## Mayor Rhinehart Named to GOC Post

Mayor O. W. Rhinehart, Bovina, Mayor Charles E. Allen, Friona, and Mayor John S. Williams of Farwell were named post supervisors for the Ground Observer Corps Post to be established in their locations.

The appointment was made by County Judge A. D. Smith of Parmer County, and it was announced on June 30 in Austin by the State Defense and Disaster Relief Office.

The Ground Observer Corps is an organization of civilian volunteers who have agreed to aid the United States Air Defense Force in observing, evaluating and reporting, from their observation posts, movements of aircraft to a central reporting point known as a filter center.

These observation posts are located as near to eight miles apart as possible. They are deemed vitally important as a supplement to the network of radar stations which are charged with the responsibility of detecting enemy aircraft invading the United States.

## 1240 Feet Of Watermain Installed In Gardner Addition

Bovina's women softball team defeated Springlake 24-17 Monday July 11, at Springlake.


Catcher Irene Hardage and Shortstop Irene Wilkerson were leading hitters for Bovina with a home run apiece.

## Mass Meeting Set For Friday Night

## Agent Warns Of Fleahopper

The cotton fleahopper is beginning to show up in Parmer County cotton and the Bovina area is no exception, says Joe Jones, Parmer County Agent.

The county agent has called cotton insect control meetings. The Bovina meeting will be at the Legion Hall at 8:30 next Wednesday, and be followed by one at the Hub at 10:30.

Due to the short growing season of this section of the country it is necessary for the fruit of the cotton to set (stay with the plant and continue to grow) the first time it comes on. If the fruit sets the first time it comes on, the cotton will be earlier maturing, of better grade, harvest may be earlier, and a higher per cent of the bolls will make mature cotton.

The next few weeks are the "critical period," Jones emphasizes. The cotton fruit is just beginning to set and that is when the fleahopper does its damage. The damage is not visible because the squares will be killed before they are large enough to be noticed.

Usually, Jones says, squares don't drop off for a few days after they have been "punctured." They stay on the stalk several days even after they are dead. Even if they do fall off the stalk they are too small to see on the ground unless they are being looked for carefully.

The fleahopper pierces terminal buds and newly-formed squares, causing them to drop, says a booklet on cotton insects prepared by Hercules Powder Company. This often results in tall, whiplike plants without fruit or fruiting branches, or other abnormal plant growth. Injury occurs chiefly in early season.

## Water Tower Will Be In Use Soon

Bovina's long-awaited water tower has been completed and "will probably be in use some time in the next two weeks," estimated Aubrey Brock, a member of the committee that helped get the tower for Bovina.

The tower was given to the city by the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe railroad and the structure was moved here from Stratford. The bill of sale on the tower was received by the city the 15th of March and the tower itself arrived here in May.

Erwin Steel Erectors of Lubbock was contracted to do the erection last February and the erection started some six weeks ago. C. B. Clegg was the engineer in charge of the tower for the city.

Though the tower was given to the city, the erection and line and other accessories will cost about \$19,000. The bottom of the tank is a little better than 100 feet above the ground.

J. T. Hammonds was mayor at the time plans were laid for the tower. A. M. Wilson and Aubrey Brock were members of the city commission.

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
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
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

FLEAHOPPER—

"The adult cotton fleahopper is an oval-shaped, pale-green winged insect about one-seventh of an inch long. The body is dotted with small dark spots with four black marks near wing tips. The young fleahopper is very small, green, and wingless."

The squares range in size from that of a pin head to a match head when the fleahopper kills them. The place to look for them is in the terminal of the cotton stalk.

Life cycle of the fleahopper is about three weeks. Several generations may mature during a year. The fleahopper spends the winter in the egg stage.

"If fleahoppers are preventing the set of squares when the first squares begin to form, control should be started at once," the booklet concluded.

Toxaphene is possibly the best control for the fleahopper. It does a good job of killing the hopper itself and does not destroy as many beneficial insects as other controls do.

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
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
