## MINE OFFICERS TRIAL POSTPONED

Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 10.—Hearing on the charge of contempt of court filed against eighty-four general and district officers of the United Mine Workers was postponed until next Tuesday morning by United States District Judge Anderson on motion of Deputy United States Attorney C. D. Ames, acting for the government, when the case was called here today. The miners' officials were charged with violating the temporary injunction granted by Judge Anderson restraining them from encouraging or furthering the strike of bituminous coal miners. The postponement was the outcome of a meeting this afternoon to act on the president's plan for ending the strike. United States District Attorney Clark moved a postponement of the impeding of the federal grand jury summoned by Judge Anderson to investigate alleged violations of the Lever and anti-trust laws by operators miners and coal dealers, and the court fixed December 17, as the date.

## DRASTIC FUEL REGULATIONS MADE

Washington, Dec. 10.—In the face of an expected settlement of the coal strike at Indianapolis this afternoon, Fuel Administrator Garfield put into effect the most drastic regulations for fuel economy since 1918. Even if the strike is settled, he declared, fuel saving measures will be necessary for several weeks. Plants using bituminous coal or coke will be restricted to operation three days a week on the basis of the present working hours. Exception is made to plants manufacturing what are considered necessary products and those consuming anthracite, gas and other fuels. The order included the curtailment of street lights, heat for office buildings and industrial plants and current for street railways.

Washington, Dec. 9.—The sentence of dismissal imposed by a naval court martial upon Captain Edmund George Chamberlain, aviator in the marine corps, growing out of his sensational claims of having defeated vastly superior forces of German airships on the Western front, was approved today by Secretary of the Navy Daniel Chamberlain is a native of San Antonio, Texas. The case now goes to the president.

## ITALIAN POET-WARRIOR COMING TO AMERICA

Fiume, Dec. 9.—D'Annunzio assured a correspondent of the Associated Press that he was not preparing an expedition against Spalato or Ljubach. He gave his word of honor that this statement was true. D'Annunzio plans to fly to the United States after the Fiume situation has been adjusted, he told the correspondent.

## BITTERLY COLD WITH FUEL FAMINE

Chicago, Ill., Dec. 10.—Hope for paving the way for a final settlement of the coal strike turned to Indianapolis today as an extension of the stringent fuel administration's rationing orders reduced the nation's industries to virtually half-time basis. The most severe weather of the winter, with sub-zero temperature and a further depletion of the diminished coal reserve, gripped the entire western part of the country, with a spread eastward and southward forecast for tomorrow and Thursday.

At Butte, Mont., the thermometer registered 30 degrees below zero, and hundreds are reported in distress from places in Oregon. Great Falls, Mont., was the coldest, with 32 below.

Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 10.—Settlement of the coal strike within 24 hours is confidentially predicted. The executive board and scale committee of the United Mine Workers met at 2 o'clock to consider President Wilson's proposal.

## PRESIDENT OPPOSES FALL RESOLUTION

Washington, Dec. 9.—The president would be "greatly concerned to see any such resolution passed by congress," he wrote Senator Fall, referring to the Fall resolution requesting him to sever diplomatic relations with Mexico. "It would constitute a reversal of our constitutional practice which might lead to very grave confusion in regard to the guidance of our foreign affairs," he wrote. The president expressed confidence that he had the support of every competent constitutional authority in his statement that the direction of the government's affairs was assigned by the constitution to the chief executive, and to him alone.

When the letter was received Chairman Lodge called Senators Fall and Brandegee in conference and in a few moments announced that no further action on the Mexican situation would be taken by the foreign relations committee.

## U. S. HAD NO PART IN JENKINS CASE

Washington, Dec. 6.—The American government has not changed its attitude on the Jenkins case and had no part in obtaining his release on bail, Secretary Lansing declared in denying vague rumors that the State Department has officially "passed word" to the embassy at Mexico City to see that the consular agent was liberated on bond.

## PIGS CAUSED THE GREAT WORLD WAR.

Buchs, Switzerland, Dec. 4.—Pigs, just ordinary lardyard pigs, brought on the world war. This is the latest contribution from the royal houses of the central Empires submitted to history as the cause of the conflict. It is put forth seriously by no less a personage than Count Carl Seliern, late confidential counselor to Emperor Charles in Vienna.

