## HARDING TO THE SENATE

President Harding evidently believes that cringing before the senate was the surest way to obtain its approval of the work of the arms. conference. That alone can almost explain the prostration of the executive before the legislative branch of the government.

But in emphasizing that nothing given up at the arms conference impaired the sovereignity of the nations represented "except that (sovereignity) which was willingly and gladly given up to further the common welfare" the president takes a position which when taken by President Wilson in behalf of the League of Nations was branded by Mr, Harding as senator and his colleagues as unpatriotic, dangerous to the ration's safety and impossible.

Time a l again adviates of the League a ... 'es that in entering 't the United States was sacrificing no sovereignity beyond that surrendered in the making of a most trivial treaty, and with this additional guarantee that this country was asked to bind itself with the world instead of only six or at most nine nations.

And so it appears that Mr. Harding who now asks the senate to surrender certain rights in behalf of the alliance (and alliances in the past have invariably led to war) but a few months ago, joined with the senators against the same thing when it applied to a world concert of policy and action. The more the arms conference is studied the more it becomes apparent that it was a political substitute for the infamous rejection of the League by politics. If it were only so, the world's welfare would be less menaced than by a collection of new alliances-a setting off of one group of nations against another when endurable peace demands but one alliance, one group, one concert, one League of Nations.

HARDING "OLD GUARDISM"

President Harding, in continuing his opposition to the direct primary, is on rather delicate ground. It is fresh in mind that he was distanced in the presidential preference primaries in 1920, and that in 1912 he was chairman of the Ohio Republican Convention that was accused of not giving Roosevelt a "square deal". Despite that it would be in better taste for him to leave it to someone else to talk on such subjects at this time, when there are so many other matters to engage his attention, he has just made a speech, before the League of Republican Clubs, showing a craving to the return of the convention plan. However, as long as there is an old guard in the republican party to ignore the preferences of the primary and make nominations itself in a hotel room long ater midLight, republicans of the Harding strain of mind need not worry. Admitting that the people themselves have not shown the interest in the direct primary that had been hoped, what indeed can be said against the primary in this respect that could not be also said against the general election ? ## TO COTTON FARMERS

The cotton planters are at the parting of the ways. One road-full acreage-leads to positive and hopeless disaster; the other road-small acreage-leads to quick recovery and financial solvency. The future is in the keeping of the planters themselves. Under present conditions of supply and consumption, the carry over on August 1st next may be five million bales, and cannot be less than three

million bales. No authority estimates the consumption of American cotton at more than twelve million bales maximum for the next crop year, and the only safe course to pursue is to reduce acreage to the possibility of only eight million bales for the current year. Last year's acreage turns out to have been around thirty million acres, and except for the weevil devastation and adverse weather conditions, a crop of twelve million bales would have been possible, in which event cotton would have sold for 10c a pound and the South would have been inevitably bankrupt.

The time has come to turn a deaf ear to sentimentalists. The South does not raise cotton for humanitarian purposes, not with the object of clothing Chinese, Japanese and whatnot, but primarily for the purpose of making a living; and there is no more reason why the South should produce a surplus of cotton than that a cotton mill should produce a surplus of goods or a bank of issue keep out a redundant currency. In the case of the cotton mill or bank, these can curtail at will, but in the case of the cotton planter, he has only one time within the year at which to curtail, which is the planting season.

A man has no more right to commi economic than physical suicide. The sotton planters know that a small crop has a greater momentary value than a large crop, and with this fact established and recognized, failure to reduce acreage to the point of the world's reeds for cotton would be nothing short of economic suicide. Our slogan should be eight million

bales of cotton for the next crop. With such a prop the world will have a sufficiency of cotton, and this is the

extent of the planter's obligation to humanitarian consideration. The South is on trial, its intelligence is being weighed in the balance.

gained by gambling in a game where an unknown dealer holds the cards. There will always be sympathy and sometimes approbation for the person who risks and loses in constructive enterprises. But honorable risk and foolish gambling are as far apart as the poles.

