APPALING DEATH RATE OF PRISONERS IN RUSSIA

Washington, D. C., Jan. 27.-Nearly 375,000 of the half million Austro-Hungarian prisoners of war taken by Russians have perished in Siberia from smallpox and typhus, according to Vladivostok dispatches to the International Red Cross headquarters here. The rest keep alive only by the efficient work of the Japanese, American and English doctors who have been assigned to different towns along the Trans-Siberian railroad.

For two years he had a pharmacy on the corner of what is now Chadbourne street and Beauregard avenue, where the Lone Star Drug Company is now situated. 





