FACTORS IN DEPRESSION

To many persons the present business depression is infinitely more mind of the business expert.

It is obvious that the great world disturbance due to the war is a prieveryone of its many victims.

Entering into today's troubles are low productivity, the high cost of manufacturing, inefficient distribution and its high cost, the infinite variety of products, sluggish management of industry and poor finance ment and develop a conception of soand credit management. Anyone of ciay conduct and duty that will have these constitute a difficult barrier the effect of stopping homicides, and for business to hurdle.

While industrial production is higher than some time ago, it is still below normal. The individual is producand in turn decreases sales. An inefchronic sore on the body economic. The State, has learned pretty well the art of economic production and consumption. Here in normal times these elements in the economic triangle have attained high efficiency and low cost, but the element of distribution of the products of the producers to the point desired by the consumers remains costly, wasteful and inefficient.

Trains of live cattle on their way to the packing centers of the West pass refrigerated trains of beef on their way to the consumers. Shiploads of raw cotton headed North pass shiploads of cotton goods on their way South. In the present era the high freight rates, transportation charges are higher than the cost of production and manufacture.

Until some of these troubles are eliminated, business will continue to suffer. Happily, the case is not one to puzzle the expert diagnositician. Isolating the causes, the business doctors can begin removing them. It is the consciousness of what's wrong that reduces the business gloom.

POISON BOOZE EVIL

Poison booze occupies almost as prominent place in the day's news as poison gas did in the days of the war, and it is difficult to say which is the more deadly. The drinker who indulges in the stuff that is sold under the name of liquor these days is taking a grave chance, and as the real "bottled in bond" contraband is becoming scarcer every day, that chance becomes infinitely great-

The syuthetic booze sold by the bootleggers is manufactured by unscrupulous men who have no regard for the law, and being criminals to the extent of risking jail for a few dollars in violation of state and federal statutes, they may be depended upon to go a step farther and market any kind of "dope" for which they can get

There are reckless souls who risk life and limb in speeding motor cars; there are others who test new parachute devices from the wings of flying airplanes, and still others who climb skyscrapers, or go over Niagara Falls, or dive from the top of Brooklyn bridge. All expect the reward of notoriety with its consequent vaudeville engagements for large sums. and then there are fools who drink bootleg rum. All the reward they can expect is to pose as central figures at a coroner's inquest.

To illustrate: Any man who arms himself with a pistol or dirk or dagger or brass knucks and leaves his own premises, not being a traveler or officer of the law, violates a plain statute and therefore does a lawless act.

He treats a statute which has been in force in Texas for more than fifty years with contempt. If he does not expect to use the forbidden weapon then carrying it is without reason. If he expects to use it, or proposes to do so, he is clearly a violator of law

If he does use it and takes the life of his fellowman, he is twice a violator of the law, because his having the pistol in his possession was montrary to law, and unless the act of killing was justified by existing statute it was likewise a violation of the

FARMER "GETS IT" BOTH WAYS

A letter rom a Nebraska farmer to a manufacturer of farming implements is quoted in a current agricultural journal explaining why the farmer is buying only what he must have.

This farmer, passing up the perplexing question of high prices in money, gets at the question of what he has to sell and what he can buy in direct terms. He says he needs a wagon; but that if he buys one at currents prices and pays for it in corn he will have to give 650 bushels. One does not wonder that the farmer hesitates to drive his new wagon loaded with corn 13 times to market to get the money to pay the implement

But the maker of the wogan writes in answer that even in selling the wag on 100 percent higher than in 1914, his concern is taking a loss, and he pushes the blame over to the railroads. "At 12 cents a bushel increase in freight you are paying the railroads \$78 more for transportation on the corn necessary to buy this wagon, therefore your increased contribution to the railroad company in getting this wagon out there and shipping enough corn to Chicago to pay for it, is \$89.40."

The latter sum is considerable more than the cost of a wagon in 1914. It is truly a perplexing condition when so great and important a body of the country's producers is thus handicap-

SCRAP THE WARSHIPS

When Secretary Hughes made his proposal for the "scrapping" of capital warships the term conveyed a single meaning to most persons: that the vessels were to be destroyed either by being broken up or sent to the junk pile or by sinking.

No doubt that was Mr. Hughes' intention: that the nations should make a "clean sweep" of some 68 mighty fighting ships as a beginning of the great work of armament limitation. Annex B of the naval treaty now under discussion, provides six ways of dealing with the warships that are to be retired from service: sinking at sea, breaking up into scrap iron, conversion for commercial purposes, conversion for harbor or auxiliary use, use astargets and use as gunnery ships. Three of these schemes would permit the possible use of these vessels again in the emergency of war.

The treaty provides that if any of the signatories should become engaged in war involving naval operations, it may give notice to the others of the suspension of its obligations under that document. Obviously the latitude allowed as to methods of "disposal" of condemned capital ships affords great opportunity to a nation to evade the spirit of the agreement while fulfilling it to the letter.

America, France and Italy believe there should be as much actual "scrapping," that is breaking up or sinking, as possible. Great Britain and Japan apparently incline to the conversion policy. "The way to resume as we were remnded on an historic occasion, is to rsume." The way to scrap battleships is to scrap them in earnest so that they can never be used again for war. The policy of conversion, even when carried out in the fullest faith, would inevitably contain many difficulties and complications and give rise to countless misunderstandings.

The straight thing is to put the sentenced battleships permanently out of business. Then we shall be living up fully to the spirit of the agreement which is looked to so confidently as a safeguard of peace.