In a statement to a member of the convoy bringing American Red Cross relief to Budapest, the count explained how plain, ordinary porkers—the kind from which the peddlers extract everything but the squeal—were the cause of the world catastrophe.

"Fifteen years before the war" said Count Seliern, "Siberia was shipping great numbers of pigs into Hungary, successfully competing with the Hungarian farmer and cutting into his income. The Hungarians petitioned the border was left open. Finally, hearing the pleas of its people, the Austro-Hungarian Government, on the pretext that all Siberian pigs were diseased, placed an embargo in 1901.

"Up to that time the two governments had a more or less friendly understanding. After this both sides became irritated and practiced every method of hampering each other, in international trade. Political doctors in Siberia seized upon the pig incident. Austro-Hungarian diplomats took up the question. Misadventure followed over it. The embargo was manipulated until the pig incident supplanted many other big political questions. When it grew too odd for political proposition other questions were built out of it, and thus the world war was brought on.

"Yes, there is no doubt, pigs caused the war."

Washington, Dec. 6.—President Wilson will see Senator Fall and ditch back at 2:30 this afternoon to discuss the Mexican situation.

Senator Fall announced that immediately after the conference he would make public the evidence he used his charges in the senate that the Mexican ambassador and Mexican consuls in the United States were circulating Red propaganda.

Senators Fall and Hitchcock were named a committee yesterday by the foreign relations committee to confer with the president and seek his views on the resolution of Senator Fall requesting the president to sever diplomatic relations with the Mexican government.

Senator Hitchcock's substitute proposing that entrance visas be granted to break with Mexico, also will be presented to the president.

Senator Hitchcock, it was learned at the White House, commiserated with Secretary Taft's last night regarding the conference, and said it was not necessary for president to see the senators immediately, but the president wished to have the conference today.

The senators will go to the White House after the president's cabinet meeting, a special meeting, at which the Mexican situation will be discussed.

The meeting was called by Secretary Lansing, who spent two hours yesterday discussing the Fall and Hitchcock resolutions and the Mexican situation in general with the foreign relations committee.

## GERMANY APPEARS SEEKING TROUBLE

Paris, Dec. 5.—Coercion is the only argument likely to make an impression upon Germany and induce them to sign the protocol to the peace treaty, according to today's newspapers. It is said this conclusion was reached at a secret session of the Council of Five yesterday, at which Gen. Foch was present. It is reported that Gen. Foch undertook to execute the plan drawn last June, the mere threat of which brought the German plenipotentiaries to Versailles. During the meeting Premier Clemenceau and Gen. Foch stated that the unexpected departure of the German delegates and the complicated points raised by the enemy left no doubt whatever of the necessity of taking action.

## MEXICANS RAID STORES AND RANCH

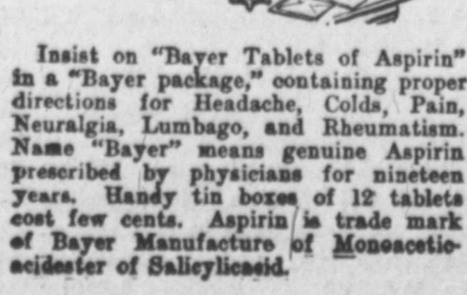

## MINERS MAINTAIN HOSTILE ATTITUDE

Chicago, Ill., Dec. 5.—Efforts of the governors of at least ten states to have sufficient coal mined for domestic consumers and the absolutely essential industries marked the progress today in the strike of the bituminous coal miners. Restrictions have been placed on the consumption of fuel throughout the country from New York to the Sierra Nevada Mountains, as the situation at the mines showed virtually no improvement and the miners maintained an attitude of hostility toward the 14 percent increase.