Perhaps few of the farmers of the country realize that the twenty million dollars which the republican congress so generously voted for the aid of a comparatively small section of Russia came cut of the pockets of the wheat growers, many of whom are in real need of aid themselves. In other words, it was appropriated from the funds of the United States Grain Corporation and not from the United States treasury, and the funds of the Grain Corporation represent profits made off the wheat growers. These profits amount to more than ! thirty million dollars. Another phase of the mater is that congress set a precedent in this case, for charity of this kind in the past has been by private subscription. In 1845 the country was so moved by the distress in Ireland, where the potato crop had failed under the burden of furnishing the principal support of the eight millions of people in the island at that time, that millions were raised by private subscription, but even then congress was not asked to make an appropriation. In the case of Russia there was plenty of food in the country, but communism does not run true to its name and parts of Russia where food was abundant would not furnish it to the famine region without a price, and the price could not be raised by the sufferers. It must give the wheat farmer, who finds it hard to make both ends meet, a pleasant thrill to think that he is helping to feed the Russians, while his own children may be in need of ordinary necessities of life. The Bible says that he who does not look after his own household first is worse than a heathen

# Was Very Weak

"After the birth of my baby I had a back-set," writes Mrs. Mattie Crosswhite, of Glade Spring, Va. "I was very ill; thought I was going to die. #### NACOGDOCHES TRADITIONS

Before the war was an expression used in the long ago with a very different meaning from now-a-days. Prior to 1860 events were dated by the wars of the Texas-Mexico revolution, which terminated April 21, 1836, at the Battle of San Jacinto, whereby Texas gained her independence and became a republic.

The next war in which Texas was mortally interested was between the United States and Mexico, ending at the surrender of Chapultepec, September 15, 1848.

The Spanish war of 1898, resulting in the surrender of Manila and the Philippines, was brief.

Last but not least came the late world war of 1917, which gives us a new event to count "before the war." The civil war of the U.S. brought about a lot of personal events and wrangles in bigh places, a large per cent being from official jealousies or differences as to policies and promotions. The fall of the Conederacy was largely due to such causes. The loss of the battles of Gettysburg, Shiloh, Chickamauga and others may be thus listed.

The battles of Mansfield, Pleasant Hill, La., followed by the expulsion of General Banks' army, were directed by the Dick Taylor army in opposition to the opinion of his superior officer, General E. Kirby-Smith, who was not on the battle grounds. And General John R. Wharton was placed in command instead of Taylor at the last moment.

General Wharton was a lineal dedescendant of a distinguished family of pioneer Toxal. patriots, and had distignuished himself in the military service of the Confederacy. He was killed in Hou-ton, Texas, by Colonel George Wyth Taylor, April 6,\* 1865 The cause of the trouble was the

refusal of General Wharton to promote Col Baylor to brigadier general

Col. Baylor belonged to the noted Baylor family of Texans. The Baylors were great Indian fighters, and leaders in private life. General John R. Baylor was credited with saying, "A good Indian is a dead Indian."

Col. George W. Baylor was in command of a regiment in Gen. Tom Green's cavalry brigade. They were fighters of the cowboy style. They generally "went after it."



#### MUST USE FOUR LANGUAGES

#### Advertisers In Turkey Necessarily Under a Handicap That Amounts to a Good Deal.

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In order to advertise in Constantinople it is necessary to use four languages. The market is hard to cultivate, but newspapers give good results there. The population of Constantinople is very cosmopolitan, and all the foreigners speak their own language and read their own newspapers, writes Trade Commissioner Eliot G. Mears. To reach the public in general, advertisements should be published in newspapers of at least four languages. However, the best results are ob-

tained by publication in Turkish newspapers, for, on the one hand, the Turkish population is most numerous, and on the other the Turkish reader is more susceptible to the claims of advertisements than are Europeans and Armenians. It has been found by experience that advertising in newspapers gives very good results in Constantinople, especially if it is pushed vig-

No advertising is carried on traincars. Street advertising is not pro tected by law and cannot be recommended to foreign concerns. The cirwiation of newspapers is not great. French newspapers have an approximate issue of 6,000 to 8,000, Greek 4,-000 to 12,000, Armenian 4.000 to 8.000, and Turkish 10,000 to 15,000.

