson will address congress next Friday to make recommendation for legislation designated to aid in reducing the cost of living.

## LABOR MAKES NEW DEMANDS

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—Labor now demands that America become the home of industrial freedom as it has become the land of political freedom, Warren S. Stone, grand chief of brotherhood locomotive engineers said today before the house interstate commerce committee, supporting labor's plans for public ownership, and private operation of railroads.

Declaring that American democracy was controlled by industrial autocracy, Stone argued there could be no solution or lowering the cost of living while the consumers pay extortionate profits on their own earnings in purchasing the necessities of life.

"While organized labor has no concrete suggestion for reducing the cost of living, it may later, after a thorough inquiry, advocate a firing squad to those responsible for the wave of profiteering sweeping the country," Warren Stone, chief of the brotherhood of locomotive engineers said today before the congressional hearing of the cost of living problem.

The representatives of fourteen different railway unions are now joined in a communion to director general Hines, asking the immediate increase of wages. So far as known this is the first instance in which all railroad unions, representing two million employees, have acted as a unit.

Hines said that he hadn't time to analyze the communication, but it seemed to be a formal presentation of the demands already made.

## AMERICAN PLAN WAS NOT SUBMITTED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—Secretary Lansing told the senate foreign relations committee today that the American plan for the league of nations was not presented at Versailles, and was never presented to the full peace conference. He said he didn't know whether a copy of the American draft was still in existence, and presumed the draft was made by President Wilson, and a copy might still be in the president's hands.

The secretary said that the agreement to obtain a reaffirmation by Japan of an open door policy in China was entered into by the American government without knowledge of the secret treaty between Japan and the Allies for the transfer of the German concessions of Shantung to Japan.

Lansing stated that the president had called Clemenceau requesting the confidential minutes of the commission on the league of nations not be furnished the French senate.

Secretary Lansing said that personally he would oppose furnishing the senate a transcript of the discussions by the league of nations section, because it might prove irritating to other nations.

## RUMANIANS MAKE HEAVY DEMANDS

(By Associated Press) PARIS, Aug. 6.—According to a message received at the peace conference, the Rumanians served an ultimatum on the Hungarian government making demands far in excess of the armistice terms, and giving the Hungarians until today to comply with them.

It is greatly feared in conference circles that the Rumanian action will result in the overthrow of the new Hungarian government, as the Rumanian army is not under command of Marshal Foch, having refused to accept orders from the French. The Rumanians have retired from active participation in the peace conference. They took exception upon the decision of the principle guaranteeing the rights of minorities within national borders.

PARIS, Aug. 6.—Bucharest dispatches says King Ferdinand of Rumania is with his army in Hungary.

## WALDEN PROPOSES TO MOVE THE COLLEGE TO CENTER

## HOUSE CONSIDERS PROPOSAL WILSON

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—The house today is rearranging its plans to meet unexpected developments owing to demands of railroad employees for increased wages. At President Wilson's request the house abandoned its five weeks recess by almost a unanimous vote late yesterday, and is considering the president's proposal for creating a commission to decide railroad wages and rate questions, and make its decision mandatory. Efforts to have the house recess for two weeks was blocked today by Representative Igoe, democrat of Missouri, who refused unanimous consent, who refused unanimous consent for consideration of recess resolution until the house acts on his measure proposing an investigation into the high cost of shoes.

## LEE WILKERSON DIED AT HOSPITAL LAST NIGHT

Lee Wilkerson, who was injured when a train ran into a truck he was driving at the crossing of the railroad near the compress, some two weeks ago, and who has been in an unconscious condition ever since, died at the hospital last night at 10:30 o'clock. He is survived by his wife and three children, one boy, Joe, who was also bruised in the collision, and two daughters, Bernice and Zelma, his mother-in-law, Mrs. E. A. Caldwell of this city, his mother and one brother from San Augustine, one brother from Shreveport, one brother from Trinity, and a sister from Garrison. He was 47 years of age, born in Boonville, Miss., a member of the Methodist church over twenty years, the Masonic Lodge, and the Knights of Pythias, the Woodmen and the Macabees. He has been in the employ of the light plant and city for about 18 years, and has been superintendent of the city light and water department for the past two or three years.

