#### WARSHIPS HELD READY FOR POSSIBLE DUTY.

Washington, May 5.—Secretary Daniels today ordered a division of destroyers at New York with the Atlantic fleet to sail immediately for Key West, where they will be held for possible duty in Mexican waters. The destroyers are the Sherwood, Case, Lardner, Putnam, Beale and Reid. The flotilla will be commanded by Captain Byron Long, on the tender Black Hawk. Captain Long conferred with Secretary Daniels here last night and returned to New York to get the ships ready to sail.

#### INCREASED BREAD PRICE

Patrons of local bakeries were presented with another jolt the latter part of the previous week when, in calling for the usual purchases, they were informed that the price of the one-pound loaf had been increased to 15 cents, or two for 25 cents, and the 15 cent loaf had soared to 20 cents or two loaves for 35 cents.

The Sentinel man became curious to ascertain the cause of the jump, and set forth upon a tour of investigation. First he came into possession of a circular sent out by W. E. Long Company of Chicago, who operate a scientific service for bakers. This being official and absolutely fair in its statements, helped mightily.

We learned that a barrel of flour, like the Anchor Brand, such as is used by bakers in this section, cost \$13.80 delivered in this city and other common-point localities embraced in the railroad tariffs affecting Texas. This barrel of flour furnishes the material for making 305 one-pound loaves of bread. These loaves, sold at 15 cents each, would yield a return of \$45.75, leaving the baker a profit of \$31.95, less the cost of other ingredients and of labor.

It is learned that when flour cost \$17 per barrel there was no advance in the price of bread to equal the last. If the labor cost has increased proportionately, we have been unable to run down the beneficiary. Sugar has gone skyrocketing, it is true, but the breadmakers tell us that there is very little sugar used in the manufacture of this article. Yeast is high, but hardly high enough to justify an arbitrary increase in the price of bread from 25 to 50 percent. So far as can be learned, there has been no improvement in the quality of the bread on which the price has advanced from one-fourth to one-half. If there is a legitimate reason for this boosting of prices, the Sentinel has no complaint to offer. But District Food Administrator R. B. Walthall informed this paper Tuesday morning that as soon as he heard of the advance he got in touch with other towns under his jurisdiction and

found that Nacogdoches is the only point where prices have been thus advanced.

The Sentinel can suggest but one defense. The housewives of the city should arrange to do their own baking. This is, of course, not so convenient as phoning to the bakery for a supply, but it is about the only thing left for them to do in the present circumstances. We are not fighting the bakeries; the baker is entitled to a fair return on his product, but if the present prices yield him but a reasonable profit, if 15 cents for a pound loaf is legitimate compensation, we have no complaint to make. Certainly we would not have him to do business at a loss. No sensible patron expects that. But no other town in East Texas has made such an advance in prices, and we would urge our local bakeries to hold out a little longer on a lesser profit—to "tote fair" with the public.

There has been no general return to home-baking yet, we are informed, but the people will be driven to it if the present prices continue or higher ones adopted.

#### THE ANGELINA BRIDGE

It is more than likely that there will soon be a bridge over the Angelina river, between Lufkin and Nacogdoches, one that no commissioner court is to have anything to do with whatsoever. J. H. Buchanan of Shreveport, a former citizen of Lufkin, who comes here often, is here today, and thinks the bridge can be built by popular subscription, that is, a structure that will serve the purpose of travel. He was in Nacogdoches recently and reports the people of that city more than willing to contribute toward the project, and he is satisfied that all the merchants there will make liberal donations. In Lufkin today he was assured like liberal donations from this people. Mr. Coke Murphey of the Bonner Hotel subscribing \$50, and every car owner in the city, especially every one with a service car, will be glad to help in the good cause. Mr. Buchanan says much of the old lumber can be used, and that Mr. Luke Wright of this place will gladly supply what other material that is necessary at the least possible cost.

The suggestion has also been offered that when the material is on the ground, a call be made upon the citi-

zens of Lufkin and Nacogdoches to meet at the river and give one or more days' work. It is believed that hundreds will respond to a call like this. The News was just advised of this matter at about the noon hour, feels confident that it will succeed, and will have more to say concerning such a subject. In the meantime, think it over—and talk with Mr. Buchanan. We need the bridge, Nacogdoches needs it, and everybody needs it except those who have the power to build it.—Lufkin News.

