STORM CAUSES LOSS OF LIFE AT MELROSE

From Monday's Daily.
One of the most tragic things that has happened in Nacogdoches county in a number of years happened Sunday night in the peaceful little village of Melrose, at the hour of about 8:30, when the Melrose church blew down before the fearful onslaught of a crashing hurricane.

The storm came unexpected when the crowd of Melrose people were in the church listening to a sermon which was being delivered by the Rev. McQuerry, a Methodist minister. It hit the little house with such a fury until it gave away, killing one person, Miss Clifford Muckleroy, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Muckleroy who live two miles east of Nacogdoches, and wounding one young man, Mr. Olan Gee. It is stated that almost everyone in the church sustained some kind of injuries. However, the two young persons named were the ones most injured by the crash.

Miss Muckleroy's injuries were not at first thought fatal, although it is thought that she barely knew anything after the terrible shock. She was caught between a falling wall and a bench, and mashed fatally. She died this morning at the home of a Melrose gentleman at an early hour. It is not known what the gentleman's name is at whose home she died, neither at what hour the young lady died.

Mr. Gee, the injured young man, sustained painful injuries, receiving a broken collar bone, a mashed arm and a painfully mashed stomach.

While his injuries are extremely painful, and is a nature quite serious, it is thought by attending physicians that he will recover, with good care. It is understood that Mr. Gee and Miss Muckleroy were sitting with each other at the church when the crash came, and both were the victims of the impact that killed Miss Muckleroy.

Aside from the havoc wrought upon the little church, it is reported that unlimited damage was inflicted upon the business houses of Melrose, the store belonging to Mr. Smith of that place being totally demolished. Some residential houses were smashed also, it is understood.

The storm made a wide sweep of the country and wrought much destruction upon the areas over which it traveled. Trees were blown down galore, and it is thought that stock in the locality has suffered. However, as yet no reports have been made to the exact loss in that respect.

The young lady, Miss Muckleroy was a well-known young lady of this city, comes of a prominent Nacogdoches family, and she was loved and admired by all her fellow-students at the Nacogdoches High School, of which she was a student.

Mr. Gee is also a high school student, and is a young man that is struggling to accomplish something in life. His many friends offer infinite sympathy.

GRAPHIC ACCOUNT OF MELROSE STORM BY EYE WITNESSES.

Immediately after writing the above information obtained from various sources in the city, the reporter was given the opportunity by Dr. Queen, who was going to Melrose, to go to Melrose and see personally the damage wrought by the terrible hurricane.

The first thing with which the visitor in that section is impressed is the utter desolation of Melrose and the vicinity adjoining. Approaching Melrose from the west, one finds trees galore blown down in the roadway—those which have not been removed by workmen who are working indefatigably to clear all obstructions, and as the spectator nears the once peaceful village, blown down houses, demolished fences, and general destruction greets the eye, telling in a mute way the sickening story of the terrible night just passed.

The storm carried a wide sweep. However, there are some peculiar instances connected with the storm. Here is a home completely destroyed, the furniture, bedding and all household effects scattered all hither and thither, as leaves by an autumn wind, while scarcely a hundred yards away, is a little cottage, unmovable, untouched and in as good a shape as if no terrible calamity had visited the section in which it was located. One side of the road is a home completely ruined; on the other side is a home untouched.

The reporter arrived at Mr. Frank Smith's home, the home in which the injured people are being cared for, about 10 o'clock this morning. Everyone in Melrose, including a large number of people from Nacogdoches were congregated at the home, trying to obtain some information as to the welfare of the injured persons within the house. Inside the house were scenes of a most touching nature. The young lady, Miss Clifford Muckleroy, who gave her life before the fury of the angry storm, was lying in one room giving mute but horrible testimony to the awfulness of the night which had just passed. Her remains showed evidence of terrible bruises about her head. She was neatly put away in a gown of beautiful white, and, despite of the pallor of death stamped upon her features, she was beautiful. In adjoining rooms were other victims who had received various kinds of injuries during the storm at the church house. In a room adjoining the one in which the remains of Miss Muckleroy were being kept, was Olan Gee, the young man who was sitting by Miss Muckleroy

at the time she received her fatal injuries. He was suffering indescribable pain, but with a stoicism that is too heroic for words, he refused to show signs of pain, despite of the dislocation of his shoulder, the bruised arm and the crushed leg which he sustained at the time the crash came.