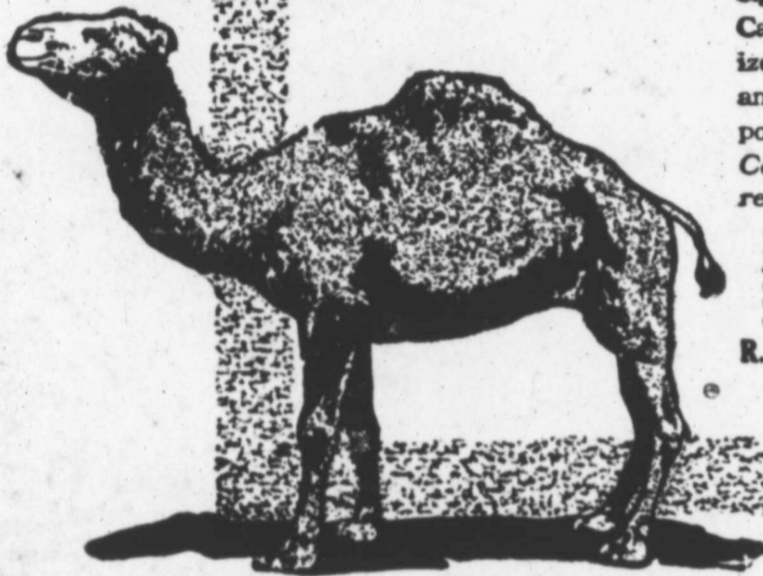

## PLAN TO ELIMINATE THE "WORK SLACKER."

Eliminating the "work slacker" is the new job which the American Legion has taken upon itself, acting in conjunction with the war department's chain of employment bureaus throughout the country. This type of ex-service man, while not numerous, is occasionally a serious detriment to the work of placing ex-soldiers and sailors in satisfactory jobs. Their attitude of shiftlessness after getting the place causes dissatisfaction among employers who are really trying to help, and gives a black eye to other service men who still need work.

Practically all the posts of the Legion now have employment committees race taken over all the task of finding jobs for their fellow service men. In other localities they cooperate with the War Department. In Bridgeport, Conn., where the work slacker has been a serious evil, the Legion keeps a special file of such classes of repeating in jobs. As a rule a heart to heart talk from a comrade in arms has been enough. In other cases a refractory man has been denied the services of the employment office altogether.

In Detroit the Legion works also with the police. Where an ex-soldier in uniform is taken up for some minor offense, like begging or peddling, a probationary system has been adopted. Instead of sending these men to jail, the authorities have consented to put them on probation with the American Legion. This practice has had a very salutary effect, and Detroit's problem of putting to work every returned fighting man is no longer so serious.

Paris, Dec. 8.—Germany will be called upon in a rigorous note which the Supreme Council completed Saturday to yield immediately to the Allied demands that the protocol of the peace treaty of Versailles be signed, according to The Excelsior newspaper, which says it has reliable information that Washington has advised Berlin to adopt a more conciliatory attitude.

## MUSIC HATH CHARMS FOR DISABLED VETERANS

Many of the disabled veterans who applied to the Federal Board for Vocational Education for retraining express a desire to be given a musical education.

If the applicant has had any previous experience, either instrumental or vocal, and has sufficient education to continue, an expert is called in who gives his opinion. If the expert's report is favorable the veteran gets his opportunity.

Some of the men who have already been granted this training have made some requests the Board which, if complied with, would soon bring financial ruin to the Government. One veteran requested that he be furnished with a harp costing twelve hundred dollars; another wanted a grand piano costing fourteen hundred dollars. A future Mozart wanted the Board to furnish him with a two hundred fifty dollar violin.

According to an Act of Congress, the Federal Board is permitted to furnish necessary instruments to complete a musical education but find it impossible to meet demands for grand pianos, thousand dollar harp and two hundred fifty dollar violins.

## WESTERN OILMEN BE PROSECUTED

Washington, Dec. 8.—Prosecution of Western oil producers for alleged profiteering was ordered by Attorney General Palmer Saturday on complaint of Senator Capper of Kansas. Agents were instructed to proceed at once against those producers who have taken advantage of the fuel shortage in the West to increase the price of their product. Simultaneously the Railroad Administration established an embargo, effective Monday, against shipments of fuel oil from the West to points east of Chicago and St. Louis. This action was necessary, it was explained, to conserve the small quantities of coal available for the territory west of the Mississippi River and compel, where possible, the use of fuel oil instead.

Senator Capper said the oil producers had increased prices from \$1 to \$4.50 per barrel since the strike.

## A WARNING FROM THE ASTROLOGERS

The following is a clipping from a Big Springs paper, which was originally published in The St. Paul (Minn.) Daily News.

### Warning Storms to Close This Year Good Year

The Editor of the Pot Worth Record has been raking Weather Prophet Pinner over the coals for predicting severe storms for the middle of October, November and December. Pinner did not tell why the storms were coming, but he says severe weather changes are caused by the movement of the planets. Some people think the planets are mere stars twinkling in the sky, while as a matter of fact they are bodies of matter, just as the earth is a great body of matter, swinging around the sun, and the vibrations of electricity from these bodies may cause the weather conditions but they are also causing the mental unrest that is now sweeping the country.

