The inspector was here recently examining the work and needs of the school. Following this up Captain Walthall and Superintendent C. F. Wellborn went to Austin in person to press the matter, and after the conference, the department promised three thousand dollars state aid, which comes like manna from heaven at this time while our district was burdened with a load of indebtedness out of which it could see no way to settle except for the people to "dig" it up from their pockets.

This indebtedness, as those informed in the matter understand, is for furniture and equipment. At the time the fire caught us, the old furniture had not been paid for. Neither had the extra money put in the building been paid for. Added to this we have the indebtedness for the new building and new furniture and equipment, and all together it was indeed a load and a problem which has caused the trustees much worry. With this help, which is not sufficient to entirely relieve us, but removes the bulk of it we can now foreseethe day when the whele load will be lifted and we can enjoy all the benefits of a progressive

#### NACOGDOCHES TRADITIONS

Among the adventurers who came to Texas when this was a wild and attractive land, there were physicians who figured as leaders, or had unusual traits of character, or ca-

One of these notables was Dr. R. A. Irion, whos name will over be remembered from the fact that the picturesque high hill in the western part of the town is called Irion Hill. His was the first residence up there, and years it was the only one. The ground belonging to this homestead included acres of dense woods and tall timber. There were vales, ravines, briers and brambles, with rippling streams of pure spring water running through the wilds. Wild deer and turkey, wolves and foxes were abundant.

Dr. Irion came from Mississippi a young man qualified for his profession. He had a calamitous experience in his voyage, getting separated from his family by accidental events, and his wife dying.

At Nacogdoches he became well acquainted with General Sam Houston who recognized his ability and made him secretry of state when Houston was president of the Republic of Texas. 



#### NACOGDOCHES TRADITIONS

Several more of the old-time physicians who were prominent here may well be referred to. One of these was Dr. William Porter Fears. The name by which he was commonly known in his parental home was Porter, and he was so-called by his many outside friends and some named their children after him. At school he was called Bill by his schoolmates, as well as by other acquaintances. But in the Confederate army he became justly styled Captain. He was soon promoted to that rank by election of his comrades. These titles were displaced by the professional title of doctor.

Dr. Fears was born in Georgia in 1842, and came to Nacogdoches with today. There are to be four "Legionhis parents in 1860. At school in the old Nacogdoches University Bill Fears was in the highest grade. He was well advanced in the dead languages, in higher mathematics and in kindred branches. The Confederate war broke up the school and all the boys volunteered. The teacher, from the state vice-commander. De-Captain W. L. Alexander, joined the army as a private in 1861; so did Bill in East Central Texas. Fears in 1862 in a different company. Both returned in 1865. The teacher became a lawyer and lived at Quitman, Texas, till his death in 1868. The Fears family left Nacogdoches and lived on a farm near Fitze, where Porter began the study of medicine. His preceptor was Dr. T. H. Hollis in Nacogdoches. He attended lectures in the University of Louisiana at New Orleans 1868-9-70, graduating as the chosen valedictorian of his class. He holds the oldest diploma and is the oldest living physician in the county. His career has not been adventurous or remarkably eventful, but until age held him back he was always at the head, though modest, quiet and unpretentious. He was regarded as one of the best anatomists and pathologists in his class.

At one stage of his professional life he was rated as the best doctor in the county. Chloralhydrate had not been used. almost criminal, and a wound to the hollow was considered fatal. Abdominal abscess, or peritinitis, was frequently fatal. Auto-cars had not mobilized, nor trained nurses. But trained patients were the rule. They were trained to have the patience to wait till the doctor was sent for, far away, not phoned for-never heard of a telephone, much less used one. And when the long-desired doctor had plodded for miles over bad so-called roads, and reached the bedside, the patient reached out a burning hand for the doctor to feel his pulse and therefrom announce the fever; the patient habitually poked his tongue out. The doctor said it was foul, and proceeded to fix up some calomel powders and bluemasspills.

Dr. Campbell was born at Talladegs, Ala., in 1852, came to Larissa the same year. He brought his parents along loaded in a two-horse wagon.

He read medicine under Dr. R. P. Bone, attended his first course of lectures at Tulane University, New Orleans, 1872-3. In 1874 he went to Nashville University. At this time Vanderbilt University was started and the two schools were consolidated. He was chosen valedictorian by both, received diplomas from both and was the first graduate of the Vanderbilt. His first location was at Douglass, about forty years ago. He says that after he graduated there he settled where he now lived in the year 1900, and that when he started life he