Olan told the reporter, substantially the following: "We were all in the church, about twenty-five of us, at about 8.45 last night. Clifford, Alma Mabel and myself were sitting on the same bench talking. Rev. McQuerry, the minister, had not arrived to begin services. The lightning was flashing outside, and the thunder was roaring overhead. Suddenly, the wind came with a crash, and the next thing I knew we were all in a pile of debris. Clifford was crying to me in a voice of pain, 'Olan, save me! I am being killed! O!' I was unable to assist in the least possible way. My leg gave down under me. My shoulder was twisted and mashed so that I could not raise up. O. D. Haltom came to me, asked me if he could help me, and I referred him to Clifford, asking him to give her attention at once. I do remember, however, just before that dreadful crash, I told Clifford to fall between the benches in the building, as I did, and I think that she did so; but it is my opinion that in some unexplainable way, she was crushed by a piece of heavy timber falling between the benches. To make a long story short, they brought me here, and I have had the attention of a physician."

In the same room, Mrs. Austin Muckleroy was lying, suffering intensely from the shock, and painful wounds sustained on her head.

In other rooms were Misses Mabel Kendrick and Alma Muckleroy both of whom had sustained painful and serious injuries, Miss Alma getting a broken leg, broken arm, and several bruises, and Miss Mabel receiving severe injuries about the head. Both young ladies were unconscious at times during the night, but had recovered at the time mentioned. Miss Muckleroy recognized the Sentinel's reporter, asked him about school, she is a high school student, and evinced an unusual amount of calmness, notwithstanding the terrible pain she must have been enduring. Miss Kendrick was quiet, but made the statement that her head was not hurting her so much. Miss Alma Muckleroy is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Austin Muckleroy. And Miss Clifford Muckleroy, the young lady receiving fatal injuries, was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Muckleroy.

It is reported that Mrs. Grady Haltom is suffering intensely from painful injuries received in the storm, also Leslie Holt was reported to have had painful hurts. In the same house in which these were being kept, it is understood that there were others who were hurt, but the reporter did not visit the home.

Homes were blown down in every direction. Melrose is wrecked. Trees blown down lay everywhere. The little Christian church in which the calamity occurred presented the appearance of a pile of debris. The reporter was shown the locations where the people were sitting who were injured in the storm. O. D. Haltom was an eyewitness to the entire tragedy, and by a miracle came out unscathed. He said: "Just prior to the storm, thunder was roaring and lightning was playing on the outside, a sudden puff of wind came, and some of us jumped up to close the doors. I saw the house give way, and jumped as far as I could between some benches. The wall by which I was standing was picked up, thrown over my head, and I was left lying under the black and rainy sky. Cries from the women and injured ones rent the air. I, in a daze tried to do something as quickly as possible." And the rest of his story was a verification of the story given by Olan Gee.

Dr. Robinson of Melrose said that he was standing in his drug store when the crash came. His office was picked up fully one foot and set down. "I never heard such din in all my life," he said, "and I hope that I never will hear another one like it again."

The home of Mr. James Stallings was lifted off its blocks, and Mr. A. D. Brewer was left destitute by the storm, both of his homes were completely demolished. Only the bare

ground remained over which his home once stood.

He is a home booster first, last and all the time.

ABOUT ASSOCIATED PRESS NEWS.

The Sentinel understands that there are some individuals in the city who believe that its associated press news comes principally from the columns of the Houston Post, Dallas News and other papers printed out of the city.