### NACOGDOCHES TRADITIONS

Texas historic antiquities has been quite a popular theme in San Antonio for the past few weeks. This locality is a rich field for that reaping. Noted personages and notable events in this vicinity are numerous. For example, there is an old building in the oldest part of the city, located on the very bluff or bank of the tortuous San Antonio river. As was the usual custom in the pioneer days of the eighteenth century, known as Casino hall. It has served for many public uses for many years, and it has preserved a register of the names of many famous persons, among whom are names of the famous Humbolt, the Georgia poet, Sidney Lanier, General U. S. Grant, Jeff Davis, Robert E. Lee, and others. Lee was in San Antonio when Virginia seceded, and is remembered by old-timers.

The Texas Historical and Landmark Association recently held a big reception in Casino hall, under the inspiration of Miss Adina de Zavala, of distinguished ancestry. More recently the Texas Pioneer Association held its annual meeting in the historic old Menger Hotel, where the Daughters of the Republic did likewise. It occupies holy grounds adjoining the enshrined Alamo.

On the 2nd day of March, 1920, there were several formal celebrations enacted, in memory of the anniversary of the Texas Declaration of Independence, which is also Sam Houston's birthday. One of these celebrations was held in the famous San Pedro park, which is on the old road-site of the noted Kings Highway, or Camino Real. The first monumental milestone going eastward, marking this old road every five miles, stands there, and on this occasion it was the center of interest, where the formal presentation of this road to the State of Texas by the King's Highway Association was made, with flags, flowers and bunting, and patriotic oratory, and military music and display. Mrs. Lipscomb Norvelle of Beaumont was the distinguished leader of the activities, having assistance of other patriotic women of note Judge Norman G. Kittrell of Houston was the principal speaker, but there were other prominent speakers, one being the scholarly General Harbor of the U. S. Army. It was indeed an inspiring patriotic fete.

A remarkable feature of the occasion was a display of a huge map of the King's Highway, used as a broad background of the stage or rostrum, showing in great display this famous road from the Sabine river to the Rio Grande. Its course from the Sabine to Nacogdoches is slightly north of west. When it reaches the Neches river west of Alto, it drops more to the south, making a notable angle, and thus runs to San Antonio.

In these historic proceedings it is a matter of note to those who are posted that no notice is taken of Nacogdoches, and no mention is made of the preliminaries that this old city held in the history-making times. The fact that Houston, Austin, Travis, Fannin, Milam and Crockett first came to Nacogdoches which then was all Texas, and that this point was the fountain-head of so many important events, is overlooked. No one seems to have heard of General Thomas J. Rusk, who was truly a most important leader in the battle of San Jacinto, and the great events of that time; and the notable undated Old Stone Fort of Nacogdoches is never referred to as the magnet that attracted the white pioneers from the states, which made Texas and that the very name of Texas was first used geographically in Nacogdoches county, about a mile west of Douglass. The Indian tribes then living in that vicinity were designated as "Tejas", because they had dwellings covered with split boards called tejas in Spanish, the first civilized language that was introduced there by Catholic priests.

The old Alamo, the chapel which was merely a church in the extensive mission, is now kept sacred by a Mrs. Applewhite, a descendant of a distinguished pioneer, under appointment by the Daughters of the Republic.

There are many historic souvenirs, relics and mementoes kept there, and pictures of our great leaders, but no pictures of Rusk or the Old Stone Fort. It reminds us of the play of Hamlet without Hamlet. Monuments showing old landmarks of historic interest are both educational and patriotic.

### C.-D. PENCIL PUSHER VISITS HIS OLD HOME.

Larkin Day, an old time Nacogdoches county boy, now located at Wewoka, Okla., in the newspaper business, recently visited relatives in this section, and wrote the following concerning us for his paper, the Wewoka Capital-Democrat:

The writer has just returned from a ten days vacation in southeast Texas his old home. Many wonderful changes have taken place in that country since he was a boy, particularly with reference to the methods of agriculture and stock raising. Pine timbered, sandy land, that once sold high at one dollar an acre has been converted into productive fields under the touch of diversified scientific farming and commands handsome prices.

