# GALVESTON WHEAT EPORTS

Galveston, Texas, Feb. 16.-Exports of wheat from the port of Galveston for the month of January totaled 881,-063 bushels, according to records compiled by H. A. Wickstrom, chief of the grain inspection department of the Galveston Cotton Exchange and Board of Trade. Exportation of wheat in January, 1919, aggregated 594,000 bushels. During the period beginning July 1, 1919, and ending January 31, 1920, 13,828,918 bushels of wheat have been shipped from this port. This compares with 4,920,024 bushels during the corresponding period a year ago.



Freight rates have played a very small part in the rising cost of living.

Other causes—the waste of war, under-production, credit inflation—have added dollars to the cost of the necessities of life, while freight charges have added only cents.

A suit of clothing that sold for \$30 before the war was carried 2,265 miles by rail from Chicago to Los Angeles for 16½ cents.

Now the freight charge is 22 cents and the suit sells for \$50.

The cost of the suit has increased 20 dollars.

The freight on it has increased only 51 cents.

Other transportation charges enter into the cost of the finished article-carrying the wool to the mills and the cloth to the tailors -but these other charges amount to but a few cents more.


The \$10 pair of shoes that used to sell for \$5 goes from the New England factory to the Florida dealer for a freight charge of 533 cents—only one cent more than the pre-war rate.

Beef pays only two-thirds of a cent a pound freight from Chicago to New York.

# TO "CONQUER AND DESTROY STATE," U. S. COMMUNISTS CALL FOR LABOR REVOLT

Revolutionary Pamphlet, Found in U. S. Department of Justice Investigations, Gives Message of Communists in Chicago to Russian Headquarters.

Extracts from "Manifesto and Program-Constitution-Report to the Communist International" by the Communist Party of America,

Communism does not propose to 'capture' the bourgeoise parliamentary state, but to conquer and destroy it. As long as the bourgeoise state prevails,

the capitalist class can baffle the will of the proletariat. In those countries in which historical development has furnished the opportunity, the working class has utilized the regime of political democracy for its organization against Capitalism.

The older unionism was based on the craft divisions of small industry. The unions consisted primarily of skilled workers whose skill is itself a form of property. The unions were not organs of the militant class struggle. Today the dominant unionism is actually a bulwark of Capitalism, merging in Imperialism and accepting State Capitalism.

The proletarian revolution comes at the moment of crisis in Capitalism, a collapse of the old order. Under the impulse of the crisis, the proletariat acts for the conquest of power, by means of mass action. Mass action concentrates and mobilizes the forces of the proletariat, organized and unorganized; it acts equally against the bourgeois state and the conservative organizations of the working class. Strikes of protest develop into general political strikes and then into revolutionary mass action for the conquest of the power of the state. Mass action becomes political in purpose while extra-parliamentary in form; it is equally a process of revolution and the revolution itself in operation.

The Communist Party is the conscious expression of the class struggle of the workers against capitalism. Its aim is to direct this struggle to the conquest of political power, the overthrow of capitalism and the destruction of the bourgeois state.

The Communist Party prepares itself for the revolution in the measure that it develops a program of immediate action, expressing the mass struggles of the proletariat. These struggles must be inspired with revolutionary spirit and purposes.

The Communist Party is fundamentally a party of action. It brings to the workers a consciousness of their oppression, of the impossibility of improving their conditions under capitalism. The Communist Party directs the workers' struggle against capitalism, developing fuller forms and purposes in this struggle, culminating in the mass action of the revolution.

The Communist Party shall make the great industrial struggles of the working class its major campaigns, in order to develop an understanding of the strike in relation to the overthrow of capitalism.

(a) The Communist Party shall participate in mass strikes, not only to achieve the immediate purposes of the strike, but to develop the revolutionary implications of the mass strike.

(b) Mass strikes are vital factors in the process out of which develops the workers' understanding and action for the conquest of power. (c) In mass strikes under conditions of concentrated capitalism there is



In other words, that out of the 11,000,000 Christian Filipinos, 8,000,000 of them at least live on their own farms, with houses of their own, independent of any absentee landlord or foreign master? That 91 per cent. of the urban property consisting of houses and lands is owned by the natives of the Philippines, and only 9 per cent, is in the hands of foreigners? LANSING RESIGNS AS SECRETARY OF STATE

Washington, D. C., Feb. 14. - Repuked by President Wilson for calling cabinet meetings during his illness, Secretary Lansing has resigned. The president has accepted his resignation with appreciation, and Lansing becomes the second secretay of state to leave the administration over a disagreement with his chief.

Although the correspondence between Mr. Lansing and the president makes the calling of cabinet meetings the incident which leads directly to the secretary's resignation, persons on the inside who know what has been going on say the real reasons for the break go back over a period of many months and come from fundamental differences of opinion in policy. The even antedate the entry of the United States into the war. The relations between them almost reached the breaking point in 1917 when Secretary Lansing issued his celebrated statement saying the United States was daily being drawn nearer and nearer war. The president made every effort to overtake the statement after it was given out by the state department, but it was impossible.

No information was available at the White House as to the probable sucessor to Secretary Lansing, but the appointment is expected to be made soon. John W. Davis, ambassidor to London, and undersecretary Polk are being discussed. Polk becomes secretary ad interim today, and will serve until a successor is named by the president.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 14.-Secretary Lane declared today that he considers himself "quite just as much responsible as secretary Lansing' for calling cabinet meetings during the president's illness. He said Lansing called him on the telephone and obtained his approval of the idea before calling the first meeting, and presumably secured the aproval of the other cabinet members also."