The Sentinel regrets that such an incorrect idea could present itself to the mind of any individual. The Sentinel goes to great expense in getting, every day, Associated Press news fresh from the scene of happening. The news is delivered every day to the Sentinel office by the messenger boys of the Western Union Telegraph Co.

Occasionally an editorial is clipped from the columns of some other paper, but when such is done, the paper from which the article is clipped is always given credit for the article. The Sentinel gets to its Nacogdoches readers every day Associated Press news that could not possibly be gotten by them in less time than twelve hours later than the time they see it in the Sentinel. That is, Associated Press news in the Sentinel gets to its readers in Nacogdoches 12 hours earlier than the Houston papers, the Shreveport papers, the Dallas papers or the Galveston papers could possibly get the same news to them.

And please bear in mind, that the Sentinel receives each day from the local telegraph office its Associated Press news, and all the Associated Press news seen in its columns comes from that source. The Sentinel would be glad to see some of those who declare it is getting its Associated Press material at the expense of other papers, pay some of its telegraph bills. It believes that they would bring another tune.

THAT BASEBALL TEAM

Down at Lufkin, they are saying that it is not possible for the Nacogdoches boys to organize a baseball team that would compare with the much boasted team of Lufkin. The sport editor of the Sentinel would like to see that assertion called. Nacogdoches can, without half trying, put out a team that could easily carry away the trophies of all East Texas, including Lufkin. That is a broad assertion from one as meek and mild in his daily conduct and assertions as the Sentinel's sport editor; but it is a true one, nevertheless. The Sentinel's sport editor foretold how the Nacogdoches football team was going to lick the Lufkinites Thanksgiving; in fact, he went so strong on it subject that some have told him that had Nacogdoches lost on that memorable Thanksgiving, he would have been forced to leave the town. But his confidence was vindicated when the Nacogdoches boys licked the Lufkinites 27 to 6. As before stated, the sports editor has the same degree of confidence in the Nacogdoches' boys ability to play baseball as he had in their ability to play football; in fact, he believes that they could perhaps play baseball a bit better than they did football, as it is a milder sport. Let's organize a baseball team and carry away some trophies. Nacogdoches might as well have a baseball team as any other city.

A SPLENDID IDEA.

The year 1920 witnesses in Texas what promises to be one of the most sensational gubernatorial campaigns in the history of a commonwealth. Four distinctly big men are out in the field for that honor. They are going over the state, meeting the citizens of every town, and are moulding sentiment for their respective causes.

Nacogdoches will be visited by all of them in due time. Mr. Pat M. Neff, the candidate that hails from Waco, has been to Nacogdoches a second time, and next week Senator J. W. Bailey will address the citizens of Nacogdoches at a prearranged place by his friends, Mr. Thomason of West Texas, it is reported, will also speak here some time next week, the date not divulged.

The Sentinel advanced the idea in yesterday's paper that a large crowd should be present, give Mr. Bailey a good hearing, and do everything possible to make his stay in Nacogdoches a pleasant one. The Sentinel says the same thing in reference to the visit of Mr. Thomason. Nacogdoches turned out splendidly to hear Mr. Neff when he made his speech here, and the Sentinel appreciates their doing so. When Mr. Looney comes to make the acquaintance of the people of Nacogdoches more thorough, Nacogdoches should do everything within its power to make his stay one of the greatest pleasure.

Now, one of these men is going to be governor of Texas another term.

And the man elected to that high office will remember the towns which impressed him as towns carrying the greatest number of progressive features. Superintendent R. F. Davis of the Nacogdoches High School says that if a public spirit can be aroused in Nacogdoches for the citizens to give a public reception to the candidates that visit here a warm reception, he will take pride in giving the high school students, if agreeable with everyone, the privilege of turning out and hear the candidates deliver their addresses while in the campaigns. He proposes, that if a warm public reception is given Mr. Bailey by the citizens of Nacogdoches next Wednesday, to allow all the high school students to attend the speaking. There is wisdom in this, Mr. Bailey is one of the most accomplished orators, one of the best informed men of the day, and the students of any high school, regardless of what political opinions the man might have, could well afford to hear such a man. The same thing applies to Mr. Neff, Mr. Looney, Mr. Thomason, or any other man noted to be an artist in some particular line.