#### Gas Warfare on Rats.

The chemical warfare service has recently demonstrated that rats can be killed with porson gas. A mixture containing 30 per cent of phosgene and 70 of chlorine , was used. This was allowed to escape over an area of 900 square feet. Fifteen rats were on the area, and they all died from the effect of the deadly poisonous

They were killed at a cost of 40 Within 15 minutes the phosme had dissipated, while the chlorne gas required 30 minutes to diffuse nd the danger point. In view of the millions of dollars' loss caused rearly by these pests, any means of troying them is welcome.

#### Bird and Boat Collide. A flying albatross collided with

ressel in Australian waters with such force that the "trigger" locking the forward rudder was lifted, and the rudder released. The vessel was traveling at a speed of ten knots an hour at the time, and as a result of the sudden release of the locking gear, the rudder took charge and caused the steamer to sheer off her course. The engines were quickly stopped and the whistle blown for assistance. After a delay of about five minutes, however, the rudder was secured again. On a subsequent trip the rudder was found to be damaged and the steamer was withdrawn and sent for repairs. The albatross, a fine specimen, was measured by one of the deck hands and found to cover ten feet from tip to tip of the wings. The skipper at first mistook the bird for a sheet of newspaper swept off the

deck by a squall. The bird only missed the glass-inclosed wheelhouse by a couple of feet.

St. Elmo's Fire, a Sign at Sea. St Elmo's fire is the popular name of an appearance sometimes seen, especially in southern climates, during thunder storms, of a brush or star of light at the tops of masts, spires or other pointed objects. It is sometimes accompanied by a hissing noise and is of the same nature as the light caused by electricity streaming off from points connected with an electrical machine. The phenomenon, as seen at sea, was woven by the Greeks into the myth of Castor and Pollux. Even yet such

lights at the masthead are considered by sailors a sign that they have nothing to rear from the storm. The name comes from St. Elmo, St. Peter Gonzales, 1190-1246, a Spanish Dominican, who is envoked by sailors on the Mediterranean during storms.

#### Roman "Hours."

The Romans divided the day-time into twelve "hours." The exact length of these varied, of course with season and latitude; but the first always began at sunrise, the sixth ended and the seventh began at noon, and the twelfth ended at sunset. The period from sunset to sunrise, on the other hand, consisted (in military parlance) of four watches. Thus Julius Caesar, at his first crossing to Britain, states that he left port "about the third watch." reached Dover "about the fourth hour of the day," and rode at anchor "till the ninth hour." when the assembled fleet moved on up the coast.

Title Passed With Him.

The last holder of the judicial title of baron in Great Britain passed with the recent death in Dublin of Christopher Palles, who was baron of the exchequer in Ireland. The title of baron was abolished when the court of exchequer was merged with the Queen's bench, and Lord Chief Baron Palles was the last bearer of it.

He was the solicitor general for Ireland in 1872, and the same year was promoted attorney general. After holding the latter office for two years he became lord chief baron and held that position until 1916.

Tides in the Bay of Fundy.

The Bay of Fundy is noted for its high tides. At the head of the bay a rise of 62 'eet is known, and in Passamaquoddy bay, which indents New Brunswick near the border of the state of Maine, a rise of 25 feet is not uncommon. At St. John the rise varies from 20 to 27 feet. At Moneton the tide rushes up the estuary a crest or wave of water from 3 to 6 feet high. At most places the tide rises gradually. but not slowly, each wave rolling up on the shore a little higher than the preceding one. There are two high tides in every 24 hours. For instance, may at 10 o'clock in the forenoon and 10 at night, and on the following day the two high tides will be one hour later, and so on.

Snake-Charmer's Secret.

How does the snake-charmer charm? asks a writer in the Popular Science Monthly. That's one of the questions we've always asked ourselves. And now an English doctor tells us one of the secrets.

Take the case of the cobra, for instance. It is a very venomous snake, yet the snake-charmer is not harmed when bitten by one.

The secret lies in the fact that the charmer "milks" the cobra before he allows himself to be bitten. He makes the cobra bite into a piece of meat, thereby expelling two thirds of the poison in its poison gland. When the charmer allows the snake to bite him immediately thereafter, there is not enough poison left in the gland to do any harm.

What is the next step? The charmer makes the snake bite a fowl while he squeezes the remaining drops of poison out of the snake's gland; the fowl dies, and the charmer wins the confidence of his audience.


