LABORERS IN POLITICS.

St. Louis, Mo., Feb. 11.-With the object of electing laborers to political office, H. B. Perham of this city, former vice president of the American Federation of Labor and past president of the Order of Railroad Telegraphers has established the "Workingmen's Political Information Bu-

The bureau's slogan is "Send working people to congress," and Mr. Perham explained the bureau would strive to foster political constructiveness. It will be nonpartisan, he emphasized.

Mr. Perham deplored the preponderance of lawyers in congress, and said the bureau would work to replace them with laborers.

Statistics compiled by the bureau show that of the 435 members of the house of representatives, 269 are lawyers-103 more than all the others

The compilation follows: Reals estate, 5; farmers, 7; merchants, 13; bankers, 15; manufuacturers and pubogy, 9 each; doctors, insurance and railroad engineers, 3 each; authors, financiers, horticulturists, iron workers, lumbermen, molders, and towing, 2 each; advertising, coal, cattle-buyer, contractor, dentist, editor, fruit' grower, glassworker, gas and electric, grain, hatmaker, miner, mine owner, minister, oil and gas, railroad conductor, railroad president, shipping, soldier and wholesale, 1 each; and 269 lawyers. The bureau has no record of the private life positions of the remaining 49 members. However, Mr. Perham said, he had learned they were not of the legal profession.



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GOVERNMENT HELPS DISABLED SOLDIERS

Surgeon General Blue Calls Attention to Free Treatment Provided under Recent Legislation.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 11.-Because discharged, sick, or disabled soldiers do not know the extent of Federal aid they are entitled to, a great many of them are buying their own artificial limbs, paying for medical attention, or neglecting themselves, in spite of the fact that they can get the very best of treatment from the government.

Reports reaching the United States Public Health Service from stations where hospitals are in opreation for the benefit of discharged soldiers, sailors, marines and war nurses, show that a great number of men who served in the war and were injured have never fully understood the provisions of the legislation supplementing the war risk insurance act. Under the terms of this legislation the Public Health Service has established hospitals at convenient places throughout the United States for the free treatment of any member of the Military Establishment whose disability may be traced to service with military, or naval forces. These are civilian hosoitals, not under army discipline.

The bill provides that the men are entitled to a free medical examination to determine the extent of their disability. If found to be disabled the war risk bureau will pay them compensation according to the extent of the disability, and if the case requires it will direct that they be admitted to the most convenient public health service hospital or sanatorium.

The hospital furnishes artificial limbs, etc., free. It also examines the eyes to see whether glasses are needed and looks after the teeth. 