Mr. Davis' suggestion is a splendid idea. All Nacogdoches should turn out and give all the candidates for governor a warm reception and most certainly the students of the high school should be allowed the profitable opportunity of hearing all of these men speak.

It is understood that Garrison farmers want at least 50 farmhands of Mexicans if they can possibly be obtained. Of course, the probability of the Mexicans proving to be an unpaying experiment in this particular presents itself to the farmers and business men of the county who are on the verge of sending after the Mexicans, but the majority of the business men think that the Mexicans could be moulded into good workmen within a short time, and that good service could probably be gotten out of their labor. The native Mexicans of this county declared that they will enter into the spirit of the affair, and do everything in their power to make the strange Mexicans acquainted with local conditions and customs. Right here the idea suggests itself that native Mexicans could be hired as overseers to superintend the imported Mexicans, and with that the case there is no cause to prevent the imported Mexicans becoming a paying proposition. Nacogdoches county seriously needs the labor, her farmers need the laborers, and her farmers are clamoring for the help. The people of the city should have a public meeting and discuss the matter. No time should be lost.

Mr. Frank Garrison, a prominent business man of Garrison, reports that oil development in the vicinity of Garrison is showing up extremely well, according to Mr. R. B. Walthall who spent a part of Wednesday at Garrison attending to some business. Mr. Walthall says that Garrison is the scene of much oil excitement, and that oilmen are coming to Garrison from everywhere. The Garrison well is down about 2250 feet, and the drilling is being continued as fast as possible. It is not known just how deep the well is to be drilled, but it is understood that the company drilling the well is planning to go to the last extremity in seeing what the territory around Garrison will produce. Mr. Walthall says that the road between Garrison and the oil well that is being drilled is kept full of passengers and sight seers who go out to see what is being done by the drilling gang. Gas in the Garrison well has already been encountered.

County Attorney L. G. King says that it should be a great source of gratification to any true citizen of Nacogdoches to see some of the fine roads that are being built between the city and the Angelina river toward Alto. Mr. King says that the men are doing some splendid work on the roads, and that within sixty days some fine roads will be enjoyed in that section. He is very enthusiastic over the situation. In the meantime, surveying is going on over the county so that other contracts can be let out in the near future. Nacogdoches is really getting herself in a class that will be a mark of distinction to be a resident in her confines. Boost the county and the hometown; if they are prosperous, you will be, too.

M. T. WILSON DEAD.

M. T. Wilson, son of Mrs. R. R. Wilson of Nacogdoches, died Friday night at his home in Chireno, aged about 40 years. He had been an invalid several years, and his death was not unexpected, though it caused profound grief. He leaves a wife, his mother, one sister, and one brother, who have the deep sympathy of all. Interment will be made at 3:30 Saturday afternoon at Chireno.

FREEZE DAMAGE NOT SO BAD.

Tyler, Texas, April 9.—An examination of several orchards in this vicinity made by M. E. Hayes of the horticultural department of the A. & M. College, discloses the fact that damage done to fruit by the recent freeze was not so great as was first reported. It is possible that the damage to the peach crop will not exceed fifty percent, and, with an unusually heavy setting of fruit buds, that part which weathered the freeze will make a fairly good crop. The examination was made upon the request of the East Texas Chamber of Commerce.

"In different orchards and different sections of the same orchard I found varying amounts of fruit killed. At this time it is impossible to tell the actual damage done the crop, but if as much as 25 percent of the crop remains uninjured, and the percentage will run higher than that, it will pay the grower to continue his summer spraying to safe guard that which is left on the trees. If the fruit that escaped the freeze is matured it will mean a fair crop and the peaches ought to be large and of good quality. I would urge every grower to make a careful examination of his orchard before suspending spraying operations to do away with summer insects and diseases.