Words can only in a small way express the sadness and sorrow of the family and the whole community on the sudden and painful death of this good man. Time and again it has been said that this life is but in preparation for the next, and that those who make use of it worthily will enjoy those greater blessings of the life to come. When the mortal soul of man takes on immortality, and when the corruptible flesh takes on incorruptibility, then can it be said that the purpose of life has been fulfilled. The grave is not the end of life, but the beginning—the beginning of eternal life where man is rewarded according to his good works, and it can be truly said that Mr. Wilkerson was ever a worker for the good.



## TROOPS CALLED OUT IN CHICAGO RIOTS

CHICAGO, July 31.—The main negro quarters of Chicago today were patrolled by six thousand armed soldiers, after four nights of race rioting that caused thirty deaths, seventeen negroes, thirteen whites and the injury of nearly a thousand persons, of whom a dozen may die.

The governor ordered the troops out last night on the request of the mayor, after darkness brought renewed rioting and the city's three thousand policemen were exhausted. The fighting continued after the troops reached their stations, one squad of soldiers having to fight a crowd of negroes to reach its station, while other troops were fired on from ambush on their way to duty.

No soldiers were killed or wounded and after the troops took stations the disorders died down within the patrolled region. Negro leaders at a meeting last night adopted resolutions advising the negroes first to cease violence, asserting that nothing but evil could result from the attempts to wreck vengeance real or fancied.

## AGREE PROTOCOL GERMAN TREATY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—A protocol to the German treaty defining the explanations of the treaty has been agreed to in memorandums exchanged between German and Allied plenipotentiaries, was laid before the senate today. A copy of the treaty between the five big powers and Poland said to have been signed June 28 was put into the senate record today by Senator Lodge, who said it was submitted to the British parliament two weeks ago. A text of the agreement between Wilson and representatives of other big powers for Rhineland was also presented to Lodge who declares he received the copy privately after it had been presented to the British parliament.

## SOCIALISTS TAKE CHARGE HUNGARY

VIENNA, Aug. 2.—Bela Kun, the Hungarian Communist dictator, has resigned and been succeeded by a Socialist government, according to a telephone message from Budapest Friday. The new government, under the leadership of Herr Peidell, issued a manifesto declaring its chief task will be to preserve internal order and enter negotiations with the entente.

The Rumanian army was within 25 miles of Budapest when Bela Kun's dictatorship collapsed. The Hungarian Red army, which had been reduced to forty thousand unwilling soldiers, were constantly harassed by guerilla warfare of the peasants, and were thoroughly defeated by the Rumanians early Friday on the Theis river. The Hungarians either surrendered or fled when the Rumanians crossed the river.

Overtures for peace with the Allies have been made by the new Hungarian socialist government. Bela Kun has been furnished safe conduct by the Allies, and is expected to take refuge here.

The Poles announce a continuance of their victorious march against the Uranians, claiming they are now at the crossing of the Rver Zbrucz at various points.

WASHINGTON, July 31.—William Lee, president of the brotherhood of railroad trainmen, announced today that unless the railroad administration take action by the first of October on the demands of the brotherhoods that the trainmen's wages either be increased or the cost of living reduced steps looking to the enforcement of the demands would be taken.

Lee said that a committee of six men here last night adopted a resolution to take protective action if the administration does not act by October 1st. Wilson is deeply impressed by the statement to the same effect presented him yesterday by representatives of locomotive engineers, saying they must have increased wages or reduced living costs. Representatives of six railroad shop unions, representing four hundred and fifty thousand men who are in a conference here with railroad administration today telegraphed shop employees all over the country not to strike, pending final settlement of their demands.

The message said that the administration consented to enter a national agreement concerning rules and working conditions.

It seems that Mr. Hale was stricken with an acute attack of kidney trouble, and has been unconscious all day. He is not thought to be in a very serious condition.

## UP TO ENGLAND DECIDE WHAT BE DONE WITH THE KAISER

LONDON, July 31.—French Major General Weygand, who is here with Foch in a statement declares that it is up to England to decide what to do with the former kaiser. "He is covered with shame and ignominy, branded as a coward, and the French think that is enough punishment."