Farmers in that section of the state no longer depend upon cotton and corn for their money crop altogether as in days gone by. There are thousands of acres of orchards and truck farms, and the bottom lands being adapted to the culture of ribbon cane many farmers have turned their attention to this profitable industry.

We saw, in our candid judgment, enough lumber along the right-of-way on the Texas & New Orleans railroad, the Houston, East & West Texas, and Santa Fe branch to supply the demands of the United States for the next ten years without cutting another board, and the mills, hundreds of them, are running double shift. One manager with whom we talked was complaining that the price had gone down on an average of \$20 per thousand in the last 60 days.

That section of the country being farther south and garden truck, crops and fruit therefore farther advanced than in this section of Oklahoma, the Easter Sunday freeze damaged them almost beyond computation. At Jacksonville, said to be the center of the great fruit and truck district, we were told that the fruit was damaged at least 50 percent and that the tomato crop was a total loss. Crops are later than usual this year due to the late spring and excessive rains.

Because of the prevailing high price of farm labor, farmers have hesitated about hiring help, and, like many other sections of the country, an unusual amount of land is lying idle. The high prices that are being paid for cattle has also reduced the supply, and big herds are an exception, although it is a fine stock country.

Nacogdoches, our old home, is a fine little city of probably 8,000 people. The business streets have been paved, factories and great mills surround the city, magnificent business blocks of brick and stone have replaced the frame structures that were once familiar to us and the new federal building, courthouse, schools, churches and other public institutions fully attest the public spiritedness of her business and professional men.

Center, the county seat of Shelby county, had grown beyond recognition. Scores of new homes and business houses are being constructed at the present time.

While there is no place we have ever seen that looks as good to us as Wewoka and Seminole county, we are bound to admit that East Texas is a great country and is developing her natural resources at a wonderful pace. Oil development has also struck that country and indications are that a great shallow field will be found during the present year.

It was a great trip. We feel better, whether we look any better or not. The grind of the print shop does not seem so burdensome and it is a pleasure to get back in the harness.

Mr. and Mrs. R. P. Johnson went to Nacogdoches last Thursday. Mrs. Johnson will receive treatment at the sanitarium. While her condition is much better than it was some time ago, she was not improving as fast as was hoped for. With the special care she will receive, it will be only a short time until her health will be restored.—Cushing Journal.