The A. & M. official will visit a number of towns in East Texas on a similar mission. He left today for Greenville and Sulphur Springs.

Tyler, Texas, April 9.—Advises received from President E. B. Alford of the East Texas Chamber of Commerce, who is in Washington with Gov. Hobby in an effort to prevent the establishing of a quarantine against Texas Cotton, is to the effect that a quarantine will not be established, but that a special session of the legislature will likely be called in May to deal with the pink boll worm situation.

A rather interesting little episode occurred Thursday when Sheriff Woodlan was called to the local depot office to apprehend some thieves who had stolen an overcoat. Some one at the office notified Mr. Woodlan that an overcoat belonging to one of the employees at the office had been stolen, and a negro woman, the name not divulged, was supposed to have gotten the coat. Sheriff Woodlan gave the supposed thief a severe grilling and in the end she told him that the real thieves were two other negro women. These women were immediately found, and after a little conference with them, they admitted that they had stolen the coat. Both were given a heavy fine, which they were able to pay immediately, and were turned loose.

HOME FOR CHICAGO PHONE GIRLS.

Chicago, April 9.—A home for telephone girls with numerous recreations will be established here as a means of solving the traffic and housing problems. A fifty-six room apartment building, to house about eighty girls, is being converted by the telephone company, into a boarding house at an approximate cost of \$70,000. The dormitory will have a large service kitchen, dining room, laundry, and a number of sewing rooms. Each apartment will be furnished with a phonograph or piano. The building is expected to be open by June.

DEFEAT OF COMPULSORY MILITARY TRAINING CONCEDED.

Washington, April 8.—The defeat of the compulsory universal military training provision in the army reorganization bill is conceded by the senate proponents plan, and to stave off a vote on the issue they plan to substitute a program of voluntary training of four months for youths of nineteen years or over.

GALVESTON COTTON RECEIPTS INCREASE.

Galveston, Texas, April 9.—Comparative receipts of cotton in Galveston show that the month of March saw twice the number of bales come into this port than during the same month in 1919. During the month just ended 135,923 bales of cotton were taken into Galveston warehouses, while in March of 1919 the number was 114,727. Last month 26,196 more bales were received than during the month of February.

Export figures show that the trade through this port in cotton is gradually assuming a normal aspect. During March of this year 96,524 more bales of cotton were exported than in the same month of 1919, the figures for the month being 265,957 bales as compared with 169,433 in March 1919.

Cotton on hand in warehouses approximates 273,935 bales as against 233,038 in 1919.

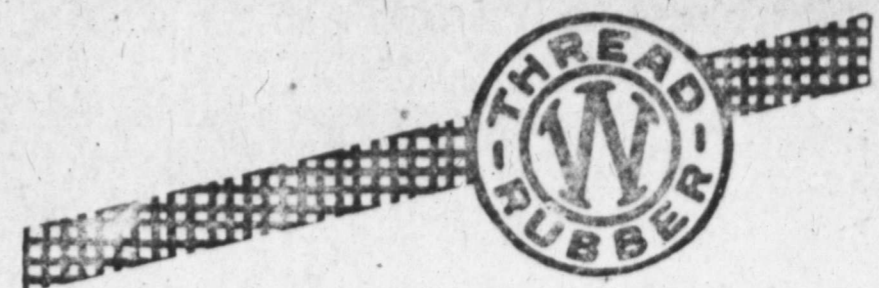
LONDON TIMES ATTACKS GOVERNMENTS ATTITUDE.