It is estimated that the planet Mercury travels 107,012 miles per hour, while Neptune travels a little over 10,000 miles per hour. The others travel at varying speeds. A very unusual thing is to occur on December 17, 1919 when Neptune, Jupiter, Saturn, Mars, Venus and Mercury will swing around and pull on the same side of the sun at a given time. The earth will be in such a position at that time that it will be liable to receive a very great shock. Since no one is living on this planet that was here when all of these planets were in that position before, there is no telling what is to be the outcome. The moon could be flung away from the earth and become an independent planet, the Bible speaks of that, or a series of awful storms could occur. It might become so cold that the proverbial "brass monkey" would shiver for the lack of warmth from the sun. But whatever happens, it will be very unusual. Everybody should be ready for any emergency.

D. Fudge of this city subscribes for the St. Paul (Minn.) Enterprise, which reproduces a picture and an article from the St. Paul (Minn.) Daily News, and has loaned this paper to the Review. The article is by Prof. Albert F. Porta, who must be an astrologer and weather prophet of great ability. His article is as follows:

Owing to a strange grouping of six mighty planets, such as has not been in a score of centuries, the United States, next December, will be swept by the most terrific weather calamity experienced since human history began. It will be caused by the highest sunspot on record—a sunspot that will be visible to the naked eye. Since man first began to make records of events, no sunspot has been large enough to see without the aid of instruments. This one will be. The sunspot that will appear December 17, 1919, will be a vast wound in the side of the sun. It will be a gigantic explosion of flaming gases, leaping hundreds of thousands of miles out into space. It will have a crater large enough to engulf the earth as Venusian might engulf a football.

Such a sunspot will be rich enough in electro-magnetic energy to fling out planets into a disturbance without precedent or parallel. There will be hurricanes, lightning, colossal rains. It will be weeks before the earth will regain its normal weather conditions.

There will also be gigantic lava eruptions, great earth quakes, to say nothing of the floods and fearful cold. I make this startling prophecy with no desire to be merely sensational or alarming. It is merely because my study of the planets have revealed certain results with authentic certainty that I now say to you.

"Be warned in advance. Tremendous things are going to happen from December 17 to December 20, 1919, and afterwards". Here are the simple yet astounding facts that enable me to make this prophecy. The planets in their orbit swing in great ellipse about the sun. They are linked to the sun, and to each other by chains of electro-magnetic energy whose compelling forces counteract each other and hold each planet in its regular path. Whenever two planets wheel into such positions that they pull together on the sun—either in conjunction on the same side of the sun or in opposition with the sun between them—their united pull causes the sun's gases to "explode" to leap out into space in the whirling volcano we call a sunspot.

These sunspots in turn cause storms in the atmosphere of our earth—sometimes no other planets as well. Two planets are enough to cause a small sunspot and a small storm. Three cause a larger one—four make a very great storm indeed. But—as December 17, 1919, no less than seven planets will pull jointly on the sun. These will include all the mightiest planets, those with the most powerful pull. Six of them—Mercury, Mars, Venus, Jupiter, Saturn and Neptune—will be in conjunction; grouped together in the greatest "League of Planets" ever known in the annals of astronomy.

They will be engaged in narrow limit of about 26 degrees, on the same side of the sun. Directly opposite, coming into opposition with the gigantic league, will be the huge planet Uranus and the six planets will plow the sun like a mighty spear. Our earth is outside the league at an angle of nearly 90 degrees—in fact just in the position to receive almost the full force of the combined electrical disturbances as it leaps like a cork on wind, to us, will be the eastern horizon of the sun's disk. This means we shall get the full strength of the storm when the sunspot is at its zenith, before the exploding gases have had time to disperse.

Such a grouping of planets has never been recorded before. The whole solar system will be significantly out of balance. What will be the outcome? My knowledge does not permit me to state, beyond the fact that the storms, eruptions and earthquakes will be tremendous in their strength and scope. Remember the date—December 17 to 20 and advise.