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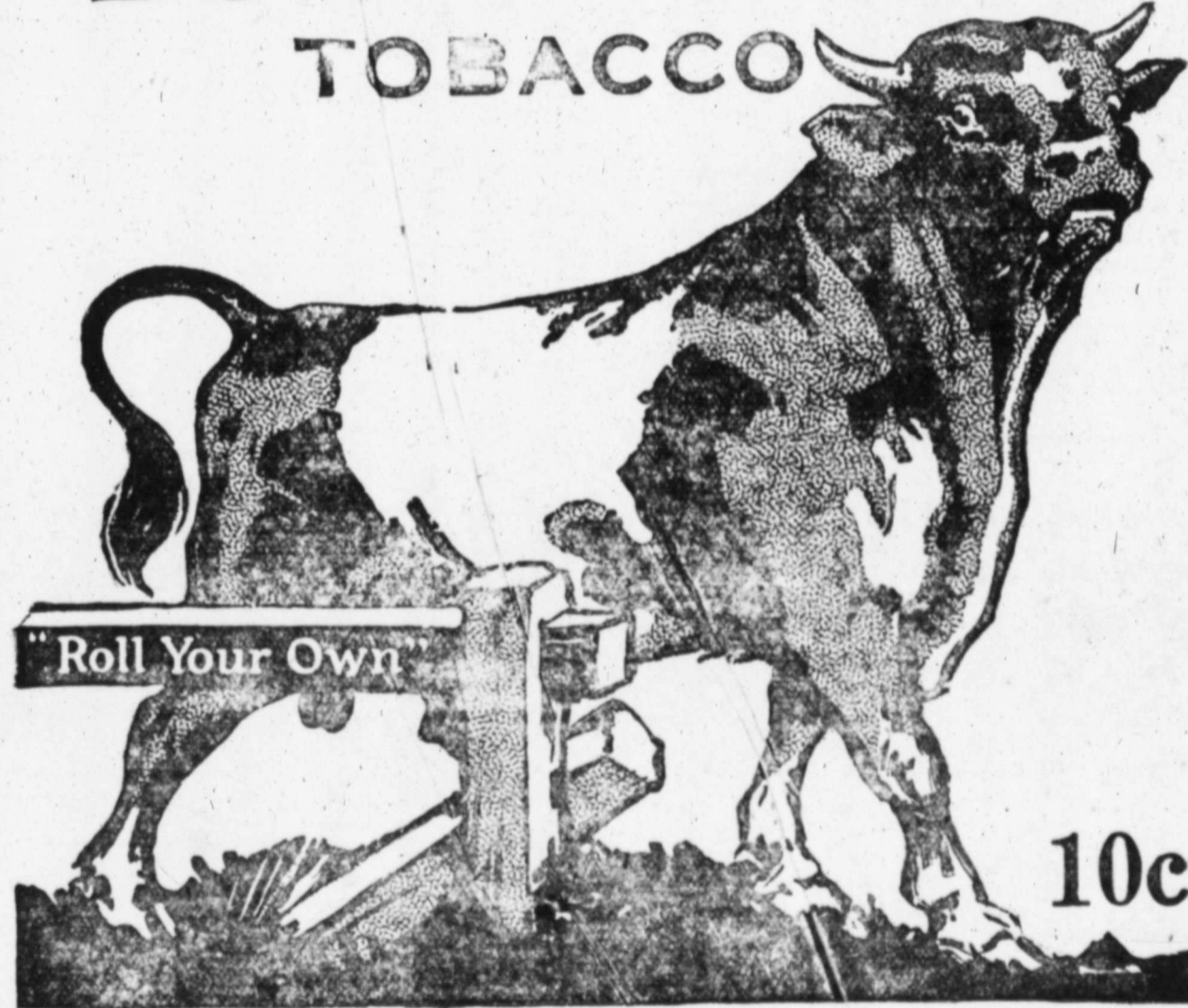

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### COUNTY SUPERINTENDENTS

Austin, Texas, April 30.—County superintendents of public instruction are to be paid more if the plans of the committee on educational affairs of Texas mature. "They should not hope to get as much as a carpenter or bricklayer," said a member of the committee. "They are to be paid, I hope, as much as the justices of peace or the constables in their county receive. Investigations show that the county superintendents receive, after their expenses are deducted, less than any other county officials."

In many counties the superintendent is compelled to distribute material for trustee elections. This expense alone frequently exceeds the amount allowed for office expenses of the superintendent; superintendents of Fannin and Collin counties spend more for stamps than their allotment. Visiting each school in the county once a year costs more than \$300, for which no provision is made; the superintendent must pay it out of his salary. Relief will be had from the special session of the legislature, which is to be called to meet in May. Governor Hobby met, with the committee, which he has named, and its members are assured the recommendations of the committee will be submitted at the called session. All recommendations have the support of all the teaching fraternity of the state.

Three other recommendations were made by the committee. They are that the certificate law should be revised so that certificates issued in other states may be honored in Texas; that the limit of salary that may be paid to teachers be raised, and that additional appropriations be made for the state schools and the state department of education.

### NEGRO BURGLAR GETS TERM OF 72 YEARS.

Houston, Texas, May 1.—Raymond Smit, negro, was assed a term of 72 years in the penitentiary in Criminal District Court. The negro pleaded not guilty to eight charges, when he had previously confessed to burglary charges, and the judge characterized him as "hard-headed," when he pronounced the sentence. The jury in each of the eight cases assessed five year. The negro had already a 32-year sentence before him.

The complainant and the court stenographer who took Smith's former confessions, were used as witnesses. This is the longest burglary sentence ever pronounced here.

### PROHIBITS USE OF AUTOS.

London, May 1.—A royal decree soon will be published in Italy prohibiting the use of automobiles in view of the serious shortage of petroleum and the high rate of exchange, according to an announcement in a Rome newspaper.