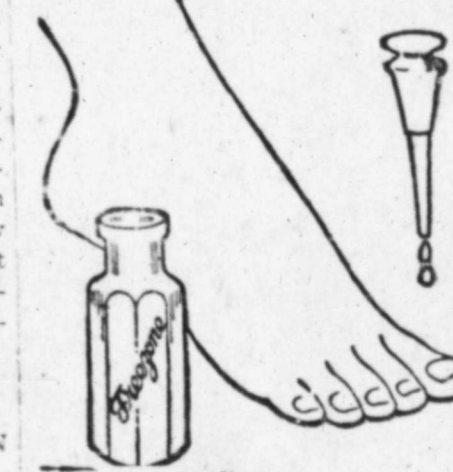
THE NAVY NEVER IN BETTER CONDITION

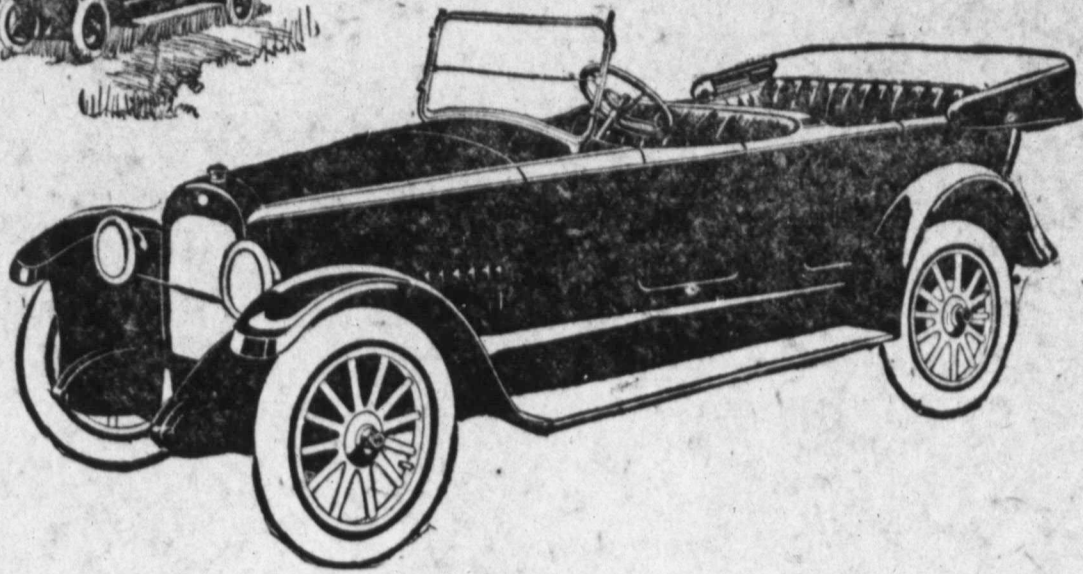
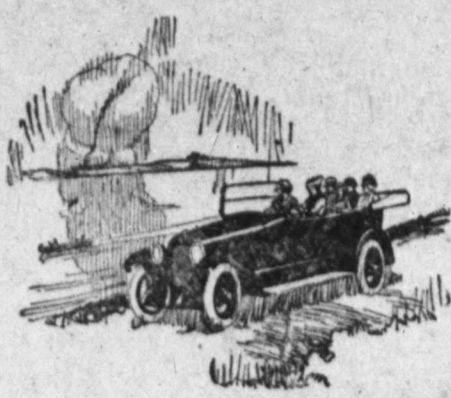

RAILROAD AGREES TO PAY TAX
County Judge J. M. Marshall and County Clerk I. D. Parmley returned last night from Houston where they went to represent Nacogdoches county in an effort to collect taxes due the county by the H. E. & W. T. and the T. & N. O. railroads. After quite a lengthy consultation with the head authorities and their attorneys, an agreement was reached whereby the railroads pay the county the entire taxes claimed by the county, amounting to \$25,753.14.

The hitch resulted from the railroads contention that they were not liable for the road bond tax on intangibles and rolling stock. The agreement provides that if the supreme court finally holds that the railroads are correct, the county will pay back that part of the taxes levied on intangibles.

With the collection of this money it puts the county out of debt and leaves a margin of about \$700. to spare.