NOTE—The above article was reproduced in the Enterprise because of the demand made for it. Over 700 copies went out in a hurry and orders for hundreds keep coming in. And quick a few letters with questions were received. We take this opportunity of saying: We do not know anything further, nor are we sure that the earth will give off one little note of a quiver. However, we would not be at all surprised if the earth were "red" and "red" as a drunkard" (Isa. 24:20) and "remove out of its place" (Isa. 9:13-14) synchronously with the great symbolical earthquake, when earth's society shall quake with fear and forebodings at transpiring events, which the Bible predicts for the very near future. We should remember that the words "red" and "remove" above have the significance of waving or vibrating in the original. There is a theory that the time is coming when the earth shall swing square on its axis and cease its wobbling. The earth has an "equatorial inclination" of 23 1/2 degrees which makes the sun appear to move southward and northward over the equator—this is the earth's wobble. But the sun does not move up and down nor does the earth. Some have theorized that the icebergs breaking away from the arctic region, would cause the earth to swing square on its axis; but if gravitation should govern the movements it would swing the wrong way and the equatorial inclination would be greater than ever, for the Southern Hemisphere is heavier now than the Northern. The earth is egg-shaped, with the bulge or greater roundness south of the equator. If the earth should swing square with its axis, the sun always on the equator, it would have to swing down at the north, throwing the North Star higher overhead. All planets have an "equatorial inclination" some more, some less, and we are inclined to the views that the earth will always have for this reason. (Gen. 8:22)—"While the earth remaineth (Ec. 7:4) seed time and harvest and cold and heat, summer and winter, and day and night shall not cease." Should the earth's equatorial inclination be lessened and the rotary speed retarded or quickened, it would not interfere with the text). Luke 21, Chap. 25-28.

25. "And there shall be signs in the sun, and in the moon, and in the stars; and upon the earth distress of nation, with perplexity; the sea and the waves roaring. 26. Men's hearts failing them for fear, and for looking after those things which are coming on the earth; for the powers of Heaven shall be shaken. 27. And then shall they see the Son of Man coming in a cloud with power and great glory. 28. And when these things begin to come to pass, then look up, and lift up your heads; for your redemption draweth nigh.

## NACOGDOCHES MAY STAMP OUT MALARIA IF IT WILL.

Austin, Tex., December 8.—Acting upon a suggestion of Representative W. E. Thomason of Nacogdoches that that city would be interested in anything that would serve to reduce the number of malarial cases annually reported there, State Health officer C. W. Stoddard has added Nacogdoches to the list of towns in East Texas that will be surveyed relative to putting into operation a campaign to stamp out the malaria mosquito.

For the purpose of making this survey, W. E. Hardenburg, sanitary engineer, from the bureau of Sanitary Engineering of the State Board of Health, and Dr. R. L. Howell, also of the State Health Department, will with in a few days visit Nacogdoches for the purpose of making a preliminary survey of the conditions existing there. After this survey, should the city officials and the citizens generally manifest enough interest in the project, a detailed survey of that vicinity will be made and the cost of the work estimated. The surveys will be without cost to the city, but if it is decided that the work of eradicating the mosquito pests is to be undertaken there the city will be asked to assume a part of the financial outlay. The amount of the cost will be determined after the survey has been made and the State Health Department learns amount can be secured from the International Health Association for doing the work. It is probable, however, that the city will be asked to pay for the labor and supplies necessary for the work. Just what the expenses will be and how much of this the State Health Department will be able to procure for the work will be determined after the city has stated the steps that it will be willing to take in the matter, and the assistance of the citizens generally.

The amount that will be necessary to eliminate the mosquito from that vicinity, however, will be small in comparison to the annual economic loss resulting from the annual number of cases of malaria throughout the section, and after the work has once been accomplished it will be an easy matter to continue it from year to year with very little additional expense. This work, the matter of preliminary surveys, is now being conducted in several towns in East Texas, and it is the belief of the State Board that quite a number of them will take advantage of the assistance offered in stamping malaria out of this section.

## GERMANY WINS WHEN SHE LOSES

Paris, Dec. 8.—The Allies have consented to modify some of the terms of the protocol putting the peace treaty into effect to which Germany made objection.

The clause providing for indemnity for the destruction of the German fleet at Scapa Flow has been modified so as to refer it to The Hague tribunal. The question is whether delivery of the tonnage demanded will cripple Germany, it is understood.

The understanding is that the other features most objectionable to Germany have been eliminated. It is expected the German plenipotentiaries will sign the protocol without further delay.

The final paragraph of the protocol that even after the peace treaty had gone into effect the Allies might use military measures of coercion to insure the execution of the treaty's terms has been eliminated entirely, as has also the clause relating to the evacuation of the Baltic provinces by German troops.

