> school. There is almost a collapse in the teaching profession. We have a bureau trying to aid the teachers in finding positions. We have calls to what the inventor got, the manufacturer was surprised, and replied that he got the ducks. That is what we have been getting in the teaching profession. We have been

getting the ducks. Why are you trying to stir up feeling, yeu may ask. My observation has been better than yours, I see the conditions.

Twenty-five percent of the teachers last year were inexperienced. One of the most serious aspects of the profession is the loss of the men. Eight years ago 40 percent of the teachers were men. Now only 10 percent are men. Last year we forever lost to the profession 40 percent of the teachers. Two-thirds of them were among the best teachers we have. The amount of salary ought to be commensurate. No work is more severe than that of the teachers, unless it is the mothers. Neither's work is ever done. Many of the teachers die of nervous prostration. and kindred ills. The teacher has to burn the candle at both ends in order

to make both ends meet. Many of the teachers in our common schools are under 21 and their minds are immature, and they hold only 2nd grade certificates. If your child is sick you will not think about having a cheap doctor. have a cheap teacher in building the



The Sentinel obtains the information that Nacogdoches is to have a modern \$40,000 picture theatre in the near future, which will rank with the largest of the state in size, equipment and all appointments.

The promoters are Messrs. Guy Blount and Luther Swift, and the show will be one of the chain to he operated in the Southwest by the United Amusement Co., whose charter was filed in Austin last Saturday. The capital stock of this company is to be increased from its present \$250,000 to over a militon.

The Nacogdoches theater will Lo located just behind the new Stone Fort National Bank building. A lobby and entrance will be constructed on each side of the Columbian Refining Company's gasoline filling station, entering into the building proper, just behind the station. 