## NOTHING TO THE GERMAN INCIDENT

PARIS, July 31.—The judge advocate who investigated the incident connected with the departure of the German delegates from Versailles finds that there is no case. It has been established that the Germans aroused the protests of French crowds by sticking out their tongues at the spectators. Charges that stones were thrown rests solely upon the unsupported testimony of two German delegates.

## ALL WORK IN BREST CEASES WHEN WORKERS CALL STRIKE

BREST, July 31.—All work in this port has ceased, the employers having declared a lockout because of the demands of the dockers union.

## HAYS TURNS DOWN NOMINATION INDIANA GOVERNORSHIP

BROOKSVILLE, Ind., Aug. 1.—Will Hays, chairman of the republican nomination for governor of Indiana, says that he will continue to give his undivided attention to the national chairmanship.

## POSTAL COMMUNICATION FRANCE AND HUNS OPENED

PARIS, July 31.—Postal communication between France and all parts of Germany was reopened today.

## BRITISH ARRANGING SEND NAVAL FORCE TO RUSSIA

LONDON, July 31.—The British government is arranging to send a naval force to Russia to cover the evacuation of the Archangel district by the troops there. A contingent of the regular army is being held in readiness to assist if necessary.

## POLICEMEN ARE ON STRIKE ENGLAND

LONDON, Aug. 1.—Sixty-five thousand policemen and prisoner officials through England are on a strike today according to a labor newspaper, which declares that London officers struck with dramatic suddenness.

This is contrary to all other newspapers, which say that the strike call was generally ignored. Scotland Yard asserts that only 536 of the Metropolitan police force failed to report for duty today.

## ANTI-BOLSHEVIKI ARMY SCORES ANOTHER SUCCESS

LONDON, Aug. 1.—The most important Russian anti-Bolsheviki army, under General Denekine has scored another success, having captured the city of Poltava, it is reported here.

The Texas condition today was 67 percent.

LONDON, Aug. 1.—Looting occurred in the London East end last night, owing to the absence of the police. Six hundred and fifty-two policemen are out at Liverpool and 863 in London, according to officials.

LUCERNE, Aug. 4.—Before winter there will be a terrible spasm of rage and despair among the peoples in Europe, in which the final remains of civilization may be totally annihilated, Arthur Henderson, British labor leader predicted at an international socialist conference here yesterday.

### PROMINENT HUNGARIAN COMMUNIST LEADER IS KILLED

(By Associated Press)

VIENNA, Aug. 4.—Fiber Szamuely, prominent Hungarian communist leader, was shot and killed Friday while crossing the frontier by a guard, whose brother Szamuely had executed.

### "CATECHISM OF HATE"

A "Catechism of Hate" was printed in the Deutsche Zeitung von Mexiko and revenge was threatened in an article accompanying it on the day when the delegates of the German republic signed the peace treaty at Versailles. The paper, printed in German, is generally believed to voice the opinions of the Pan-German, irreconcilable element of the German colony in Mexico. Translations in part of the article follow:

"The day of revenge of the German people is not far off. We shall do good to practice patience until the day of revenge has arrived. Revenge must be coldly consummated. In order to prepare ourselves quietly for it, we need 'Catechism of Hatred.'"

The "twelve commandments" of the catechism summarize in brief form many of the protests which have been heard from German sources since the terms of the peace treaty became known. They deny that Germany wanted war, assert that Germany was right in invading Belgium, attacked England for the blockade of Germany, aver that Germany's armies were never defeated and declare that German honor is insulted by making Germans sign admission of their guilt.

In conclusion the article says: "These twelve commandments will suffice to prepare us mentally for 'The Day' on which the hour of revenge will strike."

Asked if the sentiment expressed in the Deutsche Zeitung's article were those of the entire German colony in Mexico, one of the leaders of the German Socialist party in Mexico declared that they were held only by the older and wealthier colonists, who dominated both the paper and the colony, but that a large part of the colony were willing to accept the verdict of the war and give their support to the new German government and to reconstruction policies.

### RIOTING OVER IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, Aug. 1.—With state troops in full control, Chicago's black belt officials declared the rioting was ended here today. There is a total of thirty-two dead, of whom 18 are negroes and 14 whites. The injured exceed three hundred.