If foreign born, naturalized or aliens, if naturalized what year? If attended school any time since September 1st, A. D. 1919. Whether able to read or write any language. If native, in what state born? If foreign born in what country? Whether able to speak English. Occupation, if any, whether employed working on own account or for wages or salary. The same information desired relative to the wife; children, relatives, servants, roomers or boarders residing in the same house. Children permanently employed elsewhere are not to be given in.

This information may be given either by the wife or husband; and either the wife or husband, and either should be prepared to give said information on a moment's notice so as not to delay enumerator.

## ADDITIONAL INFORMATION FURNISHED BY FARMERS

Farmers should have the following ready so as not to delay the enumerators. Whether he owns the farm or not, and if owned, whether mortgaged, debt or other encumbrance on the land. Produced on farm in 1919: Corn, hay, peanuts, peas, potatoes, sugarcane, fruits, and quantity of each of these sold. Number of horses, mules, cattle, sheep, goats, hogs, chickens, turkeys, geese, guineas, raised and number sold. Quantity of milk, butter, eggs, produced and sold.

The information given the enumerator is strictly confidential and under no circumstances to be used for taxing purposes.

Any person giving false information or refusing to answer questions propounded him by the enumerator is subject to indictment and prosecution in the federal courts.

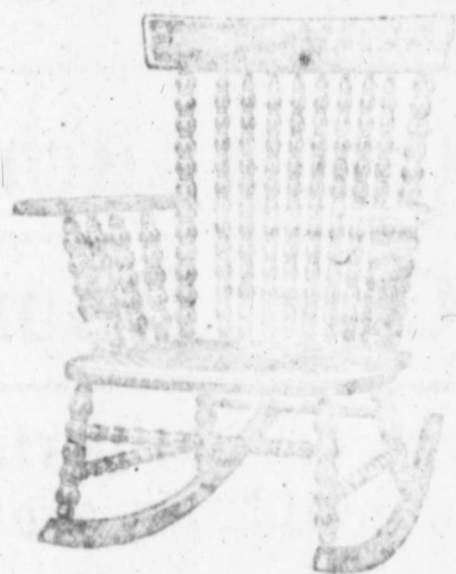

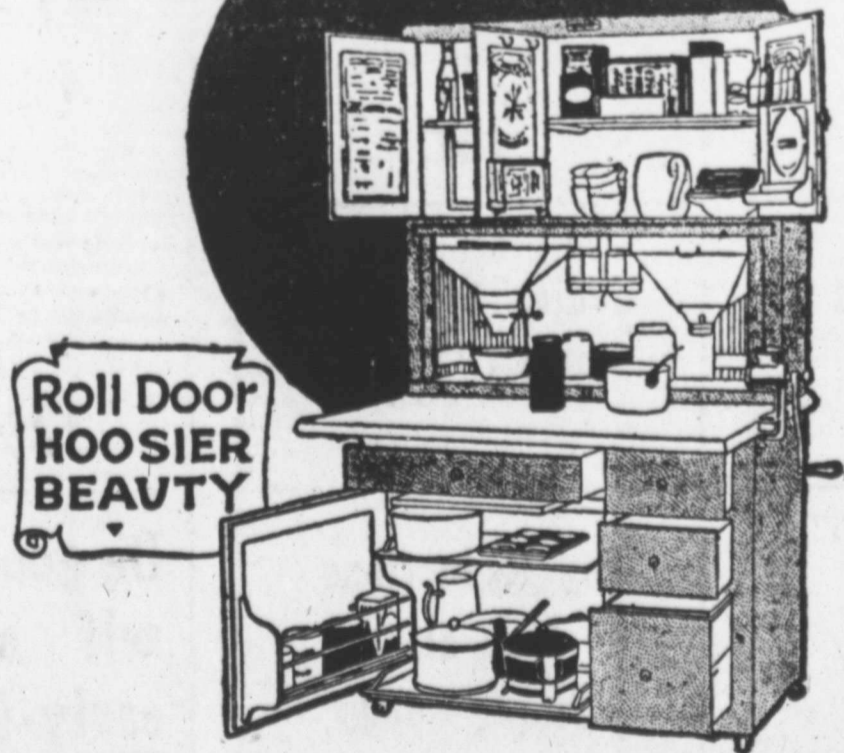
